AN ARTICLE, ran here earlier about revenue sharing had some interesting figures - assuming it all works the way it sounds. A state official was quoted as follows:

"Based on information we have received from the House Ways and Means Committee, the revenue - sharing bill approved by the Committee earlier thisweek will provide a total of \$202 million during the first year to cities and counties of Texas. Allocation of funds will be retroactive to January 1, 1972.

"We have worked closely with the Committee and Chairman Wilbur Mills to provide all assistance which would be helpful to the Committee in their deliberations. As a result of this close communication, we are now receiving detailed information as to specific allocations to the various counties of the State.

"Initial estimates indicate that a total of \$234,283 will be allocated to all governmental units in Eastland County. Of that amount, the county government will receive \$136,263.

The city of Cisco will receive \$32,325.

The city of Eastland will receive \$21,072.

The city of Ranger will receive \$25,619.

"The balance will be distributed to other cities and towns within the county.

"It would appear from these early estimates that the bill, if finally enacted, will provide substantial fiscal relief to the hard - pressed cities and counties of Texas. At the same time it will afford a real opportunity to improve and expand on those services which the people feel are most critically needed.

"I have strongly advocated approval of these funds to our cities and counties and I will continue to support these provisions until final Congressional approval is receive."

Commissioners Close Road

Congressman Omar Bureson Tuesday announced approval by Small Business Administration of a \$1,815,120.00 lease guarantee to Texas Railway Car Corp.

The Small Business Administration will issue an insurance policy to the lessor guaranteeing the lease in this amount for a term of 20 years.

It is anticipated that 315 employees will be hired in Ranger. Loan approval is going to the Ranger Industrial Foundation whose president is Bill Herod. The Foundation will assist Texas Railway Car Corp., a railroad repair business.

Financing will consist of \$210,055.00 from Small Business Administration, \$168,044.00 from local bond and \$42,011.00 from Ranger Industrial Foundation, for a total of \$420,100.00.

Funds will be used to purchase machinery and equipment for additional operation and for 315 employees. It is hoped that this will assist the community in a favorable economic impact to the area.

Headquarters of Texas Railway Car Corporation is in Abilene.

The Eastland County Commissioners Monday morning declared a county road on Tiffen road, north east of Ranger, closed.

Several Ranger citizens were present for the hearing in the County Commissioners Court Room in Eastland.

Jack Fambro, operator of Hagaman Ranch, said he was interested in seeing the road closed and was interested in seeing Ranger get new industry. He stated that several of his livestock had been shot and butchered near the sight of the road in question. He further stated that people were using the road as a dumping ground for trash and beer parties.

Col. C.O. Shiflett, president of the Texas Railway Car Corp., whose firm will build a million dollar plant for the purpose of repairing and repainting railway cars, stated that his firm had purchased the Lone Star Gas Company's tank car shop south of town and a new building located on Tiffen road will employ up to 350 employees. Shiflett said in order for his firm to go ahead with plans for the new construction the road must be closed.

Woods, commissioner for Precinct one, said the new business will not only help

Ranger, but will help the entire county. He said "I want it to go on the records that I am for closing the road."

Mat Dillion, of International Processing Systems, another new business in Ranger, stated, "The systems is on property adjoining the Tank Car property and his firm plan to be in operation soon smelting metals and the road must be closed for security reasons for the b business.

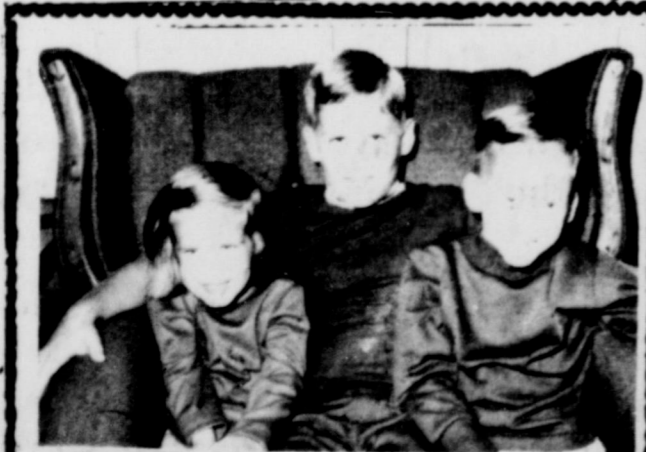

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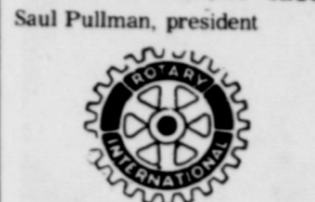

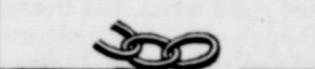

Swift To Open Giant Brownwood Feed Mill

Swift Dairy and Poultry Company is constructing an automated feed plant in Brownwood, Tex., it was announced today by Charles K. Olcott, president.

The facility will have an annual capacity of 150,000 tons on a two shift basis. Features of the new facility will include automatic punch card batching and mixing systems for maximum quality control of all products, and the latest safety and environmental controls.

The plant is being constructed in Brownwood Industrial Park by Sprout, Waldron and Company, and is scheduled for completion by Nov. 1, 1972. Houston H. Wedeman will manage the new facility, which will replace the present mill.

He said that Swift's basic goal in constructing the plant is to provide its growing markets in West Central Texas and Eastern New Mexico with the finest quality feed products and the best service available.

Run-Offs Loom

And the fever builds again. This time for the June Run-Off elections.

On the local level, there are only three contests to be decided in the runoff.

Seeking the Rising Star County Commissioners Post, Precinct Three, are Curt Smith and L.T. Owen. In the five-man race last Saturday, Smith got 311 and Owen, 190.

Also in Rising Star, Precinct Three, Arley Bibby and W.H. (Hamp) Kornegay are in the runoff. Bibby got 382 and Kornegay, 372.

In Cisco, there's a Constable run-off too, where Bill (B.W.) Carr got 394 and S.E. Parkinson got 598.

Incumbent District Judge Earl Conner Jr. carried every box for a total of 2,984 votes to defeat two opponents without a runoff. Bill B. Hart got 1,220 and Truman Kirk got 1,149.

These are complete, unofficial returns from Saturday's voting.

Incumbent Sheriff L.E. Sublett carried the eight boxes and absentee in the county amassing 3,621 votes, to defeat Bill Tackett who got 1,153 and Benny Mosley who got 666 without a run off.

Nancy Trout, a long time employee in the tax office, polled 4,179 votes to defeat Eddie Pietraszek who got 1,050. Incumbent Edgar Alton did not seek re-election to the tax office.

State Rep. Joe Hanna carried every box in the county, getting 3,796 votes to his opponent, Bill Qualls, who got 1,299. Hanna won the district for re-election.

Sen. Tom Creighton carried all but two boxes in the county, betting 2,540 votes, but wound up in a run-off with Tom

Holmes of Granbury who got 2,059 votes here, carrying Cisco and Gorman. A third man B. Carnie Marsh of Denton got 568 votes in this county.

Incumbent Bill Hunter won re-nomination handily getting 1,183 votes to defeat Howard Parsons who got 297 votes for constab in Eastland and Olden.

The county voted "for" the amendment which would curb bussing, 3,234 for and 920 against.

John Hill got 2,713 votes in this county, carrying six boxes, and Crawford Martin got 2,257 carrying two and the absentee.

Bill Hobby got Eastland County with 2,213 votes, carrying all but Ranger where Wayne Connally lead. Connally had a total of 1,379 in the county; Joe Christi, 620, and Ralph Hall got 633.

Barefoot Sanders carried the county, getting 2,453 votes and carried all but Ranger, Carbon and Rising Star. Ralph Yarborough carried those three boxes and got 2,309 votes.

Dolph Briscoe carried every box here, getting 2,984 with Ben Barnes getting 1,006 and Frances Farenthold, 745.

In Ranger, J.J.W. Vinson got 431 votes to defeat John E. Boyd, 296 for Constable.

Calvert carried the county with 2,347 votes for comptroller. Blankenship got 584; Pendleton, 578; Robertson, 188; Stanford Smith, 267; Vernon Smith, 212 and Wilson, 754.

Jesse James carried the county with 3,012 for treasurer. Cruz got 126; Robnett, 479; Rudolph, 798; Smylie, 243; Weldon, 367.

John White got 3,505 for agriculture commissioner and Bell got 1,478.

Byron Tunnell got 2,465 for railroad commissioner; Lawson got 762; and West, 1,589.

GOP VOTING

Republicans had a total vote of 65 in three boxes in the county. For governor, Grover got 19; Fay, 12; Hall, 4; Jenkins, 3; McElroy, 8; and Reagan, 16. The GOP voted 50 for the bussing amendment and 15 against, and 27 for daylight saving time and 37 against daylight saving time.

Democrats voted 5,470 as opposed to 4,459 two years ago in the first primary. A total of 8,884 were qualified to vote in the county.





May, manager of the Eastland distribution office, "Lone Star has a commitment to its customers to vigorously compete for supplies of natural gas to keep its reserves in a favorable position. While other sections of the country are experiencing some shortages of natural gas, Lone Star has maintained favorable supplies. The gas cost adjustment portion of the application placed before the City Council today," continued Mr. May, "will help Lone Star maintain its favorable gas supply position and assure our customers of natural gas service for the future."

Approval of the company's application would increase the average monthly residential gas bill by approximately 72 cents.

Lone Star serves more than 1600 customers in Eastland.

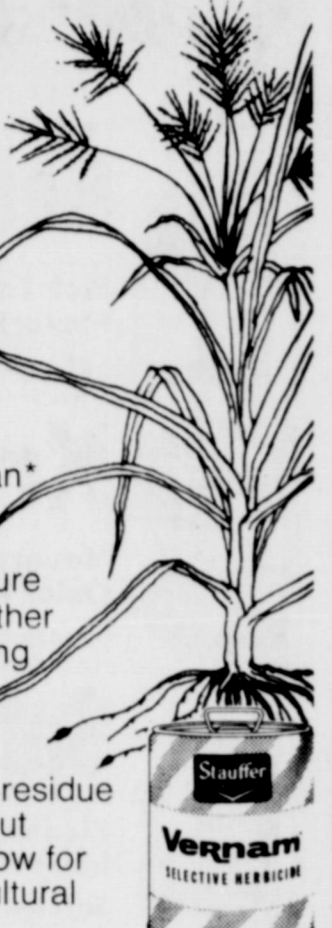

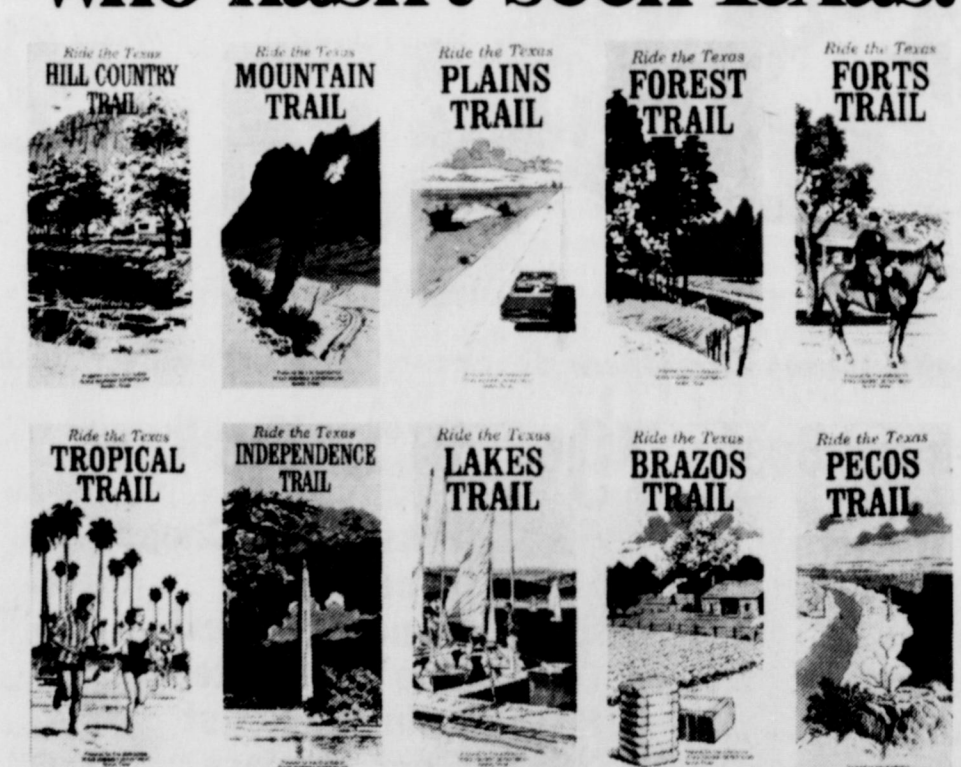

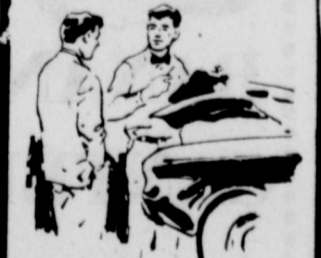

Texas Agriculture Commissioner, John C. White, announced today that the Department's light trapping program for the lesser cornstalk borer, Texas' most serious peanut insect pest, has captured the first moth for the 1972 season in the central Texas area.

Agricultural Deadlines

Certification Feed Grain, Peanuts, Cotton If you are enrolled in the feed grain or cotton program the final date to certify to your feed grain, cotton and set aside acreage is JULY 3, 1972. The final date to certify to your peanut acreage is AUGUST 1, 1972.

Grazing Deadline Nears Grazing of designated set aside acreage is prohibited during the period between APRIL 30 and OCTOBER 1 for Eastland County. No crops are to be harvested, including hay, from the set aside acreage at anytime during the year.

Each farm operator is expected to use needed control measures for weeds, erosion, insects, rodents and scattered brush.

Small grain cover crops must be pastured off, clipped or incorporated into the soil or destroyed by natural causes by MAY 1. EXCEPTION: Small grains may be left standing on set aside and conserving base acreage provided a written request is made by MAY 1.

Workmanlike Manner Those who are planting peanuts, feed grain or cotton are reminded that the crop must be planted, cultivated and cared for in a workmanlike manner to be eligible for history. Failure to care for a crop in a workmanlike manner could result in a loss of the base of allotment. Proper seedbed preparation is of utmost importance.

Skip - row Rules for 1972 Peanuts Producers who are going to plant peanuts in a pattern other than solid or with a competitive crop should check with this office before doing so.

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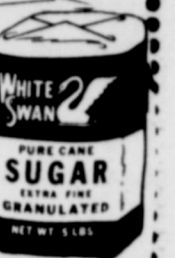
