City Okays TESCO Rate, Asks Metro Phone Service

At Business-**Packed Meet**

The Eastland City Commission in a four - hour session Monday evening approved on second reading a six - percent rate increase for Texas Electric Service Co.; deferred action on a proposed telephone rate increase; heard some good sewer plant news; and handled a multitude of other important

Mayor James Reid presided with all commissioners

Passage on second reading for TESCO came following an explanation by Eastland Division Manager Frank Sayre on a recent Star - Telegram article brought to his attention by commission - visitor Cliff Wilson, on earnings. Mr. Sayre explained that with a utility company, earnings can increase even though return on investment declines.

The Commission passed a resolution asking Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. through its District Manager John McGowan, for a feasibility study and rate report on extended dialing serv ice. Such a service, should it be adopted, would provide toll - free dialing between Eastland and Cisco and between Eastland and Ranger. The Ranger commission passed a similar resolution last week and Cisco was expected to make the request Tuesday evening. A joint meeting will probably be held after all the requests are

Following a lengthy discussion of existing telephone service in Eastland, the commissioners tabled a telephone company request for an increase in basic rates. A letter to the commission from a Morton Valley resident was read and considered.

The telephone company's report is that their rate of return is below needs at its present 2.51 percent. The listed value of the Eastland property is \$795,000 and the net income \$19,943. (The asked rate is shown in an adjacent story).

The company is asking the basic rate increase now even though, under the freeze, the rate hike might not go into effect until later. The extended dialing service (metro) would take some 18 months to install. McGowan said, and the rate increase for this service would not be in effect until such service actually began.

The city agreed to secure an option on four lots to be used as a possible site for a new community center.

It was reported that women of the town may canvass citizens to see if they'd be willing to voluntarily add a \$1 to their water bills to raise money to build a new civic center.

This pertains to skip row planting only and not strip - row. The skip - row planting pattern is peanuts alternated with idle land. The strip - row planting is peanuts stripped with a competitive crop. The current rules on strip row planting remain unchanged.

This has been thoroughly checked with the compliance department in Washington, and any reports to the contrary are erroneous. For further information or clarification, check with your local ASCS


