A - 2 Establishing Permanent Grasses

- - Limit: Coastal Bermuda - 25 acres OR Other approved grasses - - \$300.00

B - 7 Livestock Water Empoundment Limit: 3000 cubic yards

The limit per farm and per farmer is set at \$625.00.

WHEAT - FEED GRAIN - COTTON Sign up changed - - Sign - up dates for the 1972 wheat, cotton and feed grain programs have been changed to FEBRUARY 3 thru MARCH 10, 1972. Some changes in the programs are anticipated and as soon as we have the information you will be advised accordingly. Keep the new sign up dates in mind.

COTTON ALLOTMENT TRANSFER - - Cotton producers who plan to transfer cotton out of the county must do so not later than APRIL 1, 1972. Allotments will be transferred on the basis of 1971 yields, not 1972.

WOOL - UNSHORN LAMBS - MOHAIR - - January 31 is the final date to bring your sales receipts for your wool, unshorn lambs and mohair for the 1971 marketing year to the office. Check your files to see if you have turned these in to the office for payment.

PEANUT TRANSFERS - - January 3 to April 1, 1972 is set as the dates to transfer peanut allotments within the county. If you are going to transfer your allotment for 1972 you must ask that a yield be established for your farm. Come to the office to make your request for a yield.

PEANUT MARKETING CARDS - - January 29 is the final date to return peanut marketing cards that were issued to your farm. Enter the acreage picked or threshed for the year, peanuts saved for seed, sign and return to the office.

IRS Announces Results of Checks On Price Posting Rules

Dallas, Texas - The results of initial IRS spot checks of retail stores in North Texas for compliance with Price Commission posting requirements which went into effect January 2 were announced today by Ellis Campbell, Jr., Internal Revenue Service District Director.

523 spot checks were conducted during the period December 28, 1971 through January 10, 1972. These showed that 134 retailers were in full compliance; 389 were in various stages of compliance or

were in violation of the posting requirements.

Prior to the January 2 posting deadline, IRS found a high rate of compliance, Mr. Campbell said. Much of the recent non-compliance, he explained, relates to the fact that until January 2, retailers were required only to post signs announcing the availability of base price information.

Regulations requiring additional posting procedures by January 2 first appeared in the Federal Register on November 13, 1971.

Retailers who have made a bonafide, but incomplete, attempt to comply with the guidelines will be given until January 17 to adjust their posting procedures. Retailers who have made no attempt to comply with the requirements will be held in violation. The penalty for each violation is up to \$5,000 a day for as long as the violation continues.

Mr. Campbell said that the current posting regulations require retailers with sales of less than \$100,000 per year to display prominently the base price for those 40 products which had the highest dollar sales volume during the last

fiscal year, or those products which accounted for 50 percent of the total dollar sales volume during that year, whichever is less.

Retailers with sales of \$100,000 or more per year are required to display prominently the base price for food and food related (grocery store) products. These prices may be posted at a central location provided that signs are available in each department indicating the location of the base price list.

These larger retailers must also post the base price for the 40 non-food items which had the highest dollar sales volume

in each department during the last fiscal year or those non-food products which accounted for at least 50 percent of total dollar sales in that department during that year, whichever is less. Base price lists for non-food items must be prominently posted in each department containing non-food items.

Mr. Campbell emphasized that the location of price lists must be easily accessible to the customer and must not require him to ask a store employee for access to the information. At least one sign (minimum of 22" x 28") must be displayed on each floor of a retail establishment announcing the

availability of base price information for all items that are not required to be posted, he added.

It is vital, Mr. Campbell said, that retailers and consumers be aware of posting requirements.

He urged consumers to look for the price lists and speak to store managers if lists are absent or appear incomplete. The IRS has given top priority to spot-checking for compliance with these requirements.
