This represents only the second request for increase in the company's history, and in fact during the past several years, two decreases have been initiated by the company.

All commissioners were present with Mayor James Reid presiding.



Eastland Police Chief burglaries can generally be crime and related activities in Eastland for the years 1970 and 1971, stated Wednesday that overall crime was down 56

These figures pertain to certain felony crimes, including burglaries and thefts.

However, Morren said, the number of citations issued by his officers showed a marked increase over 1970. During 1971 a total of 520 citations were issued as compared to 396 for the previous year.

F.N. Savre, manager, stated: 'Texas Electric Service Company, because of sharply increased costs that it can no longer absorb or offset, and facing its largest construction program in history, must

board increase in its rates. "This is the minimum amount needed to continue to provide dependable electric service for the growing needs of our customers.

"For the residential customer with a \$15 bill, the increase will amount to 90 center per month or 3 cents a day. For a customer with a \$10 monthly bill, the increase will be 60 cents, and for a \$5 bill, 30 cents. Texas Electric Service

Company has requested a rate increase only twice before in its history, Sayre pointed out, while the company's efforts to keep the cost of electricity as low as possible have resulted in a number of voluntary rate

increase was granted in 1961. and was offset by voluntary reductions in 1963 and 1965. "In spite of continuing in-

flation, the electricity used by today's average residential customer costs less than in 1961," Sayre said. "Even with the 6 percent increase, the cost will still be less than it was ten vears ago."

We have been able to hold the line against rising costs through economies resulting from increased usage, installation of larger and more efficient generating units, and by taking advantage of automation and other technological advances. But relentless inflation and the resulting higher costs affecting every phase of our business have now outstripped the economies we have been able to realize in the past," Sayre said.

At the same time the company is experiencing this cost squeeze. Savre reported, it is embarking of the largest construction program in its

IRS Announces Results of Checks On Price Posting Rules

Dallas, Texas - - The results of initial IRS spot checks of retail stores in North Texas for compliance with Price Commission posting requirements which went into effect January 2 were announced today by Ellis Campbell, Jr., Internal Revenue Service District Director.

523 spot checks were conducted during the period December 28, 1971 through January 10, 1972. These showed that 134 retailers were in full compliance; 389 were in various stages of compliance or were in violation of the posting requirements .

Prior to the January 2 posting deadline, IRS found a high rate of compliance, Mr. Campbell said. Much of the recent noncompliance, he explained, relates to the fact that until January 2, retailers were required only to post signs announcing the availability of base price information.

Regulations requiring additional posting procedures by January 2 first appeared in the Federal Register on November

bonafide, but incomplete, attempt to comply with the guidelines will be given until January 17 to adjust their posting procedures. Retailers who have made no attempt to comply with the requirements will be held in violation. The penalty for each violation is up to \$5,000 a day for as long as the violation continues.

Mr. Campbell said that the current posting regulations require retailers with sales of less than \$100,000 per year to display prominently the base price for those 40 products which had the highest dollar sales volume during the last
