Income Tax Form Mailing Plan Outlined

The 1955 income tax forms and instructions to individual taxpayers will be mailed between December 27 and January 19 from Kansas City, it was announced today.

"Taxpayers should postpone their inquiries regarding these forms until after January 10," the announcement said.

"Taxpayers receiving tax blanks and instructions by mail should not misplace or discard them, but should save them for use in filing their tax returns, since the supply of instruction pamphlets is limited," it was added.

A study of the new tax forms shows a few changes which make the return easier to complete. A new tax table for married taxpayers filing jointly eliminates the complicated computation on the return for figuring tax on split incomes.

Farmers who file and pay estimated taxes by the January 15, 1956, deadline may also obtain the forms they require at district and local offices. Most post offices have a supply of tax forms for local residents.

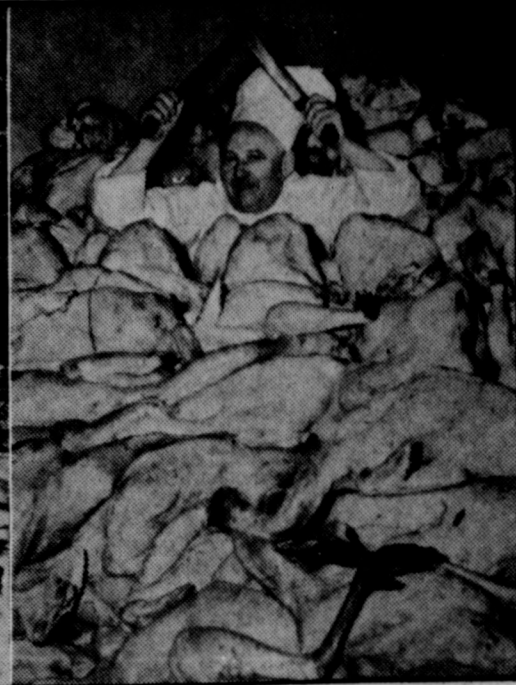

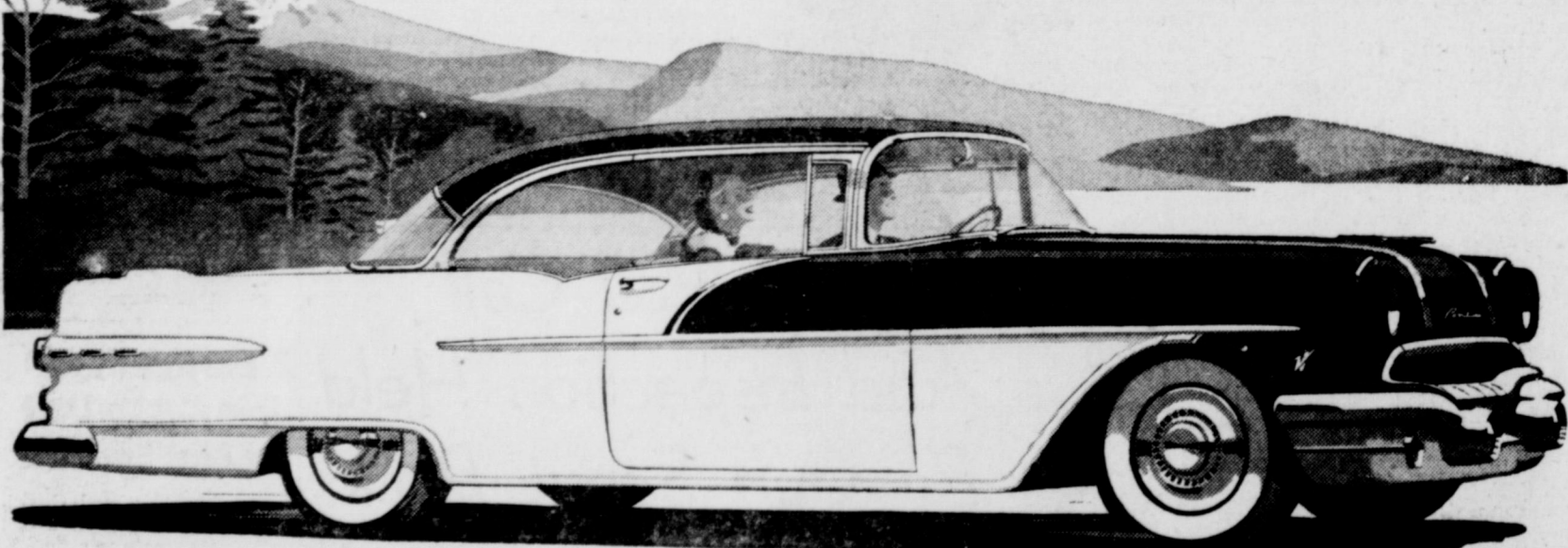

"Messiah" Scheduled December 11 At Ranger First Methodist Church

The combined choirs of First Methodist Church and Ranger Junior College, under the direction of Fred D. Baumgardner, will present Handel's "Messiah," a sacred oratorio, Sunday, Dec. 11 at 7:30 p.m. at the First Methodist church Ranger.

Dr. E. Edwin Young will be guest organist for the presentation and Mary Ellen Deffebach will be pianist. Featured soloists will be Miss Jo Ann Crider, soprano, Miss Vivian Simmons, soprano, Mrs. Richard Bonney, soprano, Miss Maxine McCotter, contralto, Mrs. Paul Nold, contralto and H. A. Lotspeich, bass.

The first part of the oratorio depicts "The Prophecies and the Fulfillment" and the last part is the symbolic of "The Pastoral Symphony."

John Frederick Handel composed "The Messiah" when he was 56 years of age during a period of 24 days from Aug. 22, 1741 until Sept. 14. The first performance of the oratorio took place at noon on April 13, 1742 in Dublin, Ireland where it was enthusiastically received.

Following is the actual review printed in Faulkner's Journal, the Dublin Gazette and the Dublin News Letter, which evidently shared the same critic: "The best judges allowed it to be the most finished piece of music. Words are wanting to express the exquisite delight it afforded to the admiring, crowded audience. The sublime, the grand and the tender adapted to the most elevated, majestic and moving words, conspired to transport and charm the ravished heart and ear."

London first heard "The Messiah" at Covent Garden in 1743. It was on this occasion that the reverent and still existing custom of standing during the "Hallelujah" chorus was inaugurated by King George II, who was so moved by its sublimity that he rose to his feet, allowed by the entire audience.

"The Messiah" was performed thirty-four times during Handel's lifetime and his last public act was to direct it on April 6, 1759, only

a week before his death. The public is cordially invited to attend this year's performance of Handel's immortal sacred classic.

Slated for 1,800 feet with rotary, it spots 234 feet from north and 890 feet from the east lines of Section 6, Block 6, ETR Survey.

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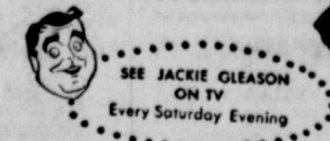

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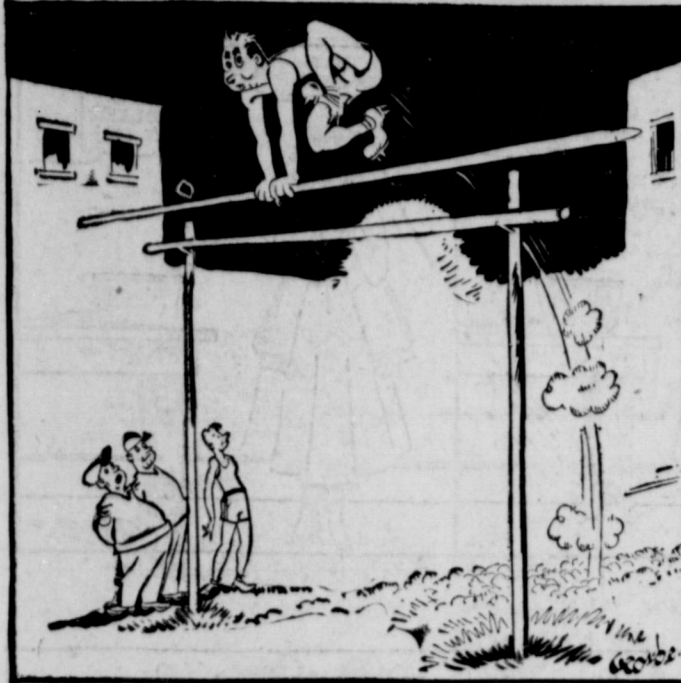

Ranger Bulldogs Face Stinnett For Quarterfinal Crown Saturday

A bleak and dark overcast hung over the Ranger Bulldogs this week as serious backfield injuries and bruises curtailed light, conditioning workouts in preparation for Saturday's quarterfinals tilt at Childress with the Stinnett Rattlers, kingpins of District 1A.

The Bulldogs, who gained the privilege of meeting the Rattlers in the quarterfinals with a 20-6 victory over Albany in district play and a 20-16 decision over the McCamey Badgers in regional competition, had only one first stringer in the backfield in top physical shape.

David Wharton pulled through the McCamey contest unscathed, but is yet nursing a hand that was broken six weeks ago. David's brother, the team's leading scorer was favoring a bruised shoulder and Fullback Tommy Sutton, who led the Bulldogs in their decision over Albany, was hospitalized shortly after the McCamey battle with a virus. He was not released until Tuesday.

Starting Quarterback Paul Hinds has lost most of his speed with a bruised leg and reserve quarterback Charles Wolford was put to bed Sunday with a virus. On the line, first string tackle Archie Robinson was unable to meet the chilling workouts Monday because of a severe cold.

With other than light bruises, the Bulldog line is nearly at full strength, but the effects of their battle with the beefy Badgers are plainly visible.

Records Vary Little

The two opposing teams records for Saturday's tilt vary little. The Bulldogs opened their season play with a 13-13 tie with Mineral Wells as did Stinnett with a 12-12 stand-off with a Hollis, Okla. squad.

Three games later the Bulldogs fell before the Winters Blizzards, 19-43. Both Mineral Wells and Winters were strong Class AA contenders.

The 19 points that Winters scored against the Bulldogs represents the highest total that any team has scored against either Ranger or Stinnett.

Following the Winters tilt, however, the Bulldogs hit their finest season stride and rolled up 195 points over five district opponents while holding their opposition

Yarbrough modified the spread on the second attempt that gave the Bulldogs their decision over McCamey Saturday after the first effort failed.

Ranger's Right Halfback Jerry Wharton, currently one of the state's leading ground gainers and highest scorers and a candidate for all-state honors has paced the Bulldogs throughout the season.

An outstanding baseball pitcher, Jerry and David, reserved their strength for the diamond game and did not participate in football until last year. Since the beginning of this season, the senior speedster has racked up 26 touchdowns and kicked 24 point-after-touchdowns for 180 points.

He has roamed for an 8.8 yard average, is extremely effective on punt and kickoff returns and has developed into a fine pass receiver.

According to statistics, anytime two Bulldog backfield men carry the ball on consecutive trips, they represent a potential first down, for not one has a rushing average of less than five yards per carry.

David Wharton, more of a power runner than Jerry, has amassed 35 points during season as has Hinds, Sutton and Bennie Robinson, a senior tri-captain. David has missed three contests with injuries and Robinson has missed four with a shoulder separation and broken leg. He will definitely not see action Saturday at Childress.

Late Developing

Sutton, likewise, was hampered with charlie-horses during most of the early season and his power running did not develop until district play was well along.

On the rib-rock forward wall, the Bulldogs have what has been considered one of the best lines in the state from tackle-to-tackle and one far above average from end-to-end.

On the left side of the line, the Bulldogs have 195 pound Pete Jameson at tackle and Tommy Young, a 190 pound guard, who have both been classified as all-state contenders.

Versatile and aggressive John Hagaman, a 185 pound center, who likes to crash enemy lines on defense, is a match for the finest. Smallest man on the line, 145-pound Dan Cruse, got his starting position not by his weight, but by his tough aggressiveness.

Robinson, a 185 pounder at the right tackle position, is the type of lineman that is seldom heard of, who is hurt most when he doesn't have a part in every tackle, even though it may be across the field.

Late Hero

Cantrell, who became the last minute hero of the McCamey fracas and Robert Watson, a senior transfer who became eligible only with the opening of the conference race, become more effective at their end positions as each game progressed.

Johnny Swinney, stalwart defensive backfieldman returned to duty with the McCamey contest. He had been sidelined with a broken leg. Pete Tibbels, a late starter, has also helped the Bulldogs defensively as has Gene Bagwell, a gritty utility man who can handle any line position effectively.

Exponents of the split-T and balanced T, the Bulldogs came up with a TCU spread last week against McCamey that carried for the game's winning touchdown on the second attempt. It was the first time of the season that the Bulldogs employed the spread.

As opposing coaches have said, "When you play Boone Yarbrough (Bulldog's head coach), you can expect most anything." Yarbrough was an all-state star for Weatherford and a top performer at East Texas State Teachers College in both football and basketball.

What to Do About a Flat Tire

By Betty Skelton, Dodge Test Driver

Don't just stand there and look helplessly at a flat tire. Change it! Except for handling a heavy wheel, which most women can do by rolling it, changing a tire is no more complex than threading a sewing machine bobbin. You can even do it without chipping your nail polish or soiling your clothes.

Tubeless tires on today's cars mean fewer punctures. Still, many a woman must drive alone or with small children on country lanes and highways where there are few knights errant and no phones within walking distance. If she has a puncture, she is helpless.

The solution:—learn to change a tire.

To be prepared, keep the following items stored in the trunk: (1) A cheap smock and work gloves, to avoid grimy hands and clothing, (2) pliers and a screw driver, and (3) two pieces of 2"x4", about 10 inches long. One of these should be tapered at one end.

Take Nine Steps

The actual tire change can be accomplished in 9 steps:

1. Apply the parking brake. Block the wheel diagonally opposite the puncture, using the wooden chock or heavy stone. (Certain makes of cars are equipped with special blocks.)
2. Pry off hub cap with a screw driver. Loosen the wheel nuts one turn with socket end of the bumper jack handle, an angled metal bar tapered at one end and equipped with a socket at the other.
3. Place jack under the bumper at point directly behind the flat tire. To raise the car, fasten the lever on the jack. Insert the handle, and work it up and down until wheel is two inches from the ground.
4. Unwind the wheel nuts with your fingers, placing them inside the upturned hub cap. The wheel will slip off easily. Roll it toward the trunk. After the spare is removed, shove it into the trunk. Never mind securing it, because it will have to be removed for repair.
5. Loosen the bolt securing the spare tire, which may require the use of pliers. Roll the tire to the ground, then up onto the 2"x4" which has been placed, tapered end first, on the ground below the wheel hub.
6. Adjust the wheel until center holes are in position to slip over the bolts. Fasten one of the wheel nuts, tapered end first.
7. After wheel nuts are replaced, tighten them with pumper jack handle's socket end. Be sure they are tightened to the absolute limit.
8. Lower the jack by first releasing the lever, then pumping the handle.
9. Return the hub cap to position, then shove with the palm of your hand.
10. Now that the job is done, give yourself a pat on the back. You deserve it.

Steer Your Youngster Straight on Bike Safety

By Betty Skelton, Dodge Test Driver

It was interesting for me recently to learn how a bicycle champion teaches her children to ride their bikes safely.

"I tell my youngsters that they are just like Daddy driving his car when they ride their bikes. Bikes are vehicles, just like cars, and they have to be handled carefully."

That was the advice of Mrs. Clair Young, the former Georgia McCluskey, one-time Women's National Bicycle Racing champion. Her children begin riding two-wheelers when they are three years old. Only two of her four children are now old enough to ride bikes,

but Mrs. Young has taught them to be skillful and safe cyclists.



Here are bike safety suggestions prepared by the American Automobile Association for the small fry:

- Suggested for Small Fry**
1. Never carry a passenger on your bike. Bicycles are unsafe when overloaded.
 2. Give the right of way to pedestrians, and warn them that you are approaching by using your bicycle bell.
 3. Do not ride too fast on hills and slippery or rough roads.
 4. Keep your bike in good condition. Be sure it has good brakes and a suitable bell or horn. For night riding, it should have a headlight and a taillight reflector. Many communities make it illegal for youngsters under 12 to use the streets for bike-riding. When your small fry reach the age

of 12, however, safety experts consider they are old enough to ride on roadways.

Be Extra Cautious in Streets

Here are further AAA recommendations for the big kids in the streets:

1. Observe traffic regulations. Halt at traffic lights and STOP signs. Stay on the right side of the road. Signal when preparing to turn or stop.
2. Ride in a straight line; don't zigzag or do "trick riding." If you must turn out to pass a parked car, always signal and check carefully for oncoming cars before you pull away from the curb. Watch out for people opening car doors on the street side.
3. Ride in single file on busy streets.
4. Never hitch a ride on the back of a moving vehicle.

That youngster of yours who is riding a bike today will be driving a car tomorrow. Don't soft pedal the importance of a good safety attitude. Now is an excellent time for your future motorist to learn respect for the traffic laws that are made for his protection.

The opinions "boiled down" were sent to President Eisenhower by the White House conference committee, as "significant and pressing prob-

lems in the field of education." Other parts of the report to the President included findings of state conferences and results of the committee's studies of the six subjects.

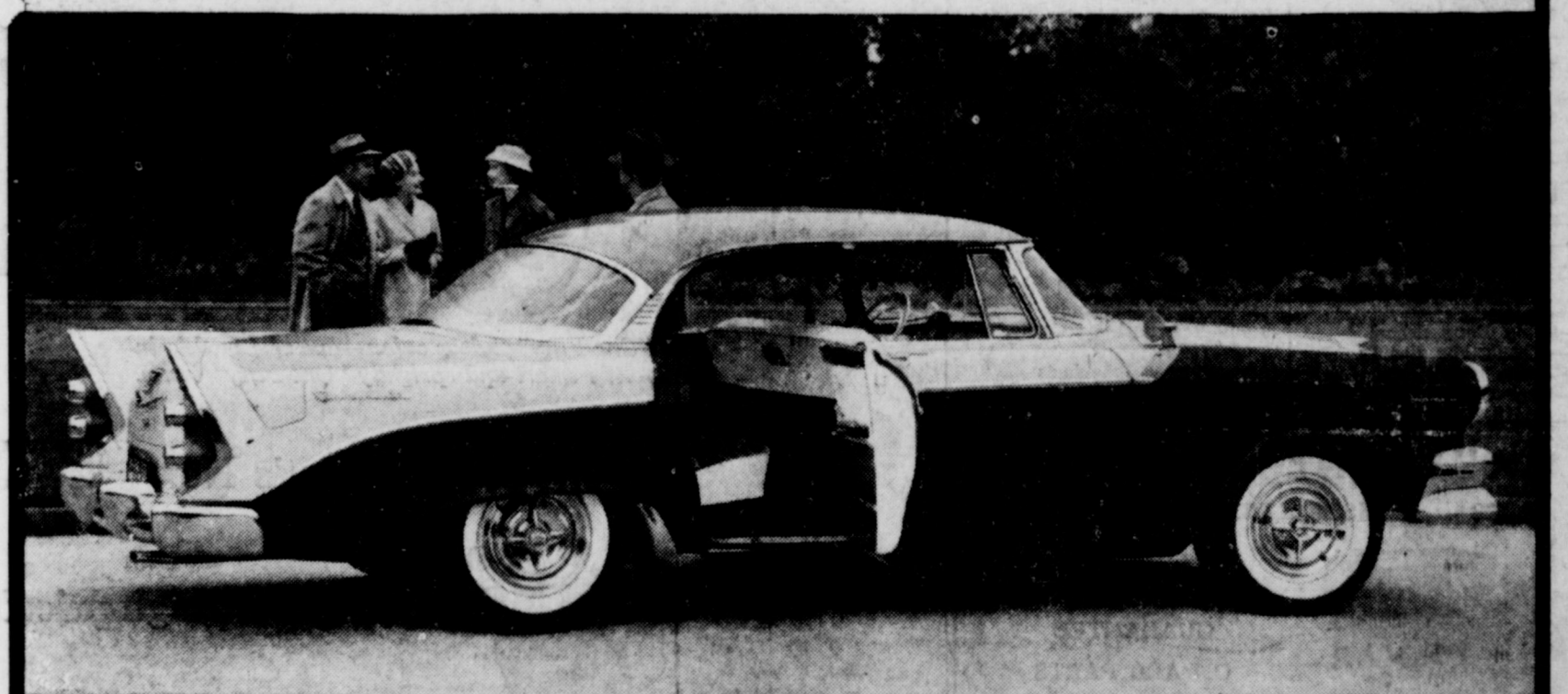
