VFW Post Seeks Beds, Chairs

Where are the loaning hospital beds and wheel chairs? That's what officers and members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 4136 are wondering.

As a public service, the post has some 30 hospital - type beds and as many wheel chairs, which they loan to persons who need such special equipment in the home.

Post Commander Milton Nash reports that the post can now only account for six beds and doesn't know where the wheel chairs are. Guesses are, he says, that most are in storage in garages and other places as need for the devices end, and of course, they're probably passed on to others who need them.

This is fine, he says, because the post wants to make them available for those who need them, but any that are not being used need to be returned so that others may benefit from this service.

Dr. Kim To Be CofC Speaker

Dr. Thomas Kim will be the main speaker at the 1972 Chamber of Commerce Banquet, January 27, at 7:30. Dr. Kim is the president of McMurry College in Abilene. Dr. Kim is nationally known for his comments on Americanism and on education in the United States. He became the eighth president of McMurry College June 1, 1970 and is the second layman in McMurry's history to be president of the college. Dr. Kim came to McMurry from Texas Tech University, where he served as professor of economics. He was on the Tech Faculty from 1965 until 1970 and also served as an advisor to the president of the university.

Dr. Kim was born Feb. 18, 1929 in Shanghai, China of South Korean parents. Dr. Kim came to the United States in 1948 to attend Berea College in Kentucky and has been in this country since that time. He became an American citizen in 1955. After receiving his bachelor of arts degree in economics from Berea College in 1952, Dr. Kim received his master degree in general business at Indiana University in 1954 and his Ph.D in economics at Tuland University in 1961. He met the young lady who was to be his wife at Berea College - while she was a student and while he was

teaching there in 1957 - 58. Dr. Kim and Martha now have two children, Larry and Cathy. Dr. Kim is an active United Methodist layman, holds many memberships in professional organizations and is author of several works. His new book, Introductory Mathematics for Economic Analysis, has been published by Scott, Foresman and Co. Veterans Enrolling For Spring Semester Submit Information

Veterans enrolling for GI Bill training for the spring semester can speed their VA payments by submitting required information to the VA or their school prior to enrollment time, according to Jack Coker, VA Regional Director at Waco. Also to help veterans, Coker said, the VA has changed its procedures on future enrollments to permit submission of documents direct to colleges by veterans who have

not had time to get certificates of eligibility from the VA prior to the school start date. Veterans should submit a copy of their separation papers, proof of dependency and application for education to the VA prior to enrollment if possible. If circumstances do not permit the veteran to do this and school enrollment has started he may submit his "package" of required documents direct to the school. Most colleges and universities have agreed to accept the

"package" and forward it to the VA for processing along with the certification of his enrollment. The key to rapid start of GI Bill checks for Veterans who will start school for the first time in the spring semester is to get his "package" of documents in as soon as possible, Coker said. Servicemen getting "early outs" before the end of the year who plan to start school under the GI Bill in January should apply for their certification as soon as possible if they wish to head off GI Bill payment delays.

Farmers Must File Social Security Reports In January

(Dallas, Texas) - Farmers have until January 31 to report Social Security taxes withheld from their employees' wages during 1971, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for North Texas, said today. The reports should be filed on Form 943, Employer's Annual Tax Return for Agricultural Employees.

Mr. Campbell said that any farmer who pays an employee cash wages of \$150 or more a year must withhold Social Security taxes. These taxes must also be withheld on wages under \$150 for any person hired 20 days or more a year. For tax purposes, a farm employer includes anyone who furnishes and pays workers to perform agricultural labor on his behalf or for someone else. Mr. Campbell said a "crew leader" is an employer under this definition.

Employer's Tax Guide." Send a post card to District Director, Internal Revenue Service, 1100 Commerce Street, Dallas, Texas 75202 for a free copy. Farmers must give a W-2 wage and tax statement to every worker they pay \$600 or more a year. Employees paid less than \$600 should receive a

Housing "Turns On" Expansion

The dawning of 1972 could easily be the curtain - raiser on a new era for Eastland. With the national economy taking a swing for the better, as the administration's measures apparently bear some results, and especially in view of the all - important election year of '72, things could take a definite swing to the glow side for the city. Construction starts nationally are upward, and Eastland's began in the year just ended, and indications are that this trend will continue and be enhanced during the new year.

Visitors to Eastland will be seeing a new image. Most dramatic of which would have to be the re - routing of Int. 20 traffic off downtown U.S. 80, to the south by some four miles. No one seems to miss the roaring trucks downtown, and traffic - oriented businesses such as service stations and restaurants naturally report a dip in tourist business, but apparently are making the transition to cater to local trade smoothly, in offering extra service and extra convenience to supply the existing local demand for these products and services.

Other patterns in the city are changing too, as shifting business designs emerge. New housing, said lacking by many for at least ten years, is now in the offing for Eastland living. This one item - - housing for all levels - - is believed by many officials to be the key to opening the city's future development. Most ambitious in this department would be the 68 - unit, multi - building apartment project which began in November. Cost is pegged in excess of \$1.5 million by Sabine Valley Lumber Co. of Fort Worth Vice President Jack Britt. Located just off Sadosa St., the facility is to be named Sabine Terrace, and is expected to be completed by early or mid - March. One, two and three - bedroom facilities will be available. Private housing is being offered by two new builders, H&W Construction and Jack Brown Construction Co. Individual local builders have stayed busy and added a great number of private dwellings and improvements to existing property. Owners Walter Hall and Ray Winingar of H&W, officed at Commerce and Madera Sts., have built and sold seven houses here since September 1, and an additional tract of possibly up to 28 new homes is on the drawing boards. Brown has built and sold four new homes. And construction of services for these new residents has followed close behind or have been completed in advance. On the medical front, the completion of B&W Clinic's ultra - modern facility on West Plummer across from Eastland Memorial Hospital further extends Eastland's medical - center image. Drs. H.J. Bulgerin and B.B. Alexander moved into their new one - story brick and glass clinic which provides office space for a third doctor as well as eight examining rooms, space for X - ray emergency facilities as well as business offices and treatment centers. Broadening care available for the elderly was the opening in January of 1971 of Eastland Manor Nursing Home at 1405 W. Commerce St., with facilities for 102 residents. Administrator Eugene Frost reports virtual total occupancy. Nolan DeFord, bulk agent for Humble Oil Co., has recently opened at the intersection of U.S. 80 and Interstate 20, a new Enco ranch style service station. He has opened another Enco center in Cisco on the

new highway. Food service expanded when JRB Super Market moved to its new \$300,000 building on East Main St. in June, and Howell Sledge, owner - operator of Sledge Retail Market, opened a Steak House and Barbecue Dining Room in connection with his business on S. Lamar St. This newspaper dedicated a new \$100,000 offset - printing plant located in the existing Telegram building and began central plant operations here in August of 1971. The plant is producing local newspapers and others in this area on contract. Robert Mangum opened a new auto repair garage and complete wrecker service in the 100 block of Mulberry. Don Baird and Randy Butler opened B&B Sales and Service at the corner of Main and Lamar Sts., offering a complete line of Admiral televisions and appliances and TV repair for all makes and models. Roy Lee Smith of Smith Plumbing Co. established an extensive wholesale plumbing outlet which will service a wide territory offering quality plumbing materials. James Zusspan and Don Barron bought Hillcrest Grocery on West Main St., and among other additions are now offering self - service gasoline. Everett Crain of Gordon purchased Rushing Motor Co. and is offering a complete line of Chrysler, Plymouth Dodge lines. A Fina A - 1 Garage, Station and Grocery has been expanded on East Main St., offering air conditioning and other auto service near the Int. 20 intersection. George Parrack opened Olden Mobile Home Sales at Olden and is continuing to expand the housing aspect of the Eastland County scene. Horton Tire Co. became Tharp Tire Co. Ann Baker opened a new beauty shop on S. Lamar St. Charlie Ben and Harry Bradberry of Dublin opened Farm Supply Store at Carbon. Harvey Basham re - located his electric shop on West White St. Eastland Auction Co. continues to grow. James Wright opened a used furniture and surplus store on S. Seaman St., operated by Bill England. The Village Hotel sold twice this year. Freddy Pevehouse bought Eddie's Phillips 66 Station. Travis Starr purchased the Texaco Service Station on West Main, west of the Post Office. Insurance Man M.H. Perry relocated offices into the Kincaid Building, and announced plans for the construction of a new office building on N. Lamar. Eastland Auto Parts was purchased by a Cleburne businessman and has been expanded. The Star - Telegram newspaper agency here was sold by Herman Alsup and is now operated by Gil Biggs. Perry's added a fabric center to their already expanded S. Lamar St. store. Victor Cornelius Menus added an extensive building facility and a plastic extruding machine to further expand that firm's menu and Redi - Clip business. Richard Wilkins purchased Toombs and Richardson Drug Store. Eastland National Bank added a second, remote - controlled drive - in window and a conference room in an extensive remodeling and expansion program. Glenn Bakker assumed management and operation of Lone Cedar Country Club, when Jean Meyers resigned to move to the Hill Country.

Caramel Brownies
1 cup flour
2 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
2 1/2 cup lard
2 cups brown sugar
2 eggs
2 teaspoons vanilla extract
1 cup chopped nuts
Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Melt lard and add brown sugar, eggs, vanilla, nuts and sifted dry ingredients and mix thoroughly. Spread in a greased and floured jelly roll pan (15 1/2 x 10 1/2 inches). Bake in a moderate oven (350° F) for 30 minutes. Cool and cut. Yield: 6 dozen 1 1/2-inch square brownies.

Ventures in Paradise Can a Poor Little Island With One Road Become A Tourist Haven? Maybe— —With Contacts, Money

TORTUGA—This island is poor. The natives barely survive by fishing and farming. The only road leads from a beach up a hill to a Catholic mission.

Yet Haitian-owned Tortuga is about to undergo an upheaval that will almost surely alter the way of life of its 10,000 to 20,000 inhabitants. The ingredients include a bundle of money, a group of Texas promoters and a young Haitian with close ties to Haiti's presidential palace.

Du Pont Caribbean Inc. (which has no connection with Wilmington's DuPont Co.) signed a contract with the regime of the late Dr. Francois (Papa Doc) Duvalier last December to make Tortuga a "free port" and turn it into a bustling tourist center with gambling casinos. To lure investors, Tortuga was made exempt from personal and corporate income taxes, capital gains taxes and all other charges—including import-export duties.

Under the contract, a Freeport Authority—controlled by Dupont Caribbean—has the sole power to start corporations, grant licenses and issue permits to foreign companies. The contract specifically bars from Tortuga companies "controlled" by Communist governments. It went into effect April 5, shortly before Papa Doc's death, and lasts 99 years.

Of Cigaretts and Scotch
Donald Pierson, founder and president of Dupont Caribbean (based in Eastland, Texas) says he is confident Tortuga will surpass the success that Freeport, Grand Bahama Island, experienced in the 1960s. "Grand Bahama has taxes on consumer items brought into the island," the 41-year-old Mr. Pierson says. "Tortuga doesn't. We'll sell American cigarettes for 25 cents a pack. The finest Scotch will sell for about \$3 a fifth."

The venture faces obstacles—not the least of which is Tortuga's lack of electricity, running water, telephones and other services. It's estimated that some \$15 million must be spent to make the island acceptable to the hordes of tourists its promoters hope to attract.

Besides the problem of raising funds, Dupont Caribbean faces grumbling from some Haitian government officials. Says a knowledgeable American who works in Port-au-Prince, the Haitian capital: "There have been complaints that Papa Doc gave away too much. Nobody dared to complain while he was alive." Indeed, these officials have put pressure on Dupont Caribbean to modify its contract, which gives it control of the commercial life of up to 75% of the 20-mile long, four-mile wide island. But the Texas firm, fully aware that any changes detrimental to the company could considerably scare off potential investors, has thus far successfully resisted these efforts.

Wariness in Port-au-Prince
Antonio Andre, veteran head of the government's central bank, says he is keeping a close eye on developments in Tortuga. "I have no doubt about the honesty of Mr. Pierson and his people, but we must be careful," he says. According to Mr. Andre, a major concern is to prevent any smuggling of duty-free goods from Tortuga to mainland Haiti, which imposes import duties. Mr. Andre adds that another official showing an active interest in the island is Laekner Cambonne, minister of defense and interior, who is regarded by some as the regime's new strongman. (Jean-Claude Duvalier, 26-year-old son of the late Papa Doc, is Haiti's lifetime president.)

Green, hilly Tortuga has white beaches and is surrounded by blue-green water. It lies just off Haiti's north coast in the Windward Passage, a route favored by cruise ships. Haitians say the island was a 17th-Century pirate haven. In recent years, it has been used as a base for the illegal smuggling of job-seeking Haitians into the Bahamas, whose nearest island is only about 60 miles north of Tortuga.

Most Tortugans live in thatched huts near beaches on the south side of the island. Visitors are welcome. Some U.S. travel writers made recent trips to Tortuga by yacht, and one recalls, "We went ashore in a little skiff, and guides ran down the beach into the water, literally, to greet us."

By the end of this year, Dupont Caribbean will have pumped more than \$700,000 into Tortuga. About 200 workmen recently built a 600-foot grassy landing strip enabling planes as large as DC-3s to land on the island. (The workmen were paid \$1 a day—not the worst wage in a nation with an average wage of \$75 yearly.)

Eduard Almonor, a Tortugan who owns two bars on the island and is an employee of Dupont Caribbean, tells an American visitor, "The people here poor. The company comes, all the people work. I love the company."

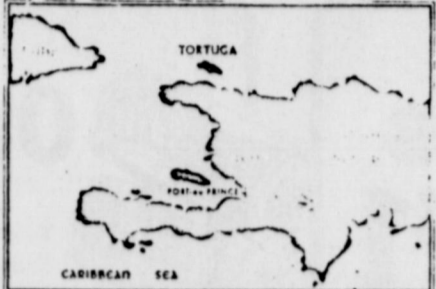
Getting a Quick Toehold
Dupont Caribbean is talking about putting up a small hotel of less than 50 rooms by early next year. "We want to get a toehold on the island as quick as we can," says Jim Hobbs, general manager of Dupont Caribbean. A large hotel of 250 rooms, he says, is promised for the end of 1972.

The chief promoter, Mr. Pierson will be sitting pretty if his plans are realized. Mr. Pierson's wife, Ann, and Mike Collins, 34-year-old Dupont Caribbean vice president, together own 10 million Dupont Caribbean shares, or 10% of the firm's 100 million authorized shares. In addition, the government of Haiti has been given 10 million shares at no cost.

Mr. Pierson has had a varied career. He was a Cadillac dealer. He is a founder of Abine National Bank, Abilene, Texas. And he operated an off-shore radio ship that broadcast music and commercials into Great Britain. (The "pirate" radio ships were banned by the British government a few years ago.) He is also former mayor of Eastland, a city of 3,200 ft. far from Ft. Worth.

Mr. Pierson's plans for Tortuga are also varied. As one venture, Dupont Caribbean is expected to be the sole wholesale importer of tobacco, liquor and perfume to the island. These duty-free items will be resold at a profit by Dupont Caribbean to hotels and retail shops.

Dupont Caribbean could also profit from the sale of land that it's leasing at token prices from Haiti. The price of this land is pegged to the amount that promoters invest in the island. Dupont Caribbean's payments will begin at



\$1.54 an acre and decrease steadily until \$1.5 million is invested. When this sum is attained, free to obtain more land from Haiti at no cost, and much of this land is expected to be re-sold to developers at a profit.

Such profits, if realized, will benefit Translinear, a Dallas-based investment partnership that owns outright or has options on about 10 million Dupont Caribbean shares. (Those involved won't disclose the purchase price of the shares.) The three Translinear partners are: William H. Crook, former U.S. ambassador to Australia; C. T. "Sparky" Beckham, a land developer, and Robert Fanning, attorney.

Correct Timing
Equity Capital Management Inc., a Translinear subsidiary, has a contract to handle the financial management of Dupont Caribbean, including the planned sale of Dupont Caribbean stock on the "international market." "Our plans are to become a public company just as soon as the timing is correct," Mr. Pierson says.

Dupont Caribbean executives shy away from discussing a stock offering; they say they don't want to violate Securities and Exchange Commission regulations. (In 1967, Mr. Pierson received a reprimand from the Texas State Securities Board for advertising the sale of unregistered stock in a new Bahamian bank that he was sponsoring. Mr. Pierson says he immediately discontinued the ad when ordered to by the securities board. The bank has since been dissolved.)

Also standing to benefit from a Tortugan bonanza is Guy Bonhomme, a 25-year-old Haitian from Port-au-Prince. Mr. Bonhomme's father, Dr. Paul Bonhomme, once operated a medical clinic with Papa Doc in Haiti; his uncle is Arthur Bonhomme, once Haiti's ambassador to Washington. "The late president (Papa Doc) loved Guy like a son," the ex-ambassador says.

Mr. Pierson last July notified the U.S. Government that Dupont Caribbean had set aside one million company shares for Mr. Bonhomme. (Mr. Pierson made the disclosure in a letter to the Maritime Commission listing the company's stockholders.) Mr. Pierson, however, subsequently changed this figure to a "modest amount of stock." The original amount, he says, was based on "a business contingency that was never realized."

Cut-Rate Prices
Whatever the amount, Guy Bonhomme says he's received verbal assurances from Dupont Caribbean that its stock will be sold to him at cut-rate prices. Mr. Bonhomme says he personally contacted Papa Doc and outlined Mr. Pierson's interest in acquiring Tortuga for land development—paving the way, he says, for the contract talks with Haitian government officials.

Guy Bonhomme first met Mr. Pierson through the Haitian's uncle, the ex-ambassador, who says he, too, played a part in helping Mr. Pierson obtain the contract for Tortuga. Haitian law, Arthur Bonhomme says, requires contracts such as Dupont's to be published in the official gazette, *Le Moniteur*, before becoming effective; however, after many weeks went by and the contract wasn't published, the ex-ambassador moved into the picture.

"I called the late president," says Arthur Bonhomme. "In one hour, he gave orders to have the thing printed in the official paper."

Ex-ambassador Bonhomme, however, says that he neither sought nor received any compensation from Mr. Pierson.

The ex-ambassador says Mr. Pierson has been kind to his nephew. The Texan, he says, sent Guy to school in Texas this past summer to study personnel management. "And I heard Mr. Pierson appointed him as his representative in Haiti at \$500 a month," says the ex-ambassador.

Chickens and Casinos
Guy confirms he received the amount while working for Mr. Pierson in Haiti. He says he has also obtained from Dupont Caribbean a potentially lucrative license for the wholesale poultry and egg business on Tortuga and has been assigned by Dupont Caribbean to recruit operators for the island's planned gambling casinos. (Casino operators, Guy says, are reluctant to make commitments until Tortuga has a jet airport to accommodate gambling junkies.)

Mr. Pierson, while conceding that Tortuga will likely offer gambling, adds that "we're de-emphasizing casinos. They won't be as important as in some other places in the Caribbean." Our plans are to aim at the middle-income group, particularly those with families. Casinos are not one of my personal interests.

Dupont Caribbean, in any case, says businessmen are clamoring to start operations in Tortuga. It says a two-day ad published in Grand Bahama brought in 60 inquiries. And one Grand Bahama retailer says he's prepared to open a shop on Tortuga with a \$250,000 inventory.

"This can be made into the Hong Kong of the West," the retailer says. "In Grand Bahama, cameras have an import duty of 7 1/2%. Jewelry and watches have 25% to 30%. Tortuga has no import duty. We'll be able to sell for 10% to 15% less than on any other island."

Anti-zoo
In 1962 a Congressman objected to appropriating funds for the new zoo in Washington, D.C., saying taxes should not be used "to afford shelter and erect homes for snakes, raccoons, and opossums." But now thousands of visitors from the 50 states and almost all foreign countries visit the National Zoological Park every year.
