OLD RIP COMES HOME . . .



"THAT'S HIM" . . .

Old Rip, Eastland's Famous Frog, returned home this week, as mysteriously as he had disappeared last year.

Cloaked in intrigue from beginning to end, the re-appearance reassured locals and all breathe easier as Old Rip, the frog that slept for 31 years in the corner stone of the old Courthouse, was returned to his tomb for public viewing in the lobby of the modern courthouse.

Citizens and officials are once again happy to point visitors to the Courthouse and assure them that Old Rip is ready to be viewed.

"That's him," came the magic words from Former Eastland Police Chief Ray Laney shortly after 10 a.m. Thursday on the grounds of the Eastland County Livestock Show, authenticating the cryptic messages received early about his return.

First word came Wednesday when the Telegram received a hastily-scribbled note instructing Police Chief John Morren to be at the Livestock Show grounds at 10. The message was signed "Old Rip". Chief Morren received a crudely-drawn map in the mail Thursday morning pin-pointing the place to look on the grounds.

Former Chief Laney was called on to help identify the Famous Frog. County Sheriff L.E. (Lefty) Sublett assisted and Mayor James Reid was on hand to help with the identity.

Rip was found in a small cardboard box in the end of some drill-stem pipe stacked on the show grounds. He was identified and rushed back to the courthouse to be re-entombed for public view.

All agreed with Chief Laney that it had to be Old Rip. The left rear leg was broken off. (He lost that leg in 1964 when Candidate John Connally made a whistle stop in Eastland and was "given" Old Rip as a symbolic endorsement of Connally in his bid for governor.)

When the toad disappeared last year, the Eastland Jaycees immediately became suspect by locals, because the frog had once before vanished, only to be suddenly returned immediately before a Jaycee-sponsored Peanut Bowl festivity.

It was thought that Old Rip would just as surprisingly re-appear at the Jaycee-sponsored professional basketball game last year - but he didn't. In fact the months dragged by, and still no Old Rip - so activities of this week

proved reassuring to those who hold Old Rip in high regard.

Sheriff Sublett and Chief Morren are continuing their investigation into the disappearance and report that laboratory study of materials found with Old Rip is underway with reports due in a few weeks.

Theories of all kinds abound. Does his sudden reappearance herald the announcement of something momentous for Eastland? It's a fact that Old Rip, even in death low, these many years, is a super-special publicity getter. What could be the story he might be telling.

One of the most extreme ideas put forth has to do with the possibility that perhaps the Russians in fact frog-napped Old Rip in an effort to determine his longevity, as it might be applied to the remains of Lenin and others, whom the Russians might or might not want to be Old Rip - i.e. this theory goes on to guess that with the thawing of relations between the U.S. and Red China, that maybe the Russians were in haste to get Old Rip home safely. Guesses might be that the CIA was close on the heels of the plot as the frog was returned so hastily.

But who knows? Ask Rip. He's at the courthouse in Eastland. (Or was at press time.)

Marker To Be Dedicated To Judge Hickman

Eastlanders will be glad to hear of the dedication of a historical monument to the late State Supreme Court Chief Justice John E. Hickman in Georgetown next Sunday.

300 Tickets Sold For Friday Event

Governor Preston Smith will be the featured speaker at the March meeting of the Eastland County Law Enforcement Association on March 24. The public is invited to attend and hear the state's chief executive.

The meeting will be an evening banquet at the Eastland Elementary School and will begin at 7:00 p.m.

Eastland Police Chief John Morren is in charge of the meeting. He has extended an invitation to the public on behalf of the county lawmen.

Tickets are \$3.25 each and may be purchased from any Law Enforcement Officer.

Featured speaker for the 6 p.m. service of the Daugherty and Plummer Sts. Church of Christ will be Lonny Wright, grandson of the Aubrey Brown's of Eastland and David Pennington, son of Rev. Pennington of Eastland.

Judge Hickman was Chief Justice of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland from 1928 until 1935, and was extremely active in civic and religious affairs here, having taught a Sunday School class for many years.

The dedication will be held on the County Courthouse Lawn at Georgetown beginning at 3 p.m. Sunday, March 26. Many from Eastland County will be attending the event.

Mrs. Hickman, now of Austin, will unveil the marker dedicated to the memory of her late husband.

Others on the dedication program include Judge D.B. Wood of Georgetown; Dr. Edmund Heinsohn of Austin; Mayor Hubert Brock of Georgetown; Bob Watson, direction of Field Operations of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

The dedicatory address will be given by the Chief Justice of the Texas Supreme Court, Hon. Robert W. Calvert, who will be introduced by Wilson Fox, a former law colleague of Judge Hickman's, now of Taylor; Inscription on the marker is as follows:

"Chief Justice John Edward Hickman (1883 - 1962)

"A distinguished Chief Justice of the Texas Supreme Court, and a native of Williamson County.

"Descendant of 1849 settlers from Alabama, he was a son of Nathaniel Dranklin and Mary J. Porterfield Hickman. He attended the Liberty Hill Normal and Commercial College, and (with interruptions to teach school) earned a law degree at the University of Texas in 1910.

"For 16 years he was an attorney in Dublin (Erath County) and Breckenridge (Stephens County). Oil was discovered in both areas, and with boom conditions his practice included some historic cases.

"Elected Associate Justice (1926), he became in 1928 Chief Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, Eastland. He was appointed to the Supreme Court Commission of Appeals in 1935; became an associate Justice of the Texas Supreme Court in 1945; and on Jan. 7, 1948, was appointed Chief Justice - a post he filled until 1961. He is credited with 433 opinions of the Texas Supreme Court.

"A devout Christian, he taught a Bible Class about 50 years, and served 1921 - 62 as a trustee of Southern Methodist University. He married (1) Ethel Markward (d. 1921) and (2) Lena Pettit, who survived him. 1971."

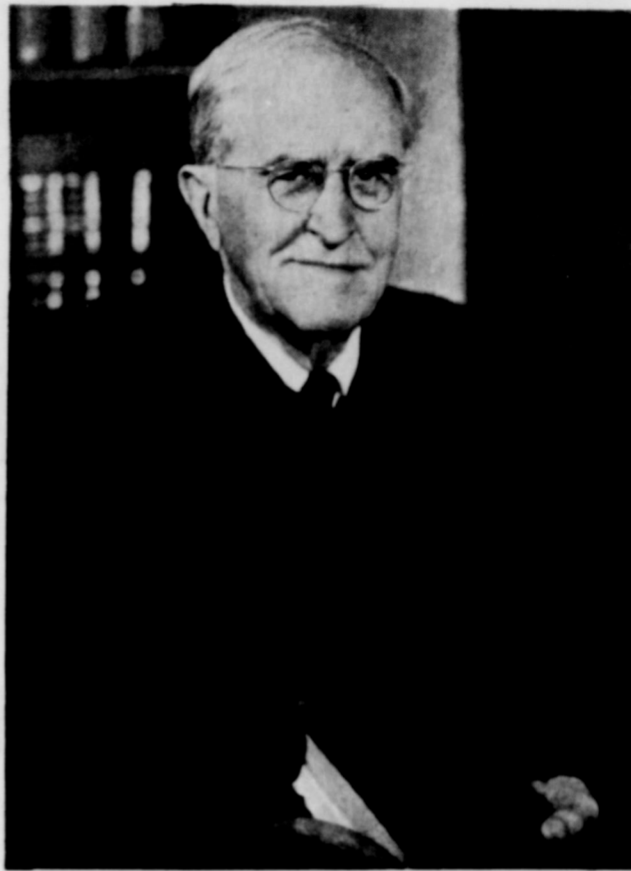

Staff Water Supply Corp. Loan and Grant Approved

Cecil Reeves President of the Staff Water Supply Corporation received a telegram from Congressman Burleson's office and a telephone call from Senator John Tower's office advising him that the Staff Water Supply Corporation's application for a loan of \$327,000.00 and a grant of \$70,000 had been approved for the Corporation from the Farmer's Home Administration.

Mr. Reeves stated that he had received a letter from O.M. Boyle, County Supervisor of the Farmer's Home Administration advising him that the fee for applying for a connection on the corporation lines effective April 1, 1972, would be \$100.00. Heretofore the fee has been \$50.00. Consequently Mr. Reeves urged all persons in the Kokomo area, the Staff and Lake Leon area and the LaCasa community area that have not previously paid their fee and signed the agreement to do so before the April 1, 1972 deadline in order to save the additional \$50.00. Mr. Reeves stated that after the line is installed the cost for connection would be much more than the \$100.00 after April 1, 1972.

The approval of a loan and grant comes after almost four years of work and effort by Mr. Reeves, Jimmy Little, E.F. Arterburn, E.L. Foster and O.M. Boyle and many others. Congressman Omar Burleson and Sen. John Tower have announced approval of a \$327,600 Farmer's Home Ad-

ministration loan and a \$70,000 FHA grant to the Staff Water Supply Corporation of Eastland and Stephens Counties, to build a rural water system.

Project plans call for construction of a central water facility to serve 252 rural families near Ranger in Eastland and Stephens Counties, including the communities of Staff, Kokomo, Freedom, New Hope and LaCasa.

The loan, carrying repayment terms of 40 years - five percent, is provided under the Rural Community Facilities program administered by the Farmers Home Administration, a Department of Agriculture rural credit service.

The Staff Water Supply Corporation is a community

nonprofit organization.

Water to the Kokomo community will be tapped from a recently installed water main line from Eastland to Carbon. Water to the LaCasa community will come from Ranger main and water going to the Staff community will come from the line feeding Eastland from the Lake Leon filtration plant.

Reeves said the first contract is expected to be let about April 1. Completion of the system is expected to take from six to eight months.

Reeves said rates are tentatively set as follows: \$8.50 for the first 3,000 gallons of water; \$1 per thousand for the next 3,000 gallons; 90 cents per thousand for the third 3,000; and 80 cents per thousand for the fourth 3,000.

Eastland Civic League Garden Club Hear Brownwood Speaker

The Eastland Civic League and Garden Club met Wednesday, March 8 for their regular monthly luncheon and business meeting. Decorations were in a St. Patrick's Day theme with shamrocks on the walls and tables. Centerpieces were green leprechaun hats with the inscription "Erin Go Braugh". Ladies were given shamrocks to pin on their clothing as they entered.

Guest speaker was Ron Jackson, Superintendent, Brownwood State Home and School for Girls. Mr. Jackson showed slides of the campus while telling about the school and encourages questions from his audience.

The Brownwood State Home and School for Girls is under the direction of the Texas Youth Council whose headquarters are in Austin. In conjunction with the school is the Texas Youth Council Reception Center for Girls. At the reception center the girls are given physical exams, dental exams, psychological testing, and they talk with a psychiatrist, a social worker, a psychologist, and an educational and vocational counselor. Three weeks are required to complete the evaluation of each girl. When the evaluation is completed, the girls are assigned either to a school for delinquent girls or a dependent and neglect home. "Ninety percent go into a school for delinquent girls," Mr. Jackson said.

Girls in the Brownwood State Home and School for Girls range in age from 10 to 20. Most of these girls are runaways and 85 percent come from broken homes. They come from all social and economic levels.

A girl brought to the school spends four weeks in the "new girl's" cottage. These first cottages have been named by the girls and are called "Faith", "Hope", and "Courage". From here she goes into a "middle cottage" where she spends a minimum of 12 weeks. These cottages were named "Success" and "Trust". The discipline cottage is called "Security" (again named by the girls) because the girls feel most secure here and are given a great deal of individual help.

Each dormitory has a kitchen and meals are served family style. Family situations are followed as much as possible. The girls may prepare their own breakfast and they have one meal a day at school.

A positive approach is used with the girls. They are given points for cleaning their room, making their grades, etc. They are rewarded according to their points. The reward may be an on-campus movie, a trip to town, or some other activity. The girls are taught to work and are required to spend Saturday mornings working. They are encouraged to make decisions and to take the responsibility for their decisions.

Gordon pot

A freeze now could really hurt trees and other ornamental plants. It would completely destroy the fruit crop. It would be unusual indeed if we should not have another freeze this year. The development of summer plants are about three to four weeks ahead of schedule.

If this is an average year our last freeze will occur this week. If we get by this week our chances will be pretty good. According to the records we will still have a five percent change of a 32 degree freeze as late as April 20th.

We have received a supply of publications from the Internal Revenue Service which you may be interested in having. The title is "Highlights of 1971 Changes in the Tax Law". It is not intended to be a comprehensive discussion of all new tax laws, nor is it a thorough discussion of the changes. It does highlight those changes taxpayers should be aware of when filing their 1971 returns. If you would like a copy let us know.

The sheep and goat raisers are to vote on a referendum this month. The referendum proposition is for sheep and goat raisers to assess themselves 20 cents a head on sheep and 10 cents a head on goats that are sold. The money collected will finance programs of predator control and predator control research and education.

Special interest in the referendum started developing several weeks ago when President Nixon issued an Executive order on February 8th, which prohibits the use of poisons on federal lands and by federal agencies for the purpose of controlling predators. Some sheep and goat raisers may not receive a ballot in the mail. If any producers did not receive a ballot they may pick them up at our office. These ballots should be mailed before midnight, March 28th.

We have long recognized the value of a pet or livestock project for youth. We read recently what a psychiatrist had to say about this and I thought you would be interested in his comments.

Dr. J.T. Holbrook, Clinical Director of the Brazos Valley Mental Health Center, said youngsters can transfer feelings of need and love from animals to humans. "Experiences with animal help mold the individual's personality and attitudes" said Dr. Holbrook.

Nearly every child who has cared for an animal has experienced some common crisis - daily feeding of a pet, oc-

casional sickness and even death of an animal, or parting with a prize steer on sale day after months of careful attention and handling. "Support from parents and leaders can help youth cope with such stress and thereby enable them to tolerate more difficult future crises," Holbrook pointed out. "Exhibiting an animal, for instance, puts a 4 - H'er under pressure; he learns to cope with the situation by accepting it and meeting the challenge".

"People who can't relate to past experiences or goals tend to have problems in adapting to changes in life," the psychiatrist pointed out. "Consequently, they seldom make useful contributions to society."

Another advantage of working with and caring for animals is that youngsters learn patience, or the ideas of delayed gratification, Holbrook added.

"Once a youngster is committed to a particular activity or project, he can work with it and, at the same time, grow and develop himself. An animal project, whether it be a steer, horse, dog or rabbit, can be the beginning of 'real life' experiences for many a youth", noted Holbrook.

Bob McCoy, president of the Eastland Jaycees, Thursday announced the club's second annual Rattlesnake Roundup for March 25 and 26, at

Eastland County Sheriff's Posse Barn.

McCoy said the organizers of the roundup will be "Copy" Hodgkins and Jim Elmore, both of Strawn, who will bring with them some 300 rattlers.

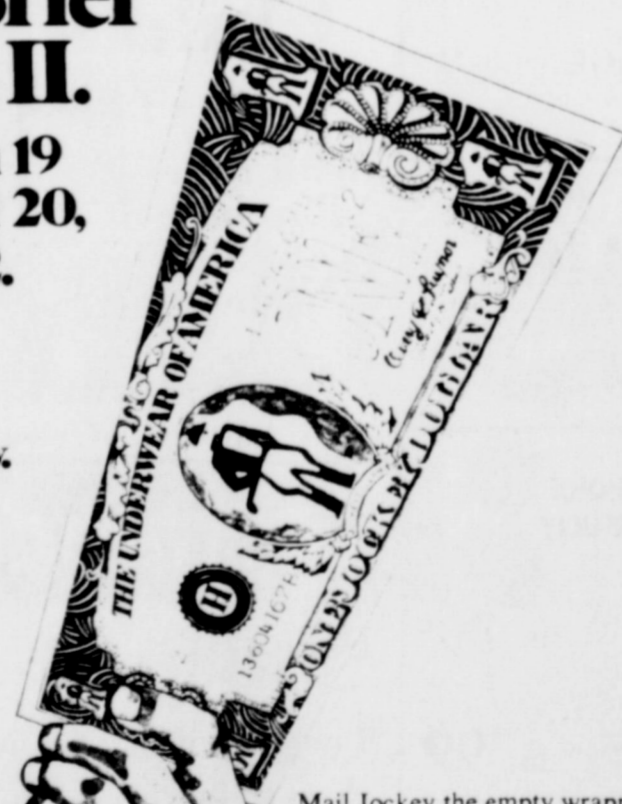

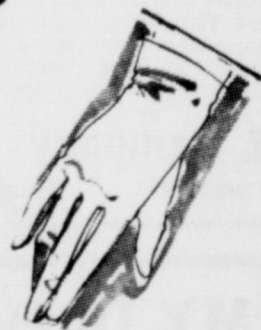
