## EHS Band Receives Excellent Rating in UIL Contest



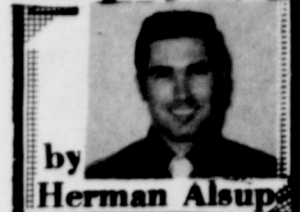

"Reading Makes the World Go Round."

That's what Texas librarians will be saying April 16 through 22 when they take part in this year's observance of National Library Week.

Libraries of all kinds are observing the week that calls special attention to libraries as sources of information and recreation. In addition to the state's 380 public libraries, there are also more than 70 college and university libraries as well as libraries in nearly all of the 1,200 school districts.

In his proclamation Governor Preston Smith pointed out that "through organization into systems, libraries look forward to sharing of resources in order to equalize the opportunity for all citizens to have access to the best services."

Since January, ten library systems have been organized under the Texas Library Systems Act passed by the legislature in 1969. The legislation permits public libraries that reach specified levels of local support to enter into agreements with one another and to receive State funds when they are appropriated to carry out cooperative activities.

"The Library Systems Act and the cooperative activities it provides can have a significant impact on library service for all Texans," said Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library, the state agency that administers the legislation. "Although all system members are public libraries, the cooperative programs developed by the systems may also include other kinds of libraries."

# Tomb of Nazarene Discovered Empty!

**EDITORIAL**

Last Friday the city of Jerusalem witnessed what we believe will go down in history as the world's most atrocious crime: A man whose spotless record contained nothing but good deeds, seasoned with some wholesale condemnation of crookedness in high places, suffered an unfair trial and a felon's death on Calvary. We can only avoid a sense of everlasting shame by remembering that the voice Pilate heard crying "Crucify him!" was not the voice of the people.

To-day a mysterious sequel to that shameful murder, done in the name of government and religion, arises to haunt his slayers and to awaken in the hearts of his followers and exultant hope that will not down. The prophet's tomb is empty.

What does that empty tomb mean? Pilate and the religious leaders claim that the body of the Nazarene was stolen by the disciples. On the face of it, that explanation seems too glib and too shallow for thinking men to accept. It must be remembered that after Friday's event the disciples were too dazed to plot, too bewildered to concoct so feeble a fable, too weak and too blundering and too frightened to attempt so hazardous a venture—a venture entailing the overthrow of the small army of prize soldiers sent to guard the tomb. Moreover, it has been well established that the disciples despite their master's insistence that he would rise from the dead, never really believed that he would or could do so. Furthermore, if indeed these soldiers did fall asleep while on duty—a military crime punishable by death—why has there been no court-martial, no wholesale purge of the proud Roman's reputation as soldiers?

Another theory advanced by his enemies is that Jesus—despite the spear thrust through his heart and the certificate of death given by the physician at Calvary—did not actually die but only swooned. And later, coming to himself he pushed aside the stone (weighing a ton or more and securely sealed) and came forth to announce his resurrection. That theory is so thin as to insult the adult intelligence.

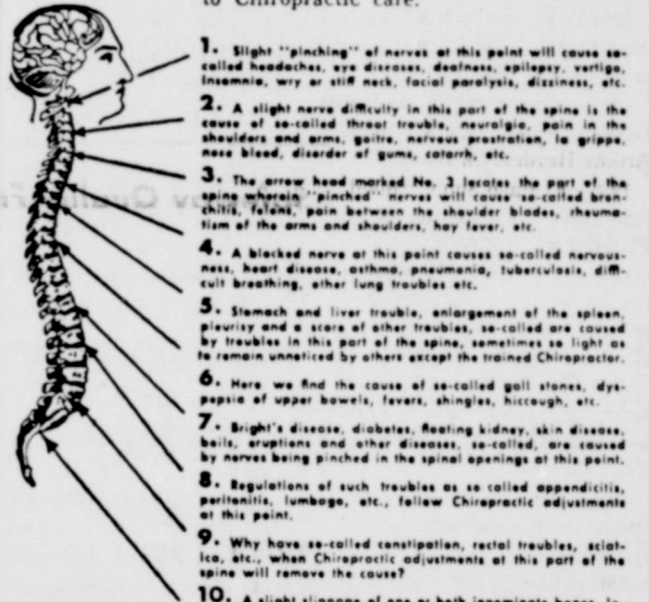

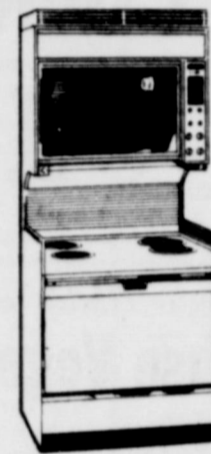

Results of the 1971 Agricultural Demonstrations in Eastland County are now

available. The annual report summarizes all agricultural demonstrations planned with the Eastland County Program Building Committee and conducted by cooperating farmers, ranchers and landowners. Demonstration are planned each year based on the agricultural problems and long-range objectives of the county program.

Purpose of the crop and livestock demonstrations is to provide farmers and ranchers with information by local use and adaptation of the latest technical research findings and recommendations.

A copy of the demonstrations handbook has been sent to most farmers and agribusinessmen in the county. Additional copies may be obtained at the County Agent's office.

Interested in boosting the percent calf crop in your beef herd? Then you may want to obtain a copy of a new bulletin by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, "Ways to Increase Percent Calf Crop in Beef Cattle." It was written by John R. Beverly, animal reproduction specialist, and is available at the County Agent's office at no charge.

Percent calf crop weaned is the most important factor in determining the profitability of a cow-calf program. This percentage refers to calves weaned from all breeding females in the herd at the start of the breeding season.

The number of cows giving birth to calves markedly governs the production cost per pound of beef produced.

There are three main factors affecting reproductive performance. These are the percent breeding females coming into a fertile heat, number of breeding females conceiving at each heat period, and death loss of calves at or near birth.

How a cow performs depends on her environment and her genetic capability.

Of all the environmental influences that affect reproductive ability, the most important is usually nutrition. Most reproductive failures are in some way related to nutrition.

Because the herd bull breeds up to 30 cows, he is more important than any single cow. Qualities that make for a productive bull are physical fitness, semen quality and "libido" or sex drive. An annual semen check is important to detect any deficiencies in the breeding program.

Various diseases can also cause breeding failures. It's important to have a sound herd health program supervised by a veterinarian.

The new bulletin on boosting calf crops is a must for all producers who care about increasing the management efficiency of their beef cattle programs.

Eastland county showed a total of 1,324 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, a part of the Department's Social and Economic Statistics Administration (SESA).

In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1964) the number of farms reported in the county was 1,283. That's an increase of 41 farms.

Of the county's total farms in 1969, 725 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural products in the year, as compared with 466 in 1964.

The report also shows average farm size in the county was 394.6 acres, and average value of these farms (land and

buildings) was \$53,724. Other figures from the report are:

1. Value of all farm products sold in 1969, \$11,036,535; in 1964, \$5,162,250.

2. Value of all crops sold in 1969, \$5,294,807; in 1964, \$1,547,759.

3. Value of all livestock, poultry, and their products sold in 1969, \$5,740,809; in 1964, \$3,596,307.

Reported for the first time in an agricultural census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agricultural products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold.
