Out of town judges have been secured and will be announced at the contest.

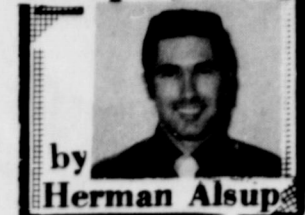
Little Miss Eastland and the first and second runners-up will receive gifts from local merchants and trophies from the sorority. All the contestants will receive a remembrance of the event.

## Gov. Smith Salutes Lawmen

Gov. Preston Smith was featured speaker and special guest for some 300 Eastland County Law Enforcement Association members and guests at a special banquet Friday evening at the Eastland Elementary Cafeterium.

Gov. Smith, in a prepared speech, reported that much progress has been made and called for even more cooperation in cutting the crime rate in the state. He cited several programs in progress which he gave credit to, for stemming the crime rate.

Introduced by Eastland Attorney Virgil T. Seaberry Jr., the governor opened his talk with good-natured stories on himself and his colleagues before launching into his address.

Representatives were present from each town in the county and from all departments of law enforcement.

Special awards were made by the Association to Scouting, and plaques, certificates and governor's pens went to Eastland Troop 6 Scoutmaster Winston Boles, and Eastland Eagle Scouts Tommy Morren, John Marshall and Stacey Blair, all Eastland High School students.

Vice President L. E. Sublett, presided in the absence of Sgt. Jerry Mathews, in Austin in training, and the organization dispensed with routine business, thanked the Ed Ethridges for decorations, Kendrick Music for dinner music, Victor Cornelius for programs, John Morren for general overall arrangements, and to each and everyone who attended.

The Rev. Haston Brewer gave the invocation and Jay Staggs was master of ceremonies.

Gov. Smith's plane touched down at 6:30 at the Eastland Airport and he was greeted by Mayor James Reid and a delegation of officials and was treated to a red-carpet welcome as Chief Morren and his Patrolmen pulled all stops to make it a night to remember in Eastland for the governor. Seaberry in his introduction pointed out that Gov. Smith served six years as a representative, six years as a senator, six years as lieutenant

governor, four years as governor, and added "I understand he plans to serve two more years to make it an even."

"His presence here is indicative of his interest in small towns," Seaberry said.

In his talk Gov. Smith paid tribute to the lawmen and

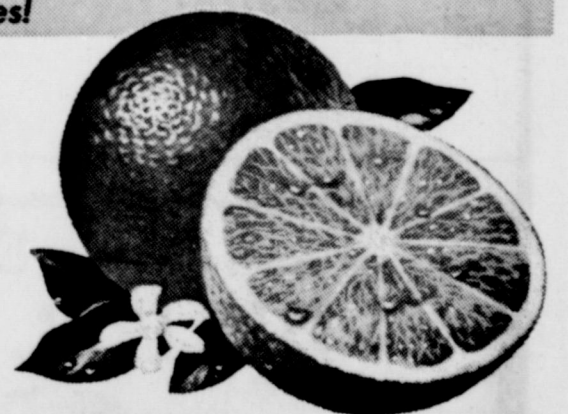

A Children's Sermon by Bertram de Heus Atwood

First Presbyterian Church, Englewood, New Jersey

LET me tell you a story about a little boy named Nathan. He lived in Jerusalem long ago with his father and mother, and they were very poor. The father had a little donkey that he called Satan, because she was slow and always behind. But she was a good little donkey in spite of her name, and she carried big loads of wood and stone—loads heavier than she was. She was very important to Nathan's family, for his father was a delivery man, and Satan was used to carry the loads.

But a sad thing happened. Satan got tired and sick and just lay in the straw behind Nathan's house. No matter how much Nathan petted her and whispered in her ear, she couldn't get up. It was a sad time for Nathan's family. What would Father do? They were too poor to get another donkey.

Then one day Nathan heard that a Man had come to town who was kind and good and clever. People went to him with their troubles, and this Man helped them. He healed the blind and made the lame walk. 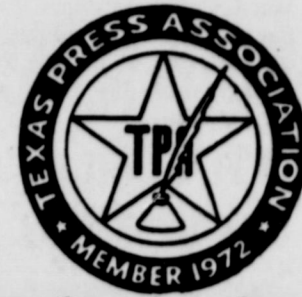

We would like to thank everyone who helped support the county livestock show. Almost 300 individuals and businesses bought ads in the stock show catalogue. You will find the list of merchants and individuals who purchased animals at the show sale in this paper. Several hundred also bought memberships to the Livestock Raisers Association. All these things help to support the show and provide an incentive for the boys and girls to do their best.

The youth receive little profits from their animals, but the growth and development of the youth because of these experiences can not be measured in money.

Eastland County has one of the best county livestock shows in the state. We have it because the merchants are willing to support it and because we have a group of adults who are willing to give much time and labor necessary to conduct a livestock show.

Enough cannot be said for the men who are directors and officers of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association. Many of them take leave from their jobs to conduct the stock show. Others leave their farms work to help the boys and girls. This work includes more than the three days of the show. They worked many evenings building new pens, new gates, repairing water lines, selling ads, assembling catalogues, mailing bills, contacting judges and setting up classes.

Thanks to the hundreds who make a contribution to the best county livestock show in Texas.

The main cause of damage to ornamental plants is not diseases or insects, but the misuse of weed killers such as 2, 4 - D. Every year we see larger numbers of plants and expensive shade trees killed or damaged with weed killers. When a homeowner in correctly uses the weed or grass killers they often damage their neighbor's plants as well as their own.

Once a sprayer has been used to apply weed killers never use that same sprayer to apply insecticides or other chemicals on ornamental plants or trees. When you do use the weed killers be sure read the label and follow the direction.

It is time to spray fruit trees the second time to control insects and diseases.

Gardens and nurseries now have a good supply of trees and shrubs as landscaping time is at hand. Three types of plants are generally available, balled and burlapped, container - grown and bare rooted.

Balled and burlapped (B&B) plants are usually larger than container - grown plants of the same price. They are usually field grown and may be better adjusted to conditions in your own landscape. B&B trees and shrubs must be handled carefully so as not to loosen the ball of soil and thereby endanger the life of the plant.

Container - grown plants are gaining in popularity, the most common sizes being those in one and five gallon containers. A big advantage of these plants is that there is less stock during transplanting.

Also, they have some protection from rough handling. By cutting the metal cans with special shears, plants can be lifted out of the containers with only minor root disturbance.

Plastic containers are now being used at some nurseries, and plants will usually slip out without cutting the container's sides.

Trees and shrubs should never be planted with the container left around the root ball. Bare rooted plants or those with roots packaged in

sawdust or similar material, are mostly successful planted during the dormant period of the late fall and winter. There is a lot of risk in planting this type once leaves are out. Two important items to remember when setting out bare rooted plants are: (1) never allow the root system to dry out or be completely submerged in water for long periods, and (2) prune the tree or shrub at transplanting time, removing from 13 to 12 of the top growth. Any damaged roots should also be pruned back to healthy wood.

When planting trees or shrubs, especially the bare rooted type, work plenty of humus material into the soil and leave a good mulch on the surface. Water plants adequately to insure maximum growth during the establishment.
