Round-Up Opens Here Saturday

Livestock of a different variety will be much in evidence at the Eastland County Sheriff's Posse Barn this Saturday and Sunday, when the second annual Eastland Jaycee Rattlesnake Round-up gets underway.

What's the rattle situation in the Eastland area?

Better than might be expected, it's guessed.

Eugene Kitchens is chairman for the Jaycee event and to be featured will be Copy Hodgkins of Strawn Texas, who will give demonstrations of live domestic snakes and treatment for snake bite. Kitchens may be contacted for information on the rattlesnake roundup as well as the Flea Market scheduled

in conjunction with the roundup. Kitchens stated that any Jaycee member could be contacted concerning this matter.

Hunters are advised to bring in their finds for cash Saturday, the paying price is 15 cents per pound and Sunday, the rate is ten cents per pound.

Activity gets under way at 10 a.m. Saturday with a weigh in and demonstration in the pit. Registration will continue until 5 p.m. and will resume at 10 a.m. Sunday, ending at 1 p.m. Sunday. From 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday, guided tours for spectators and photographers will be conducted.

City Marks Time On Phone Rate Hike

Eastland City Commissioners continued to meditate in the matter of telephone rate increases in a marathon meeting at City Hall Monday evening.

It was the second appearance of Southwestern Bell District Manager John McGowan requesting the rate hike, but the Commission refused to give the matter a first reading, stating that the people in Eastland have indicated to them that they are not in favor of granting such a request.

With all commissioners present, the telephone talk comprised most of the time as members discussed various aspects of the matter including bookkeeping procedures of the company, the differences in interstate and intrastate long

distance calling rates and other matters.

Commissioner W.Q. Verner was the most outspoken in his feeling on not granting a rate hike.

Confusing the issue is the fact that metro (toll-free dialing) service between Eastland and Cisco and Ranger is also being talked. The three cities have requested that the company provide data on such service.

The company has two separate proposals and the basic rate increase is really separate and apart. The basic rate adjustment would add 50 cents to the resident one-party service, if approved, then another 50 cents hike would come if metro-dialing is installed. It is guessed by the company that it would take a minimum 18 months to install the metro and the rate for that service would not begin until that service began, McGowan pointed out.

The company records show that their return on the Eastland exchange is presently 2.51 percent. The increase asked amounts to 9.5 percent which would boost the income by \$16,467, McGowan said. This would give the company a 4.5 percent rate of return.

Eastland Attorney Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. will introduce the guest speaker.

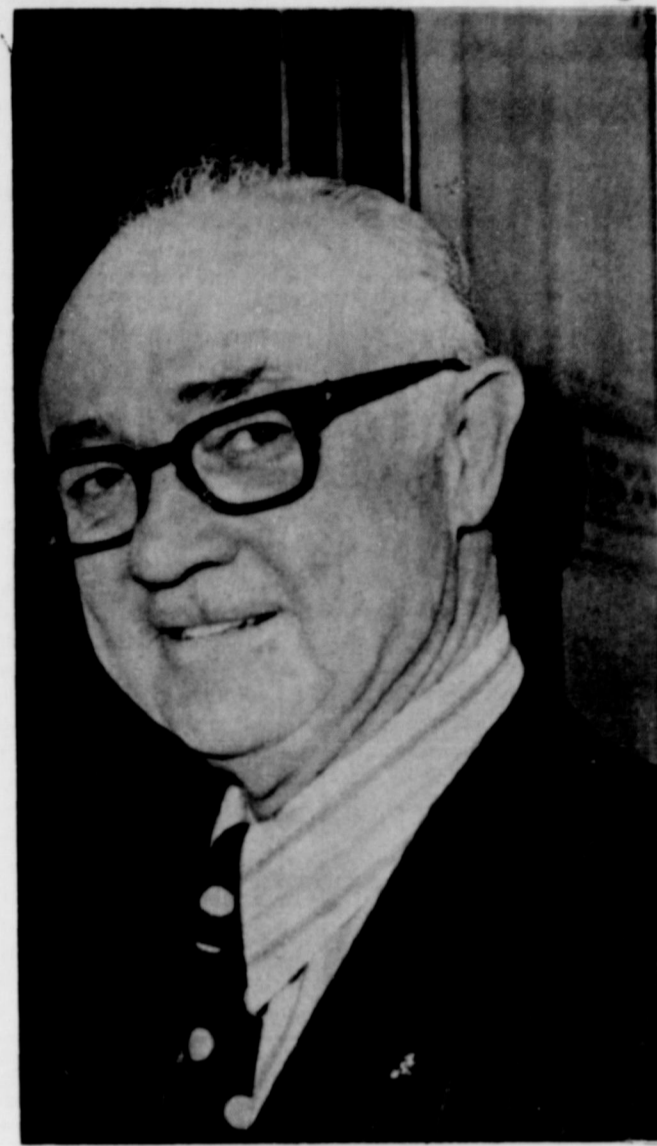

Floyd Williams of the Maverick Barber Shop is in charge of ticket sales and has tickets and will be announcing other locations where they are available.

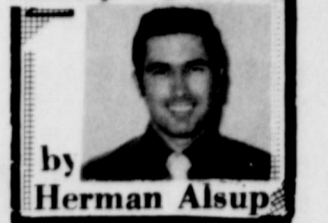
Supt. Wendell Seibert will be master of ceremonies and Football Captain Craig Lund

Drug Charges Filed Against Three Countians

Five Eastland County youths, four from Cisco and one from Eastland were arrested Sunday afternoon at the Dairy Queen, one and a half miles east of Eastland on U.S. 80 and IH-20.

Eastland County Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton said charges of possession of dangerous narcotic drugs were filed against three men. Walton said that drugs tentatively had been identified as hashish.

In Eastland County Jail are Jerry Lee Sharp, 22 of Eastland, and Ralph Adams, 29, and Jerry Lynn Owens, 21 both of Cisco.

The two other Cisco youths were released pending further investigation.

Eastland Chief of Police Johnnie Morren said that he received a tip that the exchange of drugs was to take place and he alerted and joined other officers at the scene.

Assisting in the arrest were Sgt. Ben Sancillo, Patrolman Leroy Steinman and County Game Warden Kenneth Payne. Constable Bill Hunter arrived as the arrests were made.

The five were brought before Ranger Justice of the Peace M.D. Underwood in Eastland.

The arrests culminated some three months of intensive undercover work.

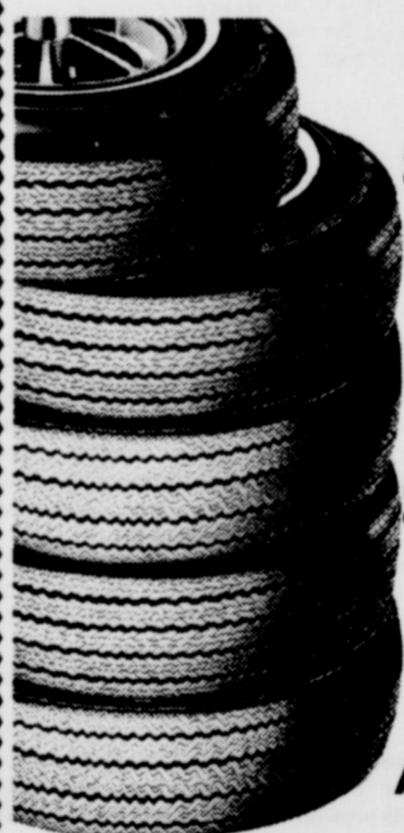

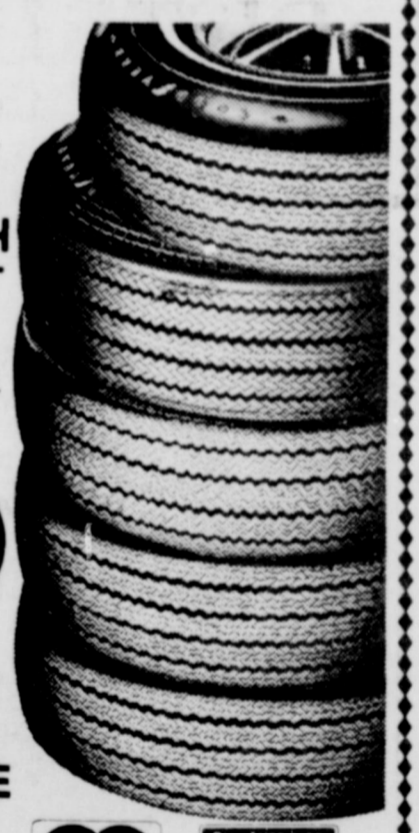

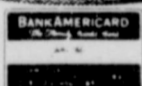

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

AUSTIN - Texas voters will get a chance to express themselves at the May 6 polls on the explosive issue of forced busing to achieve racial balance in public schools.

Both Democratic and Republican executive committees decided to put a busing referendum on the ballot to encourage voter turnout and demonstrate Texas sentiments to federal authorities. Both ballot items ask Texans to state whether they want a federal constitutional amendment to outlaw forced busing.

Neither party went along with Gov. Preston Smith's suggestion to submit to voters a presidential preference referendum. There isn't much choice for the Republicans, and Democrats dropped the presidential choice poll (which would have had no binding effect anyway) in a scrap over party rules.

Republicans adopted their required new rules routinely, but reform regulations went down hard for the Democrats.

SDEC finally adopted rules largely identical with the moderate reform proposals of William R. Anderson Jr. of Corpus Christi. They are designed to assure a form of proportional representation of minorities, youth and women on convention delegations and to reflect delegates' choices of presidential candidates. Internal operating procedures for parties are also set out.

Loudest opposition to the compromise Democratic rules draft came from Young Democrats who wanted three seats on the senior party's executive committee. Instead, two seats went to SDEC's youth advisory council officers. Young Democrats vowed to keep trying for reconsideration on the point.

The busing referendum may have played a part in Alabama Gov. George Wallace's decision to live up the conventions by openly seeking Democratic presidential delegate votes in Texas. The issue helped Wallace win in Florida.

VERDICT SHAKES POLITICOS - Conviction of House Speaker Gus Mutscher and two aides on bribery conspiracy charges left many political figures wondering about effect of fallout on their own futures.

Sharpstown Bank stock - loan scandals already were a major issue in some campaigns. Conviction of Mutscher is expected to increase the chorus of I - told - you - so's, and some incumbent officials fear outries may increase for removal of everybody who had anything to do with the Sharpstown Bank bills of 1969.

First direct political effect of the trial likely will be felt in the House of Representatives soon. Heading the order of business there - if Mutscher declines

AG OPINIONS - Retired judges are eligible to receive the benefit of limited state participation in payment of insurance premiums under state group programs, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held.

In other recent opinions, the Attorney General concluded: - Blood donors between 18 and 21 can receive no compensation or blood bank credit. - A Housing Authority tenant is prohibited from serving as a commissioner of that authority. - County court at law of Bell County exercises concurrent jurisdiction with district courts in civil cases where the amount in controversy is between \$500 and \$5,000 exclusive of interest. - Angelina County court at

law is a court of record, and its judge on demand of a litigant must furnish a competent stenographer paid out of court costs. An official court reporter is not required to be appointed on a fulltime basis.

COURTS SPEAK - Constitutionality of the death penalty has been upheld by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals. Judge Truman Roberts concluded in the divided opinion that execution for a crime is not cruel or unusual punishments forbidden by the U.S. Constitution. The issue is now before the U.S. Supreme Court. Texas Supreme Court blocked a last effort by The University of Texas at Austin to obtain an Austin house deed to it by a late professor. Lower courts found "Undue influence" had been used by UT officials on the aged professor to get his property. The Supreme Court refused to hear an appeal of an insurance company from a lower court order that an Hidalgo County man's suit to recover for loss of a 3.19 carat diamond ring must be tried on its merits.

APPOINTMENTS - State Rep. Fred Agnich of Dallas was selected as new Republican national committeeman. Governor Smith announced these recent appointments: - George E. Stanley of Port Arthur to the Veterans Affairs Commission. - Martin Frank Wood of Dallas and Bobby M. Burns of Wichita Falls to the Midwestern University board of regents. Mrs. Mary Nell Garrison of Austin was named for a new term on the same board.

OIL PRODUCTION WIDE OPEN - For the first time since 1948, the Railroad Commission has pulled the throttle wide open on Texas oil production. A 100 percent allowable was approved at the Commission's annual state - of - the - industry meeting in El Paso. Major buyers of crude requested 3,544,966 barrels of oil daily next month, a sharp increase over the big 86 percent allowable in March. Rising demands for energy forced the "sad" order. Commission Chairman Byron Tunnell said. Oilmen said imports would have to make up the deficiency of domestic oil in 1972.

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SCHOOL ASSIGNMENT SET - State Board of Education set \$265 million as local school districts' share of the Texas public school program cost for the next school year. This is calculated at about 20 percent of a district's total operating outlays. The Board also adopted an economic index determining just how much each district contributes. The state's system of financing public school education already had been found illegal by a federal court

but the legislature has been given one more chance to come up with a formula suitable to the court.

"POVERTY" COUNTIES IDENTIFIED - Thirteen Texas counties with the lowest family income as reflected by the 1970 census were designated under the Hill - Burton hospital aid program as poverty areas. Counties designated were Starr, Zapata, Kinney, Jim Hogg, LaSalle, Dimmit, Willacy, Presidio, Brooks, Real, San Jacinto, Houston and Duval.

Hill - Burton federal hospital aid is distributed on a 50 - 50 matching Basis, but poverty areas may receive up to 90 percent of money needed for building hospitals and related facilities.

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

RURAL ENVIRONMENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM - REAP

The second quarter REAP sign up will be on March 27 through March 31, 1972. The "first come, first serve" basis will NOT be used. Committee approval will be based on priorities for this period. High priority practices for this

period are brush control and farm ponds. Requests that are made after the sign up dates will receive consideration only if funds become available.

To be eligible for cost share, a request must be made and on file at the ASCS office BEFORE the practice is started.

ALLOTMENT TRANSFER

The final date to transfer 1972 peanut allotments by sale, lease or owner transfer is APRIL 3, 1972. Peanut allotments may be transferred only to the farms in the county.

The final date to transfer 1972 cotton allotments is APRIL 3, 1972.

A register of persons wishing to transfer cotton or peanut allotments is available in the county office. Your name, yield and allotment may be entered on the list upon your request.

CROPS COMPETITIVE TO

PEANUTS

A crop that is competitive to peanuts is one that is planted at approximately the same time and competes for moisture and sunlight during the entire growing season. The County Committee has determined the following to be competitive: Maize, Hegari, Milo, Sudan, Sudan Crosses, Forage Sorghums, Sweet Sorghums.

Those that are planning to plant peanuts with a crop other than those listed above should check with the ASCS office

before planting.

MEASUREMENT SERVICE
If you are not sure about the quality of your set aside acreage, you can have it guaranteed by requesting measurement service at this office. Measurement of crops before and after planting is also available upon payment of measurement cost.

PRESERVATION OF CROPLAND - FEED GRAIN BASES AND ALLOTMENT CROPS
Requests for preservation of

your feed grain base and allotment crops may be made by completing a written request in the County Office by not later than APRIL 1 of the current year and being approved by the County Committee. The acreage on which preservation is requested must be cropland that was established and maintained under REAP or comparable practices carried out with or without Federal cost share. Allotment and feed grain base acreage may not be preserved

when the crop is enrolled in the set aside program and a payment is being earned.

COVER CROP PLOW UP DATE
Producers are reminded that cover crops that were seeded with REAP cost shares must be left on the land until APRIL 1, 1972.

RELEASE AND REAP-PORTIONED ACREAGE
The final date to release and request reapportioned acreage for cotton and peanuts is APRIL 3, 1972.

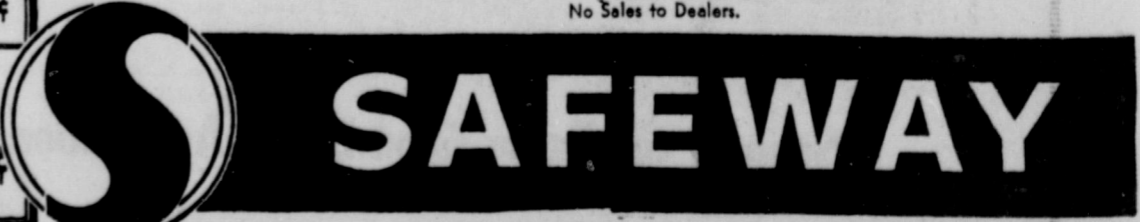

Phone Rate Would Up 1,708 Customers

The basic rate increase asked by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. for the Eastland Exchange amounts to 9.5 percent and would boost company revenue by \$16,467. This rate has nothing to do with the toll-free dialing which would come later with an additional rate increase.

The rate hike would achieve the \$16,467 increase in revenue by:

- ..Raise the 958 one-party residence phones from \$5.50 to \$6.00 per month, for a total annual increase of \$5,748.
- ..Raise the 226 two-party customers from \$4.25 to \$4.70 for \$1,220 annually.
- ..Raise the 59 four-party customers from \$4.85 to \$5.05 for \$142.
- ..Raise the 185-eight party customers from \$4.00 to \$4.25 for \$555.
- ..Raise the 247 one-party business customers from \$10.50 to \$13.00 for \$7,410 annually.
- ..Raise the two four-party business customers from \$8.35 to \$10.05 for \$41.
- ..Raise the four eight-party business customers from \$7.50 to \$9.20 for \$82.
- ..Raise the 27 pay phone customers from \$6.90 (23 cents per day guarantee) to \$5.20 (40 percent of business one-party rate) for \$1,080.
- ..Raise the miscellaneous rates for a total of \$189.

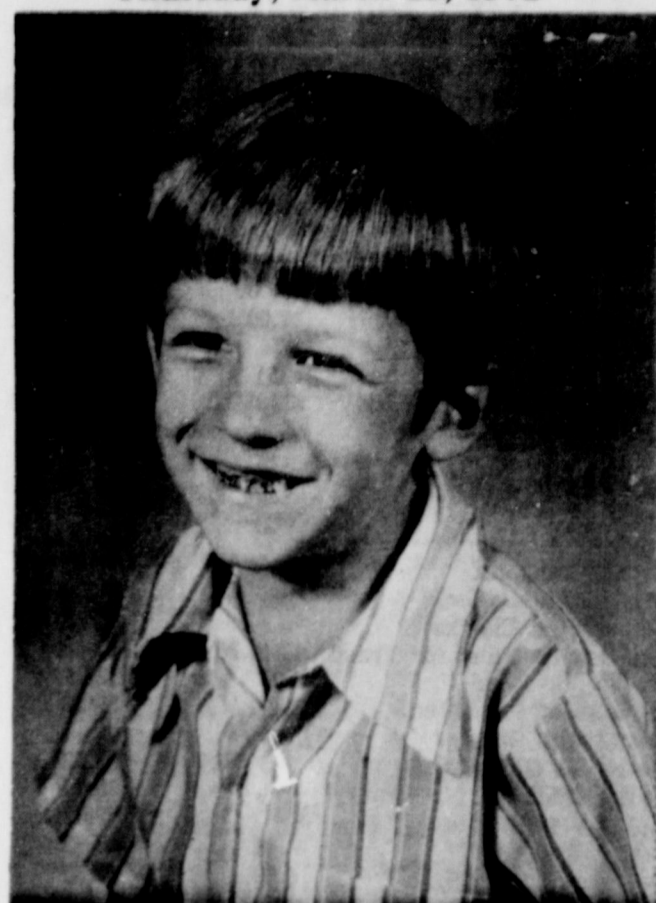
District Manager John McGowan who met with the commission said the rate ordinance will have to be read again for passage and that new rates can not become effective until after April 29.

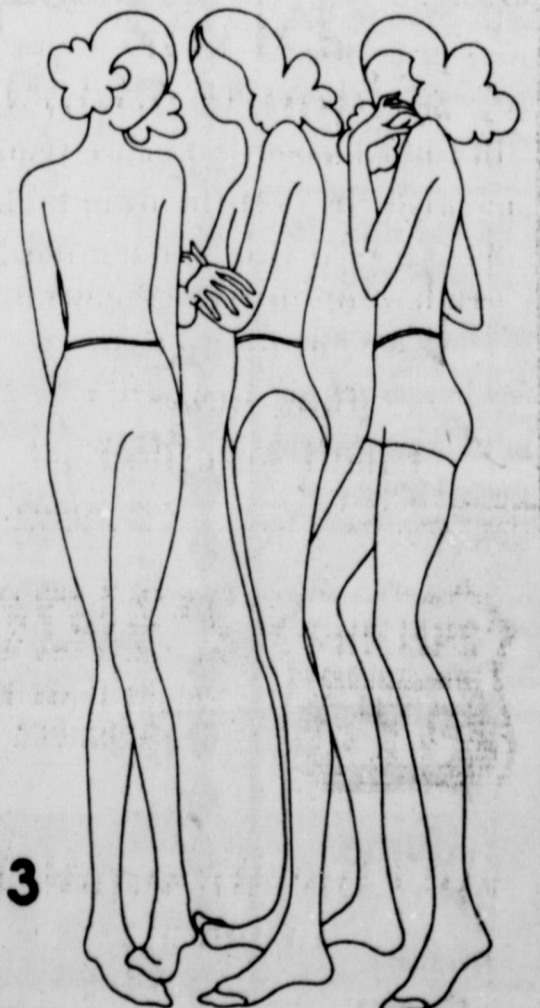

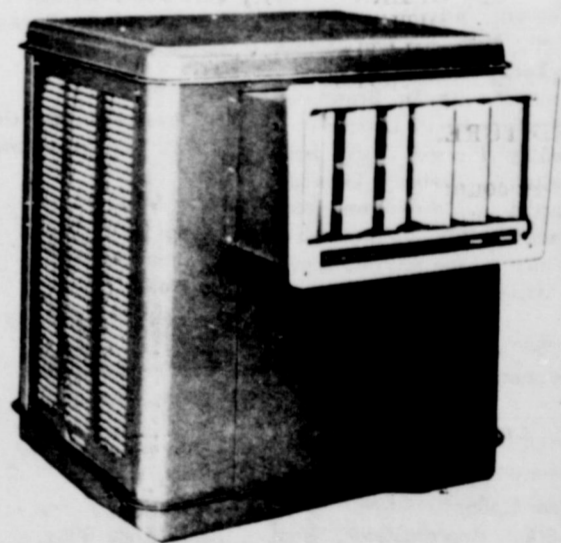

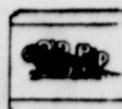
