Clyde Evatt Is New Head Coach Former Maverick Due Back April 17

Clyde Newton Evatt, 33, a three-letter Maverick of the Mid-1950's will return as head coach for Eastland High School on April 17. Supt. Wendell Siebert has announced. Almost a native son, Evatt is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Evatt who moved to Eastland

in 1940 from Baine. He was an outstanding athlete and lettered in football, basketball and track as a Maverick and was president of his 1956 senior class. He fills the position left vacant with the resignation of Head Coach Shirley Frazier

who is on duty as athletic director and head coach at Taylor. Mr. Evatt becomes the second man in Maverick history to return as a head coach. Supt. Siebert was the first returnee. (During the war years, John Hart, a local graduate, held coaching duties on a semi-official basis.)

Evatt comes to Eastland from Randolph Field High School in San Antonio where he is an assistant coach. He also coached track at Randolph. He recorded a brilliant four-year college football career: playing as a freshman at Texas Tech, then at Ranger Junior College where he was team captain, and his final two years of eligibility were at Sul Ross. He has coached for 11 years. His first coaching job was assistant coach to Jim Puryear at RJC. Then he was head coach at Troup and then to South San Antonio High. He was at Gonzales High before going to Randolph at San Antonio.

He is married to the former Ann Pittman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.D. Pittman of Eastland. They have four children: Kirk, 12; Mark, 10; Pam, 9; and Brent, 2.

Evatt played Maverick football under Carroll Shelton. Supt. Siebert said that Mr. Evatt commands the highest recommendations from throughout the state and that the board of trustees is happy to add him to the Eastland School Staff. In other business at the Monday night school board, the trustees adopted a mandatory retirement policy, with a provision that a one-year extension may be granted on special approval of the board. A textbook report was approved and the \$1,532 Title One Absentee voting for the April 1 school board election is underway at the county clerk's office and concludes March 28.

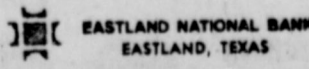
"An all-out trust in divine law can help us take an active part in today's rapidly changing world".

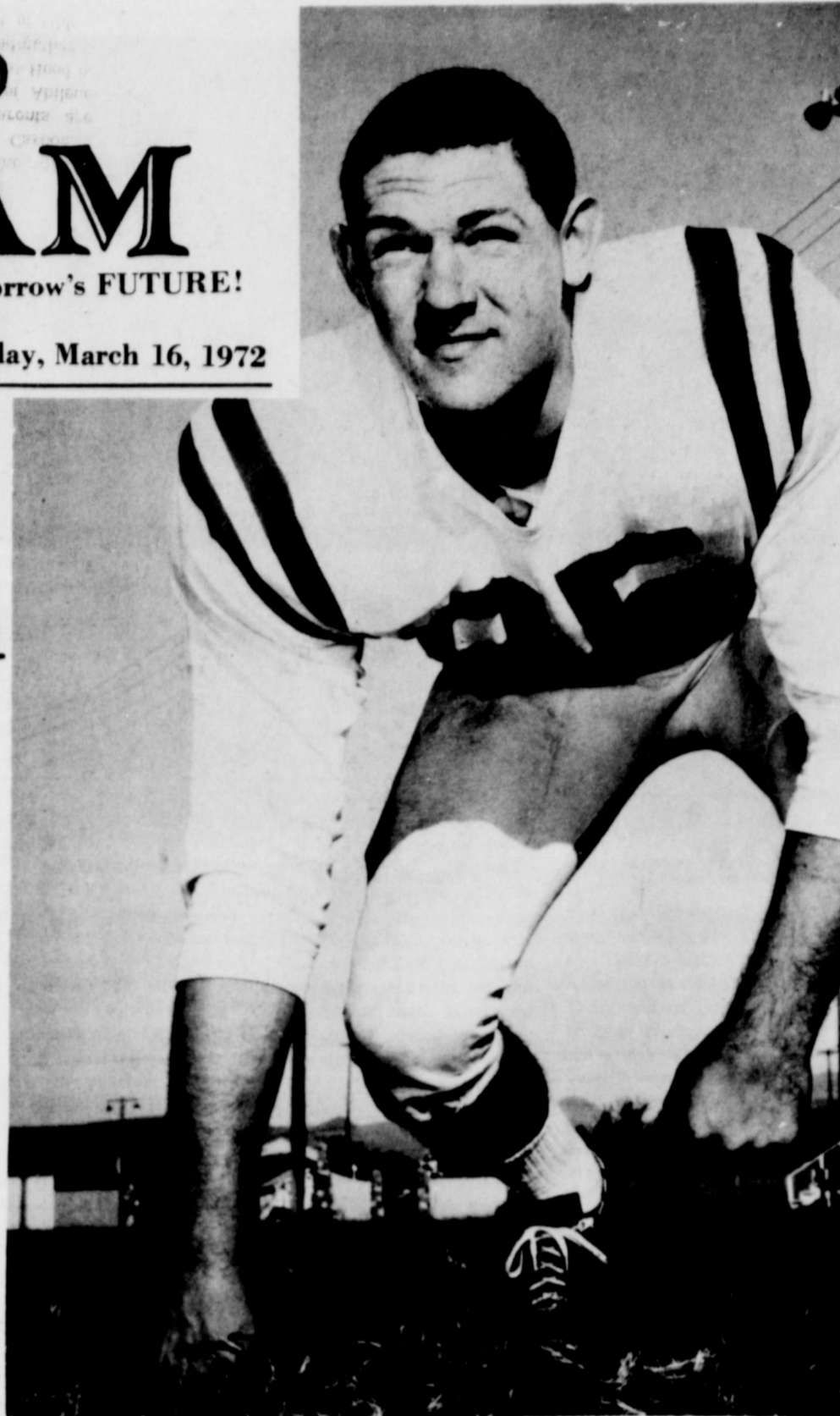
The official open house for Bakker Funeral Home will be held Sunday, March 19, from 1 to 6 p.m., Funeral Director

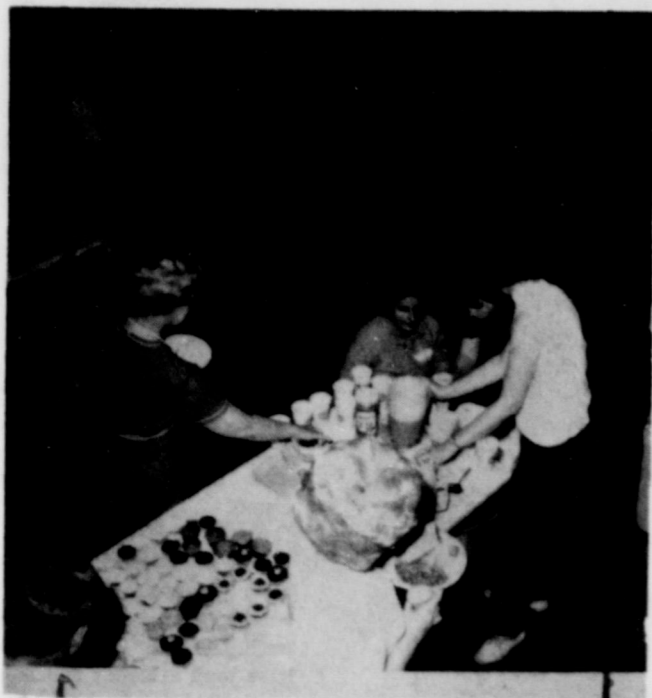

R.R.C. Okays Lone Star Gas Cost Rule

Lone Star Gas Company today announced that the Texas Railroad Commission has granted adoption of a gas cost adjustment rule requested by Lone Star. The rule authorizes the intra-company "city gate" charge for gas sold to residential and commercial customers to be adjusted for changes in the cost of gas purchased by Lone Star. The rate adjustment permits Lone Star to receive 65 percent of the increase or decrease of the cost of gas to the Company on a semiannual basis.

Any customer rate adjustment resulting from this Order must be authorized by the cities served by the utility.

The gas cost adjustment rule will benefit Lone Star customers by insuring natural gas service for their continued use and for the future growth of the Lone Star service area. A spokesman for the utility explained that, "although Lone Star enjoys a favorable gas supply position, the current action by the Texas Railroad Commission puts us in a stronger position to compete with other companies for additional gas supplies. The need to continue adding new reserves and the spiraling cost of gas create a problem recognized by the Commission. Today's action is a step forward in stimulating additional exploration and development of new natural gas reserves in Texas."

Existing rates for gas sold by Lone Star to all customers in Oklahoma and to industrial customers in Texas have for many years contained gas cost adjustment clauses. Gas cost adjustment procedures of some kind are in effect in 34 other states.

Highway Dept. Makes Changes In 'Signing'

The Texas Highway Commission has approved sweeping new changes in traffic control devices - signs, signals and highway markings.

The changes are in the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices approved by the Commission. The manual incorporates changes prepared by the Federal Highway Administration based on recommendations by a national committee of the American Association of State Highway Officials.

The new philosophy in signing recommended by the manual involves the

changeover from words to symbols and pictures as part of an international move toward greater uniformity and clarity in road signs throughout the nation.

In Europe, the system of symbols and shapes has been used effectively for the past 20 years among multi-language countries where uniformity is necessary for efficient traffic control.

The new signs and other traffic control devices have been under study in this country since 1964. One of the primary reasons for the new system of symbols and shapes is that they will enable people of different national and cultural backgrounds to easily identify traffic signs while driving.

Panels explaining the new symbols will be placed under the signs so motorists won't be confused. Traffic engineers hope that the public will become familiar with the new symbols and shapes in about five years so the panels can be removed.

In Texas, the changeover will be gradual, with new signs going up on a replacement basis initially. The manual will become effective June 1, 1972.

Although there will be new symbols, shapes and colors, the majority of the existing signs will remain unchanged.

The new yield right-of-way sign will have a wide red border and white interior and will retain the word "YIELD" in red inside the border.

The new prohibitive signs will all have a red circle with a slash cutting diagonally through the center which will mean "DO NOT" or "NO." The symbol inside the circle will show what is prohibited. For example, a sign showing a left turn arrow which is surrounded by a red circle and a slash means "NO LEFT TURN".

The yellow diamond-shaped signs will still stand for a warning, but some of the symbols showing hazards ahead will be new. For example, the message, "MERGING TRAFFIC", on a yellow diamond-shaped sign will be replaced by a black arrow being joined by a smaller black line. It is hoped this will minimize confusion as to which stream carries the merging traffic.

There is a major change in the school advance sign and the school crossing sign. These signs will now be pentagon in shape, with the figures of two school children being shown in black on a yellow background.

Color will become more important in the new system.

Red will indicate stop or a prohibition, green will show movement permitted or give directional guidance, blue will signify motorist services, yellow will indicate a general warning, and black on white will be used for regulatory signs such as those for speed limits and for most guide and destination signs.

In addition, orange (a new color in the manual) will convey construction and maintenance warnings.

The new traffic control devices manual also includes major adjustments in the use of color lines for pavement markings.

White broken lane lines will remain on divided, multiple-lane highways such as Interstate Highways. The white broken line will denote that there is more than one lane, but that traffic in all lanes travels in the same direction. Solid white lines will be used for edge lining on two-way roadways, crosswalks and road markings.

Yellow striping will be used a great deal more than in the past and will denote two-way traffic. The combination of broken and solid yellow stripes will indicate to the motorist what is permitted.

A yellow broken centerline will mark the division of the road where passing is permitted. A solid yellow line to the right of a broken yellow centerline will mean no passing is allowed for traffic in that lane. Double solid yellow lines will denote the center line of an undivided multilane highway where no passing is allowed by vehicles in either direction.

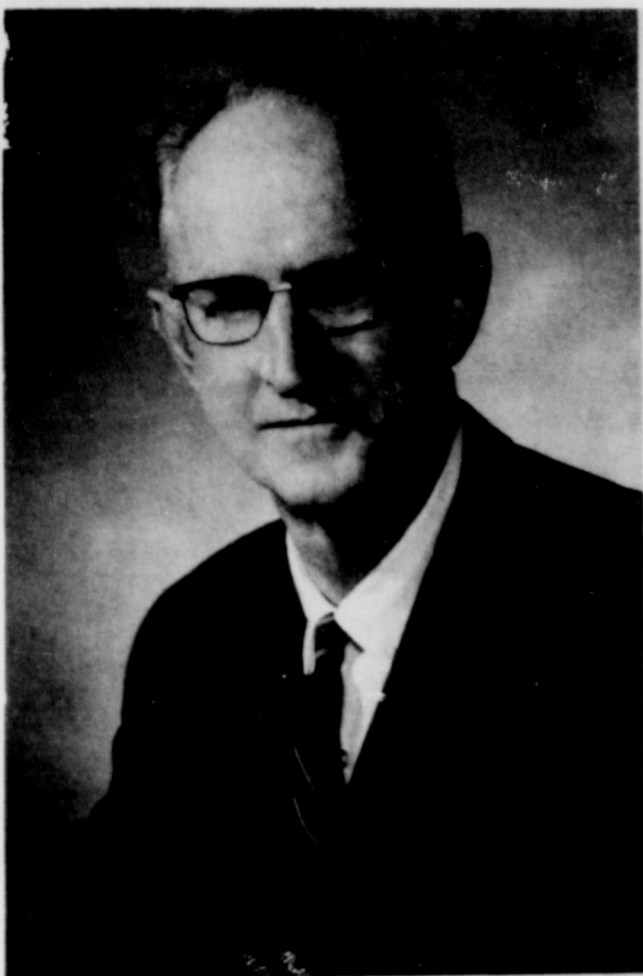

This is a time . . . when loyal Presbyterians should stand up and say clearly, 'We have not always agreed with everything our leaders . . . have done, but we believe them to be worthy of our trust and support, and we will have no part of a plan to divide our beloved church.' "

During Dr. Rose's moderatorial year, a number of organizations (Concernu Presbyterians, Presbyterian Churchmen United, and the Boards of The Presbyterian Journal and the Presbyterian Evangelistic Fellowship) have created a steering committee with the announced intention of forming a new denomination. Dr. Rose has worked hard these past months at preserving the unity of the church.

Guest soloist Friday will be Mrs. Dan H. Barfield, wife of the pastor of First Presbyterian Church, Ardmore, Oklahoma. Mrs. Barfield, formerly a soloist in the First Church, Fort Worth, will sing "O Divine Redeemer" by Gounod. She will be accompanied by Mrs. Ben Krauskopf, church organist. A reception in honor of Dr. Rose will be held in the social room of the church immediately following the program.

The girls enjoyed the exploring of new territory and petted the baby goats. A sack lunch was enjoyed under the shade of the live oak trees.

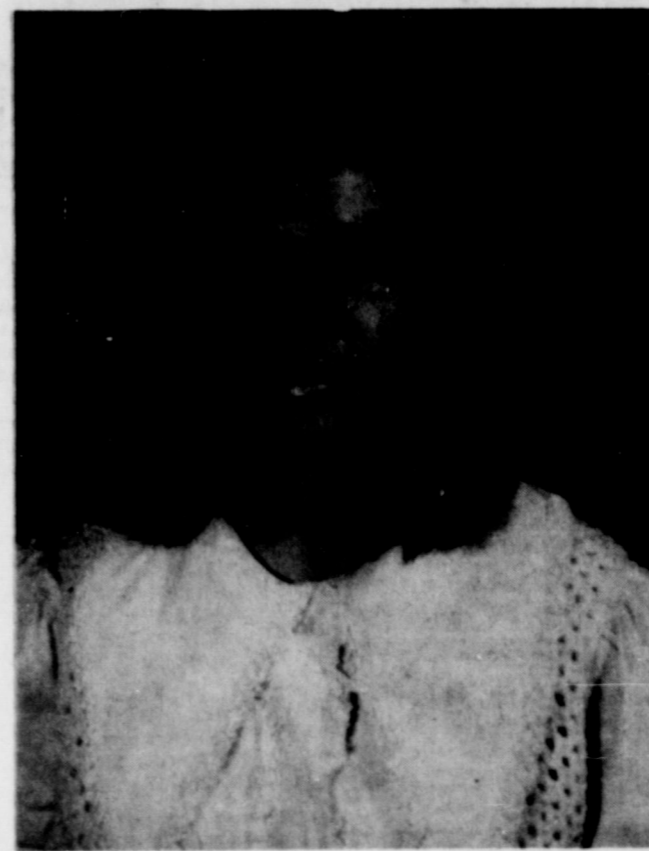
