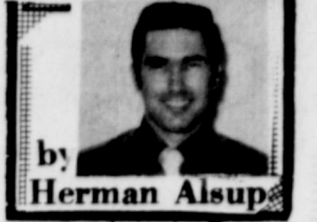

County Livestock Show Set To Open

The 1972 Eastland County Livestock Show is just around the corner and 4-H and FFA members in all parts of the

county are making final preparations. Winford Fry, Eastland County Livestock Raisers Assn. President,

reports that the show will be held northwest of Eastland at the County Livestock Show Barns on Thursday, Friday and

Saturday, March 16th, 17th, and 18th.

The County Show is held each year for the benefit of 4-H and FFA members in Eastland County. Everyone is invited to purchase memberships in the E.C.L.R.A. for \$1.00. This ticket is also good for a chance to win half a beef. A drawing will be held to select the winner on Saturday night.

Bill Claborn, General Superintendent of the show, says that there are 457 animals entered in the show. The breakdown is as follows: 125 market hogs, 39 breeding hogs, 29 steers, 43 breeding beef, 7 dairy, 133 market lambs, 49 breeding sheep and 16 goats. Marking a first for the livestock show will be the addition of 16 breeding rabbits. This is the first time that rabbits have been shown in the Eastland County Show.

These animals must have been fed, fitted and cared for under the supervision of a vocational agriculture teachers or County Agent to exhibit in the show.

Predator Problem Big One

"Livestock producers in Texas have been battling predators since 1909. You would think the predator problem would be licked by now but it appears to be worse," says Sutton Allison of Fort Stockton, president of the 5,000 member Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association.

In an effort to bring about more effective predator control in Texas directors of the TS&GRA voted unanimously to sponsor a referendum in 73 sheep and goat producing counties to allow a deduction to be checked off on sheep and goats sold to provide funds to finance a stronger and more effective state-wide predator control program. The 73-county area has 97 percent of the sheep and goat population owned by 81 percent of the state's producers.

The referendum is to be conducted by mail ballot and to be valid, ballots must be postmarked no later than midnight March 28. Permission for conducting the referendum was granted to the Association by the Texas Department of Agriculture at the conclusion of a hearing held January 7 in Austin. Ballots will be mailed to producers between March 10 and March 13. If a producer fails to get a ballot by mail, extra ballots will be available in county agents offices or in county judges' offices in counties not having an Extension agent. The ballot will also include names of nominees for directors to the commodity board that will supervise the predator control program is the referendum is approved. Each qualified voter will vote for a nominee representing his respective district and three directors at large. District nominees are: District 1 - Sid Harkins, Sanderson; District 2 - C. W. Hemphill, Valera; District 3 - Clyde Earwood, Del Rio; District 4 - Hartwin H. Holmstrom, Georgetown and Paul Dreiss, Jr., Comfort; District 5 - Armer Earwood, Sonora and Alton Williamson, Menard; District 6 - Frank K. Courtney, Jonesboro and Joe L. Jackson, Ranger. Nominees for directors at large are: Vestel Askew, Sonora; Bert Dennis, Gail; I.C. (Tiny) Earp, Crane; C.T. Holekamp II, Junction; Monte Noelke, Mertzon; Robert R. Ramsey, Hunt; Bit Terry, Del Rio; and Louis Woodward, Girvin.

The first organized movement in Texas to effectively reduce predator losses came in January, 1909, when members of Wool Growers Central Storage Co. of San Angelo passed a resolution asking the State Legislature to pass a bill to compensate "hunters and trappers" for their service in trapping and killing wolves and coyotes in West Texas. The Bounty Law of 1911 ultimately was passed at the next session of the Legislature.

Texas has had some kind of predator control program in existence for more than 60 years, but sheep and goat ranchers contend that if predators are not controlled more effectively their multi-million dollar industry will be virtually wiped out.
