Dr. Thomas Kim, president of McMurry College, gave the formula for the good life, as principal speaker.

Due special recognition by the chamber for their years of unselfish contributions to the chamber and the banquets, were Victor Cornelius who annually donates a masterpiece banquet program, unexcelled in beauty, and Mr.

and Mrs. Ed Ethridge for five years of providing the banquet's always outstanding decorations.

Golden Deeder Jones came to Eastland from Gladewater in 1949 and has been active as a school board member, chamber director and in his church.

McKinnis is division sales manager for Texas Electric Service Co., past president of the Chamber of Commerce and has been active in most civic organizations since moving to Eastland in 1957.

A native of Horton, Mr. Jones graduated from East Texas State in 1941, served in the Air Force and lived in Commerce and Gladewater before coming to Eastland. He is associated in Fullen Appliance Co. and Fullen Motor Co. here.

Mr. McKinnis is a native of Louisiana, and is credited with the development of the excellent C of C brochure now being used.

Retiring C of C president Jeff Glazner thanked many for chamber help during the year just ended, which saw the expansion and - or development of some 20 businesses in Eastland.

Dallas Symphony To Appear In Cisco Tuesday

Appearing at Cisco Junior College Tuesday night will be the Dallas Symphony Orchestra, one of the oldest American Orchestras.

In the spring of 1900, the Dallas Symphony Club announced a season of three concerts. Hans Kreissig, a well known concert pianist and musical pedagogue, led the first concert. There were 35 players in the orchestra, including 16 violinists.

It is from this event that today's 85 - member Dallas Symphony Orchestra, which plays over 165 concerts this season, dates its beginning.

By this reckoning, the Dallas Symphony is one of the six oldest major American symphony orchestras. The Philadelphia Orchestra was organized the same year; only New York, Boston, Chicago and St. Louis have longer orchestral histories.

Except during World War I and II, when the orchestra suspended activities, the Dallas Symphony has been a continuous artistic force in its own community and the larger Southwest region since the beginning of the century.

Kreissig had been conductor of a touring musical company when it folded in Texas. In 1905, another German musician, Walter Fried, arrived to teach violin in Dallas and proceeded to organize a Dallas Symphony along more formal lines.

With its traditions and its repertoire largely Germanic, the Dallas Symphony had to suspend operations during World War I because of the anti - German feeling which also hit other American orchestras at the time.

Fried reorganized the Dallas Symphony in 1918 and led it until 1924.

From 1925 to 1928, Dr. Paul van Katwijk, the respected pianist, composer and pedagogue, dean of the school of Music at Southern Methodist University, conducted the orchestra. It remained a largely amateur organization. With the advent of Jacques Singer, the conductor from 1938 see inside

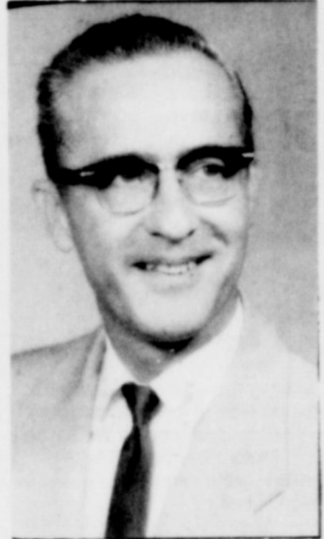
Zeta Pi Joins Civic Project

Eastland County Tax Assessor - Collector Edgar Altom is recommending that citizens DO register before Jan. 31 to insure that their names are included in voter roles, rather than registering later and then having their names added to supplemental roles.

You should also inspect your established fruit trees for scale insects. A dormant oil spray at this time will control scale. You may also prune fruit trees in February, but wait awhile before pruning roses. Roses should not be pruned until early March.

to 1942, the leaders of Dallas began to think in terms of an orchestra which would bear comparison with the great orchestras of New York, Boston, Philadelphia, and Chicago.

In 1942, World War II put the Dallas Symphony temporarily out of business again.

Antal Dorati had already won an international reputation as a conductor of ballet when he arrived in Dallas in 1945 to revive the Dallas Symphony and make it for the first time a major professional ensemble. Dorati and the orchestra were immediately signed for a series of recordings for RCA Victor Records.

When Dorati left in 1949 to assume the podium at Minneapolis, Dallas tapped the young associate conductor of the New York Philharmonic, Walter Hendl, to be its symphony chief. Hendl became the first American-born and American trained conductor to head a major orchestra.

After eight seasons, Hendl passed on the Dallas Symphony, now permanently established as one of America's major orchestras, to Paul Kletzki, the distinguished Polish conductor. Kletzki was the music director from 1958 to 1961.

The 1961 - 62 season was directed by Georg Solti as senior conductor. When Solti left at the end of the season to become artistic director of the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden, London, the Dallas Symphony turned to Donald Johanos and named him its tenth music director.

It was Johanos who led the Dallas Symphony Orchestra in

its New York debut at Carnegie Hall in March, 1965, and served as its Music Director for eight seasons.

In 1966, the Ford Foundation offered the orchestra a \$2 million grant on condition that the orchestra raise a matching \$2 million while maintaining its operating budget. After a concerted drive in June, 1967, the Dallas Symphony was among the first of the major orchestras to announce its meeting of the Ford challenge. As of June, 1971, all conditions of the Ford Foundation grant were successfully met.

The Dallas Symphony was the recipient of a special award in 1969 for its 20th-century Gamut series. The award, presented by the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, was for its contributions to contemporary music.

Skip Row Planting Increases Yield

WASHINGTON, January 13 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced today it plans to exclude peanuts from the skip row planting provision beginning with the 1972 crop program. This will mean that where peanuts are planted in a skip row pattern the entire field will be counted as peanut acreage.

The action is being taken in order to prevent abnormal increases in yields and hold down program costs, USDA officials explained. Commodity Credit Corporation has acquired about 35 percent of the 1970 crop of peanuts and present indications are it will take over a larger percentage of the 1971 crop.

Field studies indicate that yields increase by 10 to 20 percent when peanuts are planted in skip row pattern, making every row an outside row thereby improving growing conditions.

USDA has no authority, as it has in the case of other crops, to reduce the minimum peanut allotment of 1,610,000 acres to avoid surpluses resulting from higher yields. Peanut yields have been rising at the rate faster than consumption.

While skip row planting of peanuts is not widespread now, the promise of improved yields would tend to promote the practice unless the regulations are changed, USDA indicated.

POTPOURRI AND POMANDERS

Would you like your home to smell like a rose garden all winter? Then make a potpourri! While summer and

spring are not here yet, I suggest you file this article for later use. Potpourris make excellent gifts for friends.

What is a potpourri? Webster definition is: a mixture, as of scented flower petals in a jar, used to scent a room. Fragrant leaves can be used equally as well as flower petals.

How do you make a pot-

pourri? Very simple...dry leaves and petals on newspapers in a dry, dark room about 1 week or 10 days. For one quart of petals, add one ounce of orrisroot. This should be sprinkled between layers of the plant material. In addition 1/2 teaspoon spices, such as cloves, allspice, orange or lemon peel (grated and dried),

cinnamon, saffras, coriander and mace may be used. Keep these ingredients in a covered earthenware container until ready to use. Then by removing the cover and stirring the contents you can fill your home with a lovely fragrance. Unlimited possibilities exist to create your own potpourri formula.

Another way to "spice up your life" is to hang pomanders. To make these spice balls, use as a base either citrus fruits, apples, or pears.

Whichever fruit you use, cover it with whole spices. When using citrus, puncture holes with a fork which will make it easier to insert the cloves.

After covering the fruit with cloves, you can run a length of nylon fish line through one end to make a loop for the ribbon. Roll the pomander in a mixture of orrisroot and your favorite spices. Allow it to cure in tissue paper and a small amount of the spice mixture for several weeks. Finally, hang it in the closet, or give it to a friend.

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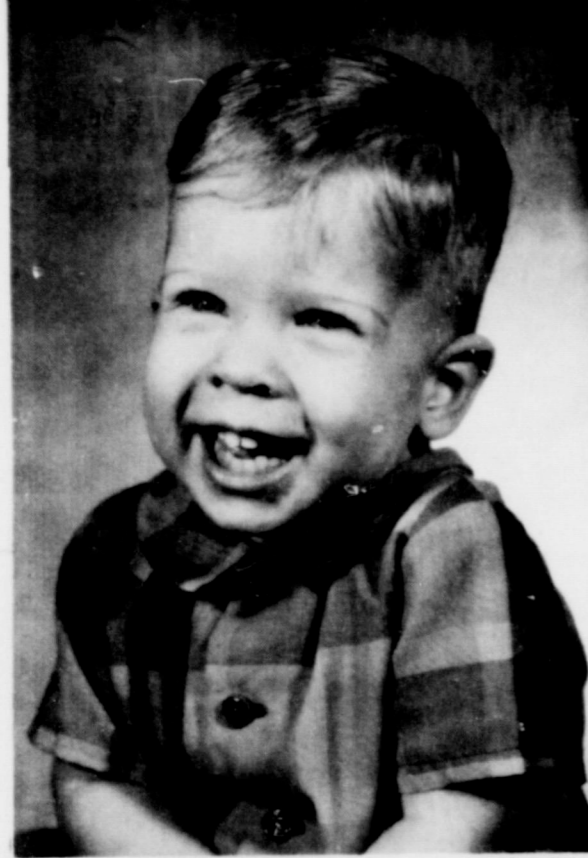
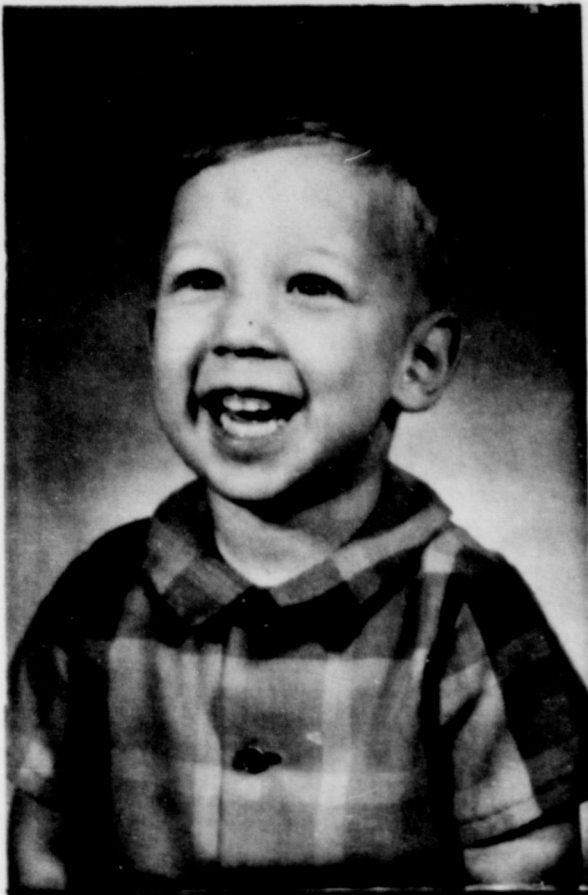

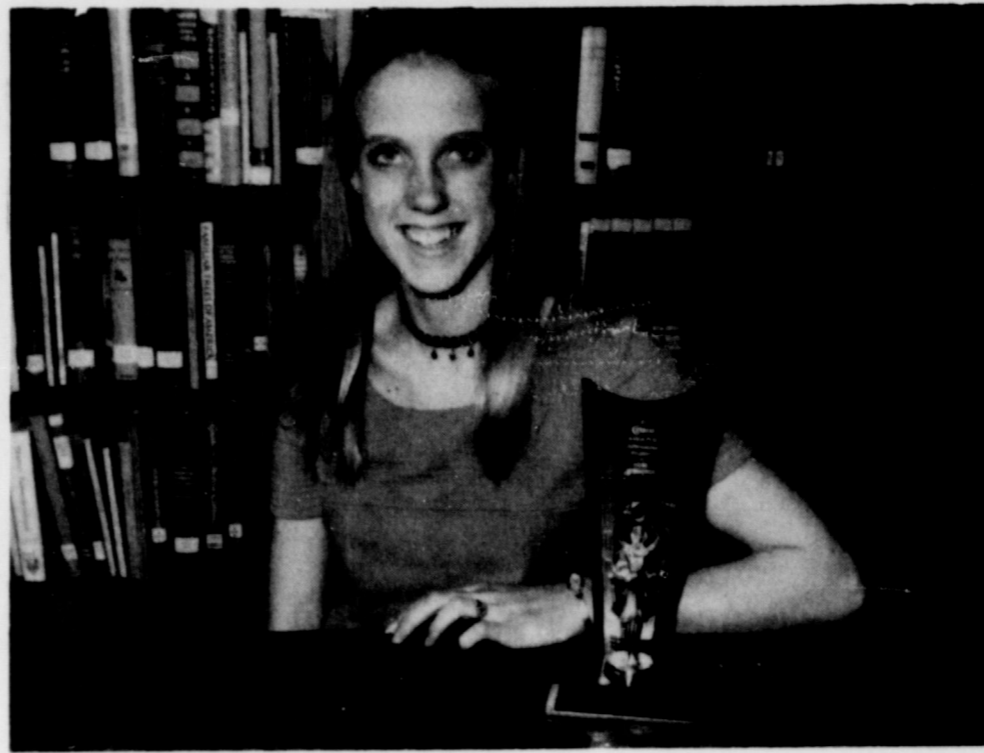
