Exhibit A indicates that a substantial number of cities of less than 5.000 population (and Exhibit A is only a sampling of cities in the 2,500 to 5,000 population category) have. indeed, demonstrated the fundamental ability to meet the important public service needs of their citizens. However, at

under 5,000 population cannot ever amend their charters, even through the Legislature. The Legislature no longer has the power to grant or to amend a city's charter. State v. Vincent, 217 S.W. 402, affirmed Com. App., 235 S.W. 1084.

Enactment of the proposed bill would afford relief for most of the smaller cities which now are in this predicament.

Texas Constitution states that "Cities having more than five thousand (5,000) inhabitants may ... adopt or amend their charters.

The City of Eastland is in the somewhat unique position of having a home rule charter, but without the minimum population necessary to amend it. And, as the attached list indicates, several other Texas cities also face this same problem.

During the 1971 session of the Texas Legislature. the Texas Municipal League sponsored a proposed constitutional amendment which would have lowered the home rule population base to 2,500 Although our 1971 bill did not clear both houses, we hope to pass this same proposition in





# Sheep, Goat **Raisers Urge** Referendum

SAN ANGELO referendum to be held later this month by sheep and goat raisers in a 73 - county area of Texas to help provide a more effective predator control program in the state in generating as much public interest as the Texas political campaigns

"It's now absolutely essential that we have additional trained predator control personnel in the sheep and goat producing areas of Texas," says Bill Sims, executive secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, sponsors of the referendum.

Sims said more trappers are necessary, especially since the few trappers now working can no longer use poisons.
