Did the freeze last week get our fruit crop? This is a question several folks were asking following the low temperatures this past week. It is my opinion that the cold weather did more good than harm. The temperature has to get down to about 28 degrees F. and remain for several hours to freeze the blossoms. It may have gotten cold enough to kill some of those early blossoms on plums and early peaches.

However, those fruit trees that were in bloom on March 1 had very little chance of surviving anyway since we have another thirty or forty days in which we are likely to have freezing weather. The average date of the last freeze in this area is about March 20 or 25th. Remember, last year we had a freeze on April 6th or 7th. Here is how the freeze may have been helpful. May be it delayed the blooming of the fruit trees that were not already in bloom. This includes most of the peach trees, apples and pears. We examined some plum trees that appeared to be in bloom. We found that there are still plenty of buds on the trees that have not yet opened into blossoms. So maybe the cold weather will delay these buds. The cold weather should also serve to delay the development of pecan buds. The pecan crop was damaged last year because young tender growth was frozen on April 6th or 7th. Home gardeners complain each year about root knot nematodes in their tomatoes, okra, beans and other vegetable crops. These microscopic worms may be the reason for sickly plants that do not respond to fertilizer or water. Nematode presence can be recognized by galls and knots on plant roots. If nematodes have been a problem in the past, treat your garden this spring before planting. The most widely used chemical for nematode control contains dibromochloropropane (DBCP). It is available at most farm supply stores. No special equipment is necessary for treating home gardens. Liquid materials can be applied with a quart fruit jar with a ten-penny nail hole punched on each side of the lid - one to pour from and the other to let air into the jar so the liquid will pour evenly. This jar can be used to pour the proper amount of fumigant diluted with water, kerosene or fuel oil into each 100 feet of open furrow at least six inches deep. Granular DBCP can be sprinkled by hand - using rubber gloves - into the open furrow. In either case, cover the treated furrow immediately to prevent chemical vapors from escaping into the air. Row treatment is made by placing the fumigant in a six-inch-deep furrow directly under seed rows or transplant rows. Broadcast treatment can be made by opening a six-inch-deep furrow using a hoe, spade or other implement. Furrows should be no more than twelve inches apart from center to center. A broadcast treatment is much more effective than row treatment, however, more fumigant and expense is involved. No matter which method is used, seal the fumigant into the soil by dragging a weighted board over the area immediately after treatment. Then sprinkle the soil lightly with water.

Consumers can look forward to more convenient information and added protection when they purchase wearing apparel in the very near future. A recent ruling by the Federal Trade Commission will require that all articles of clothing must bear permanent labels which clearly and simply disclose the washing and cleaning instruction for each item.

The new rule goes into effect on July 3 and means that all articles of clothing manufactured after July 3, must have labels with washing or cleaning instructions permanently attached to them rather than on throw-away tags which can easily be misplaced.

Home sewers will benefit by the new rule too. All textiles and fabrics which are sold for the purpose of making wearing apparel must be accompanied by similar care labels which the home sewer can attach permanently to her finished garment.

There will be a few exceptions to the rules as shoes,

gloves, and items used exclusively as headwear. The Commission is also considering the possibility of exempting some low-priced items - probably those selling for \$3 or less. Imported apparel will be required to comply with the new rule as fully as clothing and textiles made in this country.

Texas Home Rule Cities

The following cities have a population of less than 5,000 but are Home Rule Cities.

Anson with a population of 2,615, has a Council form of government which was adopted in 1920. A charter was adopted in 1913.

Ballinger with a population of 4,203, has a Council form of government which was adopted in 1963. A charter was also adopted in 1963.

Cisco, with a population of 4,160, has a Commission form of government which was adopted in 1919. A charter was also adopted in 1919.

DeLeon, with a population of 2,170, has a Commission form of government which was adopted in 1919. Their charter was also adopted in 1919.

Eastland, with a population of 3,178, has a Commission

manager form of government which was adopted in 1919. Their charter was also adopted in 1919.

Electra, with a population of 3,895, has a Council form of government which was adopted in 1917. Their charter was also adopted in 1917.

Gatesville, with a population of 4,683, has a Council-manager form of government which was adopted in 1966. Their charter was also adopted in 1966.

Gorman, with a population of 1,236, has a Commission form of government which was adopted in 1920. Their charter was also adopted in 1920.

Hearne, with a population of 4,982, has a Council-manager form of government which was adopted in 1964. A charter was adopted in 1964 also.

Humble, with a population of 3,278, has a Mayor-aldermanic form of government which was adopted in 1970. A charter was also adopted in 1970.

Lake Worth, with a population of 4,958, has a Council form of government which was adopted in 1965. Their charter was also adopted in 1965.

Muleshoe, with a population of 4,525, has a Council-manager form of government which was adopted in 1960. Their charter was also adopted in 1960.

Quannah, with a population of 3,948, has a Council form of government which was adopted in 1919. Their charter was also adopted in 1919.

Seagoville, with a population of 4,390, has a Council-manager form of government which was adopted in 1969. Their charter was also adopted in 1969.

Stamford, with a population of 4,558, has a Council-manager form of government which was adopted in 1918. Their charter was also adopted in 1918.

West Orange, with a population of 4,787, has a Council form of government which was adopted in 1956. Their charter was also adopted in 1956.

Total: 194 cities have Home Rule charters as of 10-19-71.

The dates listed in the above compilation under "Year first charter adopted" indicate the time at which the city first adopted its charter or the time at which an amendment to an old special legislative charter was adopted.

To adopt a home rule charter, a city must, of course, have a population greater than 5,000. On the basis of the 1970 census, 38 cities of more than 5,000 population still had not adopted a charter as of 10-19-71.

Texas Constitution presently provides that the citizens of an incorporated municipality of more than 5,000 population may, by majority vote at an election held for the purpose, adopt a Home Rule charter. (Sections 4 and 5, Article XI, Constitution of the State of Texas.) The proposed bill would reduce the present minimum population required to "More than 2,500 inhabitants."

1. Present Restrictions On Cities Which May Not Adopt Home Rule Charters: Many municipalities of 2,500 to 5,000 population are truly cities in every sense of the word; they provide a wide range of essential public services--including a fire and police protection, health services, street construction and maintenance, parks and recreational facilities, refuse, water and sewer services, and other vital urban functions.

Exhibit A indicates that a substantial number of cities of less than 5,000 population (and Exhibit A is only a sampling of cities in the 2,500 to 5,000 population category) have, indeed, demonstrated the fundamental ability to meet the important public service needs of their citizens. However, at the same time, the ability of these same cities to even more effectively deal with the problems which daily confront them is limited by Article XI of the Constitution.

What are the benefits of Home Rule?
(a) Local Governmental Flexibility. Home Rule allows local citizens to have the form of government they desire. Citizens of Home Rule Cities also have more direct control over the officials they elect, and such cities may undertake municipal functions not prohibited by law, when it becomes necessary, without having to find specific statutory authorization--as is the case with non-HR cities.

(b) Planning. Planned growth and the avoidance of urban sprawl become more feasible in Home Rule cities than in "general law" cities by the insertion of charter provisions which allow unilateral annexation when the expansion of corporate limits is necessary for the orderly growth of the community.

(c) Finance. Home Rule cities may levy a maximum tax of .1250 per \$100 assessed valuation; whereas, general law cities are limited to .1500.

The greatest benefit in having access to a \$2.50 rate is in the improvement of the city's bond rating: tax ceilings are, of course, one of the principal concerns of the agencies which rate municipal bonds. (A survey of 113 cities of 2,500 to 5,000 population reveals that their averages tax rate is only \$0.51--well below the statutory authorization of \$1.50, so the intent of the proposed bill obviously is not to open the smaller city tax-gate wider.)

2. Restrictions On Certain Cities Which Already Have Home Rule Charters:

Twenty-one Texas cities of less than 5,000 population have Home Rule charters. At one time and another in past years, these cities had over 5,000 population, and, at that time, they adopted charters--however, because of economic decline and other reasons, they have fallen below 5,000 population.

Section 5, Article XI of the Texas Constitution states that "Cities having more than five thousand inhabitants may... amend their charters..." This means that each of the twenty-one cities which now have charters, but which do not have the necessary 5,000 plus population, cannot ever amend their charters until and unless they again rise above this set number. + Home Rule cities

under 5,000 population cannot ever amend their charters, even through the Legislature. The Legislature no longer has the power to grant or to amend a city's charter. State v. Vincent, 217 S.W. 402, affirmed Com. App., 235 S.W. 1084.

Enactment of the proposed bill would afford relief for most of the smaller cities which now are in this predicament.

Texas Constitution states that "Cities having more than five thousand (5,000) inhabitants may... adopt or amend their charters..."

The City of Eastland is in the somewhat unique position of having a home rule charter, but without the minimum population necessary to amend it. And, as the attached list indicates, several other Texas cities also face this same problem.

During the 1971 session of the Texas Legislature, the Texas Municipal League sponsored a proposed constitutional amendment which would have lowered the home rule population base to 2,500. Although our 1971 bill did not clear both houses, we hope to pass this same proposition in 1973.

Sheep, Goat Raisers Urge Referendum

SAN ANGELO - - A referendum to be held later this month by sheep and goat raisers in a 73 - county area of Texas to help provide a more effective predator control program in the state in generating as much public interest as the Texas political campaigns.

Special interest in the referendum started developing three weeks ago when President Nixon issued an Executive Order on Feb. 8 which prohibits the use of poisons on federal lands and by federal agencies for the purpose of controlling predators. "It's now absolutely essential that we have additional trained predator control personnel in the sheep and goat producing areas of Texas," says Bill Sims, executive secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, sponsors of the referendum.

Sims said more trappers are necessary, especially since the few trappers now working can no longer use poisons. Sims said he had been advised by Milton Caroline, state supervisor of the U.S. Division of Wildlife Services at San Antonio, that all poison baits are being removed from Texas ranches in compliance with the presidential order. Deadline for removing poison baits is March 9, weather permitting.
