Churches Receive Stock

Two Eastland County Baptist churches are some \$15,000 wealthier now, thanks to the generous benevolence of former members.

The First Baptist Church at Eastland and the First Baptist Church at Cisco were notified this week that gifts were being made to them by Mr. and Mrs. D.P. Carlton of Houston.

Mr. and Mrs. Dave P. Carlton of Houston have donated 200 shares of stock in Standard Oil Company of New Jersey to each of the First Baptist Church of Cisco and Eastland in memory of her late parents, Judge and Mrs. Burette W. Patterson, according to announcements to the congregations last Sunday.

Judge Patterson was a pioneer lawyer of this county and served as judge of the old 88th District Court during the oil boom days of this region. Both he and wife died in the 1950's. He was the son of the late John F. Patterson, a charter member of the First Baptist Church of Cisco.

Mrs. Carlton is the only daughter of the B.W. Pattersons, and she married Mr. Carlton after he came to Cisco more in the 1920's as a geologist for Humble Oil and Refining Co. They have been married for 50 years.

The stock is worth more than \$15,000 to each of the two churches at current market prices. The gift came in last Friday's mail and was reported to the congregations Sunday.

GREETINGS: AUSTIN, TEXAS

Special observance of increased emphasis on our education system has been marked annually for twenty - two years by a Public Schools Week in Texas.

During this period, parents are encouraged to visit the public schools, and all citizens are urged through special programs to recognize the tremendous importance of our system of education. Our goal is to make Texas public schools the finest in the Nation, and to achieve this our citizens are urged to take an active interest in the school systems and to cooperate with their school boards, superintendents, principals and teachers.

Never before in our history has there been a greater need for educated leadership. As we rush to train young people in science and technology to keep pace with world events, it is also important to remember that our public schools will furnish our tomorrow's leaders with the basic human, moral and spiritual foundations necessary for more advanced training and knowledge.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the period of March 6 - 12, 1972, as **PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK** in Texas.

County Officials, Employees Get Cost-of-Living Raise

Eastland County officials and full-time employees have been given a \$25 cost-of-living salary increase as the result of County Commissioners Court action this week.

In a session Monday afternoon the court approved the first salary boost since August of 1969, County Judge Scott Bailey reports.

The increase will affect some 75 people and excludes only constables, food distribution personnel, extension office personnel and those employees whose salaries are set by the district court, Judge Bailey said.

The county treasurer's salary was adjusted upward, to \$4,800, in line with other elected officials' salaries.

The raise will amount to

about \$300 a year for each employee and total about \$22,500 a year for the county. Raise effective March 1.

In other action Monday the Court accepted a bid of \$5,516, with trade-in for a new dump truck for Precinct One. Delivery to be in about six weeks.

Postoffice Advises

Postmaster Marcus O'Dell announced today that effective Saturday, March 4, 1972, changes in the arrival pattern of mail at the Eastland Post Office will require that all City and Rural Carriers will leave from the Post Office for their routes at 8:30 instead of 8:00 a.m.

No change will be made in the Service Window hours.

Bob Todd Assumes Duties At County Jail



We want to welcome to Eastland Bob Todd, the new jailer and his wife, Fay.

Fay comes from Lockney. Her parents are the C.L. Tamerlins of Ranger, and Bob is originally from Ranger. The couple was married Nov. 1, 1971.

They are both mission minded and receive a deep satisfaction from helping people. They feel this position is more of an opportunity than a job.

Fay admits that she was a little fearful at first, but not any more. She says it does get heartbreaking at times,

especially when women and children are involved.

She does all the cooking for the jail and Bob says the food is good - their menu and that of the prisoners is the same. Breakfast is 7:30 to 8:00, lunch 11:30 to 12:30 and supper 5 to 6:30.

Bob appears to be very well qualified for this job, besides weighing between 300 and 320 lbs, they say he has an Irish temper. Anyone should think twice before crossing him!

Bob is 41 years old and served in the Navy for 21 years 8 months and 10 days. He retired

The Eastland jail can handle 23 to 25 men. Right now there are 11 men and one juvenile. There are three cells for women. The jail does need more facilities to handle women and children.

Bob says he doesn't mind interruptions, he's used to four hour watches in the Navy.

He says the most he has been awakened was three times in one night, and last night no interruptions at all!



Monday at Rotary Club one of the finest men in Eastland and, in my opinion, probably the best thing that has ever happened for Eastland, recapped his years in public service in the community. This is none other than Mayor James Reid. Mayor Reid gave this account:

Ten years ago, I played or tried to play Jeanie Dixon. These were my predictions. Let's see just how close they are:

I predict that Eastland will become the medical center of our north central Texas area...that is not a hard prediction as we can see we are well along our way toward this at the present time....I predict that the population loss of the county for the past 50 years will be reversed and the other towns of the county will hold their own while Eastland with the addition of a few small solid industries will gain 30 to 50 percent in population. I realize that this will be hard because of the restrictions on our city limits...so I will say the increase will be in our immediate area.....I predict that we will be back "moderately" in debt...just think everything that we go into debt for will be new - something that we will use now, not paying for things that were required and worn out many years ago by our fathers and grandfathers....We know that Eastland has always been the best place to live....tell native son story....and I predict that in the next ten years that there will be many more new people that know the same thing that we do.

Comment on impressions of my first commission race - 5 five people for two places.....The promise I had made most was that I would try and get them some cheaper water during the summer. This was my campaign slogan. I also said that I would try to do something about the problems of dogs, skunks, street grading, concrete trucks, sheep, dump grounds, muddy water, cable television, cable F.M., dust (haydite plant & concrete plant), city park, trains making too much noise going through town, trucks shifting gears too much at stop signs, and on and on....

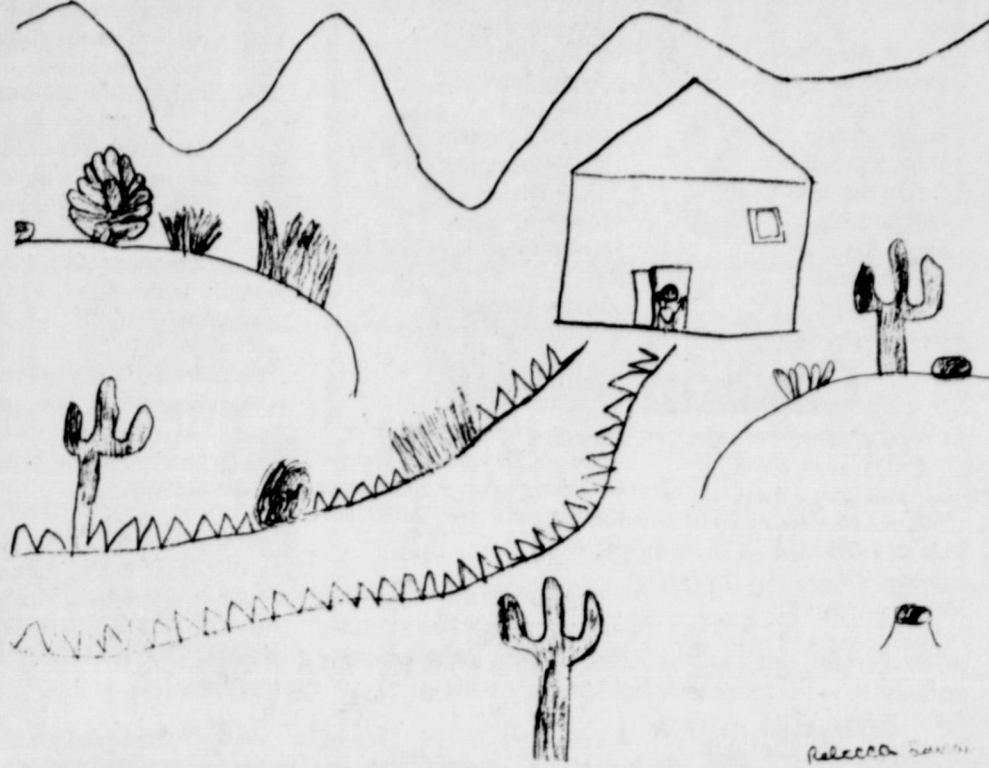

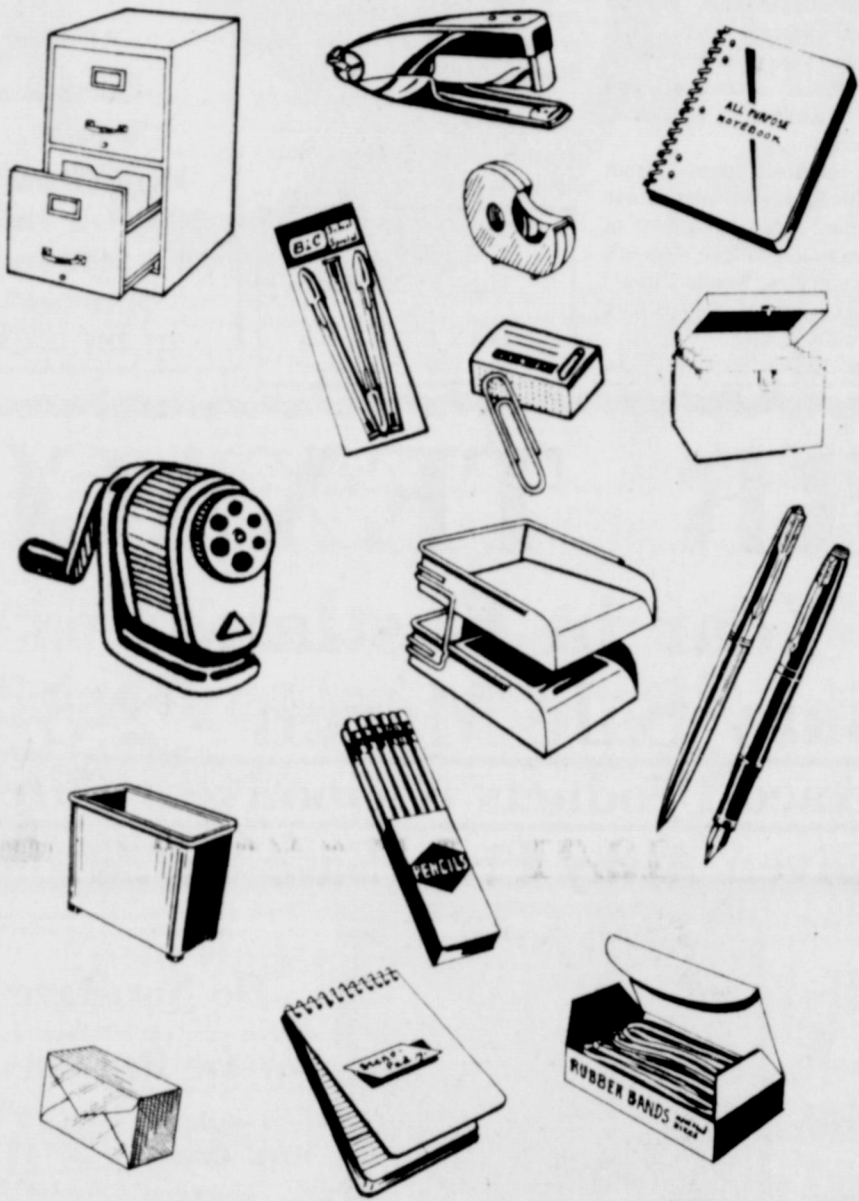

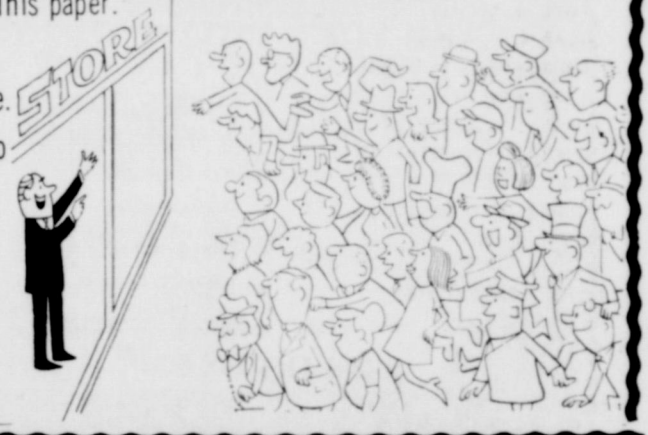

TOWN & CITY TEXAS TAX & DEBT IN TEXAS CITIES MUNICIPAL TAXATION & DEBT, 1961-1971

Preparation of this article was undertaken by the Texas Municipal League staff with the advice and counsel of Lynn Anderson, Director of Conferences & Training, LBJ School of Public Affairs (The University of Texas at Austin) and W. E. Tinsley, Executive Director, Municipal Advisory Council, Austin. Debt summaries provided by the Municipal Advisory Council; tax rate data are the responsibility of the Texas Municipal League.

Definitions

Adjusted Tax Rate. The "adjusted tax rate" is the true, or effective, rate of taxation in each city. The significance of the adjusted tax rate is best explained by means of the following examples.

Consider the case of City "A," with a reported tax rate of \$1.50, versus City "B," with a tax rate of \$1.40. At first sight, it would seem that ad valorem taxes are higher in "A" than "B"—but this is true only if the respective assessment ratios of the two make it so. If, for example, "A" has an assessment ratio of 30% (i.e., property is assessed for tax purposes at the rate of 30% of its true market value) and "B" assesses at 70%, "B" actually would have a higher tax rate.

City "A"	Tax Rate	City "B"

Applying these calculations to a residential home with a market value of \$10,000, City "A" assesses its value at \$3,000 (30% of true value), while "B" assesses same home at 70%, or \$7,000. Total taxes on the home located in City "A" thus would be \$45 per year, and \$98 per year in "B."

Assessed Valuation. An arbitrary valuation which is placed on taxable property for the purpose of assessing an ad valorem tax against it. While Texas law contemplates an assessed valuation on property which is equal to its actual value, most taxing agencies adopt a basis of assessment which is substantially below actual. The basis of assessment may run as low as 10% of actual value in many instances; seldom as high as 75%.

General Obligation Bonds are bonds which are secured by a pledge of the taxing power of the issuer. Strictly speaking, general obligation bonds are secured by a pledge of the full faith and credit of the issuer as well as the taxing power. The term may be said to be synonymous with the term "tax supported."

Revenue Bonds are special obligations of the issuer (as opposed to General Obligations) which are payable solely from revenue derived from some income producing facility. Revenue bonds are sometimes further secured by a first mortgage on the physical plant or properties whose revenues are pledged; such bonds are called "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds."

Tax Rate. The rate at which taxes are levied per \$100 of assessed valuation. In some states the tax rate is expressed in terms of dollars per thousand dollars of assessed valuation. In other states it is expressed in terms of mills per dollar of assessed valuation thus giving rise to the expression of "millage" when referring to the tax rate. In Texas the ad valorem tax rate for any unit of local government is expressed in terms of dollars or cents per hundred of assessed valuation.

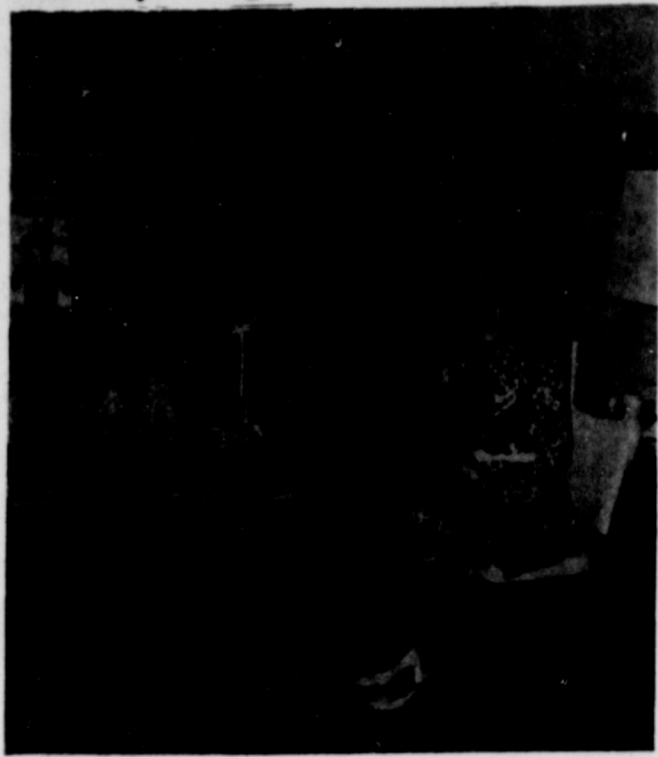



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Southwestern Bell Announces Expansion Program In Texas

Southwestern Bell has announced a record \$484 million expansion program in Texas during 1972 to stay ahead of the

growing demands for telephone services.

Despite a generally dull economy last year, the expansion is \$39 million more than the amount spent for new plant and equipment during 1971, according to H.D. Schodde, the company's vice president for Texas.

Schodde pointed out that the company's Texas operations in 1971 showed "very good" growth over the same period during 1970.

He said that the company added nearly 265,000 phones to its network in Texas during 1971, bringing the total Southwestern Bell phones in service in the state to more than 5.3 million. He said that another 304,000 are expected to be added during 1972.

Schodde also noted that along with the increase in telephones, customers in Texas used their phones more in 1971 than ever before. As an example, he pointed out that the number of completed Long Distance calls on the average business day increased by more than 57,000 to a total of more than 907,000 in the state.

The company remained one of the largest employers in the state with a work force of just under 34,000. Payroll for Southwestern Bell employees jumped nearly \$22 million to more than \$294 million annually.

"In view of the general economic conditions that prevailed in Texas and nationwide during 1971, we feel our growth during the year was very good," Schodde said.

Schodde said that with demands for communications service growing, the company's huge construction expenditures are more important than ever to provide service to new customers, to introduce new services and to maintain and improve the quality of existing services.

Ranger's Terry Porter broke the junior college division pole vault record with a leap of 15-8. The old record was held by Bill Smaley, a former Cisco J. C. athlete who cleared 16-1 Saturday for the University of Texas to set a meet record in the invitational division.

Cisco's Jimmy Hise, a former Albany great, finished second to Porter in the pole vault with a 14-6.

McMurry's only place winner in the university-college division was Doug Robinson, who finished fourth in the mile run with a 4:21.6 clocking.

Yarbrough, a junior from Waco, set a meet record in the mile run with a 4:10.6 dash and scored his second victory in the three mile with a 14:11.8 time. He was voted the meet's outstanding performer.
