New President For TESCO Named

W.G. Marquardt has been elected president and chief executive and a director of Texas Electric Service Company succeeding Burl B. Hulsey Jr., who has been named president of Texas Utilities Company in Dallas. The changes, to be effective Jan. 1, 1975, were approved at meetings of the boards of directors of the two companies. Texas Electric is one of three operating companies in the Texas Utilities system.

Marquardt has been a vice president of Texas Electric since 1963. He joined the company in 1941 after receiving an electrical engineering degree from the University of Texas at Austin. He has held a number of management positions at TESCO, including transmission superintendent at Eastland,

Fort Worth and Odessa. He was Western division manager in Midland until 1962 when he moved to Fort Worth as

manager of division operations and was named vice president the following year.

Hulsey has been president and chief executive of TESCO since 1966 and previously had held several other management positions. He began his career with the company in 1939 after graduating from Texas A&M with a degree in electrical engineering.

He has been active in numerous civic and community organizations. He is past president of the Tarrant County United Way, a Trustee of Texas Christian University and currently serves as president of Fort Worth's Progress and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Hulsey will succeed T.L. Austin Jr., as president of Texas Utilities Company. Austin has been elected vice chairman of the board and chief executive effective Jan. 1, 1975. C.A. Tatum Jr., will continue as chairman of the board, a position he has held since 1972.

The tickets can be purchased at the Olden Post Office for \$3.25 each. The deadline for tickets is Nov. 27.

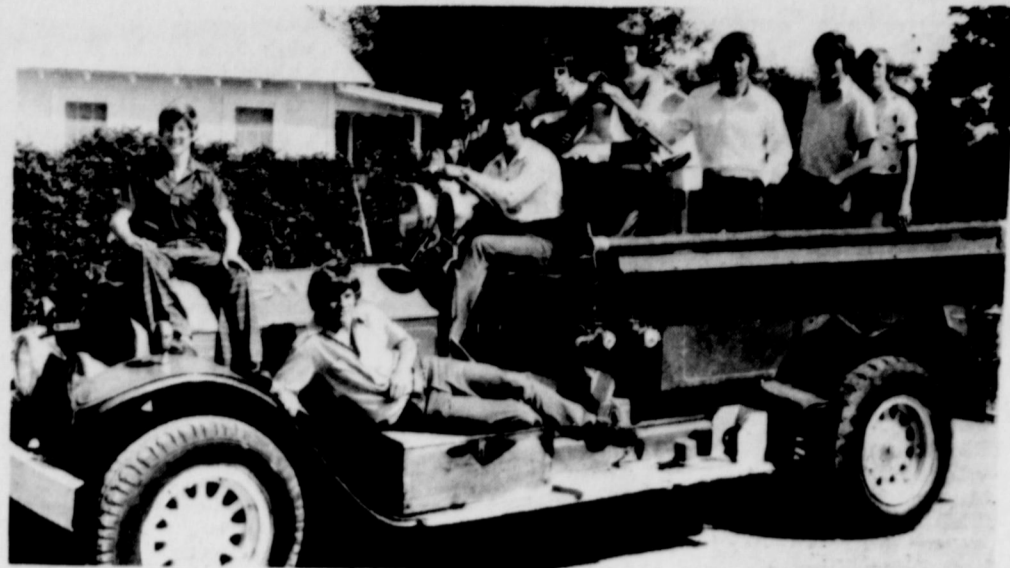
Mrs. Tom Fox III Honored With Bridal Shower

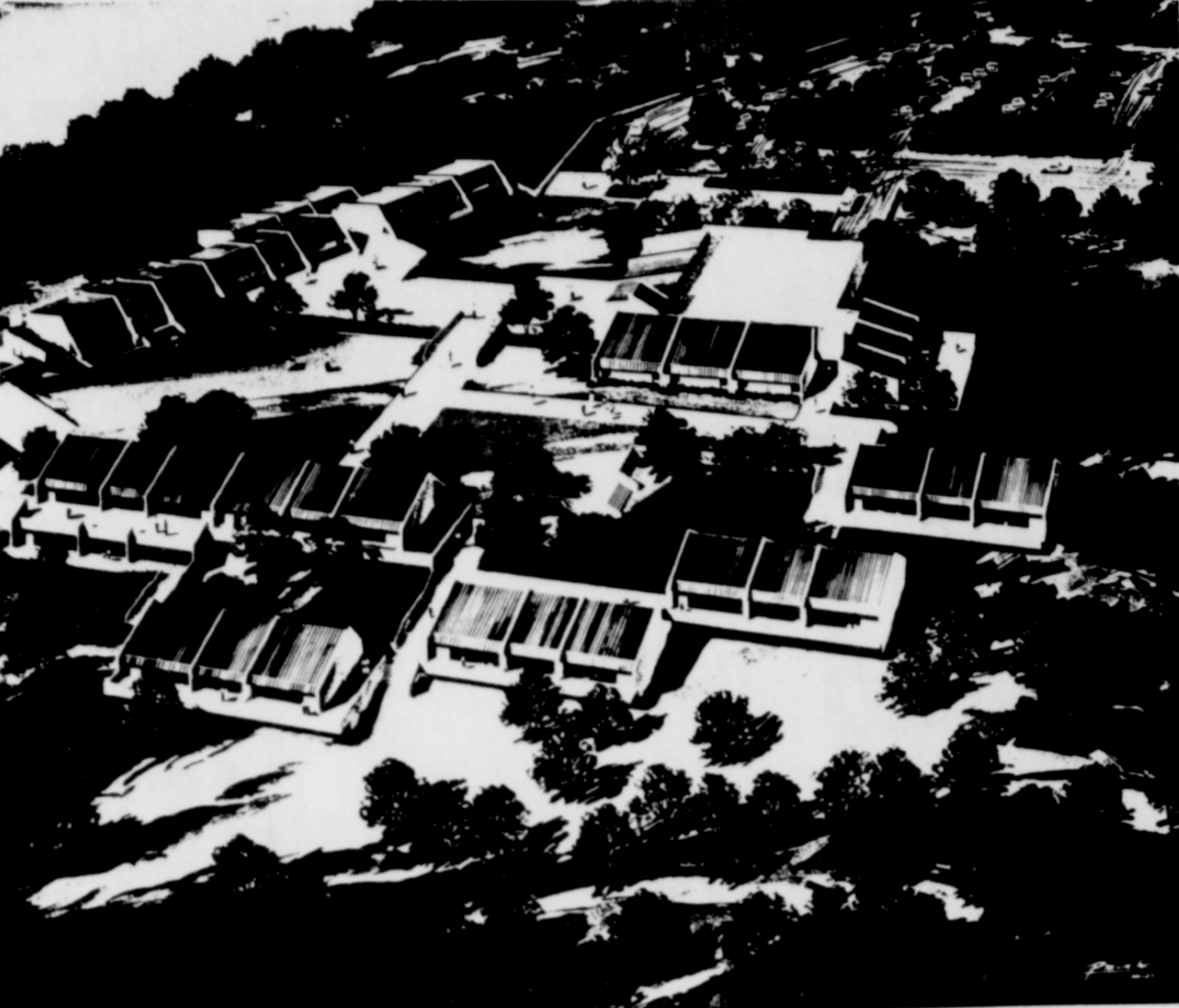

Move From Country To City Ending

The long, costly, mass exodus of country people to cities, which cut deeply into the financial and business resources of rural and smalltown areas and reduce the quality of life there, is ending, according to Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Will Erwin.

"One key to this significant change is the remarkable increase in available jobs in rural America. Since 1970, country job openings have increased nearly three percent a year against a 1.2 percent annual increase in city areas."

Speaking before the Tri-State Poultry Industry meeting in Fort Wayne, Ind. Mr. Erwin said, "Not only has the urbanward migration of rural people slowed to a trickle—it has reversed itself in some areas. One study indicates that the population in rural nonmetro areas, in 41 states analyzed, grew 4.1 percent since 1970 while urban metro areas in the same states grew only 2.2 percent."

Mr. Erwin, who is the Assistant Secretary for Rural Development, added that "People today have new desires as to where they want to live and work. Much of the magnetism for urban life has given way to a yearning for country living."

"Four major national surveys one by Gallup—concluded that more than twice as many people prefer to live in rural or smalltown areas as now live there."

"This is the most significant turnaround of its kind in the last century," the official stated. "It is bringing new life, vitality, and needed growth to thousands of countr towns. These towns, on the average, had lost 30 percent of their business enterprises since 1950."

"As the population of rural areas thinned over the years—28 million people left U.S. farms during the 25 years following World War II—the load of spiraling local taxes fell on fewer shoulders."

"Rural areas have suffered a material loss of talent and wealth by paying for the cost of raising and educating millions of young people only to have them move to cities that benefited from the rural investment. Cities also pull large amounts of wealth out of rural areas when these young people inherit their share of their parent's estate. This turnaround will help curb these costly losses," Mr. Erwin said.

"It is fortunate," the speaker added, "in light of current and future needs of food and fiber, that the U.S. farm population,

which stood at 30.5 million people in 1940, has now largely stabilized at near the 9.5 million level."

Listeners were urged to help rural people organize to get a grip on the development of their community so as to use the process to meet needs and to avoid ill effects that often occur with "hit or miss" development.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture, through its local

county offices and in cooperation with land grant universities, is able to assist local communities to use development wisely.

"But it's a local responsibility. Community leaders must take the initiative," Mr. Erwin concluded. "Government can furnish credit, technical assistance and research, but action must come from the grass roots."

Drafts Policy

Food Stamp Increases

Food stamp allotment for a family of four will increase on January 1 from \$150 to \$154, based on August food price statistics, according to an announcement today by Under Secretary of Agriculture J. Phil Campbell.

The Food Stamp Act, as amended by the Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973 (Public Law 93 - 86), requires that coupon allotments be adjusted semiannually to reflect changes in the prices of food as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Allotment adjustments are based on the cost of the Department of Agriculture's (USDA) economy food plan as it is computed from Bureau of Labor Statistics food prices. The law requiring semiannual adjustments specified that the January 1974 adjustment reflect changes in food prices through August 1973. A similar procedure was used for the July 1974 adjustment and is being used for the January 1975 increase in the value of the coupon allotment, which is based on the cost of the economy food plan in August 1974.

Cost of the economy food plan for August was \$153.40 for a family of four with school children. Accordingly, USDA will raise the value of the coupon allotment from \$150 to \$154 for a family of four and make appropriate adjustments for other household sizes. The maximum income eligibility standard for the four - person household will increase from \$500 to \$513.

The following tables giving coupon allotments, income eligibility standards and purchase requirements for all household sizes in the 48 contiguous states and the District of Columbia are scheduled for publication in the Federal Register of Monday, Nov. 18, 1974. Separate tables for Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and Guam will be announced shortly.

Understanding Of Wild Animals 1,000 Deer Expected In Current Harvest

Everyone appreciates wild animals, but few people understand them. Wild creatures are featured stars in nature's drama. They are leading characters in outdoor story and legend. Yet, wildlife species are almost universally misunderstood. This misunderstanding has led to their destruction, to overprotectiveness, to needless waste, to scarcity or over abundance, even to extermination.

Man is the only animal that deliberately alters or controls his own environment. Beavers build ponds through an instinctive urge rather than reasoned engineering. But man, in addition to changing his own habitat, is the dominant force in controlling the habitat of other animals as well. He is the key to wild animal abundance or scarcity. He is master of all game.

It is the habitat or environment which determines largely where wild animals will be and in what numbers. Food, cover

and water are the three principal ingredients of wildlife production. Every animal has his own habitat requirements. If they are present in the right combination and condition, he thrives. If they are scarce, he struggles for existence. If absent, he dies. No creature can exist without food and water, certainly, but equally important is proper cover for nesting or reproduction, for escape, for protection from the elements, for harboring other creatures which constitute his food supply. There are other factors which control animal abundance too, such as fire, rainstorms, or other violent disturbance by man or nature during critical periods, but the chief factors are food, cover and water which provide the right balance and any wildlife species will prosper. Destroy any of these three elements, singly or in combination, and the species is doomed.

Your local Soil Conservation Service people can provide you with information to help you in your wildlife program. Their office is located on the third floor of the Eastland National Bank building in Eastland.

Deer season opened Saturday, Nov. 16, and will remain open until Jan. 1. For those of you who want to hunt and have not got your license they cost \$5.25. Leases will run from about \$100 to \$150.

Game Warden Kenneth Payne estimates that there will be approximately \$2,000 to \$3,000 spent on hunting violation fines in Eastland County this year.

There will probably be about 750 to 1000 deer killed this year. The deer will probably be hiding a lot more this year since there has been plenty of food for them. They will not be out looking for food so they should be fairly still. There are about 100,934 acres of deer range with about one deer to every 20 acres. This year there were about 2,500 doe permits issued. You are allowed two deer of either sex.

For you turkey hunters Eastland County has no open this year.

Quail season is open from December 1st thru February 16th.

The average hunter is likely to spend around \$100 for clothes and another \$125 for food and beverages. Hunters spend about \$75 for shells. That is if they are hunting deer and quail.

People of Eastland County are now able to view a beautiful collection of art at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. The paintings are red and blue ribbon winners from the Big Country Art Association Show held Oct. 5, at McMurry College. Three-hundred-sixty paintings were in the original show.

Twenty-one paintings are on display in Cisco until Dec. 31. The artists come from Abilene, Anson, Snyder, Ovallo, and Sweetwater. A complete list of artists, division of blue and red ribbon winners, and price tags for the paintings are available from the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

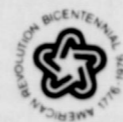

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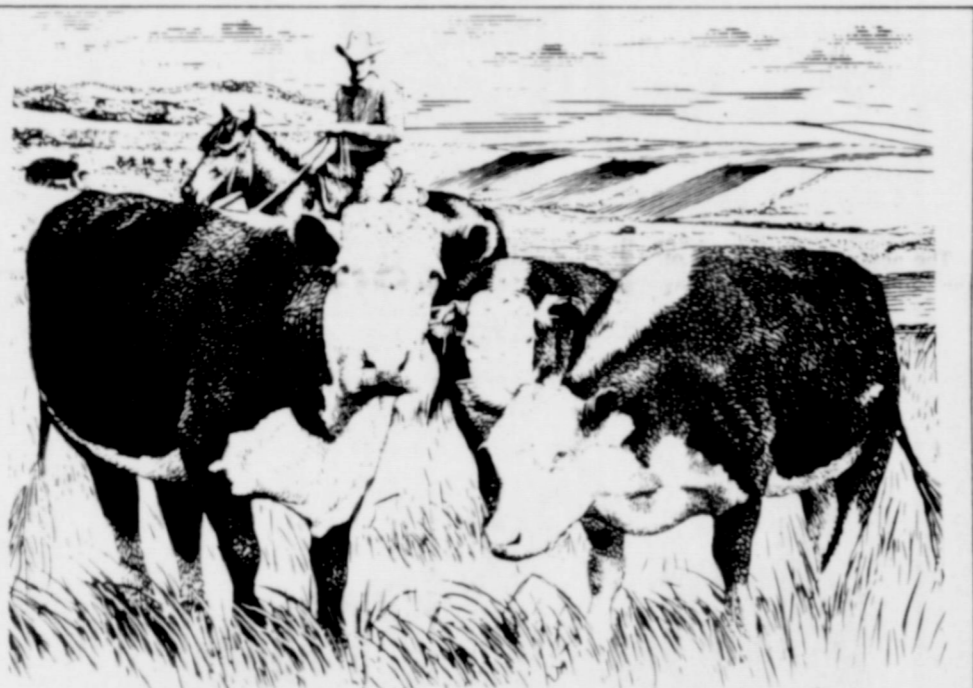

A record 614,000 Texas Southern Baptists attended Sunday School last Sunday. A first High Attendance Day goal of 600,000 had been set by the Sunday School Division of the Baptist General Convention of Texas for 4,200 Sunday Schools around the state.

"This record high is perhaps the greatest single achievement in the history of the Sunday School program", said Dr. John Sisemore, director of the Texas Baptist Sunday School Division. He alluded to many larger denominations who are experiencing plummeting attendance in their Sunday morning programs.

This was the first statewide attempt at a large scale attendance promotion says Dr. Sisemore.

Eastland County Workshop Acquires Van For Transportation

The Eastland County Workshop received a van Friday, Nov. 15, for the transportation of students to and from the workshop, and on field trips.

The Eastland County Workshop is a satellite workshop of the Brownwood MHMR. It was established to serve the vocationally handicapped of East-

land County. Eastland County is one of seven in the Central Texas MHMR Catchment area. The program includes work activity training and personal social adjustment training. There are presently eight students now enrolled in the program, five from Eastland and three from Cisco.

Mrs. Berette Lovelace is the Vocational Trainer. The program is open to any vocationally handicapped adult, with "adult" being defined as anyone 17 years of age or older. The program is located on the Cisco Junior College campus in the Vocational Technical Building, number two. The college provides rent free space, and also pays all the utilities for the program. Financial support is also received from the Community Chest and the Eastland County Commissioner's Court. Students attend the program six hours a day. The shop is open five days a week. Current contracts include packaging small plasticware and hardware.
