

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.-Majority Leader Joseph Robinson of Arkansas, told the senate today he believed "something substantial will be accomplished" toward settlement of war debts within a

Robinson made the statement during debate on the debt situation precipitated by the proposal of J. Hamilton Lewis of Illinois that the United States make no reciprocal trade agreements with nations which have defaulted on debts owed this country.

Previously the senate finance committee had reported favorably a resolution extending for three years President Roosevelt's authority to negotiate reciprocal trade pacts.





WAUKEGAN, Ill., Feb. 19 -Strenuous peace efforts were made today after 120 police had battled unsuccessfully for two hours to dislodge 100 sit-down strikers from the Fansteel Metal Corporation plant near Waukegan. Two sheriff's deputies were injured seriously, one by explosion of a tear gas gun in his pocket,

and the other by acid hurled from the beseiged building. One sit-down striker, ill, ran from the plant, but the others

smashed windows to let out the dense clouds of tear gas and re-mained inside the \$1,500,000 factory, which they have held since Wednesday.

Although Allred had asked that the bill be held back until revenue measures were passed it is not thought he will veto it. There are enough votes in both houses to overrule a veto.

The senate rejected a proposal to extend the act three years instead of two. The present law expires Sept. 1, 1937. Under the act the Railroad Commission may limit oil production to market demands and allocates the amount among fields and wells.



Dizzy Doings Make One Fear for World

It is impossible to read the newspapers these days without having dreadful moments of fear that the world is fast going completely insane.

Two little news items hit the eye on the same day, recently. They came from opposite sides of the Atlantic and they had nothing whatever in common-except that they mirrored a human society which, in at least some of its aspects, seems to need nothing so much as a quick trip to the bobyhatch.

The first one came from New York, as do so many such items. It told about five boys who left their homes to move in on a night club, remaining there in defiance of their parents and of the night club manager, basking gleefully in the attentions which chorus girls and befuddled patrons showered on them, and remarking, "Boy! What a party!" * *

These lads, it seems, came from good families. Their parents were the sort whom the newspapers describe as socially prominent," whetever that mean.

And the spectacle which the youngsters made of themelves-sending home for pajamas, sleeping in the club, hiding in the chorines' dressing rooms when irate parents came to hale them forth, luxuriating in the limelight which the tabloids promptly threw upon them, reeling into the bar to sing their college songs (most amazing of all, they actually had gone to college)-all this, to repeat, was enough to make one fall on his knees and pray for another deluge.

Now the other item was much less sensational. It came from London, and it read thus:


