Always, Christmas music has been a thrill to us. Certainly it was thus Sunday night, when we had an opportunity to hear some of the sacred music at each of three churches which were presenting cantatas — Christian, Methodist and Baptist. And, in each instance, it was beautiful.

Back to the singing: The community carol singing sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce the other night was a delightful occasion, one that did much to radiate Yuletide spirit. Incidentally, it was right beside busy Highway 80 and we imagine passers-through enjoyed seeing — and hearing — the group singing such timely melodies as "Holy Night," in the shadow of the community Christmas tree.

Peanut Production In Southwest Shows

Statistics furnished by S. E. Cloninger, Gorman, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, show that peanut production in the Southwestern States has increased greatly this year.

The Southwestern States served by SWPGA are Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Louisiana, Arkansas, and Arizona.

In 1954, the peanut crop for the Southwestern area was a total of 76,000 tons. This year the total for that area will probably be around 176,000 tons.

So this year the crop will be about 100,000 tons more than the crop of last year. This means that the peanut crop this year is more than twice as large as last year's. Mr. Cloninger further pointed out that there is a tremendous surplus of peanuts throughout the states in the South and Southwest. In the Virginia and Carolina area the yield this year is about 235,000 tons. In the Southeastern Area, which includes Florida, Georgia, and Alabama, the crop this fall is about 458,000 tons.

The normal average peanut crop for these three large areas is a total of 509,000 tons, in round numbers. The total output of the three areas this fall is 869,000 tons. So this means that there is a surplus this year of 360,000 tons of peanuts over the average year.

Mr. Cloninger said that the major problem this year would be in finding enough consumer outlets for this great surplus of peanuts.

Last Sunday the church had the pleasure of worshipping in a delightfully warm sanctuary due to the installation over the past few weeks of a 150,000 BTU forced air Janitrol warm air conditioner. This was installed on an "over and above regular pledge basis," with the money coming from members of the church only.

Bond Sales In Texas Mount To Big Nov. Figure

Nathan Adams and Ed Gossett, co-chairmen of the Savings Bonds committee for Texas, announced today that Savings Bonds sales for the month of November were \$13.2 million.

Sales for the period of January 1 through November have been \$175.7 million. This figure represents an increase of 17 per cent over the same period in 1954.

"We have now reached 87 per cent of our 1955 quota," Mr. Adams and Mr. Gossett continued, "and we are confident that the people of Texas will do their part to see that Texas will reach its 1955 quota of \$201.9 million."

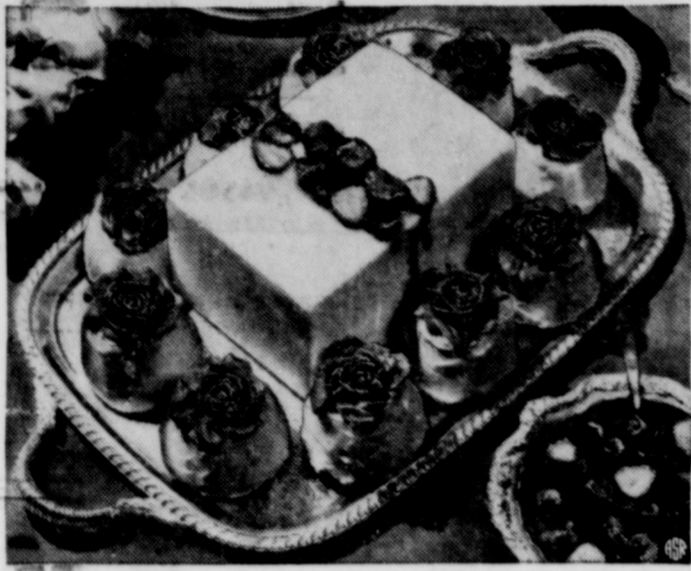



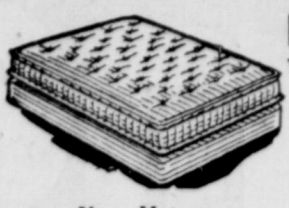
