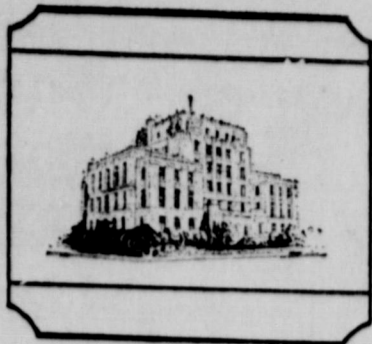
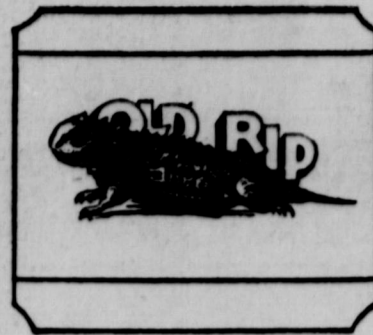

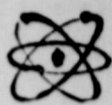

Proposed County Juvenile Board Measure Still Has Several Hurdles

The bill to create an Eastland County Juvenile Board is believed to be in committee and not likely to be passed by the legislature until mid-May or early June, County Judge Scott Bailey surmised this week.

The measure, labeled House Bill No. 986, was introduced by Rep. Wayne Gibbens at the request of Judge Bailey, county juvenile officer. Considered a "local bill," the measure isn't expected to face any opposition.

As written, the bill would require an election by qualified voters in the county within 90 days after passage by the legislature. A state-wide constitutional amendment is anticipated for July, and the local matter might be held in conjunction with that vote, it is reported.

Purpose of the juvenile board in the county would be to provide a broader base for handling juvenile matters, Judge Bailey said. The bill provides that the county judge, the district judge and a third party to be selected by them, would comprise the board, each member to receive an additional compensation not to exceed \$1,200 per year, at the discretion of the commissioners court.

Judge J. Frank Sparks is of Eastland.

Possibly such a board could serve as sort of a probation authority with juveniles to help cut down the number of "repeaters" — those who are returned to corrective institutions for more than one time. The board would also serve in an advisory capacity on juvenile authority remaining with the county judge.

A "juvenile officer" could be appointed by the board.

Plenty of Volunteers Stand By at A&P Fire

There were some 125 local and area firemen available when the A&P Grocery Store on the south side of square in Eastland caught fire Tuesday night.

The fire started in a refrigeration unit located on the west wall, near the front of the store, and damage to that area, and smoke and soot damage throughout the store, was heavy.

The alarm went in at 9 p.m., as the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department was holding a district fire meeting, with visiting firemen in town from Cisco, Ranger, Breckenridge and other area towns. Firemen, their wives and families were gathered "just around the corner" from the burning store, in the Fellowship Hall of the First Christian Church.

Sgt. Jack Jordan of Abilene, a Department of Public Safety, Weight and Measure Patrolman in town with a unit for a routine check-point operation, is credited with spotting the blaze and smashing the front door of the store to determine the extent of the fire and notify firemen. Jordan received a severe cut on his hand in so doing and was given emergency treatment by an Arrington Hamner Funeral Home ambulance driver and taken to Eastland Memorial Hospital for further treatment.

The fire was leaping upward and was believed just about ready to ignite the ceiling of the store when Chief Wayne Jackson and the firemen brought the three-alarm fire under control about 9:25 p.m. Only the small pumping unit

was utilized, but hoses were laid to plugs in readiness should the fire have got out of immediate control.

Damage was estimated at "several hundred dollars."

Store Manager Harold Hendricks of Cisco and Assistant Store Manager Jimmy Hendricks were in the store at the time of the fire.

Ranger Worth Mart Robbed; Leads Scarce

Still at large and unapprehended Wednesday afternoon were two Negroes who brazenly robbed the Worth Food Mart in Ranger shortly before noon Tuesday and fled in a Cadillac bearing California license tags.

J. W. Boggus, manager of the store, said the amount of cash and checks taken in the daring, daylight burglary was unknown.

A statewide alert continued to be out Wednesday afternoon.

Only three employees were in the food market at the time of the robbery — Pete Miller,

butcher, Mrs. Vivian Hart, cashier, and Everett Noth. The theft occurred at 11:45 a. m. Miller called the Ranger Police Dept. about 11:50.

The two unarmed Negroes came into the store about 11:30 and purchased four slices of bologna from Miller. They also picked up a can of baby food and a box of crackers.

Mrs. Hart was beginning to check the contents of her cash register as the two men left her check stand and strode out the front door.

'Late Registrants Are Big Problem in Eastland County'

"Late registrants for the draft in Eastland County are a problem," according to Mrs. Jewell Reaves, board clerk at the Petroleum Building, Eastland. To keep books straight and to comply with the law, men are required to register on time, which is within five days after reaching the age of 18 years.

A new policy regarding registrants for draft determines that all young men registering a week (or more) late will be asked to appear before the board in person to explain their tardiness. Official consideration will be given by the board, declaring these men delinquent under law and processing them for armed forces induction ahead of other men in this age group. 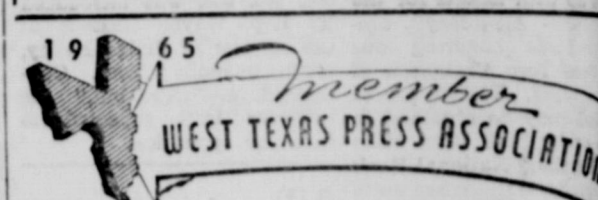

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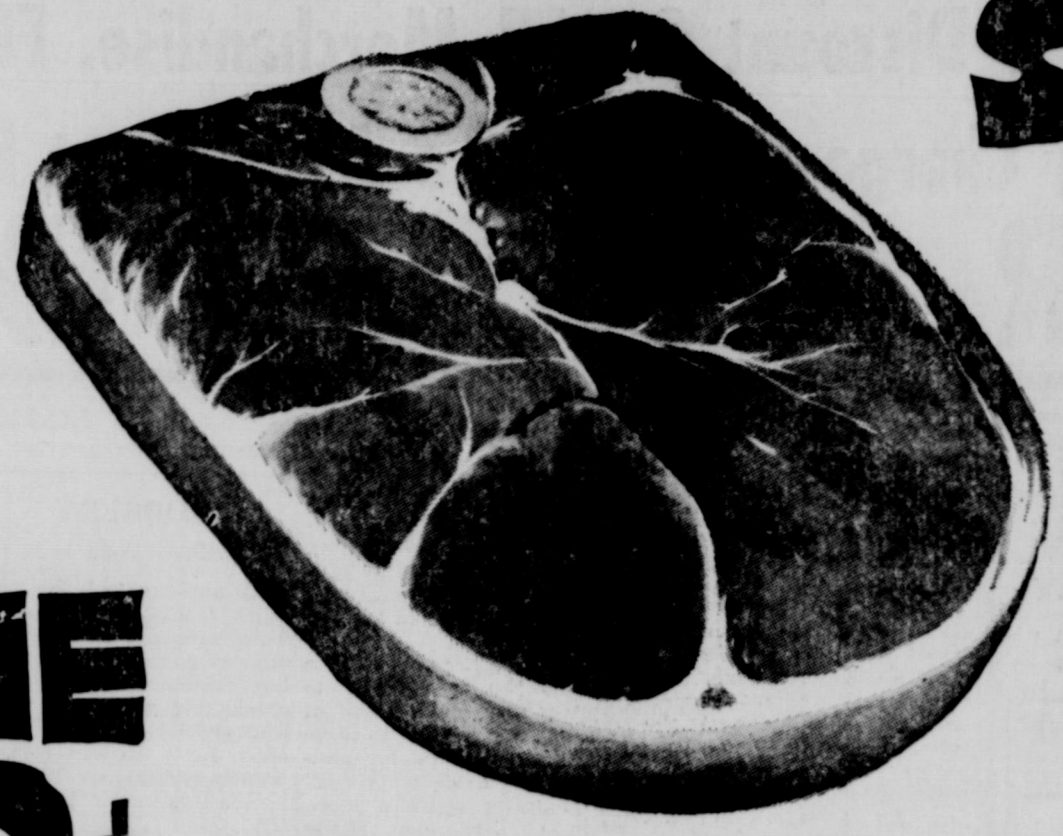

JUVENILE

Overall, Judge Bailey said, juvenile problems in this county are somewhat better, but need for proper management continues.

The measure to create the Eastland County board is based on Article 5139, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, and there are many other such boards throughout the state. The election would be a "for" and "against" proposition, with a majority necessary for passage. In most other counties the boards have been created without the benefit of local election, it was reported.

Powers conferred on juvenile boards under Article 5140, are as follows:

"Such board shall neither have nor exercise judicial power or function. In the event such Board desires to make inquiry as to whether any child should be adjudged either dependent, neglected or delinquent, it shall have power to direct one of the probation officers of said Board to file against such child in some court of such county having jurisdiction to hear and deter-

mine such complaint. Such board or the members thereof may be present at such hearing, either in person or by one or more of its probation officers and make such inquiry concerning such child as may be proper under the established rules of procedure in such court."

Article 5142 gives such a juvenile board authority to appoint "discreet persons of good moral character to serve as juvenile officers, for periods not to exceed two years."

In counties having a population of less than 80,000 (Eastland, for instance), one juvenile officer may be appointed by the Commissioners Court, when in its opinion, such officer is needed, who shall receive a compensation not to exceed \$125 per month. (Later revised to \$200 a month).

"Such (juvenile) officers shall have authority and shall be their duty to make investigations of all cases referred to them as such by such Board; to be present in Court and to represent the interest of the juvenile when the case is heard, and to furnish to the Court and such assistance as such Board may require, and to take charge of any child before and after the trial and to perform such other services for the child as may be required by the Court or said Board, and such juvenile officers shall be vested with all the power and authority of police officers or sheriffs incident to their offices."

After eating the bologna and other food outside, the pair went back into the store and after one quickly grabbed a bag containing currency and checks and raced out to a maroon and white Cadillac parked on South Austin Street. A witness said the auto bore California tags with a "BIW" prefix.

The car was identified by witnesses as a 1963 or 1964 model. Reports were in conflict, however, as to which direction the vehicle left the city.

Miller told Police Chief Bill Ogden that he could "positively" identify the pair. He said the largest of the two men was tall and heavy set, wearing a derby hat, and the smaller man was bareheaded and wore a T-shirt.

Eastland County Sheriff Lefty Sublett and State Highway patrolmen assisted Chief Ogden in his investigation.

In December of 1963, Newllyweds Millie and Bill Splawn pleaded guilty in 91st District Court to the March 8, 1963 robbery of the Ranger Worth Food Mart, and were sentenced by the late Judge T. M. Collie.

Millie drew a five-year sentence and Bill a 10-year term. Both are still serving in Texas prisons.

John Blackwell was found guilty and given a five-year suspended sentence as an accessory to the robbery.

Approximately \$900 was taken in the 1963 robbery.

Two men were surprised during the burglary of the same store in November of 1964. The two plead not guilty, posted bonds of \$5,000 each, and are still free.

The pair was arrested at the scene about 10:40 p.m. by Ranger policemen.

Browsing With Bev

Have you been stumped by the new fabrics on the market while doing your Easter shopping? Have you wondered what Dacron is or what Fortel is and how to care for them?

This article will begin a series of articles on identifying fabrics and working with and caring for fabrics.

One of the easiest ways to classify fabrics is by families — learn the family name and the trade-names in that particular family: Example: Polyester — Family or Generic Name

Trade-Mark Names — Dacron, Fortel, Kodol, Vycron. Trade-names for man-made fibers designate the producer. There may be several trade names in one family of fibers. Natural fibers are sold only by their family names — Cotton, Linen, Silk, and Wool — they have no trade-names.

You can learn the characteristics for each family and the care instructions and use these in buying and caring for any of the trade-mark names (or members) of the family. Example: The fabrics in the Polyester family are easily washable, need little ironing or pressing. Oily stains should be removed, before washing.

By keeping this in mind you would know that any member of the Polyester family, whether it be Dacron, Fortel, Kodol or Vycron, is washable and will need little ironing, etc.

This information is good to learn and keep in mind, as it will help you in buying ready made garments, as well as fabrics from the bolt. Next week we'll take a look at the natural fibers and study their characteristics and how to care for them.

May I suggest you clip these articles and save the whole series so you can refer back to them from time to time.

Recent studies indicate an increase by consumers in mail order buying. Apparel buying tops the list of mail order purchases. Sales of 10 per cent or more above a year ago have been reported by the "big four" mail order houses.

Appeals are in the terms of price — with a net saving of 7 per cent over its store price estimated by one mail order house. Other factors are the convenience of home shopping, quick delivery, telephone orders, and fashion merchandise — including creations of leading designers.

Catalogues of the mail order firms have been tailored for more sophisticated audiences. The catalogues are larger and more attractive, and there are more color illustrations. The current trend is for an increase in the number of catalogue order stores.

Other trends in apparel buying reported by trade representatives are an expansion of door-to-door selling, emphasis on the convenience it offers the suburban homemaker with young children. Expansion in the clothing and textiles field includes door-to-door selling of fabrics, rugs and draperies.

Discounters are expanding again, with an average of seven new discount stores a week estimated by the trade. Discounters tend to operate their own stores, and they do not seem eager to take over the shoe departments or the millinery departments, according to studies.

The kind of cleanser you use on your bathroom fixtures can have a decided bearing on how well the finish lasts. A harsh, gritty cleanser will soon scratch and mar the surface.

Try this test to check the abrasiveness of a cleanser: Put a small amount of cleanser between two pieces of glass. Rub them together. If the glass is scratched, the cleanser is too harsh to use on the bathroom fixtures.

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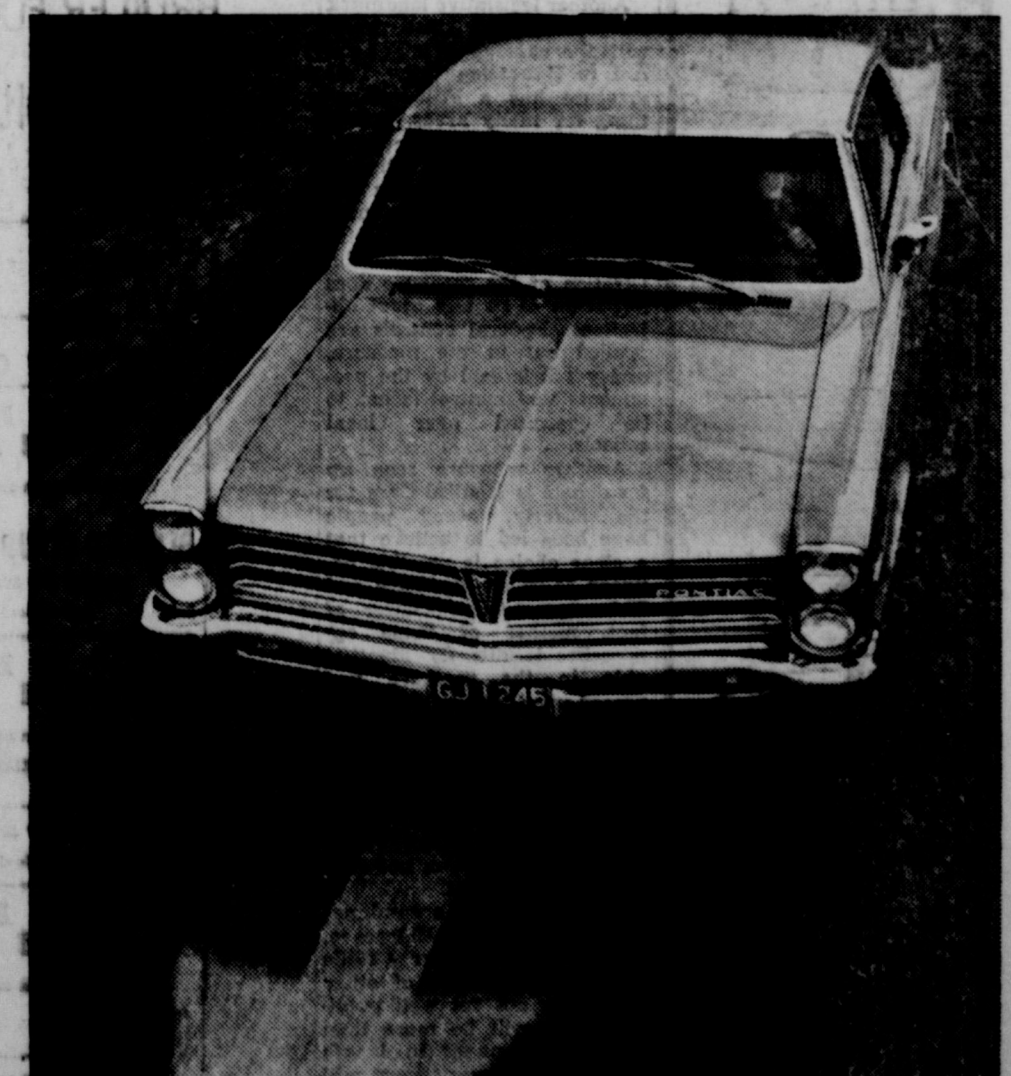

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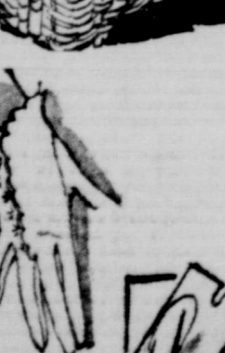

"As It Looks From Here"

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Many proposals now before the Congress would have been almost unthinkable a few brief years ago. Doubtless some of the ideas and the philosophy behind them have been in the minds of many who are now the chief sponsors, but until recently they had little hope of seeing such enacted into Law.

Programs involving billions of dollars are being passed as if the Government had the money to pay for them. Even this is not the most serious aspect. The most serious part is the attitude that it is all right to violate the Constitution in the name of securing other alleged Constitutional rights. On this line of reasoning the fact that police powers are sometimes abused by local officials, and that they have in some places is beyond question, becomes an argument, not for halting the abuse but for eliminating local powers.

Another legislative landmark was established last week with the passage of a Federal Aid to Education Bill. This measure has a little something for many areas, and it was so designed to get support for it. The fact that a Federal official, namely the Commissioner of Education, is given broad and almost dictatorial power over the administration of the measure does not seem to be any great objection. Federal controls are spelled out in the measure, and yet it is said by the proponents that control is not to be exercised over local schools.

Another measure soon up for debate is Medical Care for the Elderly. Many people have been led to believe that a clear choice is possible between so-called Medicare and Eldercare. As a matter of fact, neither of these approaches is directly identifiable in the measure just agreed upon by the Ways and Means Committee. The Bill which will be brought up for decision will be presented under what is commonly known as a "closed Rule," which means it is a "take it or leave it" proposition, not subject to amendment.

The Bill will be a combination of Medicare, Eldercare, additions to the Kerr - Mills Act, and a number of other provisions not yet well publicized. It will be more than 200 printed pages in length and virtually every word will be meaningful.

Ways and Means Committee deserves public hearings in its final form. The public interest can not be served by undue haste in pushing through Congress a bill so vitally important to the people. For instance, it should be made crystal clear that the working man, young people just beginning efforts to make a living, are going to be taxed to provide health care for every person over the age of 65, regardless of their financial need.

A justified increase in cash retirement benefits under Social Security is also a part of this Medicare Bill. This same feature was lost in the last Session of Congress because it was a part of a similar measure rejected by the Congress.

By reason of the high cost of living, many people who have earned their Social Security are being deprived of a part of it. This is a matter which should be handled separately, and not have to carry the burden of other highly controversial issues.

AUSTIN, TEX. — A goodly number of the 3,000 Texans who gathered in Washington for President Lyndon Johnson's inauguration went through the round of celebration — on a much smaller scale — in Austin Monday and Tuesday.

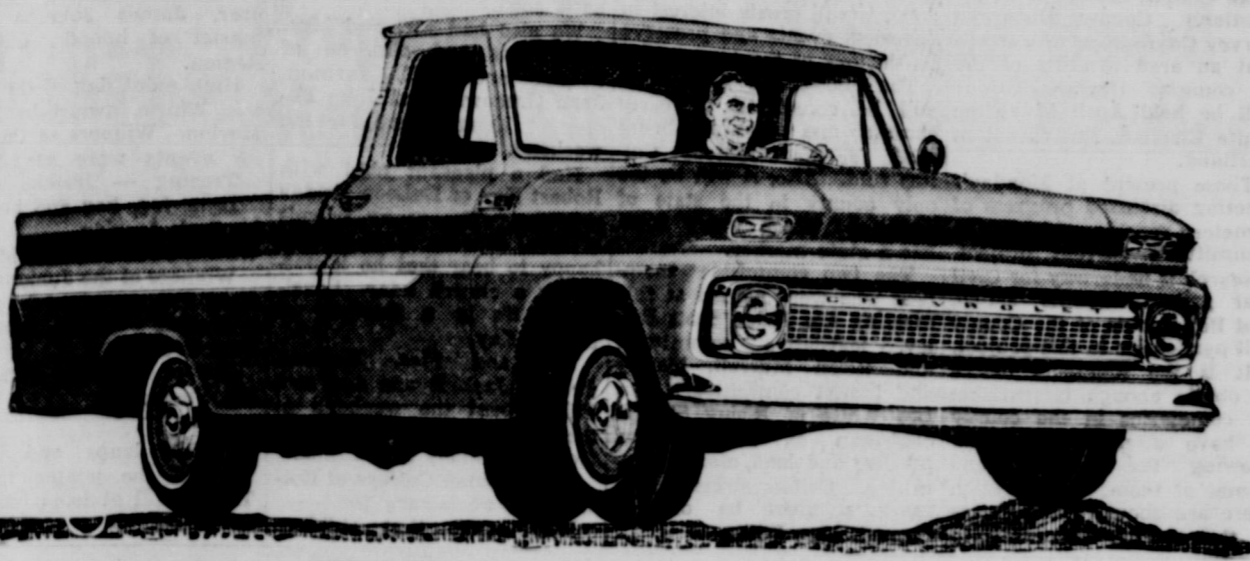

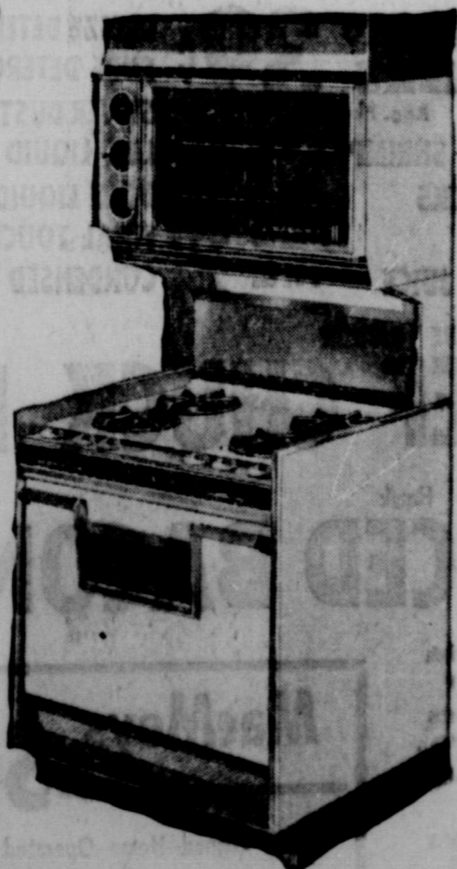

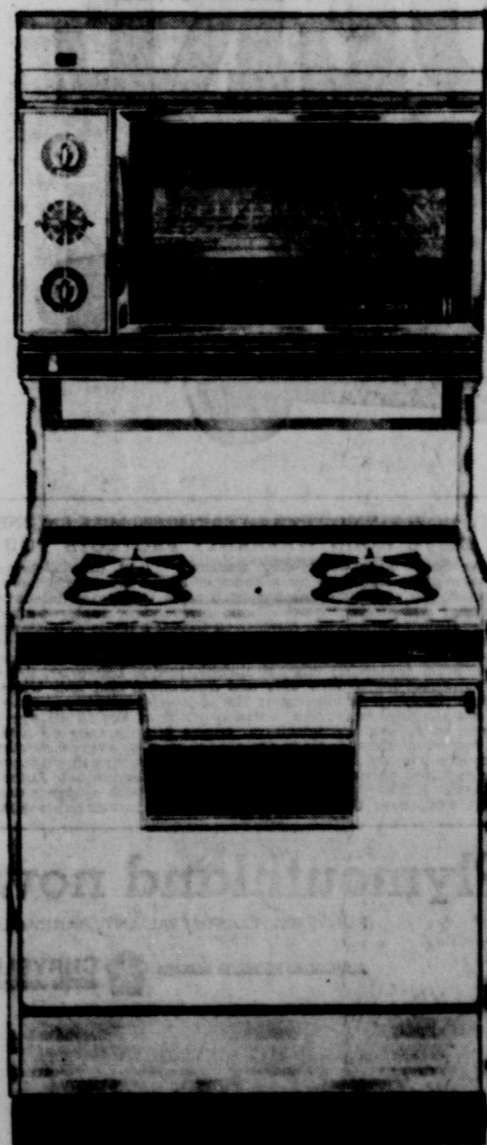

The two committee members who were named at this meeting are Judge Scott Bailey, legislative committee; and Helen Murrell, history and tourist committee. Mrs. Lee White of Rising Star is chairman of the historical marker and land marks committee. Collins stressed that markers must be ordered through Mrs. White.
