STLANDER Leon Hale's book, "Turn South at the Bridge," to be released in June by Doubleday & Co. is a real ringer — especially for people who like to read about people, real, live and sometimes a little unusual.

Hale is a columnist for the Eastland Post, and the book is a collection of his columns — ones that describe the most interesting assortment of characters.

Eastland High School graduate, Hale is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hale of Eastland and a brother of Mrs. Ima Ruth Taylor, school secretary.

Hale's job with the Post involves traveling the backwoods of South Texas, and reporting on the interesting people and experiences he encounters.

Another chapter tells of a man who carries a weapon and how he carried it. He says, as a "sling-shot."

Here's Hale's resume of that bit of wisdom: "Now if you study that statement, you will see that it sums up a vast and complex situation in a mighty simple words. If I can avoid ruining it by trying to explain it, on the surface the Union holds that when the bakeries began turning out lightbread — a term once in vogue to indicate store-bought bread — then they wanted what Uncle Charlie believed to be a deadly germ in American households.

Meaning the women quit baking hot biscuits and corn bread, and from that, went on to opening cans instead of shelling peas, and so on until they could play cards all day and rush home at five o'clock and thaw out something for supper. 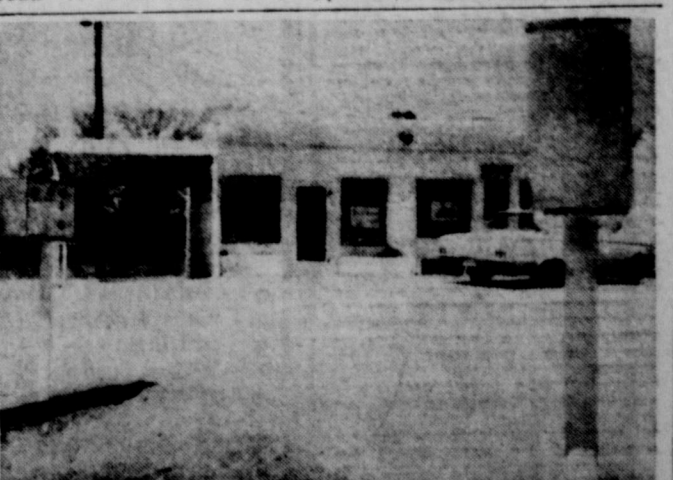
This will be the fifth seminar helping train local leaders in the techniques of industrial development.

AUSTIN — Gov. John Connally's push for four-year terms for governor and other statewide officials who now are limited to two years between elections is being bottled up in a balky House committee.

House counterpart has postponed action until March 30. Rep. John Allen of Longview is chairman of this House Committee.

While the Senate Constitutional Amendments Committee advanced the proposal with minimum dissent, its

Opponents, led by Rep. Bill Hollowell of Grand Saline, made no secret of the fact they hope to block it indefinitely.

The resolution has tremendous political impact, agrees House sponsor Rep. Gene Hen-

dryx of Alpine. If Connally runs for re-election, as many feel he will, a four-year term would place him only at the mid-point of his third term when the national elections roll around in 1968. He thus would be free to concentrate his efforts on helping old friend President Lyndon B. Johnson in his expected bid for another four years in the White House.

Opponents offer a variety of reasons for their stand. Some say they don't want the governor in a position to take a hand in legislative races during his "off" year. Others claim they have no objection to the governor's having a four-year term, but don't want to extend the benefit to other statewide officials now limited to two years.

Proponents argue just as convincingly that most states already allow four-year terms to their chief executives, and that longer terms would give officials more time to concentrate on their duties without pressure of frequent political campaigns.

Odds are that the governor eventually will find a way to get a floor vote on the proposed amendment to the constitution before session's end. Then, assuming the necessary two-thirds of lawmakers approve, it will be up to the voters to judge the issues raised.

Most important piece of water legislation to come before the current session was introduced in the deadline rush.

Bill by Rep. Raleigh Brown of Abilene lays out a way for Texas to find out how much water it has in its streams and who can use it.

Water belongs to the state, of course, and can be used only by those to whom the state permits its use. Establishing the right to water, however, can be a long and complicated procedure.

SHORT SNORTS — Bill to create a new State Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation to take over the job of the present Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools cleared both Houses after hard work by its authors, Sen. Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi and Rep. Wallace Mil-

ler of Houston. Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, president pro tempore of the Senate, will become "governor for a day" on April 20. Tuberculosis eradication bill has been passed and sent to the governor. House passed the bill to authorize eight new schools for the mentally retarded, four on either side of the 98th meridian, near center of state. "Double contracting" bill providing criminal penalties for signing false contracts or signing false statements to get bigger housing loans has cleared the House. Sen. D. Roy Harrington of Port Arthur and a group of representatives have introduced a concurrent resolution calling for a special interim committee study of feasibility of creating a Big Thicket State Park within the State Parks System. Proposed constitutional amendment to repeal the property tax for state revenue purposes in seven years (by stages) has been heard in House and Senate committees.

Licensing of water well drillers received House approval. Bill to require farm land on fringes of cities be assessed for taxation only at its agricultural value has been heard in House Revenue

and Tax Committee and referred to sub-committee. Texas traffic fatalities claimed 3,006 lives last year — a 10 per cent increase over 1963 — and auto accidents caused an economic loss of \$487,000, reports Department of Public Safety. Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr called on members of National Association of District Attorneys to initiate youth conferences in local areas patterned after the Texas Attorney General's Youth Conference as a deterrent to juvenile crime. American Angora Goat Breeders Association of Rocksprings staged a mohair products style show for wives of top state officials in the governor's office and presented Mrs. John Connally, Mrs. Preston Smith and Mrs. Ben Barnes with hand-knitted mohair sweaters.

Texas Railroad Commission ordered a slight decrease in oil production during April — 28.5 per cent of potential for 2,919,535-barrel daily allowable. Texas Employment Commission reports show an estimated 69,300 seasonal employees with farm employment down during January, mostly from cutbacks in the number of seasonal hands in cotton activities.

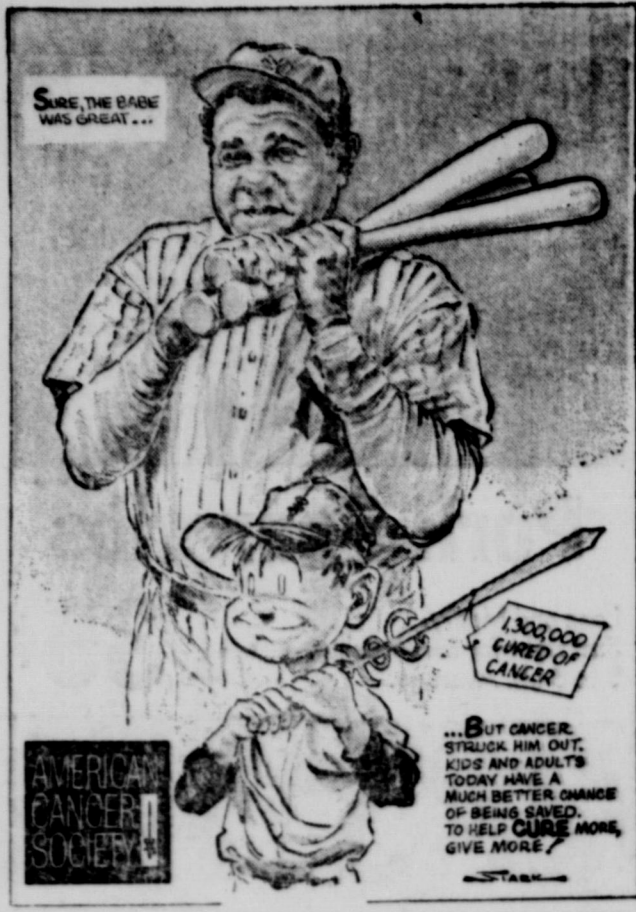


Japan Is Theme For Delta Kappa Gamma

INFRARED SPACE CAMERA PROBES EARTH SECRETS

There's a new "eye" for the sky that can reveal long-hidden secrets of Mother Earth. Mounted in a NIMBUS weather satellite whirling busily about our planet, this device, is technically known as a High Resolution Infrared Radiometer. It was designed by the ITT Industrial Laboratories of the International Telephone and Telegraph Company.

NASA scientists are elated by its performance. It is predicted that it will offer tremen-

dous benefits to all mankind, providing new means for long range weather forecasting, for geology, for water conservation, and as a tool for extending all the earth sciences.

Icebergs, clouds, cities, all give off infrared rays. Now it is possible to "picture" this radiation and chart the daily changes in weather patterns around the world. Infrared study is still in its infancy, but the benefits from it may some day radiate to all mankind.

Scholarship For Journalism Set For West Texas

OLTON — The West Texas Press Association today announced it will receive applications until May 15, for its 1965 journalism scholarship which will be worth \$600 to some West Texas high school graduate for studying newspaper journalism for four years in college.

All applications for the scholarship should be sent by interested seniors to the WTPA scholarship chairman, Bill Turner, publisher of the Olton Enterprise, Olton, Texas 79064.

Announcement of the scholarship winner will be made by June 1.

Students who desire to apply for the scholarship should talk with their high school principal and editor or publisher of their hometown paper, who will be glad to help them with necessary application details.

The scholarship winner receives \$150 per year (\$75 per semester) for each of the four years of his or her college career providing satisfactory academic requirements are met.

The WTPA has offered this journalism scholarship each year since 1956 and have had as many as five students in college at one time drawing scholarship funds. Several have graduated.

Applicants must be in the upper 25 percent of his class, must have demonstrated ability in newspaper journalism and a desire for a newspaper career.

Several copies of all rules concerning application for the scholarship have been mailed to each high school principal

in West Texas and interested students may secure full details at their high school of fice.

Ten West Texas colleges designated for scholarship winners by the West Texas Press Association but the scholarship committee will consider making an exception for other colleges or universities if they have a qualified journalism course of study.

The ten designated schools for scholarship recipients are Abilene Christian College, Hardin - Simmons University, Howard Payne College, McMurry College, Midwestern University, Sul Ross College, Texas Tech, Wayland Baptist College, West Texas State University and Texas Western College.

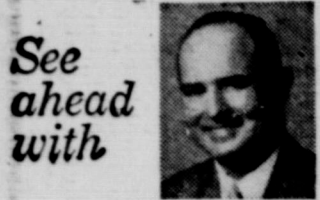
