





#### CRANBERRY MOLD

If you'd like to add a novel touch to your traditional turkey dinner, consider the relish tray. Scoop out the centers of crisp radishes, and stuff them with a mixture of blue and cream cheese. And here's a different way to use the all - important cranberry: open one No. 2 can of sliced peaches and drain the juice without removing the peaches. Soften one envelope of unflavored gelatin in 1-4 cup cranberry-juice cocktail.

Heat; add another 1-2 cup of the cranberry juice, and stir until the gelatin is dissolved. Cool until thickened, pour into the can of peaches, and chill until firm. Remove the mold from the can and cut through in layers; then cut layers in half to serve with your turkey dinner or as a garnish for a cold-turkey platter.

Try your hand at making timehonored turkey stuffings even better than mother used to make. For instance, in place of water, use chicken consomme. Mash clove garlic and add to your stuffing for an irrestible tang. One cup chopped tart apples added to your favorite stuffing gives it a sprightly flavor, sure to






