

# Eastland's Terry Treadwell On All-State First Team

Terry Treadwell, 6-3 Eastland High School senior basketball ace, has been named to the All-State Class A team by the Texas Sports Writers Association.

It marks the first in at least 10 years that the Eastland school has been so honored in the state placements. Treadwell, son of Dr. and Mrs. M. A. Treadwell Jr., is a high school basketball star in a blaze of glory, leading his Maverick

teammates and Coach Denson Moody to a District 10-A championship, to advancing to the Regional playoffs for the first time in history.

Young Treadwell was named All-District and All-Area this year before receiving this the most recent and most coveted honor that comes to Texas schoolboy athletes.

Others on the Class A All-State first team besides Treadwell are David Frazier of Aspermont, Mike Hale of

Wylie, Jack Sweeney of West Sabine and Randy Brint of White Oak.

Baylor University seems most likely site for the display of Terry's talents in the next school term.

Eastland's honors have been manifold from this season's basketball team — Coach Moody was named All-Area Coach; Mike Miller and Treadwell were named to All-District honors; and Long-Shot Hayden Wilson earned

honorable mention. After winning the district contest, the Mavericks downed Marble Falls, then were defeated in the first game of the Regional Tournament.

A multi-activity man, Terry has excelled in many fields including tennis, band and scholastics.

His basketball record looks like this:

- Scored 1,840 points during four years as a member of the EHS team, 1,789 during

regular season play.

- Averaged 27 points per game as senior with 20 rebounds (701 total points).
- Averaged 21.5 points per game as junior with 18 rebounds (479 total).
- Averaged 17½ points per game as sophomore with 10 rebounds (362 total).
- Averaged 16½ points per game as a freshman, with 247 total points.
- All District 10-A as a sophomore; All-Area, second team

as a sophomore; All-District 10-A as a junior; All-Area, First Team as a junior; All-District, All-Area, as a senior; All-Tournament team in freshman year; three all-tournament teams sophomore year; three all-tournament teams as senior and averaged 30 points per game in Stephenville tournament this year.

TENNIS: Won first place in boys' singles in tennis in

District 10-A and Region IIA in his sophomore and junior years. Went on to State Tennis Tournament both years and lost in semi-finals to Class A champion.

SCHOLASTICS: Has led his class scholastically through junior high and high school, carrying an approximate average of 95.

BAND: Is first trumpet player in Maverick band. Made second All-District Band two years; made first All-

District band two years; All-Region Band his junior and senior years. Went to State Solo Contest as junior.

A congenial, friendly young man, Terry is an active member of the First Baptist Church where he is a member of the Church Choir.

With all his athletic abilities, his scholastic standing and personal pleasantness, most agree that the one word that sizes Terry up best for his honors, is "deserving."

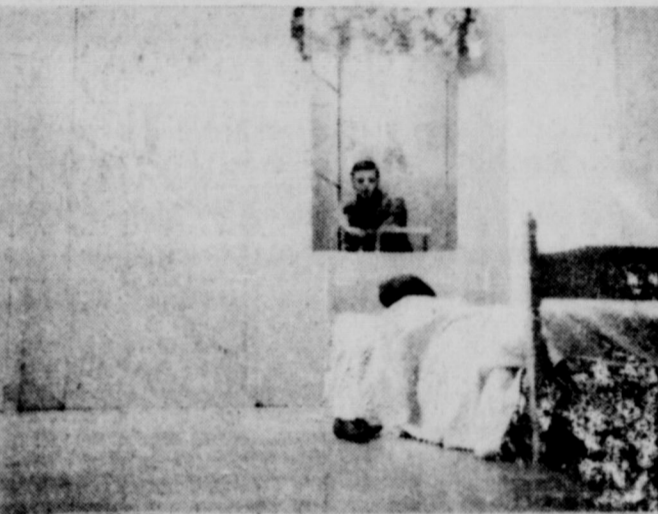

### Don Your Straw Hat Saturday

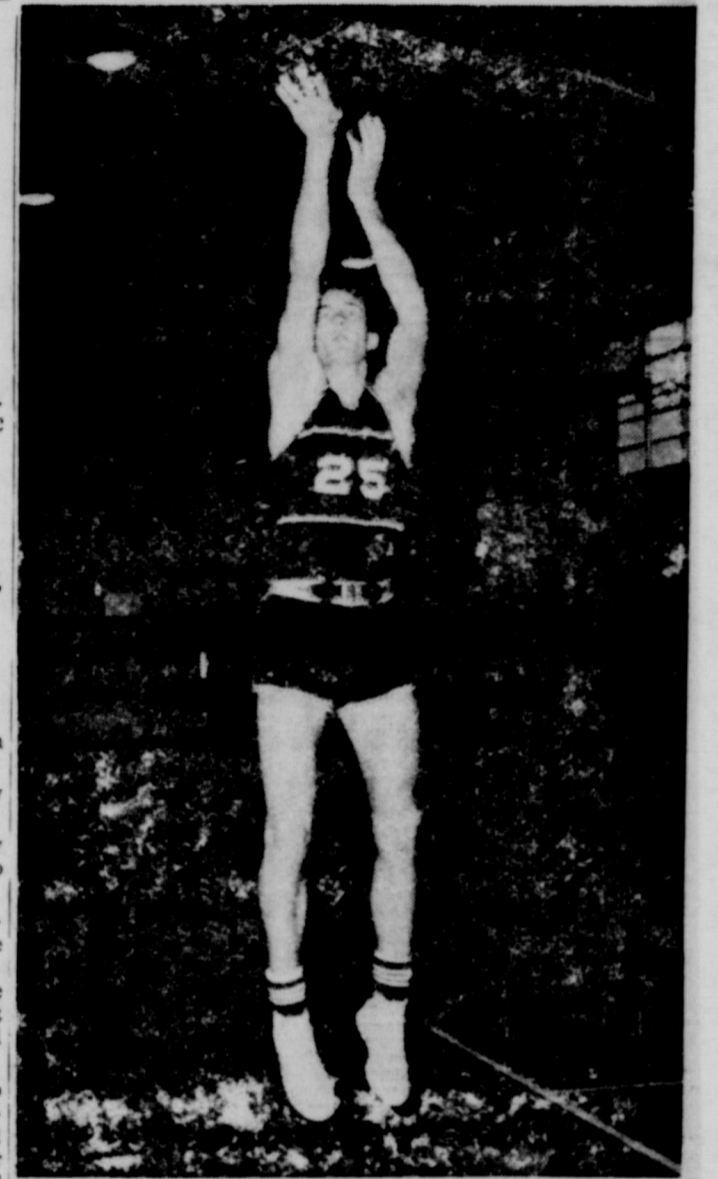
It's off with the felt, and on with the Straw!

### Bratton Trial Verdict Is Anticipated By Thursday; Woman Says Self-Defense

Final testimony and attorneys' arguments are expected to get underway Thursday morning in the Maurine Bratton murder trial which began in 91st District Court Monday.

An instructed verdict for an acquittal was asked by the defense, but had not been granted by Presiding Judge J. Frank Sparks at press time.

Mrs. Bratton is being tried for the Sept. 30, 1963, slaying of her former husband, R. L. Bratton, at her ranch home near Ranger.

Prosecuting Attorney Perry Brown, who began his parade of witnesses about 2 p.m. Tues-

day was expected to rest his case about 1:30 p.m. Wednesday.

Defense Attorney Bill Hart planned to take most of Wednesday afternoon with some six witnesses — one of whom was to have been Mrs. Bratton, attractive 45-year-old Ranger brunette.

### More Lines To Be Cleaned; New Police Car To Be Bought

Another local sewer line cleaning project was approved by the Eastland City Commission at its regular monthly meeting Monday evening.

The commission also signed two contracts with the Eastland County Water Supply District; voted to accept bids for a new police patrol car; and heard comments from several Olden residents regarding water service.

Mayor Frank Deaton pre-

sided and all commissioners were present except Dr. M. A. Treadwell Jr., who was attending a meeting of the board of directors of the Eastland Memorial Hospital.

The 4,367-foot stretch of 8-inch sewer line to be cleaned is located from the corner of Burkett St. (Highway 6) north along S. Seaman St. to Conner St., east along Conner to Broughter St., and about a block along Seaman from

Conner to Sadosa St.

The city will employ the Nesmith Pipe Cleaning Service of Abilene, the same firm that cleaned a line here last year. Cost will be 65 cents a foot for a total of some \$2,338.55. (The job last year amounted to \$5,500.)

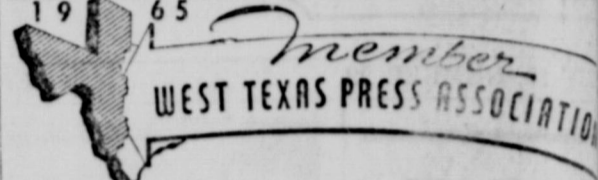

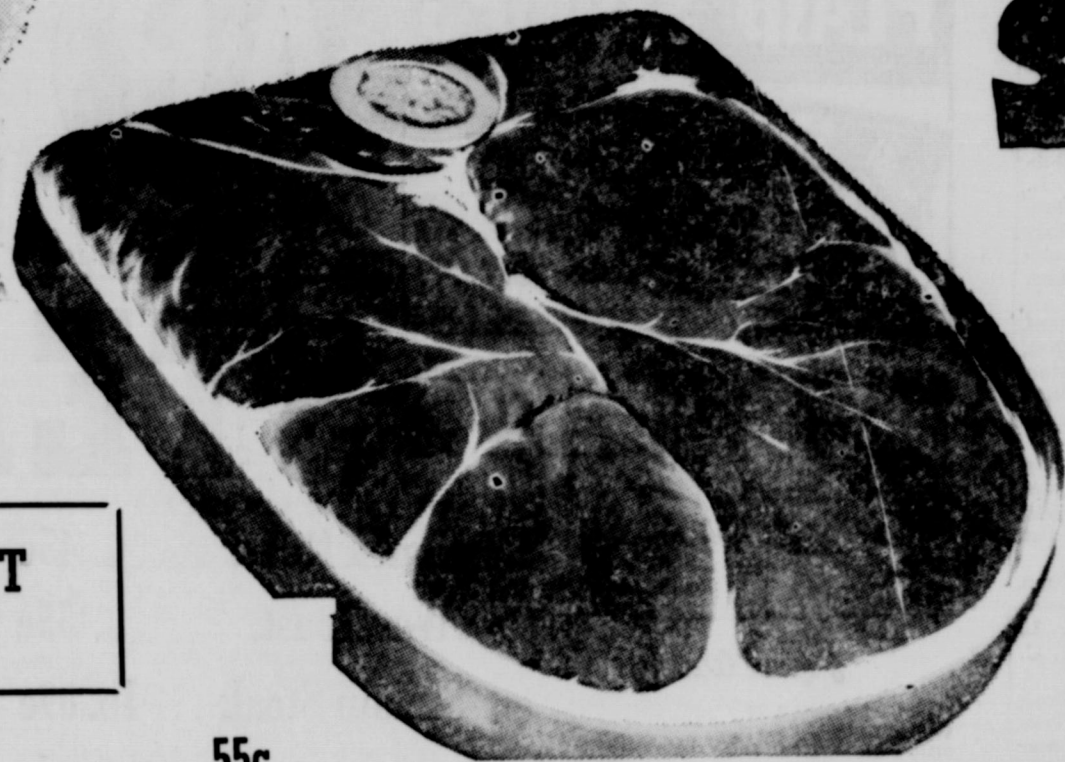

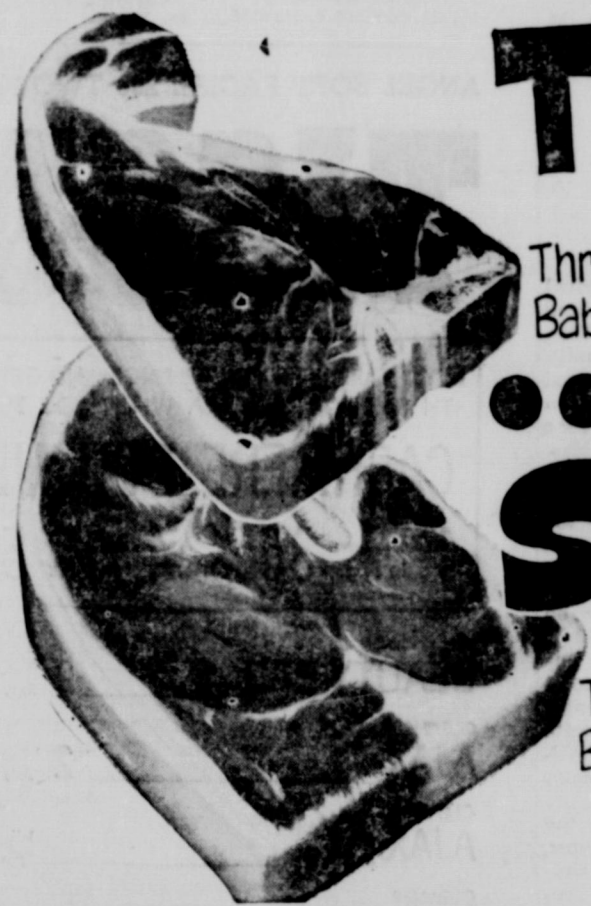

"As It Looks From Here" DWAN BIRLESON Congressman 17th District

WASHINGTON, D. C.—One of almost 100 proposals to the Congress by the Administration is the liberalization of our Immigration Laws.

Efforts to change the present Walter - McCarran Immigration Law have been made in every Congress for the last several years, but have gotten no place. The effort now is given "top priority" and there is strong indication that the 40-year old principle of national origin may be junked. The national origins principle is the relationship of the number of immigrants from any foreign nation to those of the same nationality residing under citizenship in the United States as of 1920.

It is proposed that the present national origins quota system be placed with a system based on a need for skills possessed by applicants for citizenship, and a preference for those with relatives already living in the country.

Although legislation has not been drafted in its details from the President's message, it appears that the change would result in: Immigration from friendly Western European countries would be reduced by about 25 per cent. Some would be cut as much as 60 per cent, which would include such countries as Germany and Sweden.

Immigrants from Greece, Portugal and Spain would be increased considerably. The number of foreigners allowed to enter the United States from Communist countries in Eastern Europe would be almost double. Yugoslavians, Rumanians, Albanians, Poles and Hungarians would be increased from 50 per cent to six-fold. None in these areas would be reduced.

Quotas from Asian nations would be increased from nine to ten-fold. India would have a boost of 18 to 20 times what it has today, and even Indonesia would have four times the present limit. African immigration would be boosted to more than four times the present restriction. The question is, do we need this additional influx of immigrants and, if so, should it be left to some commission or bureaucrat to determine how many and from where?

Our first obligation in anything is to the United States of America and not to any foreign country. This is the answer to those who maintain that the present origins system pictures America in a bad light, and that our relations with other countries would be improved if we repealed it. For years our Immigration Law has been considered one of the most liberal in the world. This system favors no one group over another, but fixes the quotas at one-sixth of 1 per cent of the people in each national origin group in the United States as of 1920.

There is no simple duty or moral obligation for this country to become the dumping ground for surplus people of the earth. Aside from the national security aspects, our domestic policy guards against unemployment, housing shortages, poverty, mounting crime and welfare costs. Would the importation of more people of doubtful character, no assurance of assimilation, and who in too many instances contribute to the increase of the size of the city ghettos in America, contribute anything to the good of our Nation?

The fact is that the great ethnic groups in our big cities are organized to bring tremendous political pressures for the breakdown of our Immigration Laws. They are organized and know how to exert their influence on those they helped elect to the Congress.

This is not an anti-foreigner attitude by any means. Certainly it is a meritorious contention that immigrants have contributed great values to America. In fact, could it not be said that we are all of immigrant stock, unless we are Indians? But this is 1965, and self-preservation of this Nation is a first duty. Our immigrant forebearers came here to build and develop as Americans and not as predators on an established system.

Medicare Is a Misnomer

A recent Gallup Poll indicated that a majority of Americans favor medicare. But, of great significance, the same poll found that a very large percentage just don't know what the scheme would and would not do. They believe that it is far more liberal and inclusive than is actually the case. To take one important example, 40 per cent think it would cover the fees of doctors, surgeons and dentists — which it wouldn't.

The fact is, as many observers have pointed out, that the very term medicare is a misnomer. It suggests a broad program for meeting all the needs of those coming under it. Instead, it is essentially a hospital and nursing home program, and even in those areas the benefits are strictly limited.

So, if medicare should become law, millions of people will be due for a grave disappointment. Along with that, the heavy cost — which in all probability would be larger than the estimates — would have to be paid by substantial boosts in the social security tax rates.

We might have to accept these dangers and disadvantages if medicare was the only way to deal with the medical problems of the aged. But there are other and better ways. What seems to be the best of these is a plan proposed by the American Medical Association. It would expand the existing Kerr-Mills federal-state program and authorize people over 65 to buy private health insurance providing liberal hospital and medical benefits. Government would pay part or all of the premium of policyholders who could not afford the cost.

A Matter of State Pride

What Texan hasn't thrilled to the sight of his State Capitol Building as he drew near Austin? It is most appropriate that the monumental red granite structure should dominate the scene, as it has since 1888.

Conversely, it would be most unfortunate if high-rise buildings placed too close to the Capitol should wipe out the long-range view of the stately building at the top of the hill.

Already a few structures obstruct somewhat a view of the Capitol. The state itself built one, the Sam Houston Office Building, which is too tall to be located so close.

Now foundation work is under way on a 24-story structure fronting on Capitol Square. Such a structure not only would completely domi-

nate the skyline thereabouts but would hide the Capitol from view in one direction.

Rep. Henry Grover of Houston has introduced a House concurrent resolution which would direct the State Building Commission to initiate denunciation proceedings for purchase of the site and improvements. The owners would be compensated, of course. The work already done would not be wasted, as the state could then proceed with a low-rise parking garage or office structure.

Austin is a rapidly growing city. Tall buildings will be erected there. But there are other sites available for such structures. The majesty of the State Capitol should be protected. — Houston Chronicle.

maintaining Hart's objections. Called Wednesday morning by Brown were Sheriff L. E. Sublett, G. W. Bratton of Ran-

Hart at this point asked for permission to have the jury retired to make his motion for acquittal. Judge Sparks complied, retired the jury, heard the motion which held that insufficient evidence to substantiate the indictment had been entered, recessed for formal application of the motion, then reconvened and allowed Brown to re-open for the state, without commenting on his decision on the motion.

Horn was recalled and testified that the fatal shot had been fired from the Bratton home from an open east window.

County Clerk Johnson Smith was called to testify about a warrant deed on record from M. L. Woods to Susie M. Bratton.

Tax-Collector Edgar Altom was called to the stand at 1:15 to testify to the value of property involved in an apparent attempt to show the value of the "gift" from Mr. Woods to Mrs. Bratton.

The state put on four witnesses in the opening round of testimony which began at 2 p.m. Tuesday, and three of these, all law enforcement officers, quoted Mrs. Bratton as saying she had killed her husband.

Called by District-County Attorney Perry Brown were former Sheriff Lee Horn, Dr. Luther R. Gohlke of Ranger, Highway Patrolman Jack Therwanger and Sheriff L. E. Sublett.

Horn said that Mrs. Bratton came to his office about 8:15 a.m. Sept. 30, 1963 and said: "I have just killed my husband." She had brought the rifle — described as a deer rifle with a telescopic sight, he said.

Defense Attorney Bill Hart objected strongly as he did later when Therwanger testified similarly. Presiding Judge J. Frank Sparks permitted the statement to stand as he did later when Sheriff Sublett (deputy at the time of the shooting) testified that Mrs. Bratton had told him that him that she had kept him (her former husband) in the rifle scope's sights "until he stopped kicking" (after she had shot him).

Testimony brought out that a door of Mrs. Bratton's house had been damaged — the state contending that it could have been done by anyone or anything and the defense holding that it had been done by the late Bratton. Hart even introduced the door as evidence to show its damaged surface. Through a great deal of objection, he also introduced a white night gown with blood on it (held to be one worn by Mrs. Bratton the night of the shooting), a bloody wash cloth, a pocket knife with blood on a blade (held to be the late Bratton's), a bloody tissue, a packet of matches and six spent shells.

Horn said Mrs. Bratton told him that Bratton had forced his way into the house after she had refused to open the door, had thrown her on the bed, choked her and had held a knife at her throat.

Therwanger testified that he was on his way to investigate an accident on State Highway 16 (near which the Bratton ranch is located) when he met Mrs. Bratton in a car and stopped to talk to her.

He said she told him she killed Bratton. He told her to go to the sheriff's office, then drove his car back to the courthouse. Arriving before her, he said he told the sheriff, "This was no accident." At Hart's objection to this line of testimony, Judge Sparks retired the jury, heard the testimony, overruled the ob-

jection, and permitting the patrolman to complete his statement for the jury.

Therwanger said Mrs. Bratton had told him that as Bratton left her home, he had said he "was going to kill that old snuff-dipper," referring to Morris Woods, then would come back to her home.

Dr. Gohlke told how he was called to the scene and determined that the bullet had struck the man in the back and had come out through the right upper chest. He said the cause of death was shock from loss of blood as a result of gunshot wound. Despite repeated questions regarding the entry of the bullet, the physician did not change his contention that the bullet entered from the back.

Court adjourned at 5 Tuesday and resumed at 9 a.m. Wednesday, with the jury held in quarters.

Jurors were qualified on the death penalty, which whittled the 100-name special venire fast. Only seven jurors, four from Eastland and three from Gorman were qualified all day Monday. Two more Gorman men were qualified in the first hour Tuesday morning.

Self defense, of herself and another, was the plea made by her attorney, Bill Hart of Eastland. Jurors were questioned at length on their feelings about the law which provides for self defense killing.

In an arraignment before juror selection began, Mrs. Bratton pleaded not guilty to the murder with malice indictment.

Several prospective jurors were excused by presiding Judge J. Frank Sparks before questioning began when they testified under oath that they had opinions already formed

as to the guilt or innocence of the woman. County Attorney Perry Brown is prosecuting attorney. Jurors selected Monday were Temple A. Harris, Steele Hill, A. E. Ethridge Jr., and Eddie Simms, all of Eastland, and Tom L. Broom, J. A. Watson, and Cecil Self, all of Gorman. Qualified Tuesday morning were E. H. Cook, H. N. Clark, Wayne Eaves, and Mrs. Dorothy Hatcher, all of Gorman; and Sterling Drum-right of Cisco.

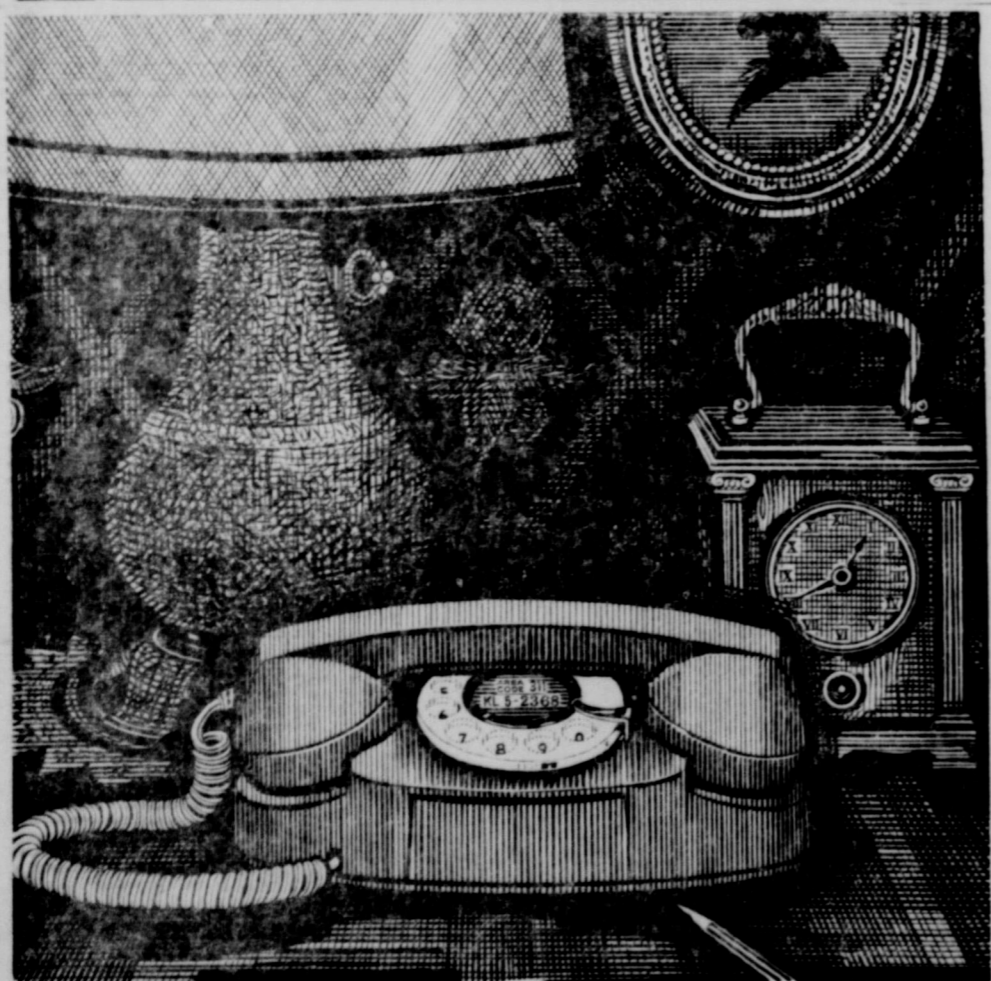

**NSLI Available To Former GIs In New Program**

WACO — Many veterans whose nonservice - connected disabilities prevent them from buying commercial life insurance at sub-standard rates will have the opportunity to obtain National Service Life Insurance during a one-year period beginning May 1, 1965.

Glyndon Hague, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, pointed out that these applicants, unacceptable to commercial companies, will be obliged to pay very high premiums.

Nonservice - connected veterans affected are those who had been eligible to purchase insurance between October 7, 1940, and January 1, 1957, but who now hold less than \$10,000 worth or none at all.

These veterans may obtain a general information sheet at any VA regional office. However, veterans are reminded that no application may be made prior to May 1, 1965.

The condition rendering the veteran uninsurable had to be in existence on the date the president signed the bill.
