Old Rip Give-Away Is Saturday

Saturday is Old Rip Scrip Drawing Day in Eastland, with \$100 in nice, green scrip up for claims.

The stub drum is located at Perry's and ticket stubs may be deposited there or at participating stores in town. Chamber officials ask that stubs be deposited before drawing time Saturday. Drawing time will be 2 p. m.

Scrip will be given in four amounts — one for \$50, one for \$30, and two for \$10 each. Merchants in Eastland are also offering special bargains for the weekend event.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. Saturday for the Democratic Primary runoff election in Eastland County — with a short ballot on tap and a light turn-out of voters expected.

Voters in three of the county's 12 precincts will have three decisions to make on their ballot. All others will have only two.

There is one state-wide contest and one county-wide contest, and one commissioner, Precinct One, race.

Voters county-wide will decide between Joe Pool of Dallas County and Robert W. Baker of Harris County for Congressman at Large, and between L. E. (Lefty) Sublett and J. B. Williams for Eastland County Sheriff.

Voters in Eastland, Ranger and Olden will decide between Earl Blackwell and Danny Woods for Commissioner of Precinct One.

Approximately 100 absentee votes were expected, with deadline for voting absentee Tuesday evening at 5. By noon Tuesday, 92 had been cast — 51 in Eastland, 23 in Ranger, 3 in Olden, 10 in Cisco, 2 in Kokomo and 3 in Carbon.

In the May 2 primary Sublett led five other candidates 1,438, putting the two into the run-off. Woods lead five too, with 1,120 to Blackwell's 581 for the run-off contest.

Pool led Eastland County in the earlier vote with 3,488 to Baker's 491.

Voters in Eastland will mark their ballots at the Courthouse, in the first floor lounge. Don Pierson is appointed election judge.

Voting in Ranger will be at the City Hall with Calvin Brown, election judge.

Mrs. O. H. Dick will conduct the Olden voting at the school.

J. V. Hevser Jr. is election judge for Cisco where polling will be at the city hall.

assisting Collins in planning the tournament include Bill Collings and Dr. Theodore Nicksick Jr. of Ranger, and Bruce Pipkin, Buddy Haun Jr., Charles Freyschlag and Jim Parks, all of Eastland.

Defending champion is Charles Bridwell of Coleman. Collins said the tournament will have seven flights and will be cutoff at 112 players. Neil Day of Eastland is the starter and Andy Taylor of Eastland will handle the registration.

A barbecue is to be held Friday evening, June 12, at Lone Cedar Country Club on the north shore of Lake Leon. The club is located about half way between Ranger and Eastland.

Collins announced that there would be free swimming for the players and their families in the club swimming pool and all other facilities of the club will be available for the visiting golfers competing in the tournament.

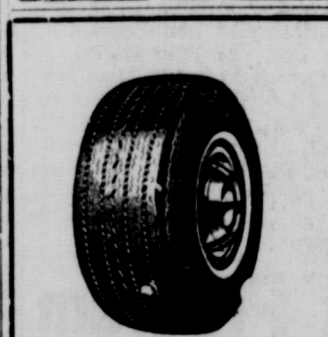

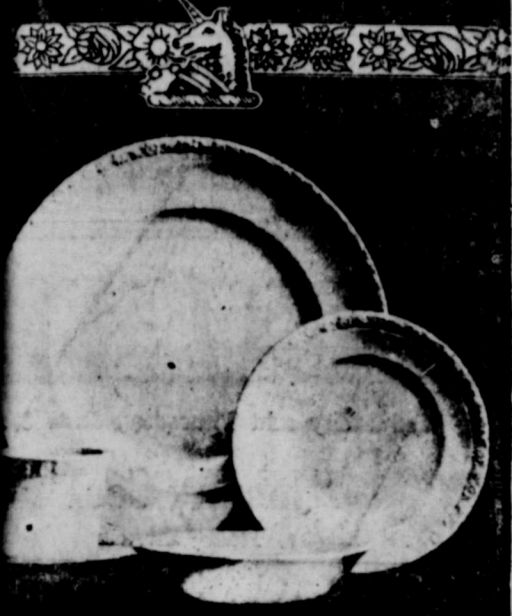

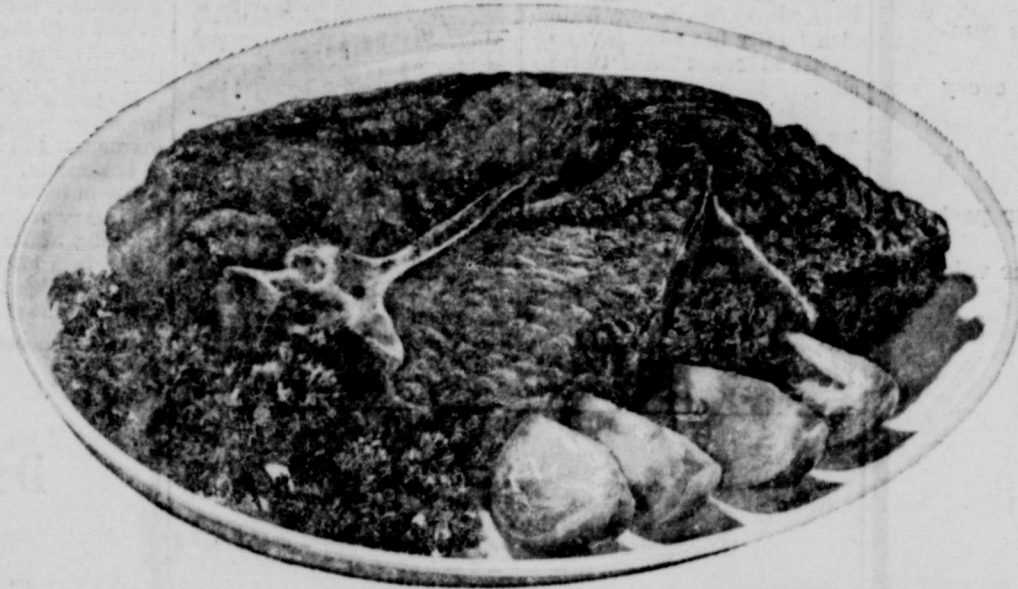

Suicide Is 10th Leading Cause Of Death In Texas

COLLEGE STATION — The tenth leading cause of death in Texas last year was suicide.

This grim reminder comes from Patsy Reynolds, Extension family life education specialist at Texas A&M University.

"It's ironic in a time when we spend so much money and have made so much progress against dread diseases such as tuberculosis that suicides should outrank deaths from many of these diseases," the specialist said.

Records of the Texas State Department of Health show that men took their lives three times as frequently as women. Ninety-six per cent of the sui-

cides were of the white race, and the period from 45 to 55 years of age produced the most deaths.

These facts support national research on the subject, Miss Reynolds explains. The

typical suicide appears to be a white male between 45 and 55 and the time of suicide appears to be between seven and 11 o'clock on a bright sunny Monday morning. He probably has a family, but few close friends. He may belong to a club, but the chances are he doesn't attend regularly.

Most people are not prepared to counsel with a mentally disturbed person who may be contemplating suicide. "Yet we can take anyone seriously who mentions suicide, and try to see that they talk to a physician, social worker, or minister. We can take time to talk to the person who doesn't seem to have a great many friends, and we can listen to their problems," the specialist said.

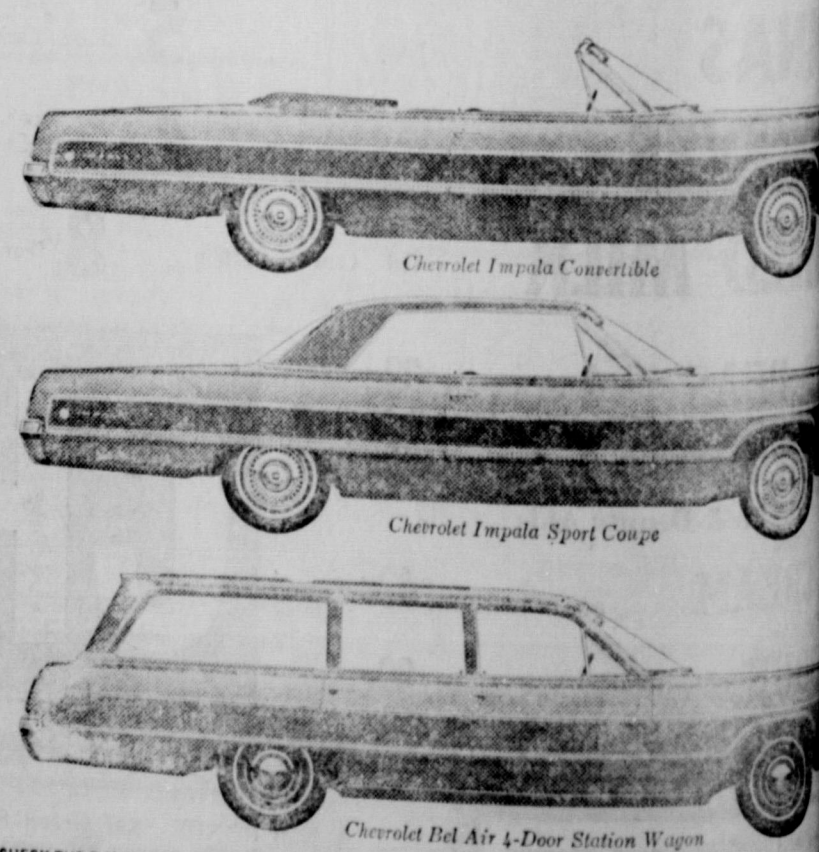

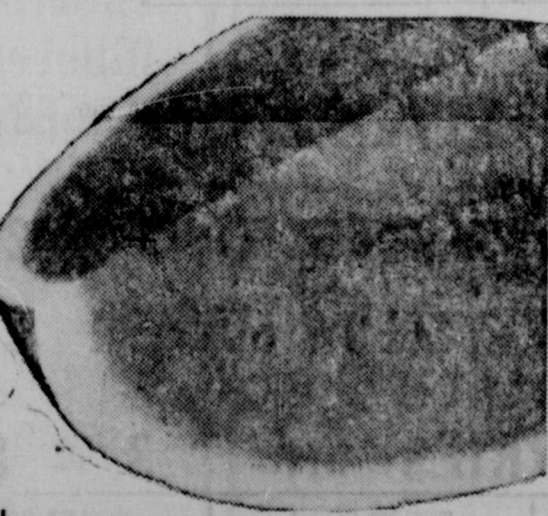

'Burglary Prevention Week' Is Proclaimed For June 21-27

Chief Ray Laney announced today that Mayor Frank Deaton, in cooperation with the Texas Police Association state-wide program, has proclaimed the week of June 21st through June 27th as Burglary Prevention Week.

According to Chief Laney, "This is not intended to be facetious, nor an indication we're only interested in preventing burglaries one week of the year. Rather, various law enforcement agencies throughout the country have designated this week to emphasize the seriousness of this crime and how the public can help by observing some simple means to keep burglars out of their homes during the vacation months ahead."

Few people realize burglaries account for 44 per cent of the total major crimes in the country. During 1963 there were an estimated 900,000 burglaries committed across the country. The total dollar

loss of these burglaries was approximately \$200 million. Chief Laney said "alerting the public to this menace, and suggesting to them some of the simple precautions to take, can substantially reduce this menace in our community."

Some of the suggestions the police department recommends you take before leaving your home during the warm month ahead are:

1. Use good locks. Don't rely on cheap door locks to protect your home and valuables. Pin tumbler cylinder locks or locks with a dead-bolt mechanism are most effective.
2. Have one or two lamps burning during the evening hours. This can be easily done by using an automatic timer on lamps or making arrangements with a neighbor to turn them on and off each evening. Lights burning all night or day and night fool no one.
3. Be sure to discontinue deliveries during your absence. A call to the dairy is safer than a note left for the milkman. The post office will hold your mail, too. Have your newspaper forwarded to your vacation spot.

4. Tell one neighbor you are leaving, ask him if he'll look after things for you in your absence — sweeping up, cutting the lawn, picking up circulars, etc.

5. Use safety latches on all windows. They'll allow the windows to be opened far enough for proper ventilation, but not enough for someone to enter.

6. Notify the police department when you're leaving, where you can be reached in an emergency and when you expect to return.
