Guardsmen to Summer Camp For 2 Weeks

Eastland County National Guardsmen, Battery C, Third Battalion, 132nd Artillery — were due to leave by convoy at 9 a.m. Sunday (today) for two weeks at summer camp and active duty training at Fort Hood near Killeen.

The unit is under the command of Capt. Winford H. Hogan of Clyde. The group will be joined by the Breckenridge Guard convoy, Battery B, Sunday morning before they leave. Along the way to Fort Hood other units will join the convoy.

There are 32 members of the Breckenridge group, and some 37 members of the county Battery.

Guardsmen will spend their first week at North Fort Hood and the second week in the field. Training will be primarily based on mobility at the unit level, climaxed the second week with a 48-hour full field exercise, "Blue Streak."

On the first Saturday, June 27th, a parade of the entire division will be held for Governor John Connally. Miss 49th Armored Division of 1964 will be selected and crowned while the National Guard division is in training at Fort Hood and will make her first public appearance during the division's annual motorized review.

Selection of the 49th Division Sweetheart at camp is a change in past procedure, when she was chosen by photograph prior to summer field training.

Articles Of Incorporation Of Eastland's Industrial Foundation

(ED. NOTE: This is another in a series on the Eastland Industrial Foundation, Inc. The foundation's articles of incorporation are given today and later accounts will give the by-laws and regulations, showing what the foundation can and cannot do.)

We, the undersigned natural persons of the age of twenty-one years or more, at least two of whom are citizens of the State of Texas, acting as incorporators of a corporation under the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act, do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation for such corporation.

Article one The name of the corporation is: Eastland Industrial Foundation, Inc.

Article Two The period of its duration is: Perpetual

Article Three The corporation is and shall be a non-profit corporation.

Article Four The purpose or purposes for which the corporation is organized are: To promote industrial development for the City of Eastland, Texas, and its trade territory and, in connection therewith, to exercise the general powers granted under Article 2.02 of the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act.

Article Five The post office address of its initial registered office is Eastland National Bank, Eastland, Texas, and the name of its initial registered agent at such address is H. T. Wilson.

Article Six The number of Directors constituting the initial Board of Directors is five in number and the names and addresses of the persons to serve as directors until the first annual meeting of the membership or until their successors are elected and qualified are:

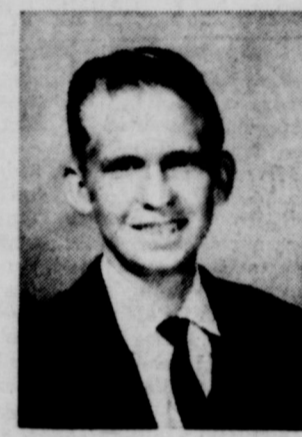

Tourism 'Think' Meeting Is Set For This Week

A special meeting will be called early this week to discuss Eastland's "search for tourists", Chamber of Commerce President James Smith has announced.

Day and time of the meeting will be announced and the chamber secretary will call members, he said.

Smith said that B. W. Robertson, chairman of the retail trade committee; Mrs. Maureen Johnson, chairman of the civic club relations committee; J. V. O'Brien, publicity; Virgil Seaberry, highway committee chairman; and Don Viergever, special events chairman, will be asked to attend.

Others will be welcome, he said, to participate in mapping Eastland's plans for the future on this important matter.

The local highway committee met with a like group from Cisco recently to discuss plans relative to Interstate 20's skirting the towns, and these members are due to meet again soon.

There Must Be a Lot of 'Gone to Texas' Signs Up

Over 11 million out-of-state visitors came to Texas to spend some \$532 million last year — and Eastland County lies adjacent to the most heavily-visited area, according to a report released by the Travel & Information Division, Texas Highway Department. Statistics and "eye-ball" observation give every reason to believe that there'll be even more in '64. Throughout the county, since schools turned out, highways have been extra crowded. This is the case on major east-west artery of Highway 80, and the north-south state roadways that slice through Eastland, Cisco and Ranger. Old timers agree they've never seen traffic heavier.

And the central part of Texas, in which this county lies, is second only to the five largest metropolitan areas in destination points for the influx of tourists, according to the Highway Department report. The report said "Central Texas — an area extending from north Dallas toward Austin and the Hill Country — proved the most popular non-metropolitan destination. A total of 7.2 per cent of those asked indicated they were headed for this area."

The Department conducted the extensive survey through its many, safety, information stops throughout the state. Eastland Countians individually and collectively, are wondering "what needs to be done to attract more of these tourists to our midst?" All agree that the county abounds in recreational facilities, lakes aplenty for fishing and water sports, golf courses, picnic areas, camping sites and a long list of other tourist-attractive diversions.

Ranger has announced plans for its oil museum and boom town, to exploit its history to good purpose. Cisco is drawing plans and will probably announce attractions soon.

The \$532 million spent by tourists represented "brand-new" money in the state (and the area where it was spent). It wasn't from existing payrolls. Everybody benefits when new money comes in, and the Department report indicates that the tourist dollar is divided up like this:

Automobile, .30; food and refreshment, .27; lodging, .24;

clothing, .09; souvenirs, post cards, etc., .04; entertainment, .03; other expenses, .02; and drugs, .01.

Where did all the tourists come from? Greatest number in 1963, the report shows was from Louisiana (13.4 per cent) followed closely by Californians, (13.2 per cent). "Everybody doesn't 'go' to California."

The Highway Department described from its survey the average tourist party like this: it consisted of three people, who spent an average of five days in the state. Average cost per day per person was \$7.85 or \$23.55 per party. The average group drove 991 miles while in the state, where .53 per cent planned to spend vacations, 29 per cent were visiting family and friends. Only 18 per cent said they were here on business. The trend is providing "your own accommodations. Six per cent were pulling their own trailers and seven per cent stated they intended to camp out."

Attraction for the most was Dallas, listed by 15.8 per cent as destination; Houston, 14.1 per cent; El Paso, 9.8; San Antonio, 9.6; and then central area 7.2 — wherein lies Eastland County.

The highways are heavy with visitors. Their number will undoubtedly increase with improved throughways — such as Interstat 20 through this county.

Now would seem to be the time for applying the three "Cs" to attract tourist in Eastland County — concentration, creativity and cooperation.

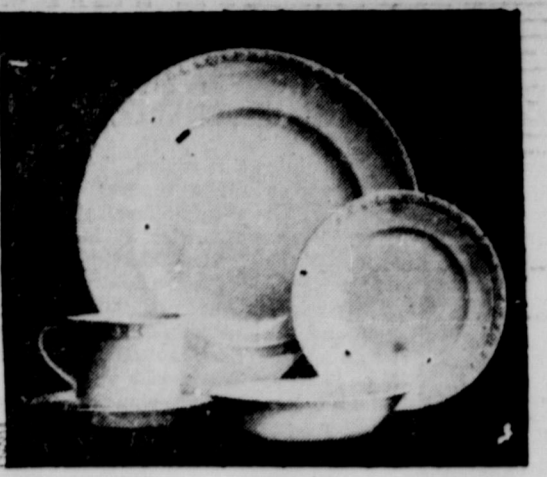

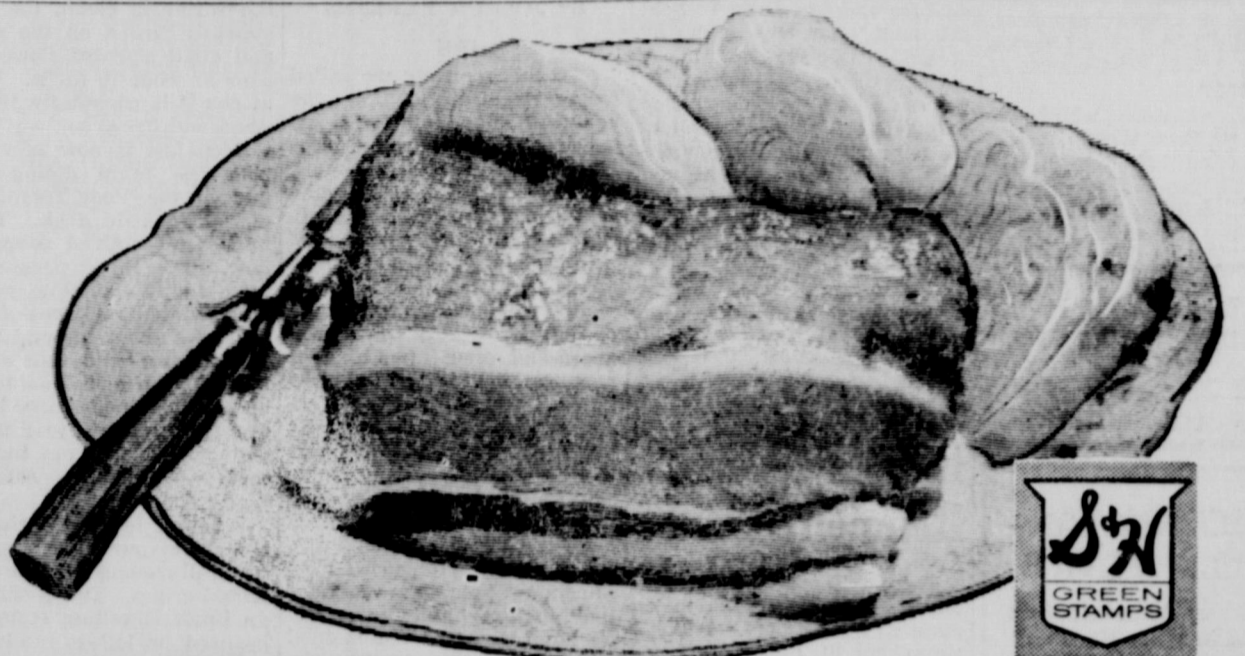

At Sea Leaving Tahiti

March 31, 1964

At 6 this morning we sailed from Papeete, leaving the beautiful island of Tahiti after our three day visit. Things that I shall always remember are the steep sided tree covered mountains that rise abruptly from the sea, the white clouds that play hide and seek around the mountain peaks, the ever changing colors of the water, sometimes green and other times blue or purple, the bright colored flowers and tall graceful coconut palms that wave gently in the breeze, and especially the happy Polynesian people who radiate happiness as they live their simple lives amid such peaceful surroundings.

Yesterday afternoon the Mormon Choir came aboard the Monterey and for nearly an hour we were entertained with singing and dancing. Up to that time I had never thought much of native dancing, either in the West Indies or the South Pacific but yesterday's performance was really beautiful. All ages performed, from children five years old to grandmothers and grandfathers. I believe that the children here are born with loose hips and a fine sense of rhythm.

On the dock of Papeete there were a dozen or more temporary booths set up for the sale of native products, shells, carved wood, beads and straw things. Prices, I noticed, were quite high when the tourists first went ashore, but two or three days later as it neared the time for the ship to sail prices were lowered considerably.

Ashore we bought postcard reproductions or paintings by Gauguin, and a few carved shells. We also witnessed an exciting bicycle race in which there must have been about fifteen contestants. The course was around several blocks in the business section of Papeete, and the local traffic police were busy keeping the streets clear for the race. I heard that the race required thirty trips around the course. There must be thousands of bicycles on the island, many with small motor attached.

As we become more acquainted with fellow passengers I am impressed with the interesting people aboard. For example, the biologist who identified the bird that came aboard in mid-ocean is going to Australia to perform a somewhat unusual service for the Australian government. Now that Australian sheep men have solved the rabbit problem and have the kangaroos pretty much under control there is another serious situation that needs correcting. Eagles prey on young lambs and are increasing in numbers as more and more sheep are being raised. This biologist and his wife are going to try to eliminate some of the eagles. We have met a good number of rich widows, retired bankers and business men and a colorful contractor who has constructed great projects throughout the world. We admire the couple who went with us to the island of Moorea on Saturday. The husband, who served on a destroyer in World War I, is blind. Tonight we will play bridge with the couple using Braille playing cards.

I neglected to mention that a few days ago, when we were a long way from land, a woman passenger asked the ship purser if the crew slept on board the ship. A few minutes later while Emily and I were in the ship's elevator I asked one of the ship's colored stewards, a fine genial fellow, what he thought of a question like that. He thought a minute and said, "That is expectable", which I thought answered nicely.

While in port the swimming pool was thoroughly cleaned and a net spread over it. This morning after we were well away from shore where

the water is clean, the deck steward turned on the water and eight streams flowed for over an hour to fill it. While at sea it is constantly replenished with fresh sea water.

Breakfast is now served in both the main dining room and in the Pool Terrace on the promenade deck. This morning I noticed something new. The Heinz people now have tomato ketchup put up in individual packages of plastic sacks about one and a half inches wide and four inches long. Each sack contains about two teaspoonful of ketchup. To use it you tear off one end and squeeze out the contents. Very nice. Attention White Elephant!

We have left the Society Islands and our next stop will be at Rarotonga in the Cook Island group. The Wells Fargo Bank is selling stamps to be used on letters mailed tomorrow from Rarotonga.

This is being written on one of three new Royal typewriters that the Royal people have put aboard this ship for use by passengers, with no fee. It is good advertising, and probably will be appreciated by the editor of the Eastland Telegram. Surface mail sent from Rarotonga will have a fine ride on this ship all the way to San Francisco before boarding a train.
