"When an emergency forces you onto the shoulder of the road, resist the impulse to lock the brakes. Pumping them gives you better control and prevents the build-up of dirt ahead of the wheels that might cause the car to overturn.

"Similarly, if a tire blows, ease up on the gas gradually: not abruptly. Wait until the car slows naturally before braking gently.

"If a heavily-loaded car seems easier to steer than usual, you've got too much weight in back of the rear axle and less actual steering control. Redistribute the weight by putting some of the heavy items further forward.

"On expressways, match your speed with that of the prevailing traffic. When exiting, don't reduce speed until you're in the deceleration lane. When entering, don't join the mainstream of traffic until you have gotten up to speed in the acceleration lane.

"Make stops on a turnpike only when absolutely necessary. Even if it means ruining a tire, keep going until you're safely far over on the shoulder or come to an emergency pull out area. If you must stop for repairs get passengers far enough away from the car so they won't be hurt if it is
