Girl Reporter Takes First Air Ride To Visit Troops In Field

A "first" airplane ride and a day in the field with the troops! That was the very interesting experience of this girl newspaper writer last Monday and Tuesday.

It was at 9 a. m. Monday, June 29, that a small military airplane landed at the Cisco Airport to take me to North Fort Hood where I was to observe Battery C, Third Battalion, 132nd Artillery, Texas National Guard in action. This battery is composed largely of men from Eastland County.

Since I had never flown before, my emotions were a little mixed as I climbed aboard the small, two seat plane, piloted by Capt. Tommy Evans, who is with the 45th in Oklahoma. Capt. Evans was unable to attend summer camp in Oklahoma so he was getting in his two weeks training with the Texas National Guard.

We traveled at 5,000-5,500 feet at 100 miles an hour. Most of the flight was smooth, until we ran into a thin layer of clouds just past De Leon, then things got rough. They say that almost everyone gets air sick their first time up, and I was no exception to the rule.

Sgt. Clifford E. Estes of Cisco met us at the airstrip. He informed me that two men in the battery had been injured and were at the infirmary. We picked up Sp4 Alva E. Farley of Cisco and Sgt. William S. Kendall, Jr., of Cuero as we headed to the field where the battery will remain until Friday morning.

As the battery was going to field Monday morning, the howitzer in which Farley and Kendall were riding hit a ditch and threw the two around inside. They were taken to south Fort Hood where they were x-rayed. Kendall sustained a small cut on his chin which required two stitches to close, and a cut on his leg. Farley suffered bruised ribs but both were expected to return to the field by Thursday.

Sgt. Estes dropped me off at battery location as he drove the two injured men to South Fort Hood.

Battery C was located some 30 miles out of North Fort Hood. The two howitzers were being readied for firing when we arrived.

Capt. Winford H. Hogan of Clyde, commander of the battery, conducted a tour which included the guns, communication center, which was manned by Sp4 George Harvey

Hull of Cisco. Sp4 Hull explained that wires had been run to battalion headquarters and post headquarters, enabling the battery commander the facilities to talk to the commanding general of Fort Hood if necessary.

The fire direction center is the hub of operations for the battery. Lt. Jimmy R. Pittman of Mineral Wells explained. Lt. Pittman said that there are three main elements to accomplish a mission, (1) the hospital last week.

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Omar Burkett, 81, Buried Following Saturday Rites

Funeral services were conducted at 10 a. m. Saturday at Hamner Funeral Chapel in Eastland for Omar H. Burkett, 81, well known Eastland County man for more than five decades, who died at 4 p. m. Thursday at Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Larry Marshall, minister of the Eastland Church of Christ, officiated in the services. Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery.

Mr. Burkett who had been in ill health for the past six months, underwent surgery at Temple recently and had been brought back to the Eastland hospital last week.

Mr. Burkett born Sept. 24, 1883, at Lampasas. In 1891, his family moved to Eastland County and, seven years later, to Callahan County, settling in a home near the site of the original Burkett Pecan Tree, now state property just east of Putnam overpass near Highway 80.

In 1906, Mr. Burkett was married to the late Katherine Pully in Cisco. She died Dec. 18, 1961. As a young man, he spent 13 years as a public school teacher in Callahan and Eastland Counties.

Mr. Burkett's long career in politics began in 1910 when he was elected Callahan County Commissioner from the Putnam precinct. He served four terms. Moving to Eastland, he served for a time as Chief of Police and then spent 15 years as a chief supervisor in this region for the Texas Railroad Commission.

'DO YOUR OWN' EVALUATING SAVES MONEY

In spite of his many duties as a county tax office employee, Assessing Deputy Edgar Altom has still found time during the past year to do an extra, money-saving service for this county.

Most counties hire outside firms to make oil and gas evaluations — but not so in Eastland County.

Mr. Altom has performed this service for the County for several years, saving the county lots of money by conservative estimates.

Having completed the oil and gas evaluations for this year Mr. Altom said, "Oil and Gas evaluations have been losing in value in Eastland County from year to year but a gain in other places, namely in utilities, which consist of pipe lines, electric, telephone company and others. This year the county dropped approximately \$48,630 in oil and gas value but the utilities showed a gain in value of \$314,430, making a net gain of \$265,800 in oil, gas

Rain Gauges Aren't Rusting In Eastland

Not that any need to be reminded, and with what surely must be the understatement of the year — it's bone-dry in Eastland County.

Everybody knows that it hasn't rain since "way back when," but for the record-watchers, here are the dry, arid facts:

In June, Eastland had .66 of an inch of rain, bringing the years total to 9.26 inches. And that, spread over six months, is hardly enough to plant peanuts with. Some have planted, others have taken their seed back and still other peanut farmers are scratching their heads and wondering if "We'll have any rain before the 10th" (of July) — considered a deadline for planting.

The years total to date is 4.56 inches below what is considered average for the first six months, and 2.47 inches below the total for the first six months of last year. Average for June 2.56 inches — far above what actually fell during the month just ended.

Of course, last year was dry too — but a six and a half inch rain in May brought that year's total up to within almost speaking distance of the total.

Eastland Water Consumption Up In June

Water consumption in the city limits of Eastland was up almost four million gallons during the month of June, City Manager Lewis Tiner said preliminary reports showed.

Hot, virtually rain-less weather and the current lower summer water rates are responsible for the increase, he said.

The City pumped 23,082,500 gallons in June, he said, compared to 19,241,430 gallons in May. That's an increase of 3,841,070 gallons — and equal to \$721.64 in water billing.

The City billed customers \$14,485.35 for June water — compared to \$13,761.71 worth of water bills sent out in May.

It will probably be mid-July before the city is billed by the Eastland County Water Supply District for water delivered to the city mains, so it's still unknown whether the city's revenue from increased water sales will be as great as first tabulations

Five Directors Manage Industrial Foundation

(ED. NOTE: This is the second in a series outlining the by-laws of the Eastland Industrial Foundation Inc. Eastland residents are being urged to clip and save the articles for permanent reference.)

ARTICLE III (Board of Directors)

Section 1. (Number and Term of Office) The business and property of the corporation shall be managed and controlled by a board of five (5) directors. The members of the Board of Directors shall be elected by ballot by plurality vote of the members at the annual meeting of the membership. Such directors shall be elected for three-year overlapping terms and until their successors shall be elected and shall qualify, and their term shall be for three years from the annual meeting of the electing them. At the time of the first meeting of the Board of Directors following incorporation, the five directors elected prior to incorporation shall draw lots to determine which one (1) of them shall serve for one (1) year, which two (2) of them shall

serve for two (2) years, and which two (2) of them shall serve for three (3) years. Thereafter at each annual meeting a new director or new directors, as the case may be, shall be elected to replace those whose terms have expired.

Section 2. (Vacancies) In case of any vacancy in the Board of Directors through death, resignation, disqualification or other cause the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of a majority thereof, may elect a successor to hold office until the next annual meeting, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. At the next annual meeting a director shall be elected for the unexpired portion of the term of the director whose seat originally became vacant.

DWIs And County Traffic Deaths

The correlation between weak-kneed punishment of drunken drivers and traffic deaths in Eastland County might be a hard thing to plot — but it does give rise to speculation.

This county is far ahead of the state average in drunk-driving/fatality ratio, records show. The Department of Public Safety figures that 50 percent of all fatal accidents involve drunk drivers in some way or other.

Eastland County doubled that percentage and batted 1,000 last year and is already

way ahead of the average this year.

There were six people killed on county roads and highways last year. Drunk driving figured in every one of the six accidents, and four were one-car accidents.

So far this year there's been five people killed in out-of-city accidents. Three accidents involved drunk driving.

What's being done? Well, four men were tried last week in 91st District Court for driving while intoxicated. All four plead guilty — two before a jury. Each of the men was fined \$50 and the

two who pleaded before the judge paid off, but the two who were heard by juries gave notice to the court, through their attorneys, that they would seek a new trial. So they probably won't pay their fines until after a lengthy decision by the court on the new trial matter.

There are three DPS DWI-felony cases pending in district court — one dates back to August of 1963. The DPS has 14 DWI cases pending in county court — one against a man with a "rap sheet" of impressive length. Oldest of the

ing) A regular annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held without other notice than this by-law, immediately after and at the same place as, the annual meeting of members. The Board of Directors may provide by resolution the time and place for the holding of additional regular meetings of the Board of Directors.
Section 4. (Special Meetings) Special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held whenever called by direction of the president, or by any two of the directors for the time being in office.
Section 5. (Notice of Meetings) The secretary-treasurer shall cause notice of the time and place of holding each meeting of the Board of Directors to be given to each director. Such notice may be in writing, in person, or by telephone.
Section 6. (Quorum) A majority of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but if at any meeting of the board there be less than a quorum present, a majority of those present may adjourn the meeting from time to time.
Section 7. (Order of Business) At meetings of the Board of Directors business shall be transacted in such order as from time to time the Board may determine by resolution.
At all meetings of the Board of Directors, the president, or in his absence the vice-president, or in the absence of both of these officers, a member of the Board selected by the members present, shall preside. The secretary-treasurer of the corporation shall act as secretary at all meetings of the board, and in case of his absence the chairman of the meeting may designate any person to act as secretary.

My plane, again piloted by Capt. Evans, left Fort Hood at 1:40 p. m., and we arrived in Cisco at 2:45 p. m. The trip home was flown at 10,500 feet, twice as high as the flight down, and was much smoother than the trip to Fort Hood. We were above the clouds, which looked like puffs of cotton. It was a beautiful sight.

The plane landing brought to an end an experience that I shall never forget.

14 cases dates to March of 1962.

One of the felony cases involves an incident in which a man was pulled, virtually uninjured, from beneath his automobile which had turned over as he drove along old U. S. 80, west of Cisco last December.

Four men, including the investigating officer, are ready to testify to the man's drunkenness.

Here's a typical DPS patrolman report of another DWI in Eastland County:

"On Sun. morning, Feb. 9, 1964, while on routine patrol on U. S. 80 east of Ranger, my partner and myself observed a Ford station wagon traveling west at a high rate of speed. We turned around and pursued said vehicle. We overtook the vehicle and checked it traveling at varying rates of speeds up to 95 m.p.h. Vehicle was being driven from one side of road to the other at frequent intervals so that we were unable to pull alongside vehicle. We pulled up behind vehicle and turned on red light and siren. At this point driver was traveling at 90 m.p.h. and it took about one mile to get subject stopped. Upon stopping, defendant was asked to step out of car; subject almost fell down as he got out and turned loose of door. Was asked for drivers license which he did not have. Upon questioning, replied that he had consumed a "bunch of beer." Subject was searched, handcuffed and put in patrol car and brought to county jail in Eastland."

and utilities for the county". He also pointed out that a number of new buildings and homes have been built in the county during the year.

In explaining how the evaluations on the oil and gas are made, Mr. Altom said that he receives reports of oil and gas from the State Comptroller Department and also well schedules from the Railroad Commission, which are used in figuring the evaluations.

Mr. Altom has worked in the tax office for about 14 years. He has been in charge of making the entire tax roll for the past five years, including the oil and gas rolls.

He does the evaluation on all of the independent school districts in Eastland County with the exception of one. This particular district hires out-of-county help to make the evaluation.

Mr. Altom was elected Tax Assessor-Collector in the Democratic Primary in May of this year and will assume those duties on January 1.

He will succeed Mr. J. C. Allison, who will have completed 14 years in the tax office at

the end of his current term. He did not seek re-election in the May primary.

Mr. Altom stated that he will continue to do the oil and gas evaluations for the county after he assumes his new duties. "I will continue to do these evaluations for the county myself if at all possible, and if not, I will get someone locally to help me", he said.

A native of Eastland County, he and his wife, Ada, make their home at 607 South Walnut in Eastland. They are active members of the First Baptist Church.

It certainly must be indigestive of the peoples' approval of Mr. Altom and the way he works, because even though he announced as a candidate for the assessor - collective post last December (as soon as he knew his present boss wasn't going to seek re-election), no one else announced for the job, and he was elected unopposed. And he polled from 200 to 500 more votes than other unopposed candidates.

lected to the Texas Legislature and served four terms as the member from this district. Later, he spent several years as an auditor for the State Comptroller. He had been retired since 1961.

Mr. Burkett was member of the Masonic Lodge at Putnam, having joined there in 1916. He was a 32nd degree Mason and was a member of Hella Temple Shrine at Dallas. He often described his hobby as "helping people."

The Burkett family home is a small farm on Highway 80 between Eastland and Cisco. His mailing address was Route 3, Cisco.

The name Burkett was given to the large round papershell pecan when, more than 60 years ago, Omar Burkett and his late brother found a tree that had a few of the big nuts on it on Battle Creek near Putnam. Their late father, J. H. Burkett, directed the boys to lead them to the tree. He took budwood from it and the papershell pecan industry was born. The elder Burkett went to become a pioneer and a state leader in the pecan industry.

It was through Omar Burkett's efforts that the original tree, which is enclosed by fence and when was fertilized under his personal supervision last winter, will long remain a historical item for tourists

to see and admire.

Surviving Mr. Burkett are two sons, Harold Burkett of Route 1, Hawley and R. W. (Bob) Burkett of Cisco; two daughters, Mrs. C. O. Goins of Topeka, Kansas, and Mrs. R. W. Nichols of Corpus Christi; eight grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Named as pallbearers were Scott Bailey, W. R. Huestis and S. A. Huestis of Cisco, Porter Woods, and Mike Collins of Eastland and I. G. Mobbly of Putnam.

forward observation post reports the location of a target to fire direction center, (2) which in turns computes the data, and (3) the fire direction center relays the information on to the gun crews. Fire direction officer is Lt. Dan Mitchell of Ranger.
Following lunch, which was prepared by Staff Sergeant Alfonso R. Gaeta of Eastland and his cooks, we visited the supply sergeant, Sgt. John Wylie of Ranger, whose duty is to see that all men have the equipment needed to work.
Since Battery C Howitzers had not received a firing order, Capt. Hogan, PFC Carrol L. Jessup of Cisco, jeep driver, and I drove to the location of Battery A, located just behind Battery C. Their 155mm howitzers were being fired at a target several miles away.
Then we drove to the observation post, located atop a rocky mountain that was almost unable to be climbed in the jeep. From the observation post, visibility was unlimited. The target being fired upon by the howitzers was some two miles from the post.
As each battery fired a round, the observation post reported how far off target they were and told them the corrections to make on their guns. As the corrections were applied, rounds were fired to see if the corrections had put the guns on target.
Going back down from the observation post, PFC Jessup had to ride his brakes to keep the jeep from coming down too fast.
We arrived back at battery

they support one cow or seven sheep to the acre. Some of the signs along the road are worth mentioning. One read "Train Crossing Road. Steady". Another, instead of reading "Give Way", read "Give Way". The business signs seem strange also. An auto body shop is a "Panelbeater", and an auto junk yard bears the sign "Car Parts". A dealer in fruit is a Fruiterer and a butcher shop is a Butchery. Longshoremen are Wharfies. And so it goes.

On our previous trip to New Zealand three years ago, we met and became well acquainted with the gentlemen who has charge of the public schools of Auckland. On our second day in Auckland we had him and his attractive wife as our guests on the Monterey for lunch. They were happy to come aboard and were interested in looking over the ship. It is now used as a home for aged, and its location is ideal for such use. Another stop was made in a city park where we found a greenhouse in which there are most beautiful begonias in bloom. There I took several pictures. All flags were at halfmast for Douglas MacArthur.

There had been a hurricane at Norfolk Island a few hundred miles north of New Zealand that day and our ship was warned of rough weather ahead. After a few hours we were clear of the islands off the north coast of New Zealand and were out in the ocean where winds were strong and there was a heavy sea. Our ship rolled and pitched and all movable furniture in the

ship's public rooms was made fast with rope. Telephones were placed in wastebaskets which in turn were tied to chairs. Our Captain Peters stayed on the bridge all night to see that all was well. Next morning we were out of the roughest seas and there were the usual number of passengers in the dining-room for breakfast.

This morning is beautiful on the Tasman Sea with bright sunshine and smooth sailing. We dock at Sydney tomorrow afternoon where we will renew our acquaintance with that delightful city of two million people.

Winter clothing and covers need correct care before storage for the summer. Proper cleaning, labeling and storage will assure that garments will be in good conditions and easy to locate when the first north-er comes next fall.

If storage space is limited, you may want to consider taking all woolen items to a professional firm for cleaning and storage. Near-zero temperature will destroy clothes moths in all stages of their development.

Make a list and jot down values of all items—one for the establishment and one for your home file.

You may give your own woolen clothing the cold treatment if you have enough space in your home freezer. First, clean the garments, seal them in heavy paper and store in the freezer for 24 hours. Then store in a closet, being sure the seal remains unbroken.

All clothing should be cleaned before storing—whatever the fabric. The storage space should be clean, free of all dust and sprayed for protection from household insects.

Woolen blankets or other woolen covers should be cleaned and sprayed with a moth spray, if not previously moth-proofed. There are many good sprays on the market, and remember to study the labels before buying.

Don't expect any washing machine to do an efficient job if it is stuffed with an overload of soiled laundry. Smaller loads and plenty of soap or detergent will give best results.

June and July are the best months to spray poison ivy. Do not delay treatment any later than August 15, because after this the plants begin to go dormant and sprays are less effective.

Use any commercial formulation of 2,4, 5-T, 2,4-D, amittrole or ammonium sulfate herbicide. Apply as directed on a day when there is little or no air movement. Early morning or late afternoon—when the air is cool and moist—is usually best.

Plants take several weeks to die and normally two or more applications are necessary to control sprouting poison ivy. Even then, keep a careful watch over the area. Plants believed dead sometime revive after many months and new seedlings may become established.

Peanut Butter Treats
2 cups white corn syrup
2 cups peanut butter
3 cups dry milk
2 cups confectioner's sugar
3 cups cake crumbs
Combine corn syrup and peanut butter. Stir in gradually dry milk and sugar. Mix until well blended an dsmooth.

Shape into thin rolls and slice into 1-inch pieces. Roll in cake crumbs.
Makes 100 cookies.

Many Homemakers put green tomatoes on a sunny window sill to ripen. They shouldn't. Too much sunlight prevents development of normal, even color. Immature green tomatoes won't ripen in the sun and are likely to rot if kept there too long. The best way to ripen picked tomatoes is in the cellar or garage—some place where the temperature is from 60 to 70 degrees F. Light is not needed to produce good red coloring in underripe tomatoes.

using spray starches, here are some helpful hints:
Shake the can vigorously before every use.
Protect the ironing board cover and any nearby furniture. It's difficult to keep the spray in a small area.
If the can has been standing without use for more than a day spray the first burst of starch into the sink.
Clean the soleplate of your iron often so the starch will not scorch on the iron.
When cooking cheese, keep the heat low. Cheese needs just enough heat to melt and blend with other ingredients. High heat or over-cooking will make cheese tough and stringy.

Whole-meal sandwiches are quickies for lunch. Cheese is a sandwich favorite that combines with so many foods for interesting combinations. Try this triple-decker open-face: Toast a slice of bread, spread untoasted side with butter. Add a spoonful of baked beans, cover with a slice of cheddar cheese and top with Bermuda or sweet onion sliced thin. Place sandwich under the broiler until the cheese melts.

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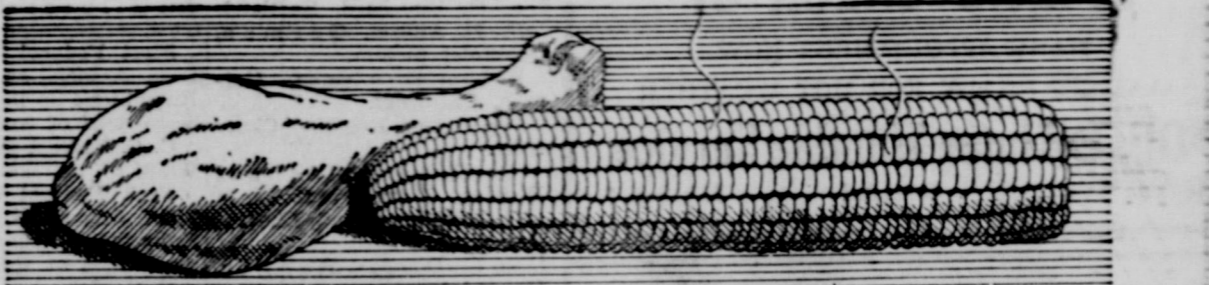

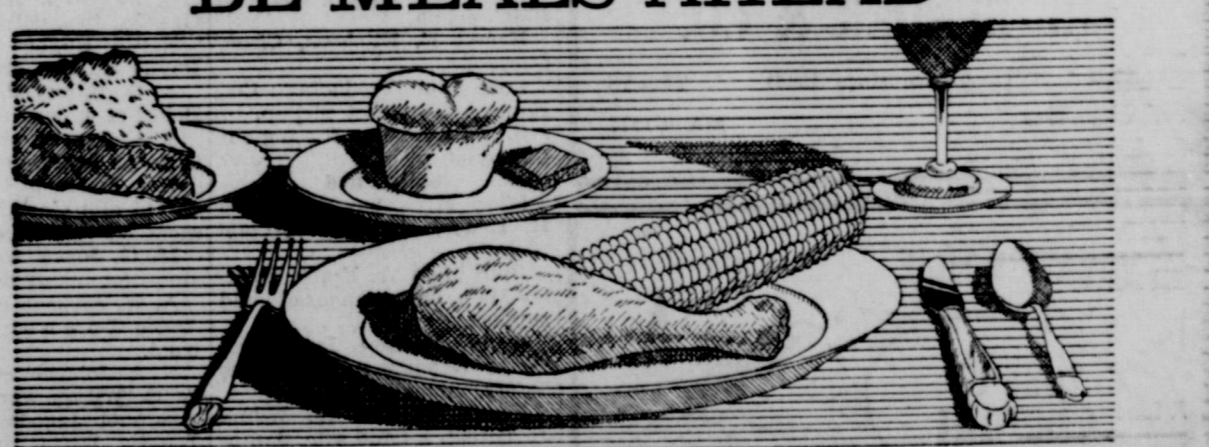

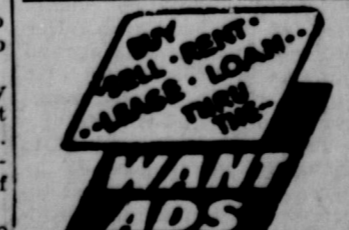

Residents at Lake Leon are warned to be on the lookout for deadly coral snakes. Mrs. E. N. Varner called The Times Thursday morning and reported that she and her husband discovered one at their lake residence Wednesday night.

The couple checked Thursday morning and discovered the reptile was deadly poisonous. The coral snake is small, scarcely ever over two feet long and is ringed with yellow markings.

Some other species of small reptiles closely resemble the coral, Mrs. Varner said. The coral, however, may be identified when the yellow and red bands are joined.

"All of us around Lake Leon might remember the Boy Scouts' slogan," Mrs. Varner reminded. It's "Red and yellow will kill a fellow."
