County Has 8 Accidents In April; 3 Deaths to Date

Eastland County had one traffic death during the month April, according to the rural monthly traffic accident summary released by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The county had two personal injury accidents, five property damage accidents, and four injured, for a total of eight accidents during the month.

Eastland County ranks third in the Eastland Sergeants area in the amount of property damage with \$4,270.

Four counties, Callahan, Eastland, Shackelford and Stephens, each had one fatal accident in the Eastland sergeants area during April.

Accidents in April for the Eastland Sergeants office area totaled 50 with four fatal accidents, 13 personal injury, 29 property damage, and 17 injuries. Sergeant Roger Sosebee is sergeant for the Eastland, Shackelford, and Stephens counties.

A comparison of rural traffic accidents in the Abilene Area of the Texas Department of Public Safety for the first four months of 1964 with the same period of 1963 shows that Eastland County has had three fatal accidents for 1964 compared to two for the four month period in 1963.

Property damage is lower for this year, \$27,000 compared to \$41,000 in 1963. Personal injury accidents were 12 for 1964 compared to 16 for 1963; property damage accidents are up from 34 in 1963 to 44 for 1964; total accidents are up from 52 in 1963 to 59 for 1964; and the injured total 20 for 1963 and 33 for 1963.

Glaucoma Screening 7 Days Away --Sunday, May 17, in Eastland Gym

Next Sunday, May 17, is an important date for Eastland County and area citizens who are over 40 years of age.

Free Glaucoma Detection Screenings (eye tests for glaucoma) will be held from 2 p. m. to 5:30 p. m. in the gymnasium of the Eastland High School, in an attempt to track down unknown cases of glaucoma, one of the leading causes of blindness among adults over 40.

The glaucoma detection tests are sponsored by the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness and the Lions Clubs of Eastland, Ranger and Cisco, in cooperation with the Eastland County Medical Society and local health departments.

Administering the simple and painless tests will be members of the Eastland County Medical Society and Dr. James C. Whittington of

Fort Worth, and formerly of Eastland, all of whom are serving as volunteers as a public service. They will be assisted by local volunteer nurses.

Dr. B. B. Alexander of Eastland and Dr. Whittington are medical chairmen of the project.

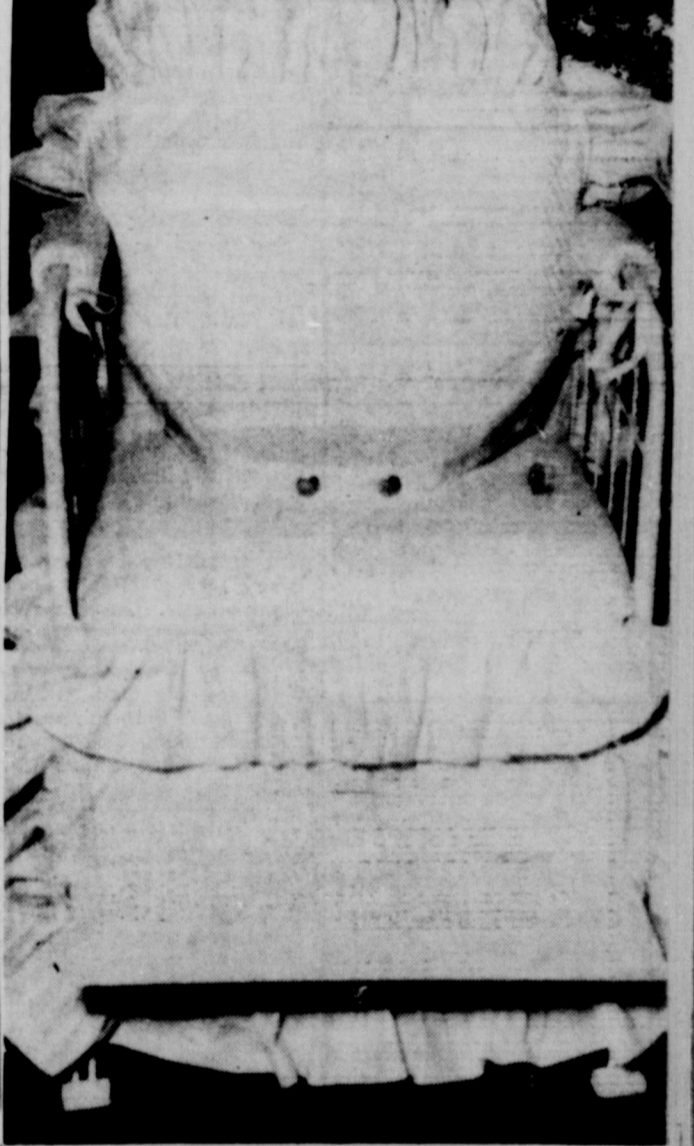

Local Woman Has Patent On Remarkable Infant Chair

A very talented lady in Eastland is Mrs. Mattie B. (Martha) Hubbard of 205 N. Daugherty St., and some youngsters are going to be "sitting pretty" because of her.

Mrs. Hubbard received a 17-year patent March 31st on an "Infants Seat and Bed" which she has designed. She started work on her invention on December 15, 1960, and completed it on May 5, 1961.

The Infants Seat and Bed is designed to give the baby all of the comforts and conveniences of home. Mrs. Hubbard said that she conceived the idea for the chair when she thought of all the things that must be taken along when you travel with an infant.

The framework of the seat and bed is of wire and it is lined with plastic covered cushions. It will fold down and make a bed; it has a safety belt and may be used as a car seat for baby; storage compartment underneath can be used to put a plastic bath tub which will hold bottles, diapers, linens for the bed and other supplies; the removable foot rest may be placed across the arms to form a high chair for baby; the ex-

tension rack that makes the bed may be taken off to make a carrier for baby; and the chair may be used as a trailing chair.

Mrs. Hubbard states that the seat and bed is now ready for purchasers or manufacturers.

Aside from the invention which she has designed, Mrs. Hubbard is very talented in making things from copper coated wire.

Chamber Transfers Option To New Industrial Foundation

Ownership by Eastland of Hollywood - Vassarette's building and grounds is presently moving toward reality.

The chain of events which it is hoped will result in the local ownership of the key industry's physical plant began last week.

The firm which now holds title to the building and site contacted an Eastland Chamber of Commerce executive and asked if the chamber would be interested in exercising its option to buy the facilities now.

The building, located just off West Main St. on College St., was built in 1956 by an Abilene contracting firm which gave the chamber the option of buying the building, effective Oct. 1, 1966. Eastland citizens and firms bought Industrial Fund Certificates at that time to make this possible.

Hollywood-Vassarette, a division of Munsingwear Inc., has leased and occupied the building since June of 1956.

Ownership of the building early this year was transferred to a Dallas financial concern through a foreclosure proceeding against the contractor, but the Eastland

Chamber retained its option rights as a part of the original contract.

In order to raise funds, the Dallas firm offered the chamber the opportunity of exercising its option 29 months ahead of schedule.

The board of directors met Monday afternoon, and it was agreed by these men that the opportunity afforded its recently-organized Industrial Foundation, Inc., a handsome chance to acquire much-needed assets.

The board voted unanimously to transfer the option right to the Foundation, and negotiations are currently underway to acquire the ownership of the building and site by the Foundation.

Such assets will enable the Foundation to explore and expand further industrialization of the city, a Foundation spokesman said.

Don Vieregger, a director and local manager for Hollywood-Vassarette, said at the meeting that his company will be happy that the ownership of the facilities will be in Eastland.

Among the initial negotiations will be that of considering new lease agreements with the company, it is said.

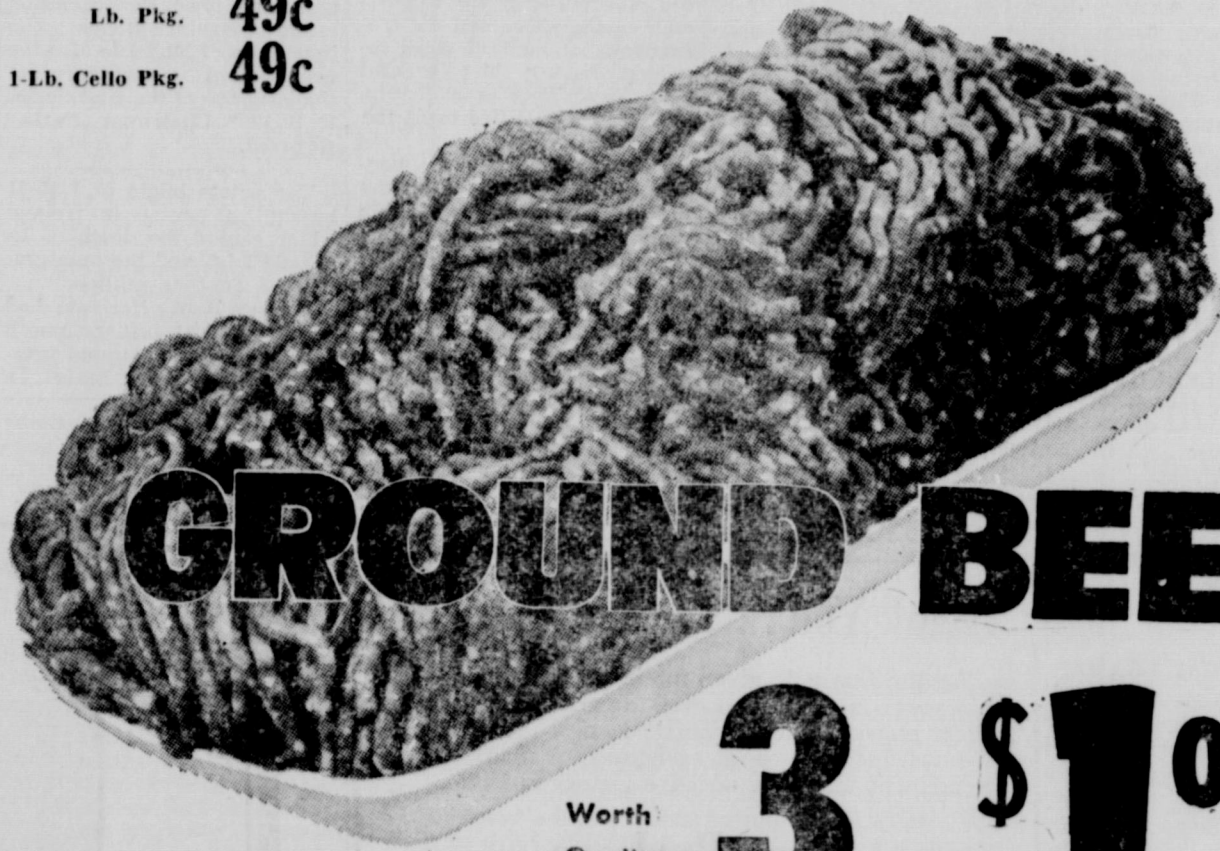

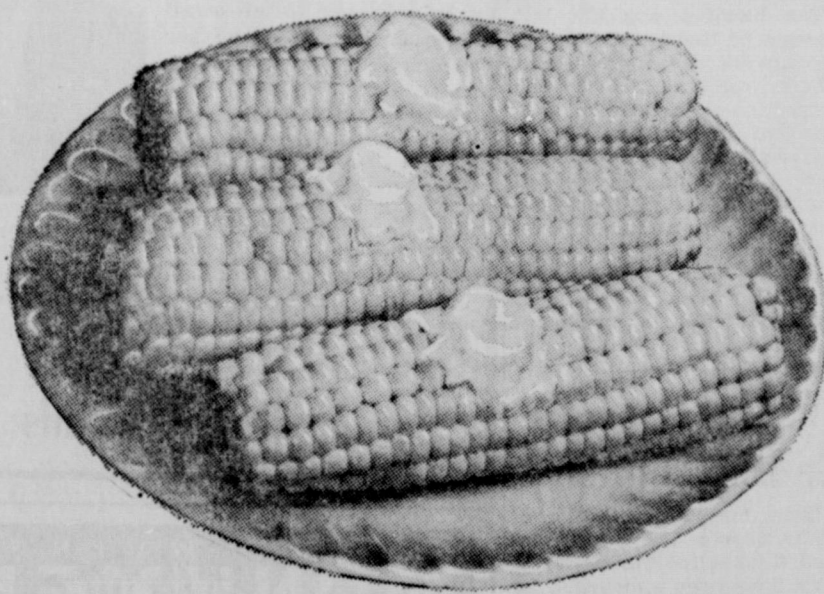

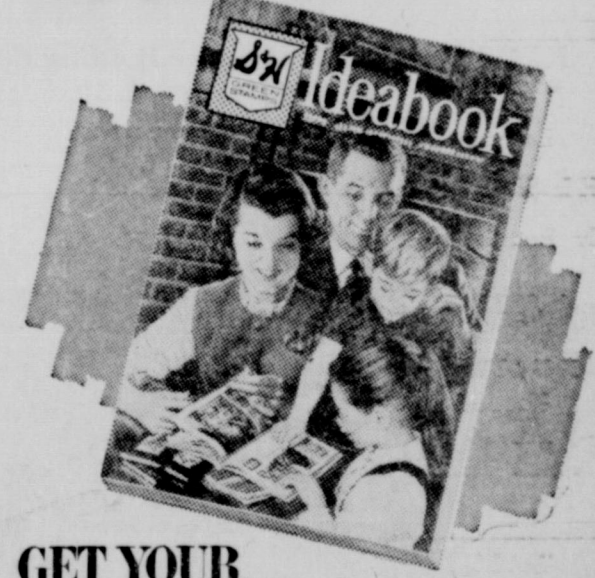

May 15 Deadline To Sign Up For Wheat Program

The deadline for signing up for the 1964 voluntary wheat program is May 15, according to Emmett E. Powell, county office manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Eastland.

Mr. Powell announced that since the program is voluntary, those wishing to participate will need to sign an application. The following benefits under the new program were outlined by Mr. Powell to wheat producers who participate:

Payments for diverting wheat acres. Price support through loans and purchases.

Cashable certificates for planted wheat. Part of the certificates will have a cash value of 70 cents per bushel and part at 25 cents per bushel, payable at the County AS CS office. These certificates will not accompany wheat to the market. This payment is based on normal yield and not on production. Farmers do not have to harvest planted wheat in order to be eligible for the certificates.

Sales in Texas for the first quarter of 1964 amounted to \$16,181,153, which represents 26.6 per cent of the state goal of \$150,000,000.

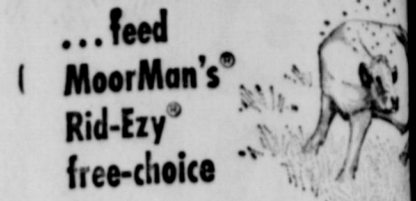

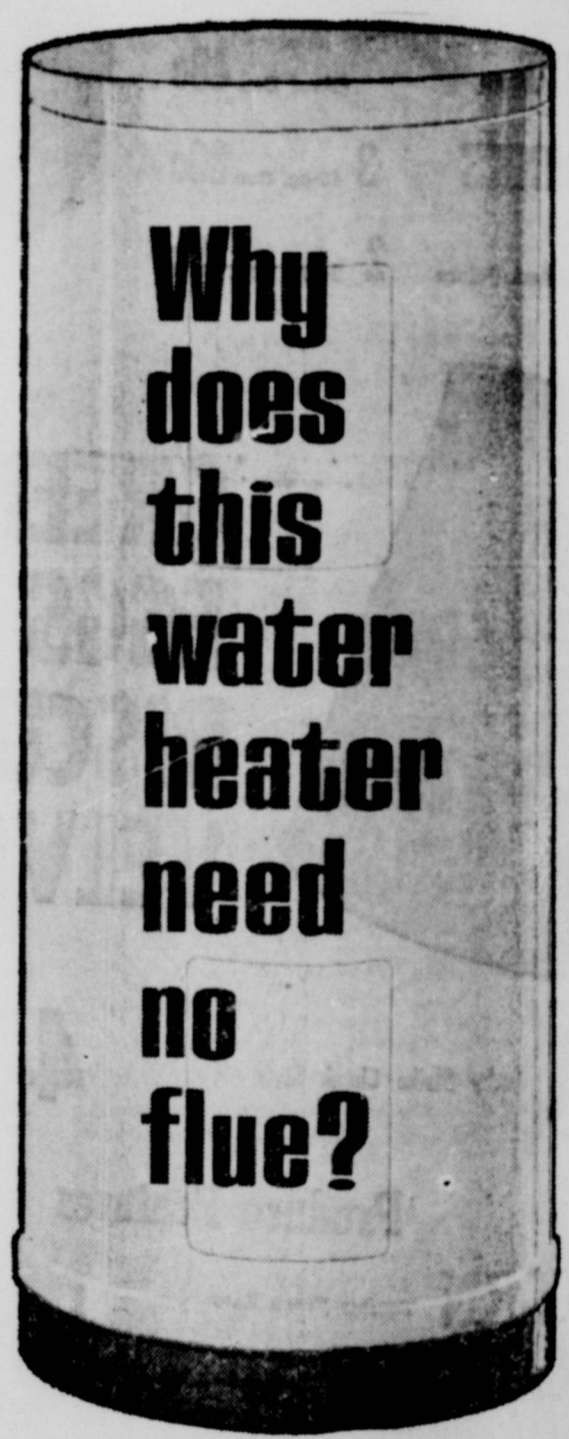

by the plant, take particular care not to come in contact with poison ivy plants. Neither should pets be allowed to run through the plants as the toxin can be transferred on their feet.

Do not burn leaves and trash that contain poison ivy plants. Should contact be made with poison ivy, wash the contaminated parts of the body thoroughly with soap and water. Neither should contaminated clothing be worn until it is washed.

With care, ammate will satisfactorily control all growth forms of poison ivy without danger to other plants or the soil. The chemical is also safe for use around animals and humans.

(Continued from Page One) Cisco Lions president, are urging all area residents who are 40 years of age or older to take advantage of these FREE glaucoma tests.

"Glaucoma is often called the sneak thief of sight, because a person may have it and yet not even be aware of it. The disease can rob one of his sight, most often without warning and without pain," Mr. O'Dell said.

One out of every eight blind persons is a victim of glaucoma, statistics of the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness show. Practically all of them may have had normal sight most of their lives, but sometime during their forties, fifties, or sixties, they became victims of the disease.

Glaucoma, in effect, squeezes the sight out of one's eyes. Increased fluid pressure in the eyeball is like that of increased air pressure in an automobile tire. This pressure damages the seeing parts of the eye.

Sight destroyed by glaucoma cannot be restored, but, if treatment is started early, medical science can check the progress of glaucoma. Thus, for each month that a glaucoma victim postpones treatment, he may lose a small but priceless percentage of his sight — a gift which he can never reclaim.
