27 Years Ago Friday

Newspaper wars with toad and anti-toad stories raged across the nation for months. Even until this good day the Story of Old Rip will touch off an argument at the drop of a hat. There are any number of people who are staunch believers in the fact that Old Rip slept in the corner stone of the Eastland County Court House from 1897 until February 28, 1928, and there are just as many who don't believe a word

At any rate, there are eyewitnesses who saw the creature removed from his 31-year tomb, and they are not among the doubters. Rip got to be so famous that he was even toadnapped once by an exhibitor who had a fast hand and an

Rip passed away. He was discovered by Mrs. Will Wood, Abilene. whose husband, as a boy, had been playing with the toad 31 years before when his daddy, Ernest Wood, thought of putting it into the stone.

Ben Hamner embalmed the body and secured a casket, toad size, from National Casket Company of Fort Worth, which became Old Rip's final resting place as hundreds of travelers still stop each year to view his body in the foyer of the Eastland County Court House.
