



Judge Makes New Plea For Drouth Relief

Disappointment was expressed Friday by County Judge Scott Bailey because Eastland County has been denied aid under the emergency drought relief program.

In commenting upon the action, Judge Bailey expressed the opinion "that we must seek every possible avenue of relief." The Eastland County official has written the Farmers Home Administration and urged that qualified farmers and ranchers be extended low-interest loans through that governmental agency.

In the letter to the FHA, Bailey stated that "it is my feeling that the severe and extended drought conditions prevailing at this time make it imperative that all avenues of possible help be sought. For this reason, I am respectfully urging that Eastland County be declared a disaster area and qualified borrowers be served through your office."

Farmers who have not planted at least 75 per cent of their 1964 cotton and peanut allotments due to extreme drought conditions or other conditions beyond their control may file written requests that the planting provisions be waived, according to an announcement by Jesse G. Meredith, Eastland County office manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, made earlier this week.

Requests concerning cotton allotments must be filed not later than Sept. 15, and peanut farmers must file by Nov. 1, Mr. Meredith said. Questions about the provision can be answered at his office.

Feed grain farmers were reminded that in order to qualify for price support and diverted acreage payments, the feed grain base or permitted acreage may not be exceeded on any farm in which they have an interest. They must also be within their conserving base on participating farms, Mr. Meredith said.

State Youth Conference -- Viewed by Local Y President

(Editors Note): The following is an account of the Attorney General's Youth Conference, written by Jimmy Wright, president of Hi-Y in Eastland. He was one of the featured youth leaders at the Conference, serving as Master of Ceremonies at one of the General Assemblies.)

I wish to express my thanks to the YMCA of Eastland for sending me to Austin for the Attorney General's Second Annual Youth Conference.

The Attorney General's Youth Conference was an excellent meeting. I sincerely wish that every youth in Eastland would have to go to one just like it. It was an extremely interesting meeting. The most amazing thing to me was the fact that the youth of Texas dig it all. They organized the whole meeting. (Of course they were under the supervision of Attorney General Carr.)

Our day started out with a 6:00 reveille. We all went by bus to the Municipal Auditorium where we ate breakfast. Immediately following breakfast, the whole conference got together for a General Assembly consisting of speeches from some of the leading people in the nation. These included Attorney General Carr, an assistant to J. Edgar Hoover, Homer Garrison, Speaker of the House Byron Tunnell. (I had the extreme pleasure of sitting on the speakers stand of the House with General Carr and Speaker Tunnell.)

After these opening assemblies we divided into smaller groups. (1600 people could hardly accomplish much in

the same group). In these different groups we heard several youth of Texas talk about different phases of crime. After the speeches from the youth, we had a discussion session in which we all told the problems of our own community. Believe it or not, most of the discussions had the protruding fact of apathy in the communities.

This would certainly hold true here in Eastland County. How much interest have you shown the community? I hope not as little as I have shown. I plan, however, in the future to do everything I possibly can. You may say "Well, it is not that important, it is just 'kid stuff'." Let me tell you, my good friends of Eastland County, if it is just kid stuff someone had best get busy playing around with 'kid stuff'. .69 Inch Rain In July Brings Total To 9.95

Rainfall in July totaled .69, according to Official Weather Observer James K. Smith. On July 20th, .57 of precipitation fell and on the 30th, .12 was recorded, bringing the total to .69 for the month of July.

Although July was hot and dry this year, it was wetter compared to last year when only .11 was recorded. Average for July is 1.74.

Total rainfall for the first seven months is 9.95 inches—5.64 inches below an average of 15.59.

Smith quoted an official temperature of 110 degrees in Eastland Thursday, August 6th.

Steadily growing in importance in Eastland County is the over-65 segment of its population. This group, which has been increasing more rapidly than the population as a whole, has also been gaining in financial strength.

As a result, it is becoming a sales target for retail merchants, manufacturers and others who are making efforts to cater to its special tastes and needs.

A wide range of products, designed for men and women over 65, is now available to them.

Recent studies of the old-age market and its composition have been conducted on a national basis by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and by other agencies.

They show that there are now over 17,600,000 people in the United States over 65, or 1,000,000 more than there were a mere four years ago. It represents a gain of 6.2 per cent.

The 1960 census showed for Eastland County, a total of 3,668 in the plus-65 bracket, 1,672 of them men and 1,996 women.

The present estimate applying the average rate of change

locally, sets the number at 3,895 as of the beginning of this year.

Because of this rapid growth rate, the older people in Eastland County comprise a larger part of the total population than ever before, 18.8 per cent.

This compares favorably with the ratio in other parts of the United States, 9.2 per cent, and with the 8.4 per cent in the West South Central States.

The American Medical Association declares that "older persons are much better off economically, mentally and physically than some people seem to think."

They are arriving at age 65, it notes, with more zest and ability to do things than was the case a generation ago. Many of them continue in their regular occupations for a number of years thereafter.

The report states that the average senior citizen has much less cash at his disposal than younger people have, but that his financial condition is improving.

In the last 15 years, because of better pensions, larger social security payments and personal investments, his income expressed in current dollars, has gone up 25 per cent.

Eastland County was well represented at the appreciation dinner honoring U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough held in the grand ballroom of Hotel Texas in Fort Worth Friday evening, Aug. 7.

Eastland Countians attending included Mrs. Ann Justice and Mrs. Jeanette Harris of Eastland; County Judge Scott Bailey, Mr. and Mrs. Grady Hogue, Clarence Dill and Richard Moore of Cisco; and Mrs. Maybelle Oyler and Mrs. Elizabeth Bush of Ranger.

They report over 1,200 persons attended the \$10-per plate dinner and said "it was one of the most enthusiastic Democratic get-togethers since the 1960 campaign."

"For the first time," a spokesman for the group said, "the Eastland County delegation as well as others were faced with pickets—'extremists.' The picketing, though peaceful, was irritating."

Charged With Grand Larceny

Grapes of Wrath: They Didn't Know the Truck Carried \$5,000 Cargo

Two Dallas men are free under \$5,000 bond after having been charged with grand larceny in the court of Justice of Peace M. D. Underwood in Ranger.

Friday morning about 11 a.m., an eastbound trucker, A. J. Adams of Cutn' Shoot, Tex., stopped off at Ranger Hill Cafe & Service Station, Highway 80 east.

He was driving a new \$25,000 Chevrolet diesel refrigerator truck and while in the restaurant he was amazed to

see the vehicle pull out and roar eastward on the highway.

Police Chief Bill Ogden and Constable Ralph Veal were quickly summoned, but the officers were unable to spot the speeding eastbound truck. A pickup order went out via radio.

Two hours later, about 1 p.m., the truck was stopped at Stephenville by the Texas Highway Patrol, and Ranger was notified of the pickup.

Constable Veal and Justice of Peace Underwood went to Stephenville where the two men—William Eugene Moss and James Richard Ash—were placed under arrest.

The pair, described as auto "bounty hunters" by Justice of Peace Underwood, had already engaged legal counsel prior to the Ranger men's arrival in the Erath County seat.

They had presumed the vehicle empty. Unfortunately it had cargo aboard—\$5,000 worth of grapes which Adams was hauling from California into Texas.

Constable Veal and Underwood charged the men with grand larceny for theft of the fruit.

Adams said he was about six weeks behind on payments on the truck.

He said the men began following the vehicle at Lordsburg, N.M. He was, however, unaware that they planned to heist the truck.

The Dallas pair probably will appear before the Eastland County grand jury during the October term, Underwood said.

I would give anything if we could promote such a convention here. It would do everyone so much good. My friends this is not 'kid stuff'. This has to have something done about it — today.

We had the privilege of hearing four Huntsville inmates speak at a General Assembly. Each one of those convicts told a heartbreaking story. They told of their younger years. They told about how they wished they had had some type of help in their younger years. You say that you had no help in your younger years? You did not have half the temptations that we as a younger generation have. I know what type we have. If you are interested in the youth of Eastland County, please contact me. Let us get together and talk it over.

It was very embarrassing for me in some respects. The youth of Texas were talking about school clubs and the like that I have never heard of, simply because we do not have them. The various clubs need to be brought to our attention. We need to set together as youth and decide how we can help pay for the right to be Americans. We have absolutely no right to forfeit the freedoms and the respect that was given us by citizens much better and bigger than you or I. We should cherish this freedom; this freedom does not continue through apathy toward youth. That boy or girl you picked up out of the gutter today may be the President of the United States of America tomorrow. Why not pick him up? If you were to see a man drowning, sinking into a clean pool of water, you would not merely shove him under further, you would try to help him out. Leave him in and his remains make the water become stagnant and impure and a burden upon the users of the water. Let us get together and be the type of people that are not mad of apathy. Let us be Christian Americans working together for ourselves and future generations. Let us be proud Americans in a proud America.

It's Been A Pretty Busy Summer In Eastland County, Texas, USA

August is nearing the midpoint and Eastland countians are sweltering to the close of another summer. It's been a big summer in this little central Texas county with the exciting and mysterious discovery of a skeleton, the usual number of beauty contests, weddings, engagements, births, deaths, and other news matter.

Big news in the county went to the peanut farmers who suffered through an excruciating drought. Other news, looking back through the files, went something like this:

June 4 — Eastland's Chamber of Commerce banquet was planned for Lone Cedar Country Club with Lawyer Bob Murphy of Nacodoches as guest speaker. The annual Lone Cedar Country Club golf tourney was planned with \$2,100 in prizes to be given, and the primary run-off featured three contests: congressman at large, county sheriff and commissioner of precinct one.

June 7 — Noel Patterson, regional controller of the Post Office Department, of Dallas spoke at the annual Flag Day services held Saturday on the Post Office lawn. Mrs. Joe Stephens, longtime Eastland elementary school teacher, retired, and Rev. Cyrus Barcus, pastor of the First Methodist Church was assigned to remain at his church in the Methodist assignments.

June 11 — L. E. Sublett was elected county sheriff in the

Saturday run-off primary. Woods was named commissioner and incumbent Joe Pool carried Eastland County over opponent Baker.

June 14 — The Lone Cedar golf tourney attracted a field of 106 contestants. Great Plains conservationists met and toured the county.

June 21 — Qualifying rounds began for medal aspirants in the 14th annual Lakeside Country Club Golf Tournament. By-laws for Eastland's new industrial foundation were cited in the county newspapers. Eastland County National Guardsmen left for two weeks of summer camp at Fort Hood near Killeen.

July 2 — Rives McBea, Fort Worth, won the Lakeside Country Club golf tourney. Plans were made for the Ranger Junior Chamber of Commerce rodeo and plans were also made for the annual Eastland County Sheep and Goat Field Day held in Ranger.

July 5 — James Reid was promoted to vice president and comptroller at the Eastland National Bank; Grover Hallmark to vice president and Mike Collins to cashier. The horrible drought continued in Eastland County, and longtime Eastland Countian Omar Burkett, 81, died.

July 9 — Investigation by Eastland County sheriff and police authorities began as an unidentified, unburied skeleton was found at the Yellow Mound Community near East-

land. A Missouri man was apprehended near Eastland with a stolen car and forged credit cards.

July 12 — The county drought was proclaimed the most serious in the history of the county, according to J. M. Cooper, county agent. The area brotherhood rally was planned for the First Baptist Churches. And the Medics were named city champions in little league play. Football boys were urged to get their physicals early and the farm bureau began plans for a queen contest for Aug. 20th.

July 16 — Eastland Elementary School, new and shining, was announced as ready for completion on Aug. 15, and the county grand jury probed a July 4 slaying in Ranger. Firemen halted a huge blaze at Lake Leon and Henry Pullman gave the program at the Rotary Club.

July 19 — Bids were asked on the Highway 206 project south of Cisco, the skeleton discovered near Eastland was found to be that of a Mexican ranch laborer, Jesse Torres, whose wife resides in Quanah now, and the new high school gymnasium was announced to be completed by the end of the summer. The B. W. Robertsons of Robertsons Radio and TV Repair Service were named winners of a free trip to the New York World's Fair.

July 23 — The Eastland Chamber of Commerce asked for entries in their tourist attraction idea contest. West Ward old elementary school building was being demolished and the Little League All-Stars made plans to battle Albany for area championship.

July 26 — The All-Stars throttled Breckenridge and made plans to play in district competition at Coleman. The Abilene Reporter-News carried a fitting tribute to an outstanding Eastland resident — Judge Clyde Grissom. The president and the governor were asked for drought help and emergency drought benefits were sought for stockmen and farmers of the county.

July 30 — Hamner Funeral Home was sold to a local corporation, the sub-division plat was approved by commissioners of the county and the Eastland All-Stars were matched with Cisco for district championship at Coleman. Cecil Ruby, a man with a big business and a heart to match, contributed 2,000 ton of crushed rock delivered on the spot for roads for the new Eastland elementary school.

August 2 — Livestock feed request was denied by the disaster group, the Little League All-Stars won the runner-up title and a handsome gold engraved trophy in district competition at Coleman, sending Ranger's spirited team to regional competition in Lubbock. Gilbert Meredith assumed duties as the new ASC manager.

August 6 — It was announced that unplanted land due to drought won't penalize area farmers and a second appeal was made to the State Disaster Group and Jan Taylor was named to represent the city of Eastland at the De Leon Peach and Melon Festival. Betty Easter and Carolyn Key were named as farm bureau queen contestants and Mole O'Day in Eastland planned a grand reopening celebration. Chamber of Commerce winners in the Eastland tourist attraction contest were named and checks presented to Mrs. A. E. Cushman, Mrs. Dick Yielding and Karen Taylor.

And that's about the way the summer summed it up so far, with still a month left before school starts; and in a jumping little county like Eastland County, you never can tell what may happen. It might even rain!

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Eastlander Recounts Tasmanian Vacation

We are back on the mainland again, but before writing of it I still have things to say about beautiful Tasmania and its charming folks.

Last Saturday we were the guests of Nan Chauncy, her husband and daughter, in their home at Chauncy Vale, a thousand acre wild-life sanctuary in the bush, about twenty-five miles from Hobart. Nan Chauncy is the outstanding author in Australia of children's books, and they are widely read throughout the world. After meeting the Chauncy family in their rustic home I can understand why children love her stories, because she lives in and has an intimate knowledge of the Tasmanian bush, with its wild animals in the mountains and along the sea coast. Her stories are full of adventure.

At noon we were served a delicious lunch of meat, salads, vegetables, fruit, and an apple crunch pudding with rich whipped cream made from goats milk. Then came the afternoon walk through the woods to some caves high up on a sandstone cliff overlooking the narrow valley. Later in the afternoon we returned to the house and visited awhile before a cheerful open wood fire, where the two Great Danes, fine family pets, were sprawled out on two sheepskins near the hearth. It was sundown when we left the interesting home with its lovely people, and returned to Hobart.

On Sunday more friends drove us out into the country to show us the Derwent River with its poplar trees now bright yellow in their autumn colors. In the river we saw hundreds of black swans and the young cygnets. We also visited some of the apple orchards with low trees so full of apples that the branches were propped up with sticks. Before returning to Hobart we visited old churches and the oldest stone bridge in all Australia. It is at Richmond, built by convicts in 1825.

Hobart is a delightful city situated at the mouth of the Derwent River, with Mount Wellington's 4 thousand foot summit in the background. In this most southern Australian city we found true southern hospitality in the three lively private homes that we visited.

Early Monday morning we started for western Tasmania, a sparsely settled wild region in which there are several operating metal mines. We went by bus up the Derwent Valley to near its headwaters, through thick forests over steep narrow winding roads.

Great areas of western Tasmania have never been explored and doubtless there are minerals and timber yet to be exploited. There are wonderful opportunities for geological exploration and I wish I were fifty years younger! Late in the afternoon we arrived at the old mining town of Queenstown. There I visited the Mt. Lvall copper mine, now producing.

Next morning we took another bus for Devonport. Our road again a crooked and narrow one which climbed up steep grades and descended into narrow valleys. Much of the time we were in dark forests of big gum and pine, and sometimes we were in green tunnels as the tree branches overhead arched entirely across the narrow road.

Occasionally we met a log truck carrying logs thru to four feet in diameter. After the first hundred miles we were in more open country where we found large blocks of sheep. I noticed some unusual gateposts at a ranch estate. They were about five feet high and made of round logs two feet in diameter! The bus made frequent stops at mining town post offices as it carried the Royal Mail.
