### Progress Report

## West Ward Building Being Demolished -- South Ward to 'Wait'

The walls of West Ward are coming down. Demolition of the sturdy old building is moving fast and is expected to be completed on contract schedule. The school board awarded contract for demolition to the Brown Wrecking and Lumber Co. of Abilene, and the contract, dated July 1, is for 60 days on the West Ward building. John E. Brown is in charge of the local project.

Contract was for the demolition of both West and South Ward buildings, but school officials are going to "hold off" a little on tearing down the South Ward plant "just in case" something should go amiss and prevent the moving into the brand new elementary plant as soon as planned. No such delay is foreseen, but officials agreed it's better to be safe than "building-less at the last minute."

Terms of the demolition contract call for the wrecking firm to be paid \$445.75 on completion of the contract and have salvage rights to all that comes out of the building, except certain usable fur-

nishings, Supt. Wendell Siebert said. The Brown firm is operating under a \$5,000 performance bond and is insured with \$50,000-\$100,000 liability, in case of accident. The board is also holding a \$500 cashier's check, executed by the company when it submitted its bid. There were two other bidders — one asked \$7,000 and the other, a Midland firm that has done business in Eastland before, asked salvage rights. All the usable furniture has been removed from the buildings for use in the new plant, Siebert said. A little new furniture (Continued on Page Two)

## L. W. Mitchell Found Dead; Rites Tuesday

Funeral services for L. W. Mitchell, 73, were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday in the Hamner Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Haston Brewer, pastor of the First Baptist Church officiating. Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery.

Mr. Mitchell was found dead in his bed at the Old Eastland Hotel at 6 a. m. Sunday, July 19. Born Jan. 31, 1891, he was a concrete and rock mason before retiring several years ago. He had lived in Eastland since 1921 and was a member of the First Baptist Church. Survivors include three daughters Mrs. Gracie Lee Moore and Mrs. Dixie Pontremoli, both of Brea, Calif.; and Mrs. Betty Joe Scott of Fort Worth; three sons, Evan Mitchell of Eastland, L. W., Jr. of Odessa and Roy Ray of Fort Worth; seven grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

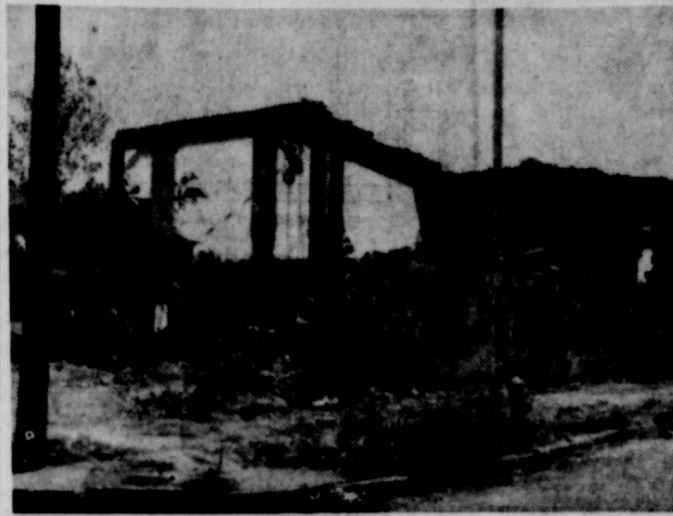

## Eastland Countians In Never-Ending Struggle To Beat Torrid Temps

So the song goes, but it looks from here, where we sit square in front of an air-conditioner with a glass of lemonade in one hand and a block of ice beneath us, that the livin' is getting harder and harder—just trying to stay cool and beat the heat. These are the dog days, so named for reasons no one seems to know for sure. Maybe because only a dog could survive in the desert-like heat or because this is the time of year the mad dog is common. Anyway, the name fits. It's

summertime in Eastland County, and to make things worse, we are in the midst of one of the most scorching droughts in the history of the area. Everyone tries to stay in, and those who are out are usually heading for the lake with a boat and trailer hitched to station wagon loaded with kids, the wife, the dog, a thermos of ice water and a hamper of picnic goodies. The lake or the swimming pool are favorite spots, because submerged it's just a few degrees cooler than it is in the shade. ## Rotary Dist. Governor Challenges Local Club

"The best Rotary club is the one that thinks it can do better," District Governor Dr. C. J. Dodsworth told the Eastland Rotary Club Monday, and urged the members to get active in more "hand" projects, and fewer "purse" projects. Gov. Dodsworth, a Bowie dentist, spoke for the local

club at its regular luncheon meeting at the White Elephant Restaurant. Local President Dr. Cyrus Barcus presided and introduced the visiting speaker.

Quoting from the International President's program, Dr. Dodsworth that Rotarians everywhere have been charged to "live Rotary" in four areas — by sharing Rotary (extension of members and clubs); in business relations; through community leadership; and through world fellowship. He challenged the local club to launch a "Paul Harris" project this year. (Rotary was begun by Paul Harris 60 years ago, he explained.)

The local club was urged to recruit young men, to expand its public relations and to hold more ladies nights to share Rotary.

President Barcus announced that the Eastland club was first in the district in June in attendance. A local assembly was held Monday morning with Gov. Dodsworth in charge. His Eastland visit is his second of a planned 40.

## City Health Inspector Ok'ed -- To Be Hired by Manager

The city commission voted Monday night to hire a city health inspector to be considered an employe of the city and to be under the direction of the city manager and city health officer. The job is to be part-time and the inspector duties will be directed by the city manager.

In the relatively brief meeting, commissioners agreed not to lease any grazing land at Lake Eastland in order to leave land there owned by the city, free for possible use for industrialization should the need arise. City Manager Lewis Tiner reported that he had been asked about leasing some of the land. Commissioners agreed that it would be better to leave the land uncommitted so that it could be used for industry if the need arises.

Also during the meeting, presided over by Mayor Frank Deaton, the commission agreed to leave to Tiner the decision of allowing payroll deductions for employe insurance. It was reported during the meeting that the city attorney

## Ranger Man Indicted for July 4 Slaying

James Will Battle, 49-year-old owner of the Little Jim Hotel in Ranger, was indicted on a charge of murder by an Eastland County grand jury which concluded its deliberations at Eastland late Monday afternoon.

Prior to the action of the grand jury, he had been freed under \$2,500 bond after having been charged with murder by Justice of Peace M. D. Underwood in the shooting death of Don Gonzales, 45, in Ranger on July 4.

Battle's arraignment before Judge Turner Collie in 91st District Court has been set for Monday morning, July 27, at 10 o'clock.

At that time Judge Collie will take the defendant's plea, discuss arrangements for legal counsel and set the date of the coming trial. Prosecutor will be Earl Conner, veteran Eastland County district attorney. The Battle case could be Conner's final murder trial of his career as DA since his term of service ends Dec. 31. Conner was defeated for re-election by Perry Brown of Rising Star.

Self-defense or murder with malice apparently was the issue before the grand jurors who heard testimony from a large number of witnesses. Had the body been convicted Battle's action was purely self-defense, it was possible he would have been no-billed.

The grand jury recessed Monday at 5 p. m. after handing down the murder indictment and three indictments of embezzlement against another Eastland County man.

Battle was taken into custody by Ranger city police officers a few minutes after the slaying took place on Saturday, July 4, at 2:30 p. m. Initially, Justice of Peace Underwood (Continued on Page 2)

## James Grisham, Former Eastland Attorney Dies

Funeral services for James S. Grisham, 73, of Ben Wheeler, former Eastland attorney, were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday July 21 in the Methodist Church at Ben Wheeler. Burial was in Ben Wheeler under the direction of Hilliard and sons.

Mr. Grisham died at 10:20 p. m. Sunday, July 19, in his home near Ben Wheeler.

As a young man, Mr. Grisham joined his brother, R. N. Grisham in the law firm of Grisham, Babb and Grisham at Sweetwater and soon was elected mayor of Sweetwater serving two terms.

He moved to Eastland in 1919 and again joined his brothers, R. N. and T. F. in the practice of law in Eastland.

He lived in Eastland until 1931, when he moved to Tyler.

In 1931, he joined former Sen. Earl B. Mayfield in a law practice until 1942 when Grisham established his own law offices in Tyler and Dallas. In 1950 he partially retired from practice and moved to his stock farm near Ben Wheeler. Soon after moving to his stock farm he was appointed Criminal District Attorney of Van Zandt County, and he served two terms in that office.

He was a member of the Methodist church.

He is survived by his wife; three children, Mrs. Paul Olds of Midland, Jay of New York City, and Nelson of Dallas; one brother, M. A. of Abilene; one sister, Mrs. Ida Newby of Houston; two grandchildren; and numerous nieces and nephews.

derwood set Battle's bond at \$5,000. The following Monday following a conference with District Attorney Conner, the Negro's legal counsel and Underwood the bond was lowered to \$2,500 and he was released that afternoon.

The shooting victim, Don Gonzales, 45, allegedly was creating a disturbance at the colored hotel and Battle, at the rear of the frame building, barbecuing some meat, rushed inside to stop the commotion. Gonzales reportedly pulled a knife and lunged toward Battle, a World War II overseas combat veteran, who grabbed a .25-caliber automatic and blazed away at his attacker.

The gun snowed out four fat shots. One bullet plunged into Gonzales' right chest, another into his left chest, a third ripped into his left jaw and the fourth pierced his forehead just above the hairline.

Underwood, Sheriff Lee Horn and Chief of Police Bill Ogden all checked Gonzales' corpse and said that he had been shot four times. Underwood also added that still missing at the time was the knife which Gonzales is alleged to have used at the scene of the shooting.

Gonzales died 10 minutes later in the emergency room of Ranser General Hospital.

He had been rushed to the hospital for treatment in a private car by persons at the scene of the incident.

Battle probably will plead self-defense.

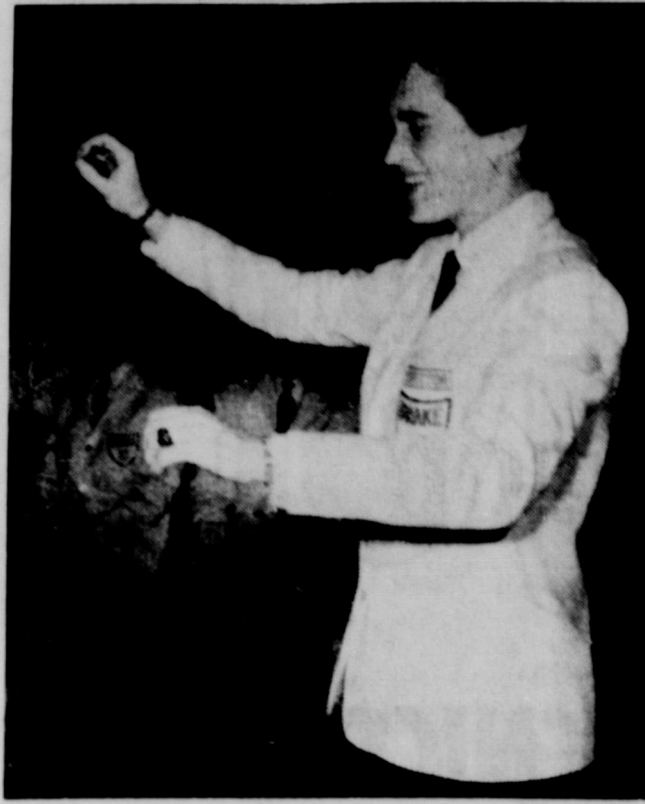

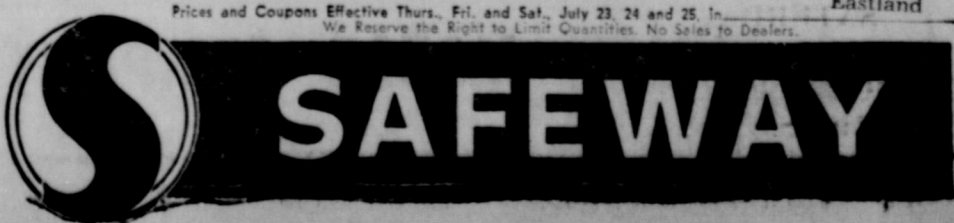

Following the ranch style lunch, Gray discussed nutrition of Angora goats in Eastland County and the West Cross Timbers area.

Control of some of the major diseases and parasites of sheep and goats was another interesting topic of the field day. Producers received valuable tips from Dr. W. T. Hardy, DVM, associated with the Ranch Experiment Station, A&M University, Sonora.

Concluding the day's informative program Vestal Askew of Sonora, president of

Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn., told producers of the purposes and activities of the organization which is expanding into this area.

Accompanying Askew to the Ranger agricultural event was Elmer Kelton, Award-winning western writer who is editor of the association's widely-circulated monthly magazine published at San Angelo.

Dr. J. B. Henderson of Coleman, area veterinarian for the Texas Animal Health Commission, was unable to appear on the program to discuss the status of the screwworm program. An emergency forced him to cancel his appearance.

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# Woman Writer Looks Back Over Experiences Of Family During Boom

Though I was very young when they struck oil in Desdemona, I am old enough now to know that I am an old timer from your area. I was seven years old in 1917, but I remember:

That we were living in El Reno, Okla., and my father, Pierce Carruth, was working for the railroad company; that it was during World War I and there was not enough money, that a can of corn or a cake made with part flour and part cornmeal was a treat; that there were three children younger than I, and out of forty dollars a month daddy made, six went for house rent.

No, I don't remember all of this. I am sure that some of it must have been told to me later. I do remember coming

home from school one day and my happy, loving, broke mother and father, and the three children younger than I, were in a state of utter confusion. A telegram had come from grandpa W. R. Carruth — always called Uncle Dick — who lived in Desdemona. Now in those days a telegram meant death, or at best, that a loved one was dying; but, this telegram said something like, "Come home they struck oil on Joe Duke's place" and further more we learned it had some amount of money in it.

It must have been a fortune, because we had money left when we got to Desdemona. We got to Eastland on the train, and were met in a Cadillac, which, even then, was considered a prestige car. We had also later a Jordon and

a Nash. This time we had a new house — although unpainted and an oil field shack — all ours, and we did not have to pay rent. We had a piano. I got to take music lessons, and this was the height of luxury in my life at that time. I do not know what the sudden possession of a great deal of money would do to one who had never had enough; it didn't happen to me.

At some time my father reminded me, "No, Pet, you must always remember that Desdemona was named for your mother's aunt, Desdemona Wynn, whose father was ole' Squire Wynn; she taught the first school in these parts; Come here to keep Molly and Tom Henry company, mostly Indians back then!"

My next memories are of hearing my father say to my mother, "No, Lizzie, you keep the kids away from the matches; don't let 'em strike a match. The Cosden is runnin' wild and with all that gas, we'd all explode. The whole country would explode! Aunt Kizzie — Kizzie Shuler — won't let 'em drill up by the graveyard, and I guess I don't blame her, but there might be big oil there." Aunt Kizzie was grandpa Carruth's sister, and she said she just didn't need money bad enough to let 'em drill near where her husband, son-in-law, my great-grandfather and grandmother, and my great-great grandfather and grandmother were buried.

My father went into the drug business which I remember because I ate all the ice cream cones I wanted. I can see the street, the side-walks made of boards, the streets of mud, O'Rear's General Store stocked with crackers, pickles, and salt in barrels, and smelling of saddle leather soap, and tin.

I remember the Rip Andersons, Dr. Kuykendalls, Dan Powers, Griffins, and others who lived on our street in Desdemona. Both the Baptist and Methodist Churches were on the street and I got religion every time they had a revival until I am not sure of the times I was converted — three times, I think.

The young men in my father's group were all ardent Masons — Norvel Gallagher, another Gallagher, a Mr. Brothers, and other names I can't recall. I am not saying they were not all ardent Masons. They may have been. I do remember that the meetings to which they went were in Fort Worth, and they didn't take their wives. At any rate, my father didn't.

I remember that, on one of these meetings, the women — my mother among them — became flagrantly brave and Add woman writer — times — had their hair "bobbed"; and, that when the men returned, they had their heads shaved on top, leaving a rim around the base; and, that the effect was startling; my father had a big nose.

My mother became very indignant the time some single women living near us put their flesh-colored underwear on the clothesline. This, I think, especially funny now, since her daughters, who are no longer young hang very-very-briefs on her line and she doesn't say a word!

I recall living in a big house called the "Green House", because it was painted a putrid, pea-green color, and that not so many years ago I went back to Desdemona; and, I wish I hadn't. There was the big silver-leaf maple standing in a forlorn vacant-lot where we had had our home, and where my mother planted the small sapling.

My grandmother, Mattie Carruth, cried when they dug up part of her peach orchard to drill an oil well; an uncle my age, Richard Carruth, and I climbed to the top of the old, cable tool derrick in the orchard and were amazed to see the small, insignificant things below who were our parents — urging us to climb down; and, I was scared to death I would get a whipping. It was many years later before I understood why my father didn't whip me, why he shook and cried and crushed me to him and told me how much he loved me.

I remember the new school house and that for some reason involving the school, we all moved to Lubbock along with many other families. I remember Dan and Della Powers, who came with us; and, though he has long since died, Dan Powers is still one of my favorite educators.

When we came to the end of the plains we made the canyons at Post in high; and I can still see and hear and know my father's glee when his high-powered automobile was able to perform this miraculous feat.

I can, forever, hear the old cable tool rigs going full blast
