



By-Laws Name Of Three Officers

This is the outline of the minutes of all meetings of committees in books provided for that purpose; he shall attend to the giving and serving of all notices, he may sign with the president, or a vice-president, in the name of the corporation, all contracts and instruments of conveyance authorized by the Board of Directors, and, when so ordered by the Board of Directors, he shall affix the seal of the corporation thereto; he shall have charge of the certificate books, transfer books and membership ledgers, and such other books and papers as the Board of Directors may direct, all of which shall, at all reasonable times, be open to the examination of any director, upon application at the office of the corporation during business hours; and he shall in general perform all the duties incident to the office of secretary-treasurer, subject to the control of the Board of Directors. He shall submit such reports to the Board of Directors as may be requested by such Board of Directors.

The secretary-treasurer shall have custody of all funds and securities of the corporation which may come into his hands; when necessary or proper he shall endorse on behalf of the corporation for collection, checks, notes and other obligations and shall deposit the same to the credit of the corporation in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. 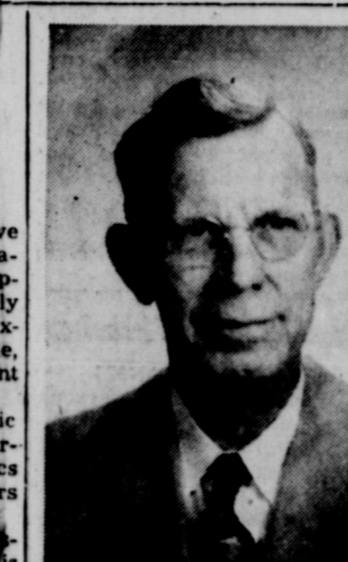
Coach Price also stated that Dr. J. O. Jolly will start making mouth protectors now and all prospective players should make an appointment with him at the earliest possible date.

Former City Manager Dies; Rites Saturday

Funeral services for I. Charles Heck, 75, former Eastland city manager, were held at 5 p. m. Saturday in the First Methodist Church with the Rev. Cyrus Barcus, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery with Hamner Funeral Home in charge.

Mr. Heck died in Memorial Hospital at 8:30 p. m. Friday. He had been ill several years and hospitalized for several days.

Born in Gypsum, Kansas, October 5, 1888, he married George Olive Collier, May 21, 1912, in Birmingham, Alabama.

Mr. Heck was Alabama state comptroller four years under Governor Dixon and Governor Sparks then moved to San Antonio where he had his own accounting firm.

He was city manager here four years, beginning in 1949. Later he was city manager of Cleveland, Texas for four years. He returned to Eastland after retiring in 1958.

He was a Mason and a Shriner and a member of Sigma Iota Epsilon, national fraternity, and of the First Methodist Church. He formerly was a member of the Lions Club and later of the Rotary Club.

Survivors are his wife; one sister, Mrs. M. L. Roark, San Antonio; two brothers, Frank of California and P. J. of San Antonio. A daughter, Olive, died in 1930.

County Drought Is Called Most Serious In History

Only 10 Per Cent Peanuts Planted

Eastland County has undergone the most serious droughts in the history of this county's farming, according to County Agent J. M. Cooper.

Rainfall so far this year has been as follows: January, 2 inches; February, 2.10; March, 1.20; April, 30; May, 1.10; and June, .60. The normal average annual rainfall is 27 inches with the majority of the rain falling in May and June. The schedule indicates the serious lack of moisture.

According to the 1959 United States census, the total value of field crops for the county is \$1,618,000, and the value of livestock and livestock production is \$3,951,212. With values as high as these at stake, the drought is a serious matter for area farmers and ranchers.

Mr. Cooper recently conducted a county-wide survey of farm and ranch conditions and the effects of the lack of rainfall. Most farmers throughout the county report that as little as 10 per cent of the peanut crops have been planted due to dryness, with as little as half of these crops being harvested.

Most grazing grass is short, thin and dry, and livestock tanks are drying up. Many farmers are hauling water to livestock. The county agent's office has already begun to try to get relief for county farmers in an effort to save foundation cattle.

If a rancher is forced to sell his entire herd, rebuilding the stock from foundation cattle up is a financially disastrous effort. Aid comes through the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office and is usually cheaper hay and-or grain, preferably hay.

Mr. Cooper said that Eastland County has never been so dry before that crops could not be planted and grown during planting time. July 10th is the deadline for planting peanuts and then it is a race to get them harvested before the first killing frost.

Farmers are hoping for summer rain, and many have begun praying.

The county, which stands No. 3 among the leading producers of peanuts in Texas, usually plants about 30,000 acres. The huge crop supports peanut processing plants, drying plants and wholesale buyers in most of the county's towns.

It was expected that the land usually seeded in peanuts will be used for feeds and hay crops if rain comes in time. Winter grain crops are usually planted in the fall.

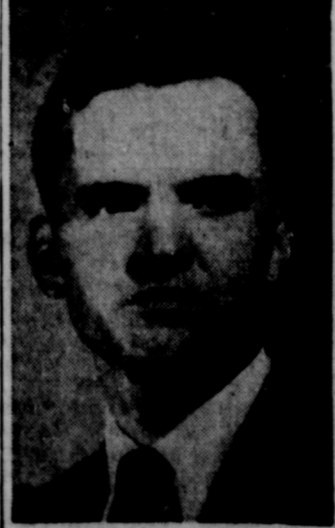

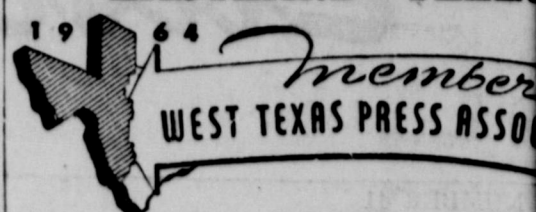

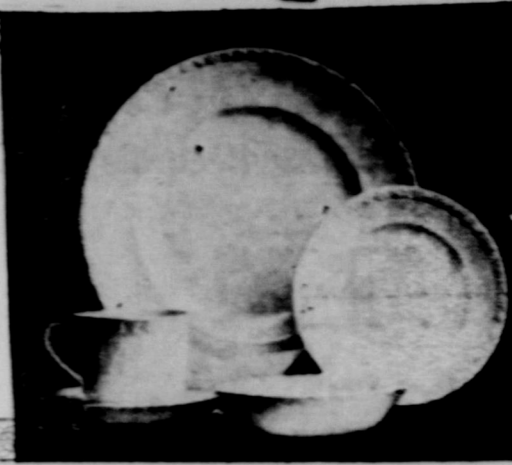

He shall give such bond for the faithful discharge of his duties in such sum as the Board of Directors may require.
