## Leads Being Checked In \$224 Theft

Several important leads are being checked in connection with the recent theft of money from an Eastland firm.

The Western Union office, located at the Village Hotel was robbed Sunday night sometime after eleven, and \$224 was taken, it has been reported.

Mrs. Reita Bond, who is desk clerk at the hotel, said when she arrived at work Monday morning the Western Union Safe was open and the \$224 gone.

The money has not yet been recovered. Chief of Police Ray Laney said the robbery occurred between 11 p.m. Sunday night and 5:30 Monday morning, and that the Eastland County Sheriff's Office is assisting with the investigation.

The manager and employees of the local store are urging residents to visit the four-day tent sale beginning Wednesday.

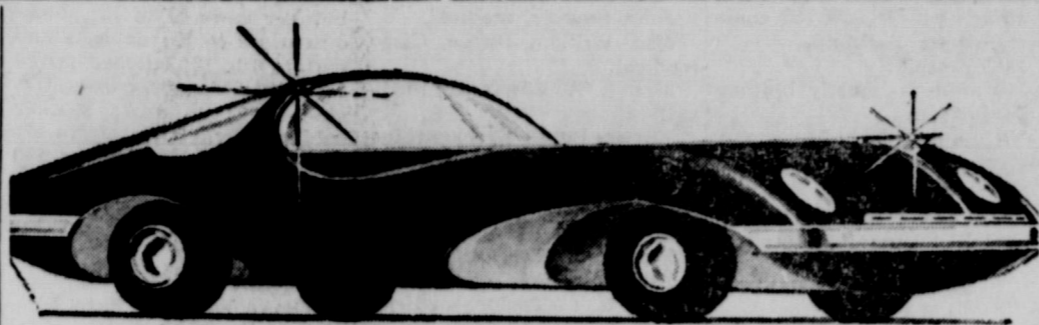

Former District Judge and Mrs. Elzo Been, now of the Long Branch Community, will celebrate their golden wedding anniversary Sunday, Sept. 27.

Their children, Mr. and Mrs. Syd Davis of Elgin and Mr. and Mrs. Truett Been of Grand Prairie, will honor the couple with an open house at the Been home from 2 to 5 p.m. that day. All friends and relatives are being invited, although formal invitations are not being sent within the county, it is announced.

The beloved Judge Been retired as judge of the 88th District Court in 1932 after having served two terms. "I just don't like it. I worried too much about other people's problems — whether or not I had made a right decision in a case. And nobody comes to a court except in trouble," he said recently in looking back at his retirement. He and his wife have made their home on a 700-acre farm in the Long Branch Communi-

ty south of Carbon in the southern part of Eastland County for many years.

Judge Been is a trans-planted Arkansan, of Georgian and Mississippian stock. Born in 1883 on a farm about 20 miles south of Little Rock, he was twice an immigrant to this county — the first time in 1891 when he made the trip with his parents in a covered wagon and settled in what is now the Kokomo Community (then known as Simpson). ## Twilight Auto Show On Square Saturday

The "Twilight Auto Show" in Eastland next Saturday will be among the very few places in the nation where all the 1965 model automobiles will be on display at one time — and at one place, with in a two or three-block area.

Eastland's automobile show will be held on the square from about 1 p. m. until what its sponsors call "dark: 30."

All of Eastland's dealers will be displaying the new models, jointly, just briefly after exposing them for the first time in their own local showrooms. All of the General Motor line will go on display at local dealers Thursday and Ford, Chrysler and American products Friday.

Co-sponsoring the local show are the members of the Eastland New Car Dealers Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

Mayor Frank Deaton endorsed the show plans and will assist in having the streets

roped off so that Eastland and area residents can inspect the new automobiles up close at their leisure.

Opening the show will be a special appearance by the Eastland High School Maverick Band under the direction of Director John Foster. The band's parade appearance is set for 1:30 and will officially open the show.

Mr. Hood King, twice nominated as the state's outstanding new car dealer, is president of the Dealer's Association here, and he and Chamber of Commerce President James Smith are extending invitations near and far for residents to attend the all-free show.

Other Eastland retail dealers will also probably have entries in the show, it has been announced.

Idea for the show began at the Chamber of Commerce Membership Breakfast Monday.

## Mavs Shut Out 34-0; QB McCullough Injured

The Cisco High School Lobos lived up to their favorite role Friday night to win a non-conference football game from the Eastland High Mavericks at Eastland. A capacity crowd turned out for the renewal of ancient rivalry.

The game was considerably better than the 34-to-0 score might indicate as both teams demonstrated good power. The break-away running of Cisco's Larry Hargrave, a tall sophomore, and seniors Jimmy Brown and Danny Clack were big contributing factors for the Lobo triumph.

Wayne Waldon, 145-pound fullback, was the Mavericks' top ground gainer with 52 yards in nine bucks. The starting Maverick quarterback, Jerry McCullough, suffered a leg injury early in the game and never returned to action. Cisco's End David Waters left the game with a leg injury in the second quarter.

Hargrave scored two of Cisco's five touchdowns on runs of 54 yards and three yards. He had a total of 149 yards rushing in 13 tries. Nicky Lopez scored once on a 7-yard sprint.

Danny Clack scored the other two Cisco touchdowns—the first on a 40 yard pass play from Anthony Strother and the other on a 38-yard off-tackle slant that went all the way. He is a senior and played his best game of the season.

Tim Bennie, the 190-pound end of the Lobos, did an outstanding job in the kicking department. He hit four of five extra points and his booming kickoffs were a contributing factor to his team's victory.

Among the top defenders for the Lobos were C. B. Rust, Bengie Burnam, Richard Coats, Larry Griffin, Gary Phipps, Jimmy Smith, Bobby Smith, Brown, Lopez and Strother.

Standing out in the Maverick line were Tackle Fred Keith, End James Whitehead, End Mike Miller and others. Gaylon Griffin did a fine job as linebacker. Gene Wilson, 120-pound quarterback, carried on in a commendable way after McCullough left the game.

The first Cisco score came on the third play of the game. The Lobos got the kickoff back to their 33. Brown scooted for five and Hargrave got seven yards. Then Hargrave circled left and went 54 yards with Strother, who had been out all week due to illness, throwing the key block.

The Mavericks took the kickoff and drove to the Cisco 40 before losing possession. The Lobos then were forced to punt, and Miller took the punt back 35 yards to the Cisco 17. Four plays then fizzled and the ball went over. Hargrave plowed for 31

yards, Lopez made five and Brown raced 32 yards to the Maverick 7. Lopez then scored early in the second period. Neither team could threaten again until the Mavericks drove to the Cisco 22 as the half neared the end. Pilgrim intercepted a pass there.

An Eastland scoring threat was thwarted in the third period when the Mavericks drove from their 25 on short gains by Ted Martin, Griffin, Waldon, and Moylan went to the Cisco 11 where Jimmy Smith intercepted a pass for Cisco.

## Olden Residents To Discuss FHA Water Loan Thursday

Homer Cole, Farmers Home Administration Supervisor, will meet with the citizens of Olden Thursday, Sept. 24, at 7:30 p.m. in the Olden High School Gym, for the purpose of discussing the possibility of the community receiving a loan to build a water system.

The new Rural Area Development Plan will be explained by Mr. Cole. This plan is for the purpose of making long term loans to the citizens of rural areas of less than 2,500 population.

If a loan is made, the funds may be used to install or improve rural water supply and distribution systems that furnish water for household, livestock, garden irrigation, orchard and crop - spraying purposes and fire protection. A system may include capacity for commercial and industrial use when the cost of such capacity will be less than the cost of the capacity for other purposes.

It is necessary for the residents of Olden to attend this meeting to discuss this system before a definite step can be made in securing fire equipment for Olden. A meeting to discuss the equipment will be held at the Community Center, Saturday, Sept. 26 at 7:30 p.m.

Mr. Cole said organizations operating on a nonprofit basis, such as nonprofit corporations; irrigation, water supply, or soil conservation districts; grazing or recreation associations; and small country towns and other rural po-

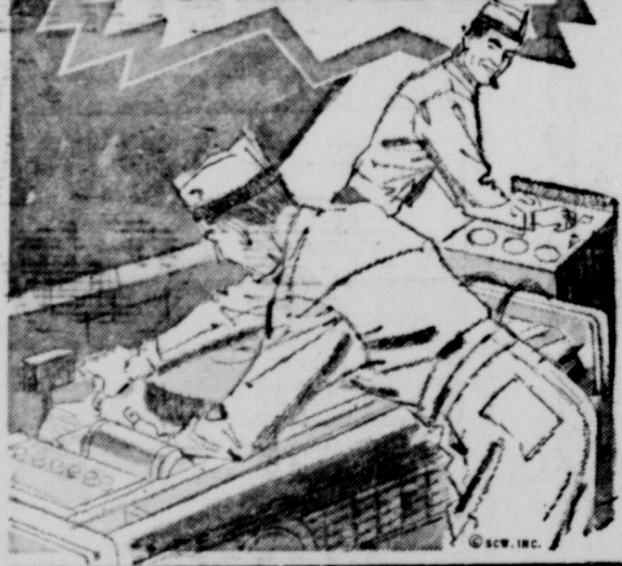

2. To help organize local United Funds. At the request of local communities, since 1951 the Texas United Fund has helped organize 150 local United Funds. Texas now has over 200 United Funds—more than any other state.

3. To assist local United Funds in conducting their campaigns. Annually, the Texas United Fund conducts Campaign Institutes solely designed to help local United Funds do the best job possible.

4. To establish a fair and equitable quota plan to be applied to the goals of state and national agencies so that no United Fund in Texas will be subjected to "target goals" or "all the traffic will bear" campaigns.

The Texas United Fund this year includes eleven state and national agencies combining eleven appeals in one. These eleven organizations are providing Texas and Texans with vitally important services:

American Hearing Society, through local member organizations in Texas, works exclusively in behalf of the acoustically handicapped to prevent deafness, conserve hearing and rehabilitate the deaf and hard of hearing.

American Social Health Association performs research, investigation and family life education work with schools and the Armed Forces, with local and national agencies, local law enforcement and health departments in control of VD, prostitution, narcotics traffic and allied vice conditions.

Council on Social Work Education leads the effort to resolve the Number One problem in social welfare field—the shortage of competent social workers—by recruiting competent individuals into social work and upgrading standards of social work.

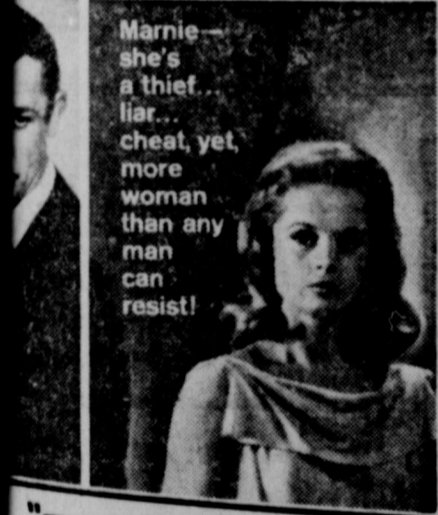

They settled in the Long Branch community upon their return and young Elzo went to school in a one-teacher classroom there and later attended Howard Payne College and Hankins Normal at Gorman. He met Fannie Cannon while both were students at Rankin Normal and the two were married in 1914.

As a girl, Mrs. Been had lived on a farm south of Rising Star. She taught school in Comanche County and at May after finishing Hankins Normal. She was teaching at May when she and the judge-to-be said their vows.

After completing his schooling, Mr. Been taught the one-teacher Long Branch school for two years and decided he

wanted to be an attorney. A term as deputy tax collector had whittled his legal curiosity. 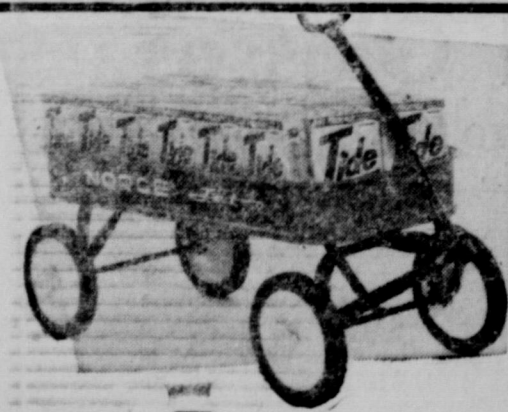
