Flag Day Ceremonies Attract Large Crowd

A large crowd attended the annual Flag Day Services held on the Post Office lawn Saturday morning. Preceding the ceremony, the six flags were displayed by Boy Scouts of Troop 103 and an honor guard of four U.S. Air Force men, on the front steps of the Post Office.

The Boy Scouts and the honor guard marched to the east side of the Post Office and raised the Stars and Stripes as the organist, Kenneth Mayhall of Abilene, played the National Anthem. The six flags were placed in the

staffs at the top of the beautiful red, white, and blue floral bed. Pat Miller sang "Pledge of Allegiance" accompanied by Kenneth Mayhall at the organ.

Mrs. Maureen Johnson, Postmaster, welcomed the guests, and stressed the fact that Flag Day is a most important day in everyone's life. She introduced Wendell Seibert, superintendent of Eastland Public Schools, master of ceremonies.

Mr. Seibert expressed his appreciation to Mrs. Johnson and the Lions Club, the Jaycees, Beta Sigma Phi, Scouts from Troop 103, and others for making the Flag Day ceremonies an important event in Eastland. He introduced Clyde Grant, postmaster of Abilene. Mr. Grant introduced the guest speaker of the day, Noel Patterson, regional controller of the Post Office Department, of Dallas.

Mr. Patterson spoke of the importance of a country having a flag and when we leave this country to visit another and return to our own, the flag is one of the first things that we look for.

He said, "You may not be aware that a neighboring country does not even have a national flag. This country is Canada". He stressed the fact that our flag was flown in all government places and schools and throughout our country and that we should all be proud of this fact.

Mr. Seibert presented a replica of the Declaration of Independence suitable for framing to the guest speaker, in behalf of the Lions Club, expressing their application to the speaker.

John W. Norman, Winters attorney and Shetland pony trainer, staged the patriotic review with his trained animals from his Lazy N. Stables. The horses were donned in black and white harness with white plumes. They were trained by Vern Brewer of Gainesville. Mr. Norman was also presented a replica of the Declaration of Independence by Mr. Seibert, in behalf of the Lions Club.

Following the ceremonies a reception was held on the lawn for the guest speaker.

Texas Industrial Commission Has the Facts on Eastland

A community development survey containing economic information about Eastland prepared by Texas Electric Service Company was presented last week to the Texas Industrial Commission for use in helping provide facts to industries considering new plant site locations.

It was one of 40 community surveys presented by Beeman Fisher, president and general manager of Texas Electric, to Harry W. Clark, executive director of the commission. The surveys include one volume for each community with more than 1,000 population served by the company.

"We feel it is important for the commission, which receives requests for information about prospective plant sites, to have these surveys," Fisher said. "It means that the communities Texas Electric serves can be better represented when industries and commercial enterprises go to the commission for information."

Clark said the commission will find the surveys most useful and pointed out that they will provide much information which has not been readily accessible in the past from the commission files.

"We will be better equipped with facts regarding these cities and towns now that we have the surveys," Clark said. "The surveys will be most useful."

The surveys are revised annually by the Area Development Division of Texas Electric in order to keep information up to date. Such surveys:

Important factors of interest that are given detailed coverage in the surveys include water supply, labor market, tax information, mineral resources, agricultural data and other statistics which are directly related to the basic economy of the area.

Lights, Gas and Oil Monday City Commission Business

The city commission heard a report on Eastland's street lighting system, granted an easement to Great Western Drilling Co. in their water-flooding project and decided in favor of Lone Star Gas Co. in a dispute between that company and a local resident, during the regular business session Monday evening.

With Mayor Frank Deaton presiding, the commission heard Frank Sayre, Division Manager for Texas Electric Service Co., explain the city's street lighting coverage. His company surveyed the city last October, Mr. Sayre said, and found that it is generally above average in lighting.

The commission granted permission to Great Western Drilling Co. to lay a water line and build a pump station at Lake Eastland where that company has a water-flooding, oil-recovery project going. The lake is getting low, a company spokesman said, and the project is getting to a "crucial" period and the need for adequate water for flooding purpose will increase. The city sells the company water and stands to profit from oil recovery too because the city is the largest holder in the area. Great Western's share had been about \$300 for April and May and about \$1,000 for May, it was reported.

The Lone Star Gas Co. incident involved a dispute between that company and C. C. Cornelius over the ownership of an existing gas line and service to Mr. Cornelius. District Manager Gene Abbott of Cisco and M. L. Forgey, local manager, spoke in behalf of the gas company.

With a map and sample globes, Mr. Sayre explained the street-lighting arrangement in Eastland. The downtown area, he said, is illuminated with 39 mercury vapor, 400-watt bulbs, and the highways (80 and 6 from city limits) are lighted with 45 mercury lights.

The inter-sectional (basically residential) area is lighted with 113 115-watt lights and 22 295-watt lights at strategic intersections, he said. The company spent about \$7,000 up-dating the street lighting program in Eastland in 1960, he pointed out.

Texas Electric installs and maintains the city lighting system and the city pays 2.05 cents per kilowatt hour for the service, he said.

The Great Western representative said his company is

putting about 3,000 barrels of water a day into the ground in the water-flooding program.

Commissioner Dale Trout reported that he had a complaint from a local resident regarding the placing of artificial flowers on graves at the cemetery, and on the selling

at the same price of grave plots which are two and a half feet larger than earlier sold plots. No action was taken.

Commissioners also discussed the city's meat inspection program but took no formal action. All commissioners were present with Dr. M. A. Treadwell being called away.

Patriotic Registrant In Army After Volunteering 13 Years

The number "13" is generally considered "unlucky" by many people — but not for Jurel Varner, young man from Ranger who waited that many years for a dream to come true.

Jurel tried for 13 years to get into the Army, but the fact was, he was just too short to meet the requirements. And so, in this, his 13th year of

time. He'll be 32 years old on the 23rd of this month — and he couldn't have been taken after that.

His story began back in 1950 when he registered on his birthday with the Eastland board, Jewell Reaves, clerk, reports.

The following year, in July, Jurel was placed in I-A classification by the local board. Well, it wasn't until October of the following year, 1952, that Jurel was sent to the Armed Forces physical examination — where he measured only 59 1/4 inches in height, and was rejected for induction because he just wasn't tall enough.

Five feet is the minimum height.

Time passed, and Jurel grew taller — but not tall enough. In January of 1954, he visited the local office, reported that he'd grown and was sent back for another examination. The examiners marked him up with a half inch gain, but that still wasn't enough. So he remained in the IV-F classification because of his height — or lack of it.

Clerk Reaves reports that at various intervals over the years young Jurel came in, told her he thought he'd grown enough, and wanted to volunteer. But local medical examinations showed that he still hadn't got tall enough.

The patriotic volunteer was undaunted, still hoping for enlistments. Things began to change for the better this year — the 13th. The local board was reviewing IV-F classifications for the purpose of placing those persons who could, in case of national emergency, be inducted and put to some use for the armed forces. Well, Jurel fell into this category, because short or tall, he certainly could serve in some capacity under emergency conditions.

So he was notified that he was now in I-Y classification. As soon as he got the notice, he came to the Eastland office, wanting to know if he was not now eligible for service and he also happily reported that "he had still grown taller since his last visit to the board."

Sure enough, the local medical advisor concurred — Jurel now measured 5' 1" in height and he was advised that he would be placed in I-A at the next meeting—but that he would not be eligible to volunteer as he was over 26 years of age.

Jurel got busy, but he didn't have much time. He went to the Armed Forces Induction and Recruiting station for enlistment in May—less than a month before he would reach the "too-old" bracket of 32. On May 19, the local board officially put him in I-A which opened the door for his enlistment.

Right now, he's likely doing "close-order" drill—and being patriotic, loving every minute of it.

Personnel of the Eastland County Farmers Home Administration office will attend a bi-area meeting on June 18-19 in Abilene to discuss measures proposed by President Johnson to eliminate rural poverty.

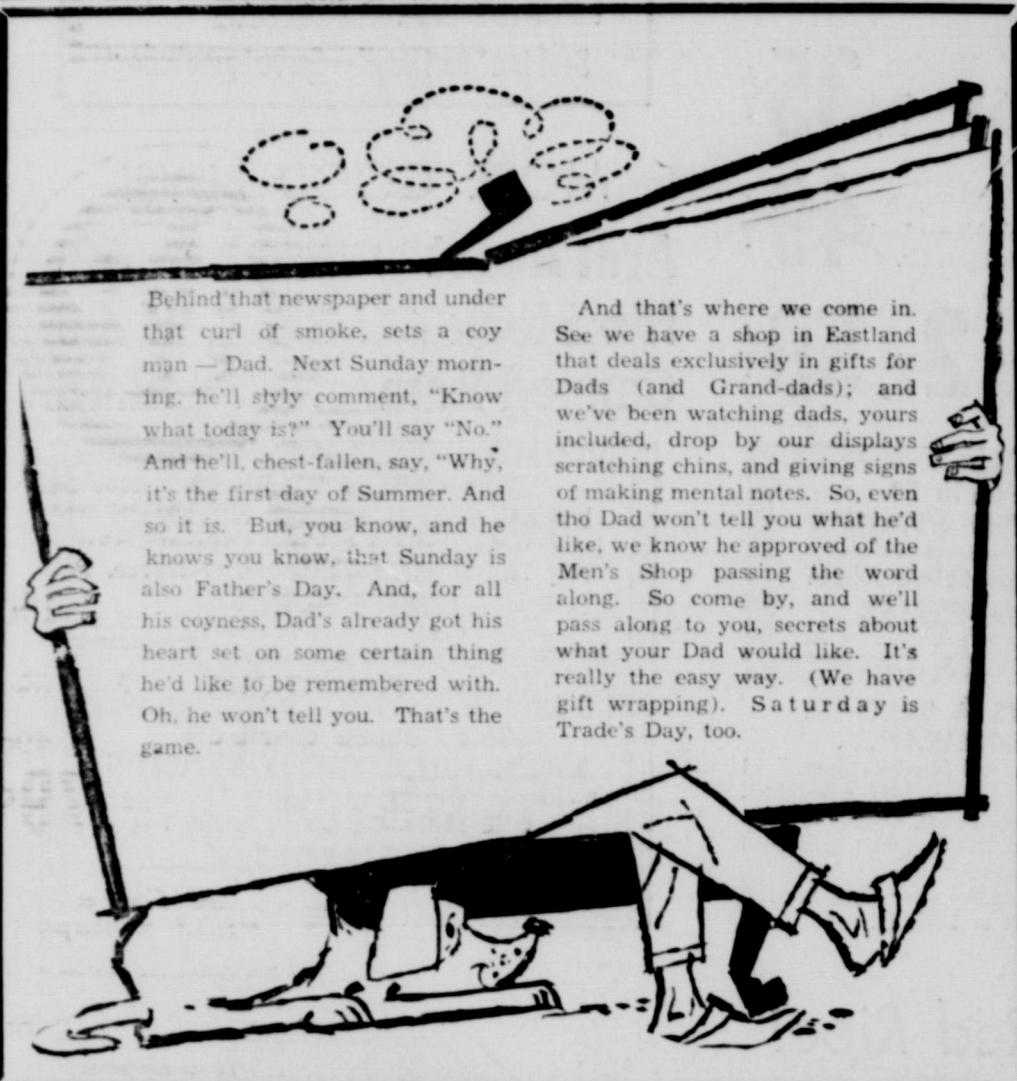
These measures along with other aspects of the FHA program were presented to the FHA state staff members in Dallas on June 2-4 in a meeting with Howard Bertsch, FHA Administrator. Elmer L. Foster, Area 12 Supervisor, whose office is located in Eastland County Office, attended the meeting.

At the meeting in Abilene officials will discuss steps being taken to help young farmers take over the farms of retiring elders, progress made in developing rural community water systems, and the housing assistance given senior citizens in rural areas.

The Farmers Home Administration through a network of

1,500 county offices located throughout rural America provides credit assistance in farm and financial management to owners and operators of family farms and aids farmers and rural residents in improving rural housing and other rural community facilities. The agency's funds supplement the credit provided by other lenders. State Directors and county supervisors of the agency serve as chairman of RAD technical action panels organized to help rural communities develop their local economies.

Mrs. Alice Lawless, county office clerk, Homer P. Cole, County Supervisor, Darrell G. Cooper, Assistant County Supervisor and Elmer L. Foster, Area Supervisor will represent Eastland County at the meeting in Abilene. Mr. Oris Bruner of Seymour is the Area Supervisor for the area surrounding Seymour.
