Officiating was Dr. Cyrus Barcus, pastor, and burial was in Eastland Cemetery under direction of Arrington Hamner Funeral Home.

Mr. Hoffman died at 4:30 p.m. Sunday at Eastland Memorial Hospital, which he had re-entered Saturday after having been at home for a short time following earlier hospitalization. He had been in ill health for several months.

His place of death was in the hospital to which he had devoted so much of his means and talents in building.

Born Aug. 6, 1895 in Nebraska City, Neb., Mr. Hoffmann came to Eastland at the end of World War I and entered the oil business. He married Miss Bessie Hilton in Eastland Jan. 25, 1923.

He operated Hoffmann Drilling Co. and was in the oil producing business. He was a past president of the West Central Texas Oil and Gas Producers Assn.

Mayor in Eastland prior to and during the early part of World War II, Mr. Hoffmann was cited just this past year by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce as one of the city's Most Outstanding Men.

T&P to End Two Trains On Thursday

Two Texas and Pacific Railway passenger trains serving Eastland, Ranger, and Cisco will be discontinued Thursday, according to an announcement from the Dallas office.

The last eastbound run will leave El Paso at 12:50 a.m., Mountain Standard Time, Thursday, and the last westbound run will leave Fort Worth en route to El Paso at 10:55 a.m. Thursday. The trains are numbers 21 and 22.

Permission was received by the T&P Tuesday morning from the Railroad Commission to eliminate the two daily passenger trains from the schedule because of financial losses incurred.

Two other passenger trains operating through here will continue to pass through on the same schedule.

Eastbound 26 will leave El Paso at 6:30 p.m. (M.S.T.) and arrive in Fort Worth at 9 a.m. Westbound 27 will leave Fort Worth at 10:35 p.m., Central Standard Time, and arrive in El Paso at 12:50 p.m. (M.S.T.).

Trains number 26 and 27 are the ones which give important mail service to West Texas and will still have good passenger equipment, according to the announcement.

Cab Fares Upped; Sewer System Rapped by State

Cab fare are going up in Eastland, new parking meters are to be purchased and the city's sewerage disposal plant is less than perfect.

These matters occupied the meeting of city commissioners this week as Mayor Frank Deaton presided Monday evening. Commissioners M. A. Treadwell Jr. and Curtis Koen were present.

Permission was granted to Mr. Fritz Jones, operator of City Cab Co. to raise his 50-cent fares from 35 cents to 50 cents, after a lengthy discussion as to whether the increase in rates would curtail his business.

Mr. Jones, who bought the cab firm from Mr. Sam Wallace recently, told the commissioners that the rates had not been increased for 13 years, and in view of increased operating costs, insurance, fuel, etc., the need for an increase is imperative.

Mr. Kelly, a driver for Mr. Jones, was also present. City Manager Lewis Tiner asked what rates are in Cisco and Ranger and was told by Jones that 50 cents is standard. Commissioner Koen made the motion to increase rates and Dr. Treadwell seconded.

Mr. Henry Pullman was present but left when he was told that no action was to be taken on the matter of opening a street off East Main St. adjoining his business. A petition from another citizen regarding the street is being

H-Vassarette Plant Expansion Contract Officially Signed Here

Work Will Begin Immediately On Site

The Hollywood-Vassarette Manufacturing Co. plant in Eastland will be increased in size by over 50 per cent, according to an official announcement made jointly this week by D. E. Vieregger, plant manager, and H. T. Wilson, president of the Eastland Industrial Foundation.

The contract between the manufacturing company and the Eastland Foundation was officially inked at 1:30 p. m. Tuesday.

The Foundation, which already owns the present plant facilities, will pay for the remodeling and expansion, to be built to the company's specifications and under their direct supervision.

Construction will begin immediately, Wilson said, and is expected to be completed by early spring. The increased employee buildup will begin then, Manager Vieregger said, indicating that the increase will be gradual up to some 300 employees. The firm presently employs some 200 workers.

The project calls for a 10,600 square foot extension, to be built on the north side of the present 17,800 square foot building, and the addition of a 250 by 250 foot paved parking lot, also on the north side. The Foundation has recently purchased two acres to the north of the present two-acre tract.

Construction will be of steel beam and cinder block with a colored metal north exterior. The main entrance will be located on the north side. The present entrance, located on the east, facing College St.,

will become a service entrance, Vieregger said.

Close negotiations between members of the firm and the local foundation members has been underway for several months, working out specifications and agreements.

Cost of the entire project is expected to be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$54,000, Wilson said.

Mr. Vieregger said: "I would like to take this opportunity for myself and on behalf of Munsingwear, Inc. to thank the Industrial Foundation and the citizens of Eastland and Eastland County for the warm and efficient cooperation they have extended to us in the planning of this expansion."

"This is another example of the type of splendid relationship which has been afforded to our company over the years and which has made this plant a happy and successful establishment in the community."

"We look forward to many more years of growth and prosperity in this community."

The additional 100 employees will mean an additional \$250,000 in payroll for Eastland County, Vieregger said. Employees come from throughout the county and in some instances, from outside the county, to work at the plant.

Hollywood-Vassarette is a division of the nationally-known firm of Munsingwear Inc. and

the Eastland plant manufactures garments of underwear for women.

Mr. Wilson said: "Eastland can be very proud of its Industrial Foundation. Through it, the building expansion program now underway at the Hollywood-Vassarette plant was made possible. We all know that for our area to grow, it must increase its industry."

"And one of the finest ways to accomplish this is by the expansion of existing industries who are already our friends. "Eastland is very fortunate to have such a fine company as Munsingwear located here. And with this start, we are looking forward to many more projects through the Eastland Industrial Foundation for the economic betterment of our City." (Continued on Page 7)

Haden Lee probably doesn't know much about the opera-

tion because it was complicated, involving the insertion of a special tube from his brain to his heart to drain off excess spinal fluid there. And the unfortunate thing is that the youngster is apparently in store for quite a few more such major undertakings.

Realizing that his father is a hard-working public employee, who if not underpaid, certainly isn't overpaid, good people in Eastland decided to begin a fund for the tot.

Haden Lee has a brother, Leslie, two. His father, James, 30, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. (Buster) Johnson of Lake Leon, and his mother, Berta, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hardin of Eastland.

As he grows, larger tubes will be needed and in two or three years, extensive tests of Haden's various glands will be made.

Battle Jury Selection Is Long, 2-Day Prelude

Testimony got underway Wednesday morning in the Battle murder trial in 91 District Court after a long two days taken up the questioning of 44 potential jurors.

The 12th juror was qualified about 7:30 p. m. Tuesday. Six were seated Monday and six Tuesday.

James Battle, 49-year-old Negro, is being tried for the July 4 slaying of Don Gonzales at the Little Gem Cafe in Ranger. Battle appeared in court accompanied by his wife and small daughter.

The death penalty is being asked — which made jury selection difficult. From an original list of 50 prospective jurors called for the case which began Monday, 24 were excused before the trial opened and attorneys began whittling the list of 26 remaining prospectives Monday. From that 26, these were seated: Mrs. B. H. Clifton of Eastland, James Reid of Eastland, Jack Whitehead of Cisco, Mrs. P. A. Cox of Eastland, Jerry Carter of Eastland and M. H. Perry of Eastland.

Sheriff Lee Horn brought in a list of 25 extra talesmen Tuesday morning (two of whom were excused) and attorneys began questioning.

Seated Tuesday were J. D. Parsons of Eastland, Alvy Taylor of Cisco, K. D. Butler of Eastland and C. L. Noble of Eastland, C. F. Coats of Cisco and C. A. Nance of Cisco.

District Attorney Earl Conner, Jr. is prosecuting and Eastland Attorney Bill Hart is defense attorney. Battle, through Hart, asked for and was denied a motion for continuance as the trial got underway Monday.

The defendant is charged with murder with malice aforethought and line of defense is self defense.

Juror questioning followed this pattern with prospectives on the stand some ten or 12 minutes: Have you read or heard about the case? Does the fact that a man has been indicted influence your thinking as to his guilt or innocence?

Do you believe a person to be innocent until proven guilty? Do you understand what murder with malice aforethought means? With-

Health Department in the form of a letter, read by Tiner, in which the state health officials pointed out that the Eastland system, built in 1920, is in a state of deterioration, not up to modern treatment standards and topographically - poorly located. The state board recommended that a professional engineer be hired to study, design and supervise the construction of a new treatment system. That represents some \$250-\$300,000, Tiner told the commissioners. Commissioners agreed that petitions could be raised to help the location process, and Tiner explained it had been recommended to him that the addition of an additional pump to re-cycle the refuse would certainly help the situation.

The Foundation was recently granted and exercised the option owned by Eastland Chamber of Commerce to purchase the site and facilities of the plant. The foundation is, in acquiring these holdings, acquiring equities which will be continued to be used for the expansion of industry in the city and county.
The plant was established here about 17 years ago and has been in continuous operation. It first utilized downtown buildings, but about 10 years ago the present building was built and financed by local capital, through the purchase of stock certificates. To

date some \$11,000 of these certificates have been donated to the foundation for its further industrialization efforts. Donations to the foundation have been extensive and continued support is being solicited.
Munsingwear and Hollywood-Vassarette officials who have been instrumental in negotiating the planned expansion with local citizens have been Mr. C. W. Pauley, special project engineer on new buildings, A. Byron Reid, Mike George, A. M. Hanson and of course, Mr. G. D. McConnell president.
The Eastland Chamber of Commerce recently donated \$500 to the Foundation. President Dick Johnson has announced.
The present expansion here

Mr. Hoffmann's, City's History Are Entwined

Carl W. Hoffmann was not only a successful businessman, but also a man concerned with the welfare of the town in which he lived and the people who were his neighbors.

The list of accomplishments attained during his administration as mayor of the city is long — and the physical structures and facilities that make up the city, bear, upon close examination, the stamp of his handiwork.

Elected to the commission

in 1935, Mr. Hoffmann served as mayor for four terms — eight years. Each term he asked that others lead, but invariably each new term his fellow commissioners re-elected him. He resigned April 5, 1943.

During those eight years, many things happened and the face and fiscal stature of Eastland changed.

Elected with Mr. Hoffmann were Tom Johnson and E. C. Satterwhite. Otis Harvey and Ben Pryor were hold-over commissioners. Mr. Harvey resigned during the first year and C. T. Lucas was elected

to finish his un-expired term, the records show.

Other commissioners who later served with Mr. Hoffmann were Clyde Wellman, L. J. Lambert and Dave Flency. M. H. Kelly was city manager and W. J. (Red) Peters was chief of police.

All except Mr. Lucas, who served 13 years, are deceased.

The city's first police car was purchased during Mr. Hoffmann's tenure.

Other accomplishments? Well the water rates were reduced by 15 per cent across the board;

The cemetery, now one of Eastland's most beautiful sites, was landscaped;

Streets at the cemetery were paved;

A nursery was established by the city to feed and care for the mass of underprivileged children that were a part of the city's population during those years. (Mrs. Joe Stephens was administrator of the nursery - school) which functioned several years;

A Workman Projects Administration (WPA) program was begun which resulted in the virtual re-building of Eastland's city park, building of a swimming pool at the park, building of the recreational building at the park (now known as the American Legion building) and the development of picnic and camping facilities at Ringling Lake.

The south spillway at Eastland Lake was raised and the north spillway built to improve water storage facilities and prevent flooding of the east part of the town; and

Some 75 per cent of the town's streets were paved with WPA labor;

The city's gigantic debt of some \$1,350,000 (brought about by heavy bonding during earlier boom days) was lowered through carefully negotiated refunding and economies.

A man never to forget the young people and the importance of a good time for them, Mr. Hoffmann initiated, with his own money, the well-remembered 4th of July fireworks exhibits, which later included beauty reviews and became an Eastland institution up through the war years of the early '40s.

Mr. Hoffmann was also known to have used his own funds to see that city employees received their salaries during some "lean" city years.

was a member of the Lutheran Church. Active in civic affairs in Eastland throughout his life here, Mr. Hoffmann was noted for his unselfish contributions to worthwhile projects in the city.

One of the wings of the Eastland hospital is affectionately known as the Hoffmann Wing because of Mr. Hoffmann's assistance in its construction. In late 1959, the year the wing was completed, the board of directors of the hospital issued the following statement regarding Mr. Hoffmann and his son, Eill's contributions:

"Though many volunteered their services and funds, without which the wing could not have been built, the largest part of the credit for that wing should go to Hoffmann and his father, C. W. Hoffmann. In addition to putting thousands of dollars of their own money into building materials, furniture and equipment, they brought their own crews to the hospital to do construction work, taking them from work that would have been profitable to the Hoffmanns personally. C. W. Hoffmann personally supervised the construction of the wing from early morning until late at night during each day of the construction job. No

one else could have done or would have done the wonderful, unselfish job done by both Bill Hoffmann and C. W. Hoffmann."

Survivors include his wife; two sons, W. H. (Bill) and C.

W. Jr., both of Eastland; one daughter, Mrs. Mary Gavrel of Fort Worth; one brother, Fred of Los Angeles, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Herman Richter of Nebraska City and Mrs. Berte Panke of New

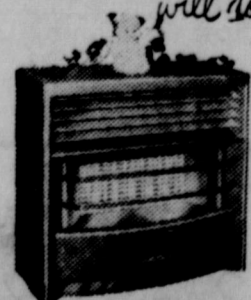

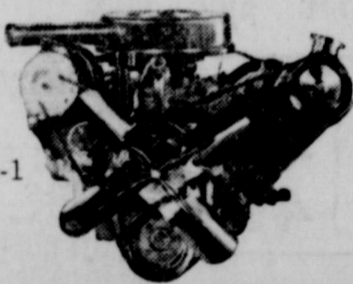
