Battle Acquitted After Long Study

It took two days to get a jury, one day to present testimony to the jury in the James Battle murder trial in 91st District Court, and six and a half hours for that jury Thursday to acquit Battle.

A \$4.95 Barlow pocket knife appeared to be the hinge on which the case hung.

Battle, a 49-year-old Ranger Negro, was indicted by a grand jury in the July 4 slaying of Don Gonzales at Battle's Little Gem Cafe in Ranger. From the day of the incident Battle had contended that he had killed Gonzales at Battle's himself because the Latin American Gonzales was attacking him with a knife.

The knife wasn't found and the grand jury indicted the murder with malice aforethought. During the testimony Wednesday Defense Attorney Bill Hart got admitted as evidence a knife, identified by several witnesses, as identical to that which Gonzales wielded during the fracas at the cafe.

This apparently established self-defense in the minds of the ten men and two women jurors, resulting in the "not guilty" verdict. However, what took the group so long to come to their conclusion was not known.

District Attorney Earl Conner Jr. was prosecutor and showed with witnesses including County Sheriff Lee Horn and others that Battle had a "bad reputation" in Ranger. Fanny Bee Russell, the Negro woman with whom Gonzales scuffled in the cafe before Battle intervened also testified.

Six jurors were picked Monday and six Tuesday as the questioning on the death penalty note consumed hours. The state finished its case Wednesday morning and the defense, using the same witnesses as the state, finished Wednesday afternoon. The charge was given the jury by District Judge T. M. Collie Thursday.

Speculation was for a quick return of the jury, but it proved to be unfounded second-guessing as the hours whittled on. The jury sent out twice for information.

At 4:30 p. m. Thursday, the jury came back in and Foreman James Reid of Eastland turned the verdict over to Judge Collie who read it.

Battle's wife and young child sat by his side throughout the trial.

Another murder trial, involving a Ranger woman who is indicted for killing her husband, is expected to go to trial soon after the first of the year. Attorney Hart will represent the woman.

JOE TOW AND FRANCIS URBAN
... Retired By Lone Star

Two Veteran Lone Star Producing Co. Officials Retire At Same Time

Francis Urban and Joe Tow set some sort of a Lone Star Gas Company record in October. It was the first time the top two men in one area retired in the same month and one of the first times that two men from the same section retired at the same time.

The careers of the two men are closely parallel. They both started and ended their careers in the Eastland production office. They both came to Texas from Oklahoma, worked as roustabouts and both plan a retirement life of hunting, fishing and golf.

Mr. Urban worked off and on for Lone Star for ten years prior to 1940, when he was put on the payroll on a permanent basis. His seniority includes some 28 years with Lone Star. He worked in the Chickasha, Oklahoma gas field running a rod and tubing machine before moving to Eastland in 1941 as a roustabout. He worked as a gang pusher and other jobs before rising to job of superintendent.

"When I first worked for Lone Star, the offices were above the First National Bank Building in downtown Eastland," Mr. Urban recalls. The offices are now located northwest of town on the site of an old compressor station.

Born in Kansas on a farm, Mr. Urban moved to Oklahoma with his parents when he was four years old. They moved to New Mexico in 1911. The family stayed there several years before moving back to Oklahoma. Mr. Urban worked for the county com-

missioner building roads for a while but the commissioner was not re-elected and he lost his job. He moved to Arizona to build roads during the depression, then went to Oklahoma and Lone Star.

Mr. Urban doesn't have definite plans until after the first of the year. He has a rental home in Eastland and Cisco.

Mr. Urban is the former Sibil Worsham. The couple married December 18, 1921 in Duncan, Oklahoma. The Urbans have four daughters, Mary Parks of Eastland whose husband works for Lone Star in the distribution office in Cisco; Nell of Jacksboro; Lena Fox of Winters, whose husband also works for Lone Star; and Melinda, who lives at home. The Urbans have three grandsons.

Former Resident Jay Hunt Dies; Rites Thursday

Funeral services for Jay Hunt, 70, former Ranger resident, were held Thursday, November 19 in Hedley, Texas.

Mr. Hunt died Tuesday, November 17, in Amarillo following surgery in a hospital there.

He was a member of the Baptist Church and of the Masonic Lodge.

Survivors are his wife; one son, Col. Jerry Hunt of the Strategic Air Command, Washington, D. C.; four grandchildren; one step-daughter, Mrs. Roy Bohannon of Amarillo; three brothers, Marian and Purl of Ranger, and Bob of Odessa. Seven brothers preceded him in death.

Mr. and Mrs. Marian Hunt of Ranger and James Hunt of Strawn attended the funeral. Purl Hunt of Ranger was unable to attend, but had visited Mr. Hunt just before the surgery.

Some time next year, he wants to get a part-time job completing oil wells or looking after someone's production business, he said.

Mr. Urban's retirement partner is Mr. Tow, who retired as senior foreman after Mr. Tow began his Lone Star career December 7, 1943 as a laborer in Eastland production department. Following an 8-month break in service, he worked as maintenance helper, gang pusher, and pumper before being appointed fireman in 1952.

Born October 30, 1899, on a farm in Arkansas, Mr. Tow left the farm with his parents when he was 13 years old to move to southern Arkansas. After three years, he moved to Oklahoma and later joined Sinclair Oil Company as a roustabout and pumper. He came to Eastland County in 1920 and was employed by States Oil Company. Four years later opportunity knocked and Mr. Tow bought a grocery store in Morton Valley during the Ranger oil boom. "I had \$500 and a car and I borrowed another \$1,000 and bought the grocery store," he recalls. "I opened the first day with \$4.55 and a lot of hope."

He kept the store for 20 years and sold out in August, 1943 to join Lone Star. Always interested in the oil business, Mr. Tow owned two oil leases at different times. He married the former Margaret Cowan on July 14, 1919. The couple has two boys, Don of Temple and Doyle of Conroe. They have six grandchildren — two boys and four girls.

Visiting with his two sons and grandchildren will be Mr. Tow's first retirement plan. He and his wife expect to go to the Texas Valley during the winter. He plans to build a home on Lake Leon, "but that's way in the future." Like his fellow retiree, Mr. Tow will get in lots of fishing and golfing.

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

Here's some food for thought for you students. "What sculpture is to a block of marble, education is to the soul." You seniors take this into consideration. This is your year to shine. Leave

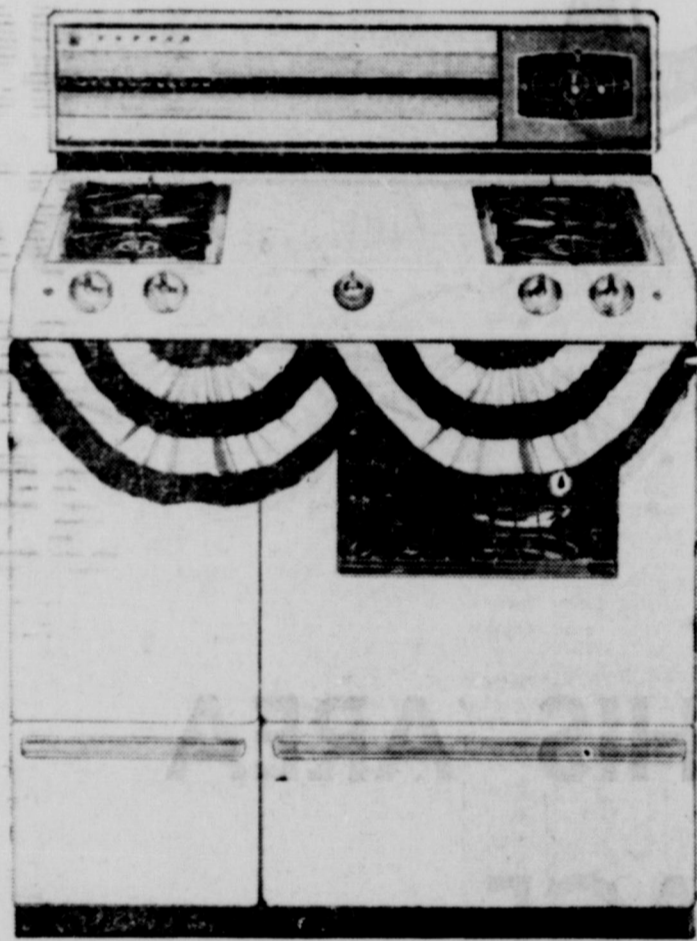

New Insurance Plan Available To NSLI Holders

A new plan of permanent life insurance — called "modified life" — is being made available to all holders of National Service Life Insurance through the new law which re-opens NSLI for disabled veterans. Glyndon Hague, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, said the VA plans to notify all term policyholders at the time of renewal of the opportunity to obtain "modified life" policies. Any type of NSLI insurance, including policies already issued, may be exchanged for or converted to this new plan which will be issued at lower premium rates than the present permanent plans. The "modified life" plan provides a level premium through the life of the insured. However, the face value will be reduced automatically 50 per cent when the insured veteran reaches the age of 65. At that time, Hague said, the policyholder will have the option of restoring the full amount of coverage by purchasing ordinary life insurance without a medical examination. The new plan is offered as an inducement to NSLI term policyholders to convert before the premiums on renewable term insurance become prohibitive with advanced age, the VA Manager said. There are still some three million NSLI term policyholders who have not converted to a permanent plan. The new policies will become available May 1, 1965.

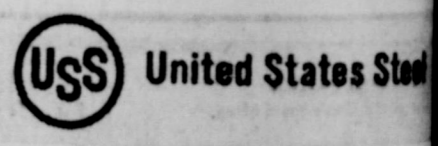

Quail Shooting To Begin Dec. 1

AUSTIN — While big game hunters are stalking deer and turkey, the bird hunters also will be having their day in Texas, according to A. J. Springs, wildlife coordinator for the Parks and Wildlife Department.

The quail season opens November 14 in regulatory authority counties east of the Pecos with the exception of the Possum Kingdom region. The mourning dove season in the South Zone continues through November 24, except in counties which had a white-wing season. The closing date in those counties is November 20.

Quail shooting opens in most counties covered by state law on December 1.

Springs said sportsmen could well study the departmental hunting season guide or check with their local game warden or both, because of the many local variations in regulations.

First areas in Texas to have quail hunting were in La Salle and McMullen Counties in deep East Texas where the season opened November 1.

Meanwhile, said Springs the quail season which opened October 31 continues statewide but the duck season does not open until November 25.
