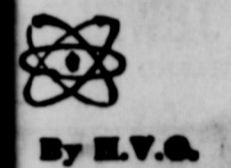

A huge star mounted atop the court house can be seen for miles.

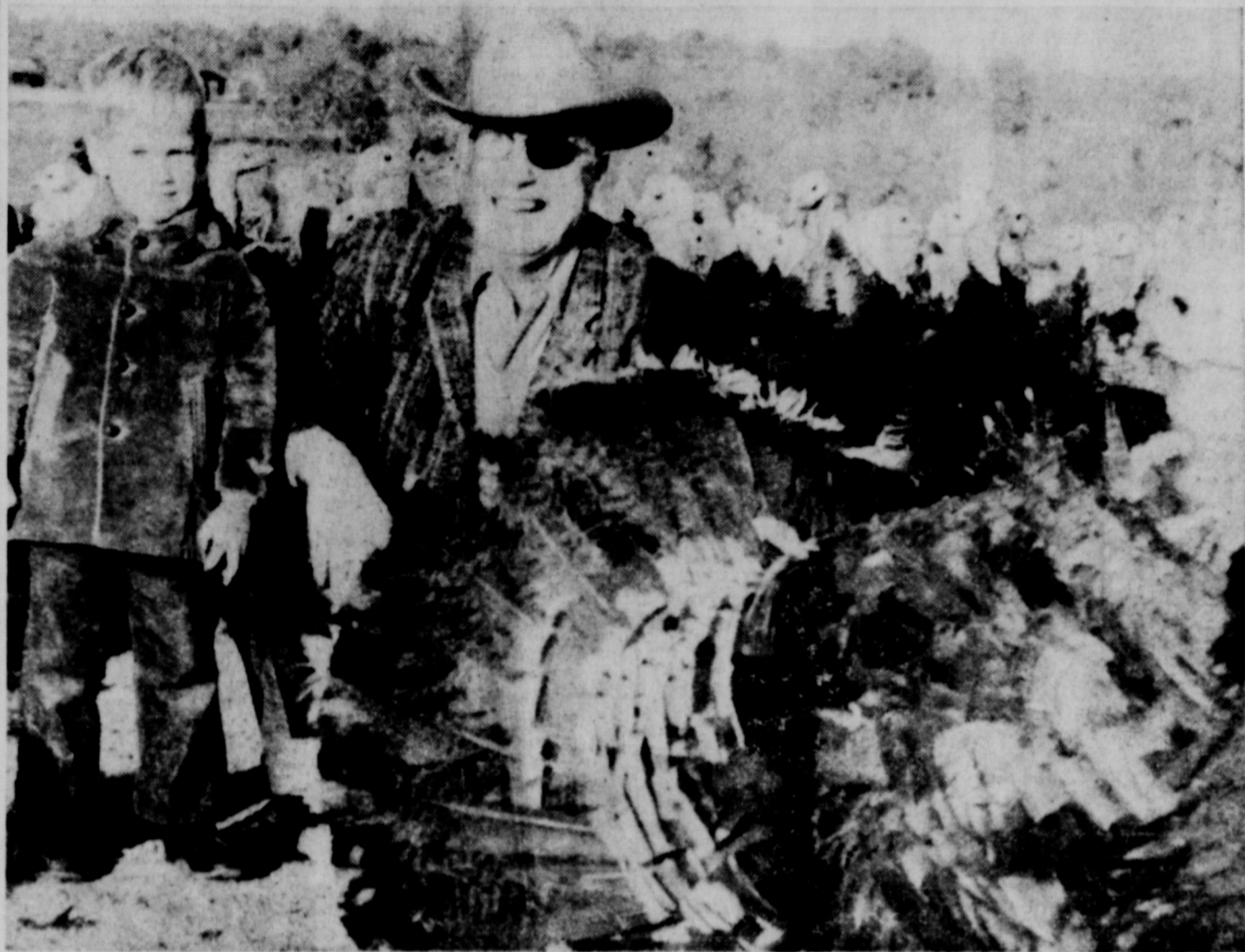
Christmas ornaments will decorate each corner and the middle of each block around the square.

Grand Jury Praises DPS; Body Returns 13 Indictments

Members of the Department of Public Safety (Highway Patrolmen) were cited specifically for commendation by the 91st District Court Grand Jury which recessed this week.

The jury returned 13 true bills, five no-bills and passed 11 cases. Indictments handed down included:

Assault with intent to murder, (two counts), aggravated assault, driving while intoxicated, swindling by false pretext, forgery, (two counts), driving while intoxicated, second offense, (two counts), theft by bailee, burglary (two counts), and robbery by assault.

The grand jury report, signed by Foreman Gene Abbott of Cisco, said in part, "We particularly wish to commend the members of the Department of Public Safety for their untiring efforts in the protection of the lives and property of citizens who use our highways."

The report said in reference to the 11 passed cases, "The cases passed will require further evidence, which is not available during this term of court."

The jury recessed Tuesday at noon.

Eastland's Fiscal Status Is Improving Each Year

How fares the City of Eastland on this Thanksgiving Day, 1964?

Not bad, judging from a report issued by the Municipal Advisory Council of Texas, just issued.

The report shows that the city has an assessed valuation, as of Sept. 30, of 20.02 per cent of actual value, or \$2,635,236, indicating a \$10 million-plus total for the city.

What about the city's debts? Well, there's \$75,193 in general purpose bonds and \$39,100 in waterworks and sewer system revenue bonds. Special fund balances include \$9,762 in the interest and sinking fund and \$3,525 (including \$3,000 par value U.S. Government securities held as an investment) in reserve fund.

Payment record? — Quote the report: "The city has not defaulted since 1946 when a refunding plan was consum-

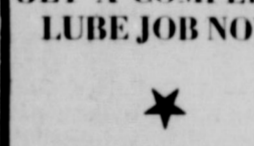

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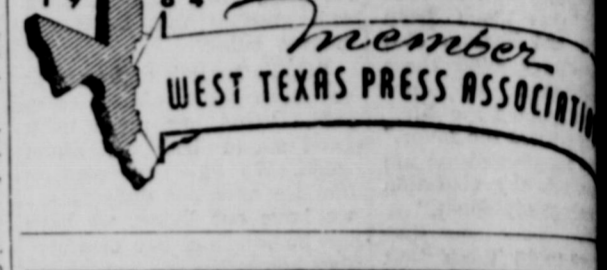

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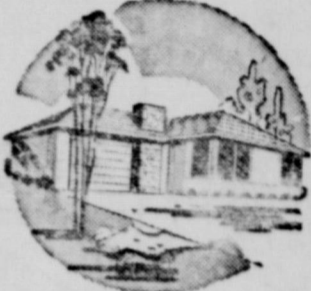

18-YEAR-OLD REGISTRATION DUE 5 DAYS OF BIRTHDAY

An estimated 6,000 to 8,000 18-year-old males, legally required to be registered under the draft law, are not registered in Texas currently, and quite a few of that number are Eastland Countians.

That was the conclusion reached here this week by a spokesman for the local board of the selective service.

The estimate is based on 1946 male birth in the state and rates of increase in the number of males at the 18-year-old level.

More than 45,000 males registered with Texas draft boards from January through July. The figure should be 51,000 to 53,000, based on the best analysis of statistics at his disposal and current experiences of local boards.

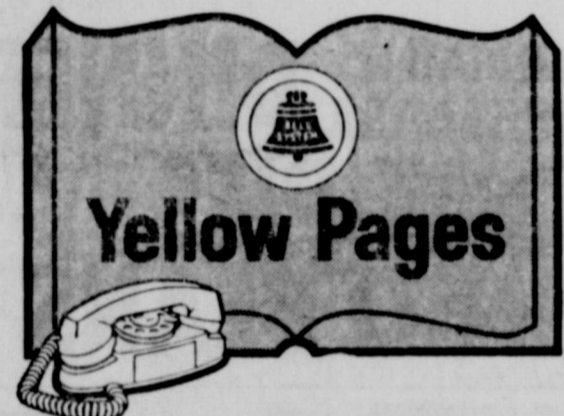
One Texas draft board recently began a special project

of investigation through the school census as well as taking other special actions and doubled its current registration rate of 18-year-olds, the state draft director said. He indicated some other boards

were considering similar action. The draft law makes it the responsibility of the 18-year-old male to register at the nearest local board on the day he is 18, or within five days thereafter. "If he waits as much as six days to present himself for registration, he is late," the spokesman said, "and is subject to penalty of the law."

165 Goats Stolen From Two Ranches

Nearly \$1,700 worth of goats have been stolen in two rustlings and County Sheriff Lee Horn reports that extensive investigations are underway. Both losses were reported Sunday, indicating that the animals were stolen sometime last week.

Frank Byers reported that 75 head of goats were stolen from his place, known as the Frank Ford place, near Nimrod, and O. D. Chambers reported that 90 head were stolen from his place, three miles west of Chandler's Store near Rising Star.

Animals are valued presently at from \$10 to \$12 a head, Sheriff Horn said. A Texas Ranger from Brownwood and a Sheep and Goat Raisers Association official from Coleman are assisting with the investigation. Investigations thus far indicate that the rustlings probably were accomplished by driving trucks, and-or pickups into the places at night and "loading up" because fences are all still in good repair with no signs of having been cut on either place.

Byers runs about 500 head of goats on some 360 acres and Chambers has about 215 head. Brush has been pushed on both places, the sheriff said, and daytime visibility is good. Several good leads are being checked.

This will allow the farmers a period of time in which to consult their 1964 farm business records in order to answer questions on the form accurately before enumerators begin calling on individual farmers to collect the questionnaires. These visits are scheduled to start on November 23rd in this county. An enumerator will call on


every farmer in the district under his supervision, the crew leaders said. At the time of the call, the enumerator will help the farmer complete answers to any questions that prove difficult to understand and check the form for accuracy.

The do-it-yourself aspect of the farm census is aimed at saving time and effort.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9" to gather needed, up-to-date information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventory, information on farm equipment and facilities, farm products sold, and use of fertilizers, insecticides, and herbicides.

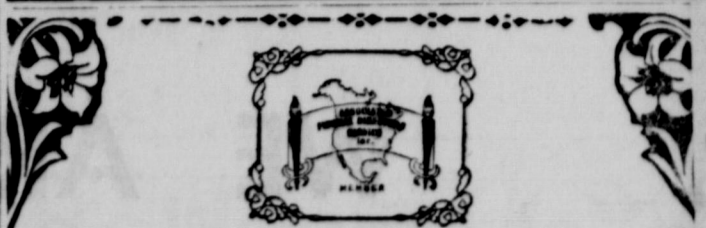
