

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Income Tax Course To Be **Taught At EHS**

The Eastland High School is among the 1,700 schools in Texas that are training stuincome tax returns this year. Principal Charles P. Marshall says that 175 students will receive several hours income tax instruction early in Feb-17 ndictments for theft over ruary. In Texas, 235,000 students will get this training. The free material furnished by the Internal Revenue Service will be taught by teachers Nine years (five suspended) Charles B. Harris, W. L. Sims,

Ellis Campbell, Jr, District Director for Internal Revenue in the Northern half of Texas, the period with two petitioners feels that the schools and teachers are doing an outstanding job with the simple tax course. He explained, "Taxpayers pay 97 per cent of all federal taxes through voluntary compliance. Teaching Taxes teaches the student to pay all the taxes he owes. It also teaches him to keep records and take all the deductions he has coming to

him. This course teaches students to pay the right amount - no more, no less. We started of fering free materials to our nation's schools 12 years ago. Last year 88,000 teachers taught 31/2 million students in approximately 25,000 schools throughout the nation. Students taking this course make enly one fourth as many errors as their parents make on their tax returns."

During the past five years approximately 500 Eastland High School students have completed this course.

giving of notice the City will receive sealed offers on tenders of refunding bonds of this series at prices less than par; and to the extent that fund are available, said bonds will be purchased at the lowest price or prices at which they are offered."

Vets Questions And Answers

Q - My husband died as a result of injuries received in World War II. He obtained a GI loan during his lifetime, which is now paid off. Am I as hs widow, also elgible for

A — Yes. Any widow of a World War II or Korean Conflict veteran may be eligible for a GI loan if the husband's death was service-connected. The fact that the veteran may have obtained a loan does not affect the widow's eligibility.

Q - I am a member of the police force, and I find that there are some restrictions in commecial life insurance policies because of this. Is this true also of my GI life insurance?

A - The restrictions you nention are those imposed because law enforcement is conidered a hazardous occupation. There are no such restriction on GI insurance. The veteran may engage in any occupation, no matter how azardous, without effect on





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
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
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
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
