Public Is Invited To Open House At School Sunday

The public is invited to attend the informal open house of Eastland's new school system facilities Sunday afternoon and inspect the latest in educational plants.

Visitors will be welcomed between the hours of 2 and 5 p.m. at the new Elementary Building on S. Sadosa St. and at the new Gymnasium on S. Ostrum St.

There will be no ceremony or speech, it has been announced, affording visitors the opportunity of setting their own pace at looking at their children's new school home.

The 16-classroom, air-conditioned elementary building also contains a combination cafeteria and auditorium, considered to be a vital addition to the city as a public meeting place. The new school was occupied for the first time this fall, following its completion in late summer.

Eastland residents voted \$550,000 in bonds early in the year to build the new facilities.

The new gym has already seen basketball action twice this season, and coaches will be on hand to explain the modern physical education plant for visitors.

Mrs. Bernice Durham is principal of the elementary school.

On hand Sunday will be faculty members, administrators, and school board members.

Plans for a vocational shop still being worked out by the board, President M. H. Perry said. "We wanted to make sure we got the classrooms and other immediate needs built first with the money we had available," he said.

"We believe that we have bought for the people of Eastland the best possible plant — utilizing the funds entrusted to us by them, to the best of our ability," Perry added, "and when they visit Sunday and see what they own, I hope they will agree with us."

Building architects was the firm of Boone and Pope of Abilene and general contractor was Kinard and Beck, also of Abilene.

Art Center Opens Saturday

Eastland's newest firm, The Art Center, will open Saturday at 113 W. Main St., on the north side of the square, offering a complete service for artists, both professional and amateur.

The center will feature ceramics, ceramic supplies, white china for painting, oils, lessons for the various crafts, and equipment necessary, including a potter's wheel and a kiln.

32 Felony Convictions Bring 77 Years in Pen

A total of 94 years in the state penitentiary was meted out to felonists in 91st District Court during the past two years, a report prepared for the state Attorney General's office reveals.

The 94 years, which includes 17 years of probated and suspended sentences, represents punishments for 32 separate convictions. The 32 convictions were the result of 62 felony indictments rendered from Sept. 1, 1962 to Aug. 31, 1964, the report shows.

There were 49 misdemeanor indictments during the same period with 21 convictions, five acquittals, three dismissals, and \$726.50 collected in fines.

There were two felony acquittals and three dismissals. Countians appear to be re-spectors of fire laws and the truth — there were no arson or perjury indictments during the two-year period.

Sentences resulted from convictions as follows:

Eight years (suspended) for one conviction of two indictments for assault on murder.

Thirty-four years for nine convictions of 13 indictments for burglary.

One indictment for disposing of mortgaged property; no conviction yet.

One conviction of two indictments of felony driving while intoxicated, for \$100 fine.

Three indictments for embezzlement; no convictions.

One \$100 fine not collected for one conviction from one indictment for failure to stop and render aid.

Eleven years (four probated) for three convictions of five indictments for forgery.

Three indictments for murder; no convictions.

One dismissal for three indictments for rape.

Boyce House, the famed au- thor of Texas books, was a sports writer in the Oil Belt's glamorous days. It was this piquant journalist who select- ed the entire Cisco team as his All-State team. Listing each member of the team and what

town he had come from, House ended up with only one player actually being from Cisco. "This represents the state more than any team I can find," wrote the then editor of the Oil Belt News at Eastland.

"Football has come a long way since the 1920's; especial- ly is this true of high school football as was played in the old Oil Belt of Texas," re- called Curtis, who coached six years at Ranger, one of the towns in this league of schools.

"There was no transfer rule and about the most important rule to meet, besides the age limit, was the residence rule, which required that a player's parents must reside in the school district as of Septem- ber 1. Naturally, ambitious coaches began recruiting play- ers and moving families from town to town."

Ranger, Breckenridge and Cisco were in the heart of the oil boom, consequently there were many people moving into these towns. Teams could

pick up several good players each year. This, of course, presented eligibility problems — the exact ages of these players. In those days there were few birth certificates so the earliest "documentary evi- dence" was used to establish the age. A boy might be de- clared eligible by the district committee one week, protested by another team the next week, ineligible the next.

"This happened in Ranger in 1928 with a fine quarterback and passer, Lee (Pud) Ham-

met," Curtis recalled. "Pud moved to Ranger from Hog Town, later called Desdemona. It seemed to only sure way to stop a team was to protest the good players, and practically all of the good players in those days were protested, and several times a season. The League has al- ways permitted four years of play for any boy, and partici- pating in one play counted as a year. Hammett was pro- tected on age but found to be under the limit. But next

Income Tax Course To Be Taught At EHS

The Eastland High School is among the 1,700 schools in Texas that are training students in how to prepare their income tax returns this year. Principal Charles P. Marshall says that 175 students will receive several hours income tax instruction early in February. In Texas, 235,000 students will get this training. The free material furnished by the Internal Revenue Service will be taught by teachers Charles B. Harris, W. L. Sims, and Ethel Woloszyn.

Ellis Campbell, Jr. District Director for Internal Revenue in the Northern half of Texas, feels that the schools and teachers are doing an outstanding job with the simple tax course. He explained, "Taxpayers pay 97 per cent of all federal taxes through voluntary compliance. Teaching Taxes teaches the student to pay all the taxes he owes. It also teaches him to keep records and take all the deductions he has coming to him."

This course teaches students to pay the right amount - no more, no less. We started offering free materials to our nation's schools 12 years ago. Last year 88,000 teachers taught 3 1/2 million students in approximately 25,000 schools throughout the nation. Students taking this course make only one fourth as many errors as their parents make on their tax returns."

During the past five years, approximately 500 Eastland High School students have completed this course.

Mercury Dips To 24 Degrees As Month Ends

Above-average rainfall during the month just ended brought the total for Eastland up to within a drop or two of the average for the year, and the temperature dipped to 24 Monday night for the low of the month.

During November, 3.38 inches were measured. Official Weather Observer James Smith reports, bringing the year's total to 25.97 inches.

Average for November in Eastland is 1.67 inches and average total for the 11 months is 24.22.

Rains fell on seven separate days during the month - 60 on the 4th; 46 on the 5th; 65 on the 13th; 66 on the 14th; 55 on the 15th; 1.22 on the 16th; and 44 on the 17th.

There were quite a few sunny, peanut-maturing days during the month with the rain coming in two "spells." High temperature for the month was 77 degrees, with quite a few "70s" registered.

First sub-freezing temperature was measured about the 20th when a 29 was recorded. Peanut harvest continues heavy in the county as landowners attempt to get their crops in before really bad weather sets in.

Most days during the month, including Thanksgiving Day, were ideal chamber of commerce-type fodder because of the pleasant temperature and un-winter-like conditions.

lene, who had played Haskell, were among the countless others who were drawn into the committee room.

"I really believe that Chuck Bird of Ranger, who had played at Mineral Wells, was protested more times and declared eligible more times, than any other ever to play in the Oil Belt," said Curtis.

"It was almost a weekly affair every Wednesday to meet at Abilene and, fight the Chuck Bird Battle. Ranger for many weeks won two battles a week — one in the committee room, the other on the field. This was in 1930. It took coaches away from their teams a day a week, which was not good, especially if you wanted to win."

Bird was one of the greats of Texas schoolboy football. His "recruiting" began during a game between Ranger and Mineral Wells at Mineral Wells in 1929. Mineral Wells was receiving a punt and Chuck was backing up the line and had retreated to run interference for the Mineral Wells safety man. Bird threw a terrific block on one of the Ranger men covering the punt, knocking the player into another Rangerite — and knocking both men out.

I came on the field with my two boys down and about 10 feet apart," Curtis said.

"Chuck came over to me and apologized for hurting the boys. That's O. K., Chuck. I told him, 'Come to our dressing room after the game. His reply was, 'You are not mad, are you, Coach? 'No, but I want you in Ranger next year, was my answer. He did not see me and later on we persuaded Chuck to play for Ranger and with the great Dangerous Dan McCarty, recruited from Carbon, in 1930."

"Abilene was also bidding for Chuck that year, as was Breckenridge. Anybody who could block, tackle and carry the ball, as Chuck did could, was a highly sought player. McCarty was very fast and shifty — 180 pounds — and Bird, 205-pound pile driver, good blocker and excellent line backer."

Curtis concluded that "re-

cruiting played a very important part in the success of the team back in those days. I always felt that my experience along that line from 1925, until the League passed the one-year transfer rule in the thirties, helped me in recruiting from the University of Texas from 1946 to 1955. We gained real experience then."

Curtis coached at Anson for three years, winning 28 games while losing five and tying one, and in 1926 claimed the State Class B championship at Ranger from 1928 through 1935. Curtis won 40, lost 15 and tied five. At Breckenridge from 1935 through 1944 his teams own 83 games, lost 22 and tied six. He won seven district championships in 10 years and in 1942 was in the state semi-finals, losing to the team that won the title. Austin.

Curtis also coached a Highland Park of Dallas in 1945 and tied Waco for the state championship. This game drew 45,790 paid attendance — the largest crowd in Texas schoolboy history.

Blair Cherry had strong teams at Ranger in the Oil Belt days but won undying fame at Amarillo, where he had three state champions. But Cherrys reminiscences of the Oil Belt capers and great players pack intense interest. Cherry preceded Curtis at Ranger.

He named as the best players of that era Honk Irwin of Cisco, Dan Salkeld of Abilene, Pinkie Alsbrook of Cisco and Ox Hinman and Buster Mills of Ranger.

His most lasting memory was of Buster Mills drop-kicking against Abilene in 1926. "The day before this important game it came a big rain," Cherry recalled. "Since we had very little grass on the field, I became worried, because Abilene was a big outfit and we were small. We would be at a big disadvantage going against the Big Uns. I called my old coach, Matty Bell (Bell coached at Texas Christian when Cherry played his college football), and asked him what to do. He sent me the next day shoes with mud cleats. We scored early in the game one the running and short passing of M. I. S. Near the end of the first half Mills fumbled a punt near our goal and it was recovered by Abilene, which scored to tie the game at 7-7.

"During the half Mills was crying, heart broken. At the start of the second half the field was a quagmire. Mills took the kickoff and returned it past midfield and before we lost our drive he drop-kicked a field goal (mud cleats and all) through the middle. It didn't travel end over end — it spiraled. Later on he repeated and this gave us a 13-7 victory.

"Mills also kicked a field goal — a drop-kick — against Cisco in a terrific sand storm, against the wind, to give us a 3-0 victory.

"We were playing in Breckenridge and won the game. When it ended our players went for the ball but the Breckenridge player in possession of it refused to give it up and this started a fight which developed into gang proportions. One of our players got the ball and a quick-thinking student manager punctured it. The player slip-

ped it into his pants leg and walked off the field while the fight went on. We had to have a police escort back to Ranger. We still have the ball."

One of the main reasons for the intense rivalry in the Old Oil Belt was that the towns were so close together. Ranger on the east was 10 miles from Eastland and 10 miles beyond Eastland was Cisco — all in Eastland County. Thirty miles north was Breckenridge and 50 miles west was Abilene. The race was continually getting scrambled when some lightly considered team arose to knock out the favorite. At times there were ties for the championship, necessitating playoffs. The towns usually drew more spectators for a football game than there were residents.

Boyce House recalled the young man who arrived from Oklahoma and played on the Ranger football team for a season. That year the dogs were only successful. When the track began the coach sauntered out to watch the shop. The youth clothes, picked up the steps into the room, his head a couple and heaved the ball. When the toss was made the coach asked him to do it again. The youth and again the distance measured.

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City Has Paid \$351,107 Of Its Bankruptcy Debts

(ED. NOTE: Second in a series on the City of Eastland's fiscal condition as the year 1964 draws to an end.) Eastland has retired a total of \$351,107 of bonds issued back during the bankruptcy days of 1941 and 1946, according to the report issued by the Municipal Advisory Council of Texas.

How is Eastland paying its debts? A quote from the final decree of the U.S. district court, entered on Aug. 28, 1941, which settled the litigation resulting in the issuance of these bonds, gives some insight into the requirements.

"Sixty days prior to each interest payment date the City Clerk will ascertain the amount of money available in the Principal Account, and if such account contains as much as \$2,000 he shall issue a notice in accordance with this ordinance that on a date approximately 30 days after the

giving of notice the City will receive sealed offers on tenders of refunding bonds of this series at prices less than par; and to the extent that fund are available, said bonds will be purchased at the lowest price or prices at which they are offered."

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Vets Questions And Answers

Q — My husband died as a result of injuries received in World War II. He obtained a GI loan during his lifetime, which is now paid off. Am I as his widow, also eligible for a loan?

A — Yes. Any widow of a World War II or Korean Conflict veteran may be eligible for a GI loan if the husband's death was service-connected. The fact that the veteran may have obtained a loan does not affect the widow's eligibility.

Q — I am a member of the police force, and I find that there are some restrictions in commercial life insurance policies because of this. Is this true also of my GI life insurance?

A — The restrictions you mention are those imposed because law enforcement is considered a hazardous occupation. There are no such restriction on GI insurance. The veteran may engage in any occupation, no matter how hazardous, without effect on the terms of the policy.

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
