Workers Named For Farm Census **Work In Region**

Enumerators have been named in South Eastland County for the 1694 Census of Agriculture, Crew Leader Eloise Parker said today.

Enumerators in Eastland County belong to a force of 23,000 throughout the nation employed temporarily by the U. S. Bureau of the Census for this year's Census of Agriculture.

Enumerators are key workers in an agricultural census. It is the enumerator's responsibility to locate every farm within an enumeration district assigned to him (or her), determine if the operator of the farm has answered all questiens on a questionnaire that will be mailed to the farmer by the Census Bureau, help the farmer complete any unanswered questions on the orm, check answers for accuracy, and deliver the form to the Census Bureau.

A Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9" to gather needed, up-to-date information on the nation's agricultural resources and pro-duction. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventory, information on farm equipment and improvements, farm products sold, and on some production expenditures. formation also will be collected on use of fertilizers, insecticides, and herbicides.
