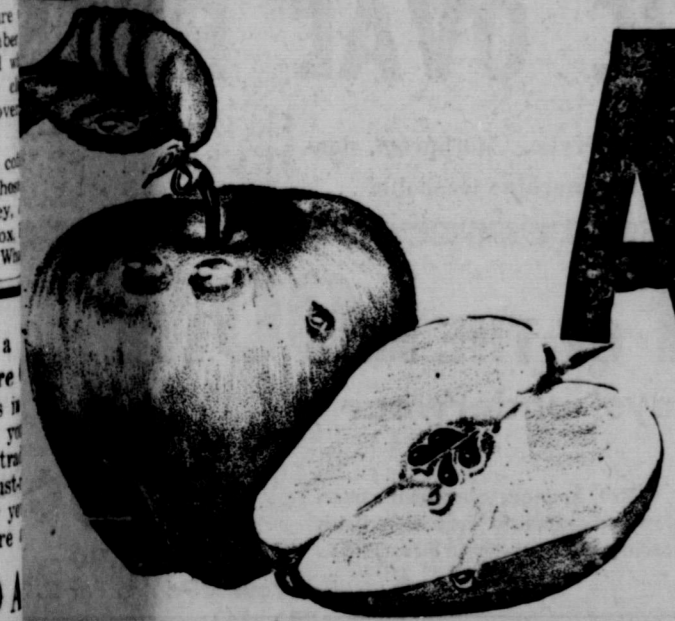

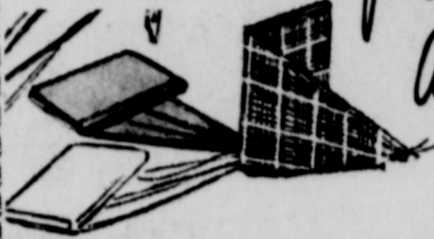

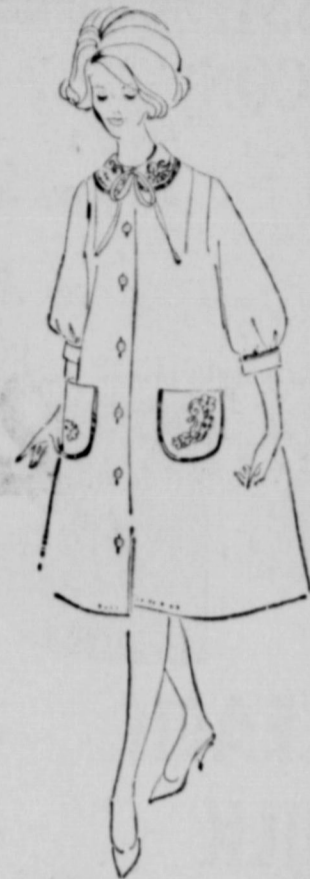

Workers Named For Farm Census Work In Region

Enumerators have been named in South Eastland County for the 1964 Census of Agriculture, Crew Leader Elvise Parker said today. Enumerators in Eastland County belong to a force of 25,000 throughout the nation employed temporarily by the U. S. Bureau of the Census for this year's Census of Agriculture.

Enumerators are key workers in an agricultural census. It is the enumerator's responsibility to locate every farm within an enumeration district assigned to him (or her), determine if the operator of the farm has answered all questions on a questionnaire that will be mailed to the farmer by the Census Bureau, help the farmer complete any unanswered questions on the form, check answers for accuracy, and deliver the form to the Census Bureau.

A Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9" to gather needed, up-to-date information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventory, information on farm equipment and improvements, farm products sold, and on some production expenditures. Information also will be collected on use of fertilizers, insecticides, and herbicides.

The enumerators will be trained in a special 4-day home study course designed to prepare them for the farm census, their crew leader said.

State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN — State Representatives who were sworn to the 1965 Legislature on Monday have military matters very much on their minds. Constituencies of those lawmakers with military bases in their district stand to be affected by both Federal and State proposals.

Some law makers were sworn in with the knowledge that many Federal workers in their districts and to lose their jobs by U. S. Defense Department cutbacks. Operations will be cut out at James Connally Air Force Base at Waco and Amarillo Air Force Base and cut down at Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene and Eagle Mountain Army maintenance facility at Fort Worth.

San Antonio bases and Carswell AFB at Fort Worth stand to gain by the big shift. And that also will present new problems for State Representatives.

Congressional redistricting, one of the major problems facing the 1965 Legislature, may cause a headache for legislators whose districts embrace bases.

Bob Johnson, executive director of the Texas Legislative Council, believes the Legislature could — if it chose — leave out military and State hospital populations in deciding the "population" of a county for redistricting purposes.

By State constitutional provision, persons in State mental hospitals cannot vote, nor can persons in military service who enlisted in other states. Therefore, they could be left out of population totals if the Congressional redistricting goal of "one man, one vote" is considered paramount.

However, Johnson conceded that the mathematics involved in paring down population in communities as heavily military as, say, Bexar County might become so complicated that the Legislature would choose to proceed on full population figures.

Orders involving President Johnson's ranch home near Stonewall from the Parks and Wildlife Commission and the State Highway Commission raise the question of whether tourists from Texas and elsewhere ever will get glimpses of the President at his "little White House" as Washington, D. C., visitors enjoy at the big White House.

Parks and Wildlife Commission authorized creation of a Lyndon B. Johnson State Park directly across from the LBJ Ranch. Commission said the proposed park—located on some 245 acres between Ranch Road 1 and Highway 290—would be created in cooperation with Gillespie County. Commission does not have authority to condemn land for parks but the County does.

The question came up a day later when the Texas Highway Commission granted the U. S. Secret Service's requested authority to restrict traffic on that part of Ranch Road 1 when President Johnson is there — in the interest of presidential safety.

The President returned home last Thursday and is due to remain on the LBJ Ranch until after Thanksgiving.

Industrial Commission at the suggestion of Gov. John Connally.

The Eastland County project is being vigorously supported by Gov. Connally as a pattern to be used throughout Texas following approval by the Texas legislature.

The Tuesday session, held at Ranger Junior College, began at 9 a.m. with opening remarks by County Judge Scott Bailey of Eastland and Mayor Morris Newnam of Ranger.

Clark presided at the morning and afternoon seminar meetings.

About 100 men, including members of the Ranger Lions and Rotary Clubs as special guests, were present for the noon luncheon in the college cafeteria. Mayor Newnam presided and featured address at noontime was delivered by Perryman of Lone Star Gas Co.

He told his audience that the six keys to community in-

dustrial growth are people, purpose, plan, performance, perseverance and progress. The Ranger Junior College choir, under direction of Kenneth Alford, also entertained with Christmas songs. Joe Dennis of the Ranger Lions Club was program chairman.

As first speaker during the morning session of the Tuesday seminar, Perryman, former city manager at Paris and Brownwood, made a talk and visual slide presentation relating to the topic "Is Your Town Ready?"

He reminded the group that rural population is rapidly making an exodus to larger cities and pointed out that industrial development of communities in rural areas is necessary to produce new jobs to meet unemployment problems created by automation in agriculture.

Jordan, WTCC industrial executive, challenging the group for community improvement and development to lure new industry, pointed out that of 132 West Texas counties, only 12 have more industrial and manufacturing enterprises than Eastland County. There are 37 plants in the county, producing 30 diversified products.

Jordan also noted that Eastland County's retail sales — in excess of \$20 million annually — rank it among the top 25 per cent of West Texas counties and that in yearly income — \$26 million — it ranks among the top 30 per cent in that area. In addition, bank

deposits total nearly \$17 million, loans about \$9 million. He also complimented Eastland County leaders on the advantage that junior colleges are located at Ranger and Cisco. He predicted, on the basis of population growth, a "new day for junior colleges" and urged the county to "move to the forefront of the junior college movement."

Lee Vickers, field representative of Texas Municipal League, spoke on the importance of close cooperation between government at all levels — especially city government — and all civic institutions in the quest for new industry and in creating "a better business climate."

He emphasized the importance of community planning to meet the challenges of future growth, and said that zoning definitely was a necessity in planning a program of industrialization.

Milner concluded the Tuesday seminar with a review of the day's salient points as presented by the speaker.

Guiding the county's industrialization effort is County Judge Scott Bailey and a steering committee composed of Mayor Newnam of Ranger, and Mayors A. R. Rutherford of Cisco, Frank Deaton of Eastland, Walter Smith of Rising Star, and Ross Wilson of Gorman.

The second seminar — accenting the importance of research in securing new industry — will be held at Eastland on Wednesday, Jan. 6.
