Twin Garbage Pickup Begins Monday, 29th

The special, double summer garbage pickup schedule will begin Monday, June 29, City Manager Lewis Tiner has announced.

The double pickup is put into effect each summer during the hotter months — July and August — to insure that refuse is picked up as soon as possible, he said. It amounts to two pickups per week for residents rather than the ordinary one per week.

Those persons who have been having one garbage pickup on Monday or Tuesday, will have pickups on Monday and Thursday. Those accustomed to pickups on Wednesday or Thursday, will have pickups on Tuesday and Friday. Friday or Saturday rounds will be made Wednesday and Saturday, he said.

Residents may cooperate by planning their individual take-outs for these days, so that refuse may be picked up promptly in order to prevent health hazards in the city.

Two Men Earn Competency Certificates

Eugene Kitchens of the Eastland city water department and R. M. Buntin, Sr., operations specialist with the Gorman city waste water treatment plant, have earned an official State Health Department certificate of competency.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association, the citation was given to Kitchens and Buntin after they successfully passed examinations to demonstrate their skill in plant management and their understanding of modern methods of water pollution control.

Under terms of the health agency's operator certification program, candidates for certification must acquire a certain amount of actual work experience, and must show a satisfactory record of attendance at state and regional short schools at which the techniques of modern plant management are taught.

Plant operators often attend such schools at their own expense and on their own time as a means of increasing their efficiency and enhancing their status as key community servants.

The schools are conducted under sponsorship of the State Department of Health, the engineering extension service of Texas A&M University, and the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association.

TWSWA officials said recipients of the certificates are "credits to their communities and to their profession."

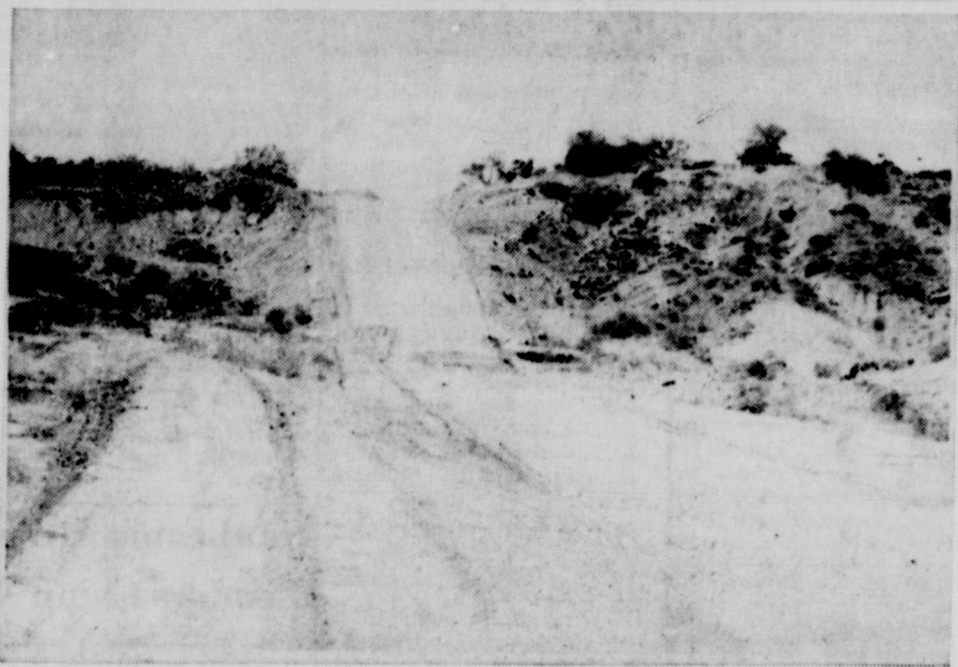
Chance Family Will Attend Glorieta Meeting

H. N. Mehaffey Awarded Degree

Henry Pullman Spans 50 Years For Lions Club

"Now to begin with it..." began Henry Pullman, Eastland business man since 1923, as he told about the past 50 years of his life as program for the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday.

It was his third appearance before the club, he said. He first appeared 25 years ago when the club met at the Morton Valley school. (Only three members — Frank Crowell, Judge Clyde Grissam and Ed Freyschlag — were present Tuesday, who were present when Mr. Pullman first talked to the club).

Pullman and his wife, Tillie, operate the Eastland Iron and Metal Co. on E. Main St. He was born 65 years ago in Lithuania on the East Prussian (East German) border, one of ten children in his family. Of the ten, he said during the informal talk, seven were killed in World War II.

He described how he was a "smuggler" in his youth ("until lightning struck and there was a strange guard on duty one day"), how he was in the grocery business ("I went broke anyway") and finally how he got into the "crap business." His presentation was both serious and comical.

Newly installed president, Leon Musgrove presided and guests included Rev. B. L. McCord of Ranger and Ted Roark of Burk Burnett. Mr. Roark has been named information officer for his area on Dist. Gov. Elect James McCracken's cabinet, it was reported, and was in Eastland awaiting the birth of a grandchild.

PFC J. D. Walker Finishes Course

Army PFC James D. Walker, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. M. Walker, Rt. 1, Rising Star, completed a chemical, biological and radiological course with honors June 10 in Germany.

He is a 1958 graduate of Cisco High School and attended Cisco Junior College.

Laney 'Pulls Pistol' Second Time In Career to Un-Arm Knife-Wielder

Eastland Police Chief Ray Laney had to resort to his pistol Saturday morning to un-arm a man-size juvenile who was threatening to cut his daddy's head off with a jungle-size butcher knife.

It was only the second time in nearly 21 years service that Chief Laney has called on his firearm to help him out, and he added that he was mighty happy that he hasn't had to "go all the way" with it either time.

The youth only 15 years in age, but six-plus in height, and heavy, heavy in weight, apparently tanked up on vino Friday night and was causing his father quite a bit of disturbance Saturday morning when the police were called.

When Chief Laney arrived at the home, site of the fracas, the boy had his father hemmed in a corner, fanning the air with the long, sharp knife and threatening to slice the man's head off.

"I'll drop you, if you cut him," the chief told the boy, taking his service revolver from its familiar place at his side. Even a bit wild, and perhaps a great deal hung-over, the boy had reason enough to know the chief meant business. Subdued, the youth handed over the knife and spent the rest of the day and that night in the county jail.

As a rookie policeman, Laney said, he used the pistol once before in a suspected grocery burglary.

City officials were unanimous in praise for Chief Laney and cited his rare use of firearms as a decided compliment to his ability as a law enforcement officer to handle situations without depending on the use of threat and harm.

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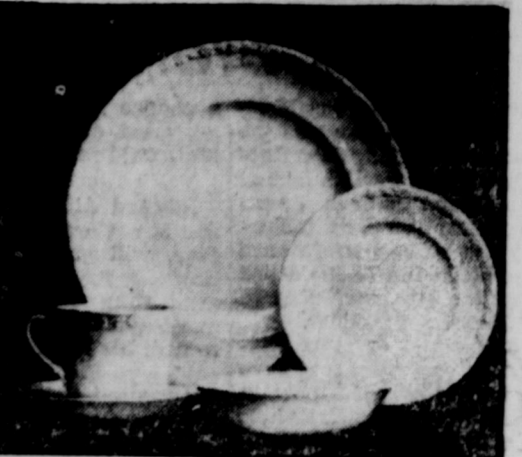

Upon our arrival at Sydney we checked in at the Manhattan Hotel where we stayed three years ago, and found it practically unchanged. The small birds still fly into the spacious dining room through the open windows for crumbs and to peck at any butter

left on tables. The excellent view of Sydney harbor adds to the fun of eating there. Sydney as a city has changed considerably in three years, with a lot of new modern office buildings and thoroughways.

On Saturday, the day following our arrival, we were entertained by our friends, the veterinarian and his family in their new home, followed by a drive in the country. That evening we took them to Her Majesty's Theatre to see an American Company play "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying." It was an excellent comedy well played. Early Sunday we were awakened by the calls of mourning doves in nearby trees, and we heard them again at sunset. Their low call is most pleasant. Sunday afternoon Emily and I took a two mile walk, had lunch at a tea room in Domain Park, after which we sat on a park bench and observed the people. The Australian seem to be slaves to the tea habit and they bring thermos jugs of hot tea to the park, spread a napkin on the grass and enjoy a leisurely tea, with scones and cookies. Later the sea gulls and pigeons come along for any leftover crumbs.

Sunday evening we were driven to the home of another friend, a physicist, where we joined three more couples for a delicious dinner followed by a good evening of conversation with an accountant, a professor of philosophy at the University of New South

Wales, a barrister and our host, and the wives of all.

Near the Sydney docks we discovered a bronze plaque: "To commemorate the place of farewell to the soldiers who passed through the gates opposite for the great war 1914-1919.
