# **1 A Modern Driver License Law**

The Texas driver license law has not been revised substantially since 1941. By all standards, many of its provisions have become obsolete, and time has proved that it is inadequate to do the job for which it is intended - to protect the average driver from the small percentage of dangerous drivers who repeatedly refuse to operate motor vehicles in a safe and legal manner.

The proposed revision of the Texas Driver License Law is designed to plug numerous loopholes through which wanton violators of the laws of safety who have long records of lawlessness can presently retain a valid driver's license and continue to endanger the life and property of others.

For example, there have been cases where people have been illed by drivers with extensive records of flagrant while in the act of committing another serious violation and holding a valid driver's license. The proposed new law would help to remedy this situation, and make many other badly needed improvements in the driver license law. These would include:

## 2 More Highway Patrolmen

#### Adequate pay!

The National Safety Council has repeatedly affirmed that the Texas Department of Public Safety and its Highway Patrol are among the nation's best in performing their duties.

But the Texas Highway Patrol is operating with less than half the number of men needed to cover our vast highway system, based on national standards, and is finding it increasingly more difficult to fill the ranks because of inadequate salaries to compete with industry.

# **3 Driver Education** For All Teen-Agers

Texas is pouring some 150,000 new Teen-Age drivers into its vast traffic streams every year. Less than half receive any training in the arts and skills of driving an automobile, yet most of them drive.

For years now, about one-fourth of the Texas traffic death toll is composed of young Texans from 15 to 24 years of age, and they are involved in 31% of the rural-traffic crashes while holding 20% of the driver's licenses.

# **4 Traffic Courts of Record**

Texas traffic cases are tried by Corporation Courts in the cities, by Justice of Peace courts in rural areas. No written record is kept in these courts, so that any case

which is appealed to a higher court is tried all over again.

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In many counties, county courts receiving these appeals are overloaded, since they handle many other types of cases, too. Delays in trials may stretch into months or years; witnesses may move away; facts grow stale; a new judge may "clear the docket" and may dismiss hundreds of cases in which all defendants are cleared without trial.

A frequent violator may not only find ways of delaying his trial; he may eventually "wear out" the case and have all charges dismissed.

1. Authority to give special attention to the improvement of substandard drivers.

2. Authority to remove totally unqualified, dangerous and lawless drivers from streets and highways through denial or revocation of license quickly and surely.

#### TEXAS MUST KEEP PACE

Its accident prevention programs must be as up-to-date as space-age living. In 1963:

- Texas' 2,729 motorcides were 13% higher than in 1962.
- Texas traffic killed one person every 3 hours and 12 minutes.
- Texas motor vehicle accidents cost \$13.72 per second.

Federal aid or subsidy is NOT involved. Passage of the "4 Laws" by the 1965 Texas Legislature CAN reduce the needless loss of lives and human suffering caused by traffic accidents-and-SAVE TAXPAYERS MILLIONS!

Records of the National Safety Council show that Texas has 791 patrolmen looking after 32,440 miles of paved state highways as compared with 2,707 patrolmen for 11,110 miles of paved roads in California and 2,180 men on 20.730 miles in Pennsylvania. Illinois has 1,304 patrolmen for 12,610 miles of state roads, and Ohio has 1,178 men for 15,730 miles.

A considerable percentage of all Texas traffic crashes are not investigated by the Highway Patrol because there are too few Patrolmen, although they average 54 hours a week, longer in emergencies and without overtime pay

Texas needs higher pay for its career patrolmen, at least 100 more men each year until its present strength is doubled, to about 1,800 to 2,000 men.

In many other states, reliable stud-: ies indicate this crash involvement can be reduced by 50% among trained young drivers as compared with their untrained classmates.

While a high school education is estimated to cost about \$15,000, Driver Education courses are being taught in various Texas high schools at \$40 to \$110 per student. This is a tremendous educational bargain.

But Driver Education still costs more than some schools and some students can afford, so it is proposed that all Texas students shall have the opportunity to learn how to stay alive in Texas traffic through proper high school training. To make this possible, it is proposed that state aid be proviced for driver education through the Gilmer-Aikin Minimum Foundation Program, long and successfully used in our state to provide all school district and students with minimum-level high school education.

Texas have favored establishment of courts of record for traffic cases. The State Bar has proposed traffic courts of record which would also be empowered to try more serious traffic cases-driving while intoxicated, driving while license is suspended, homicide and assault cases-which present Corporation and Justice Courts may not hear.

Traffic Courts of Record, operating under standards established by the Association of Chief Justices of State Supreme Courts and the American Bar Association, can provide immediate, fair and impartial trials. Thus, traffic defendants may be found innocent or proven guilty, but in either event, these courts can administer justice efficiently and fairly.
