### Soc. Security Form Told of For Farmers

In my last article I called attention to a responsibility under the social security law which must be met before the end of January by every farm or ranch operator who paid as much as \$100 cash wages to any one agricultural employee in 1955. Today, I shall describe the form he must use to report the wages and remit the social security tax.

For this purpose use Form 943 "Employer's Tax and Information Return for Agricultural Employees." Insofar as possible, the District Director of Internal Revenue mailed this form to agricultural employers in the area serviced by his district office. If you are required to report wages paid to your agricultural employees in 1955 and did not receive a form or have lost the one you received ask the District Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas, Texas, for a copy.

There are three important entries you should make on this form. First, sign and date it, and give your title — that is, owner, president, partner, member, etc. of the agricultural enterprise. Second, be sure to enter each of your employees' social security account numbers correctly, also his full name and the total of taxable cash wages paid to him during the year.

It is best to copy the number and his name directly from his social security card. This is important in order that the employee's taxable wages can be credited to the right social security account. In case it is impossible to obtain his social security number, write "Unknown" and enclose a sheet of paper showing the employee's name and address. Third, enter the amount of the total taxable cash wages you paid during 1955 to all of your farm employees, counting only the employees to whom you paid \$100 or more in cash wages.

Multiply the total of these cash wages by 4 per cent and enter this amount. If you have been required to make one or more deposit amounts of social security taxes with the Internal Revenue Service during the year subtract those amounts from the total tax, attach depository receipts, Form 450, and enter the amount of the balance of tax due and remit the social security tax.

One thing more. To help the Government keep records, every employer who is required to re-

port wages for employees and pay the social security tax should secure an identification number. Do not confuse this number with the number on your own social security card which you will use to report your net earnings for your own and your family's old-age and survivors insurance protection.

If you do not now have an employer's identification number, get Form SS-4 from the District Director of Internal Revenue or your social security district office. Fill it in promptly and send it to the District Director of Internal Revenue with your Form 943.

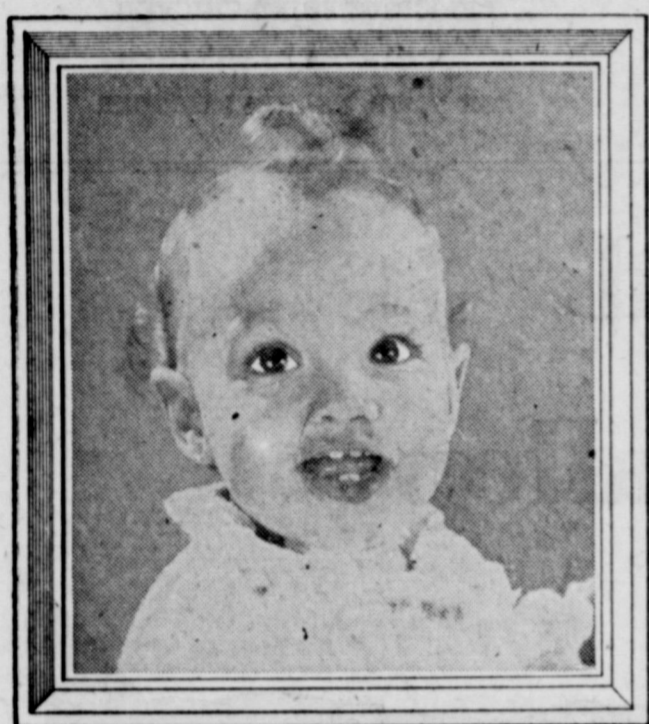
### Gorman Hit By Trio Check Cases Lately

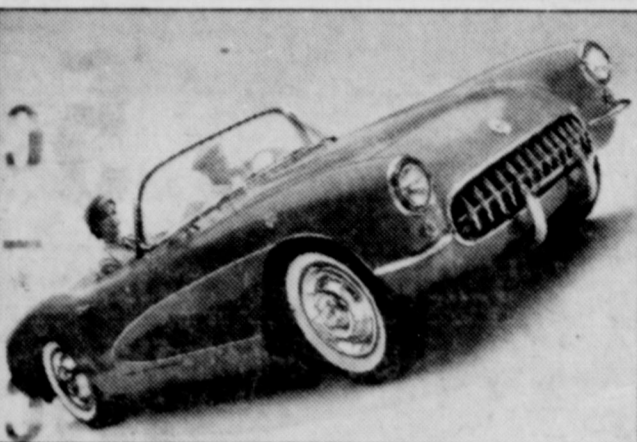
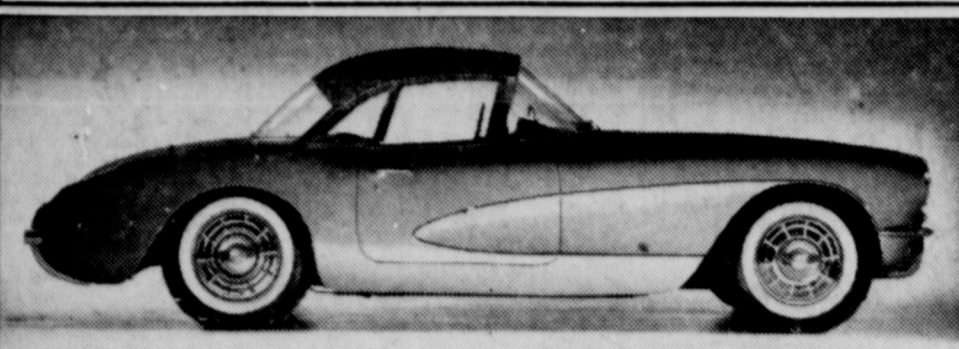

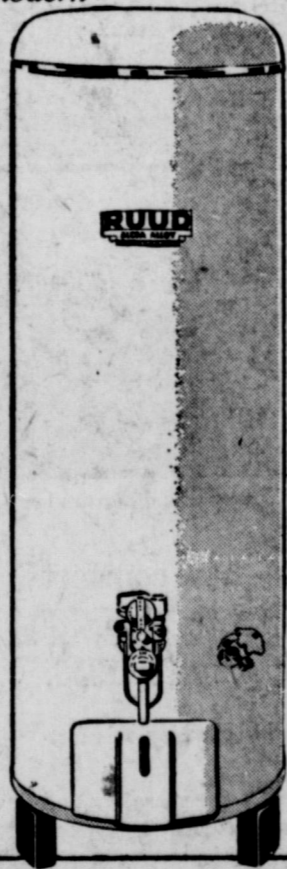

Many of the strikes, of course, were minor, some being prorated in the regular field. A Flippen sand discovery which opened the Tuscola, North Field in the southern part of the county led Taylor activity.

It was Sid Katz and R. H. Venable No. 1 Thad A. Russell, Section 20, Block 1, SP Survey. Completed for a daily flowing potential of 243.01 barrels of oil, it was followed by a great amount of successful development drilling.

Most "talked about" discovery in the area was American Liberty Oil Co. No. 2 Shadle, completed in November as a Cambrian sand strike two miles north of Aspermont in Stonewall County. The well is the Schick Field area, opened earlier in the year with a Bend Conglomerate discovery by J. B. Schick Drilling Co.

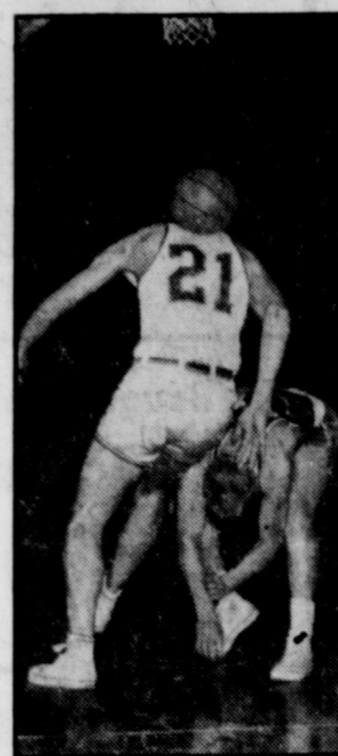
Among other significant discoveries in the area were the Sweetwater (Canyon Sand) Field in southern Fisher County, Fennell multipay Field west of Winters in Runtels County the Nena Lucia Strawn and Odum Field in southwest Nolan County and the Vensenmeir Field in Stephens County.

In the five-year period from 1951 through 1955, West Central Texas has gained a grand total of 1,034 discoveries. Leading county during the span was Runtels County, with 127 new strikes. Runtels had 34 discoveries in 1953, best all-time record in the area.

Coleman and Jones counties tie for second place during the 5-year period, both with 102 strikes.

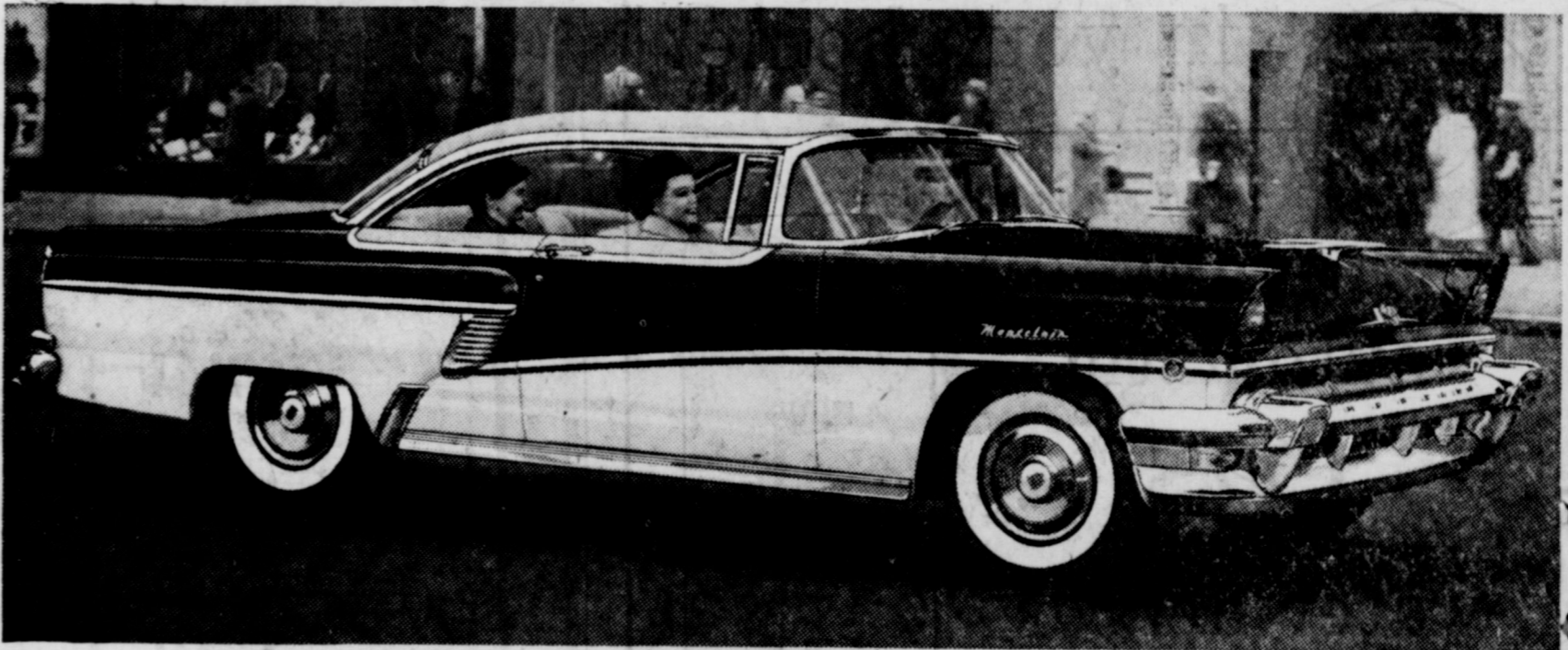

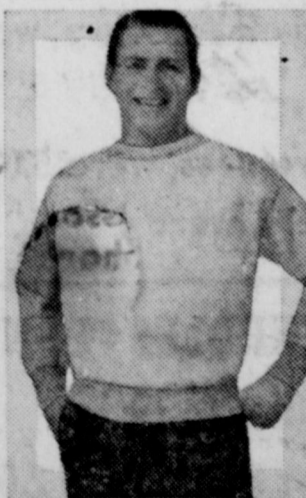

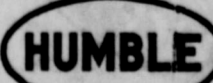
