A total of 5,905 voters casting ballots in the county's 13 precincts gave Brown 3,650 votes to 2,093 for Conner.

Citizens of the Cisco precinct gave Brown an over-whelming 1203-267 triumph over incumbent Conner. He also carried Ranger by a vote of 618 to 492. Brown carried 11 of the county's 13 precincts in the May 2 balloting.

A number of Eastland County citizens were reported to have contacted the office of Governor Connally in Austin Monday and Tuesday urging the appointment of County-District Attorney-elect Brown to the judgeship.

The movement is being led by Democrats in Ranger and "It also is being widely supported by citizens over Eastland County."

The spokesman also stated that Brown had been contacted and that "he said that he would gladly accept an appointment as district judge.' In the event that Brown were appointed to the judgeship by Gov.
