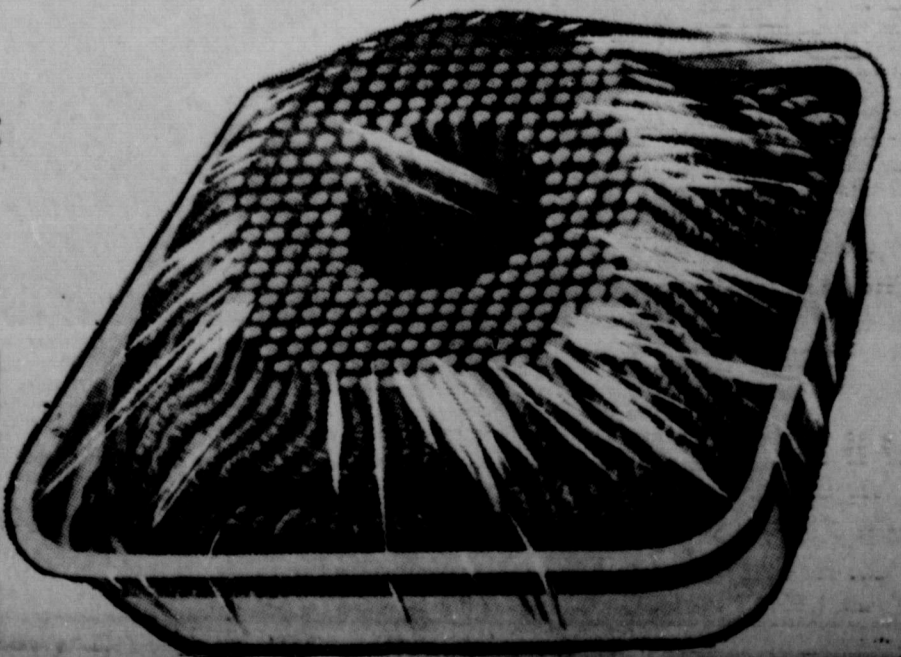

AMARILLO — Cisco, paced by Preston Shearod and 6-7 Harry Gunner, rushed to a 13-1 season record to pace all teams in the Region V division of the National Junior College Athletic Association.

Shearod is the second leading scorer among individuals in the region with a 22.4-point per game average. Gunner is scoring 17.6 points per game and hauling down 12.1 rebounds per game.

Cisco is averaging 100.4 points per game, while limiting their foes to an average of 70.6.

Her Recipe Collection Well-Tested

Most women collect recipes. But Mrs. Frank Sparks collects and serves them, too. Her loose leaf notebook is a favorite source for neighbors searching for old favorites and something different.

One she serves frequently at bridge club is:

JACK STRAW CASSEROLE

1 4-ounce can shoe string potatoes
One 6 1-2, 7 or 9 1-2 ounce can drained tuna.
One three-ounce can boiled sliced mushrooms
1-4 cup sliced pimientos
One can of fancy mixed Chinese vegetables
Save one cup potatoes for topping. Bake uncovered 20-30 minutes at 375 degrees.

GREEN RICE

2 cups cooked rice
One tall can evaporated milk
2 eggs beaten
One small onion, grated
1-4 lb. Old English cheese
Garlic, one clove
one-third cup oil or oleo
Salt and pepper
Put container in pan of water at 350 degrees, one hr.

GRIT SOUFFLE

Boil three cups water. Add 1 tsp. salt and dash of garlic, red pepper or dash tabasco.
Boil hard and slowly add 1 cup quick cooking grits. When begins to thicken add one stick oleo. Then add 1-2 cup sharp

grated cheese or one package jalapeno cheese.

When thickened add 1-2 cup sweet milk and 2 beaten eggs. Put in buttered casserole and cook uncovered 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Put cheese on top. Serve with ham or chicken.

SHRIMP, JELLO SALAD

One pkg. lemon Jello
1 cup boiling water
Cool until partly jelled and whip one cup whipping cream and fold into Jello, then add 1-2 cup chipped celery, green olives. Pour into molds and chill.

DRESSING

Dilute one-third pint real mayonnaise with cream. Add 1-2 lb. of shrimp, 1-4 cup pimiento, lemon juice and scraped onion. Pour over salad.

MAMA-O POUND CAKE

1 cup butter or 2 sticks oleo
1 3-4 cup sugar
2 cups cake flour
3 teaspoons lemon juice
5 eggs (6 if small)
Use tube pan. Cream butter and sugar well. Add lemon juice. Beat in whole eggs one at a time. Add sifted flour and mix well. Cook 325 degrees, for one hour.

CRAB STUFFED POTATOES

4 medium potatoes
1 6-ounce can of crabmeat
1-2 cup butter
1-2 cup light cream
1 teaspoon salt
4 teaspoons grated onion
1 cup grated sharp cheese
Cayenne pepper and paprika
Bake potatoes, scoop out and

mash fine. Add crabmeat and restuff. Refill potato skins and heat in oven 15 minutes.

SHRIMP RICE MacDOINE

3 tbs. vegetable oil
1 bunch green onion (chopped fine) about 1 cup
1 clove garlic (chopped)
1 green pepper (chopped) about 1 cup

1 cup rice (uncooked)
1 tsp. salt
1-2 tsp. accent
2 cans shrimp (5 oz.)
1 6-oz. can mushrooms (cut)
1-4 cup pimiento (chopped)
1 bay leaf
2 cups water
Brown rice in oil. Add onions, seasoning and everything else. Add water, cover and cook 15-20 minutes. Serves 6.

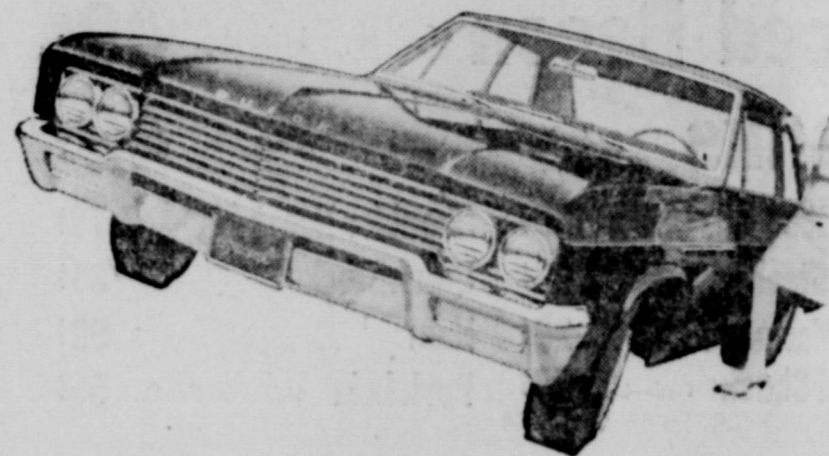

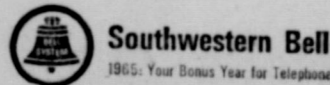

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State Capital NEWS

By Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — Surprises come fast and furious on the political scene in Austin.

First surprise of the new year was the resignation of Ernest O. Thompson.

Then came an even greater surprise as the Legislature was out to open and everything as in readiness under the management . . . pre-empted with problems of the old and new . . . Gov. Th. Clonally named House speaker Byron Tunnell to fill Thompson's old post.

Thompson, once the battling mayor of Amarillo and more than 30 years a rapper on the Railroad Commission, had been ill for many months. Only recently had he been moved from an Amarillo hospital. He had two years yet to serve.

Tunnell is an East Texan. He's the first person from the East Texas oil area to serve on the Railroad Commission in 23 years. He was just beginning his third term as legislator from the Tyler-Kilgore region and expected to preside for a second term as House Speaker.

Immediately upon learning of Tunnell's appointment, Rep. Ben Barnes of De Leon, contacting Legislators about the speakership. Barnes already had announced as a candidate for Speaker of the 1967 session.

Most observers feel the 59th session may run through the summer. Certainly it will dominate the 1965 Texas political scene.

These results seem likely: . . . Lawmakers will spend

a record amount of money, much of it to uplift higher education. Budget proposals of both Governor Connally and the Legislative Budget Board awaited Senators and Representatives at their capitol desks.

. . . School teachers will get the \$45 a month pay raise they are asking. But they will have to figure out who is going to foot the bill.

. . . A few more exemptions are going to be removed from the state sales tax. Just enough to balance the budget, but not enough to hurt much.

. . . Commission on Higher Education will be reorganized along lines recommended by Governor Connally. But the successor agency may not get all the power Connally would like it to have.

. . . Stormy hearings will be held over legalizing horse race betting and sale of liquor by the drink. Both proposals may move farther than they ever have before. Maybe all the way.

. . . A congressional reapportionment bill eventually will be adopted. However, it's difficult to see any agreement on legislative redistricting.

Other key issues which will occupy the 59th Legislature are statewide water planning and financing, oil and gas tract pooling, mental health and tuberculosis programs, criminal code revision, judicial redistricting, state property tax repeal, extension of the medical care for the aged program as authorized by constitutional amendment voted on November 3, equal rights for women, gasoline tax exemptions for municipal bus lines, and enlargement of state tourist and industrial attraction programs.

Before the end of 1965, Texas will have 1,623 miles of super roads. Total interstate highway system designated for Texas is 3,025 miles. California, heretofore the

leader, has a designated interstate system of 2,173 miles. Interstate construction in Texas costs \$610,000 a mile, compared with about \$1,000,000 nationwide.

Railroad Commission is having a difficult time getting rid of more than 107,000 barrels of oil, impounded because of illegal production. Some of it has been tied up since 1933.

About 70,000 barrels of this oil has been stored in Beacon Tanks in East Texas for close to 30 years. State can't find a buyer for it because Federal law prohibits the sale of illegal oil into interstate commerce, says Fred Young, attorney for the Commission.

Young said the counties have received some benefits from the Commissions problem. When a well is shut down on an illegal production order, oil at the well is impounded in tanks at the well site. When oil operators want to use their tanks, the Railroad Commission will let them give the impounded oil to counties for road construction free.

State Board of Education voted 13-5 to comply with the 1964 Civil Rights law, a necessary ingredient for acceptance of some \$37,000,000 in Federal funds for public school operation.

But the Texas Commission on Higher Education, which will administer the new Federal college construction grant program, says it has not been requested to sign any such agreement.

Governor Connally appointed Dr. McIver Furman of Corpus Christi to the Texas Commission on Alcoholism and reappointed Dr. Ira Woods of Grapevine and Dr. N. Review Of Tom Lea's King Ranch Is Rotary Program In Eastland

A review of a "Texas book about a Texas institution" was program for the Eastland Rotary Club Monday as Cisco Attorney W. B. Wright shared Tom Lea's two-volume Southwest classic on the King Ranch.

H. T. Wilson was program chairman and introduced Wright who explained that the book carries the King Ranch copyright, indicating that it was written, if not at their request, at least through their editing. "Because there's but one disparaging incident in the work."

Published in 1937, the book(s) was published in Texas, and logically begins with the story of Capt. Richard King, a native New Yorker, who with 11 months school amassed one of the nation's largest fortunes. First a runaway seaman who later became a captain and partner in a river-boat operation, King purchased his first Texas land for two cent an acre (15,000 acres) and in 1854 his first stud for \$600.

In '54 another 54,000 acres were purchased and his partner was mysteriously killed in 1855. King and his river-

boat partner joined forces in 1860 and were set just right to profit during the Civil War by running cotton down the Rio Grande to Mexico where it was sold profitably by the Confederacy to the British. In 1857 Partner Kennedy sold out, leaving King sole owner of the growing empire, which adopted its famous Running W brand in '67, and started cattle drives to Abilene, Kansas in 1870.

King died in 1886 leaving a son-in-law to operate the spread, which by 1906 contained a million acres. The Ranch operation was incorporated in 1934 after having granted drilling rights to Humble Oil Co. the year before. Today the ranch comprises about 726,000 acres.
