



Eastland May Sell Water to Olden For Its Proposed FHA System

The Eastland County Water Supply District cannot sell treated water to the residents of Olden with its present equipment, a representative of the district told the Eastland City Commission Friday.

H. T. Wilson, speaking for the District, told the Eastland Commission that Olden residents had recently met with the district to ask "How they could buy water" for their proposed new water system. The district has contracted

its total capability, Director Wilson, who was accompanied by Director M. H. Perry, told the commission. "The district is under contract with the City of Eastland and the City of Ranger to provide each on demand, 1,800,000 gallons per day, and this is the total capacity of the district's treatment facilities," he said.

Pa Moseley and Bert Kent, both of Olden and both active in the drive to provide a water system in Olden, but at the

commission meeting on another matter, were asked by Wilson to report to the Olden group of the district's findings. "Our pumping facilities would be adequate," he said, "but we can't treat more water than what we're already contracted for."

It appears possible that the City of Eastland might be able to sell Olden water from its own "quota."

There are presently 65 residents in Olden buying water from Eastland (at the same rate as Eastlanders, plus 50 cents for meter reading), Moseley said, and the developers of the water system plan to have about 70 on the program when it begins, expanding up to some 100.

This would represent an increase of some 40 per cent in water sold by Eastland, and judging by comments by commissioners later, it would probably be necessary to sell the water at some 30 cents per thousand gallons.

Miller and Kent asked the commission for the loan of an unused siren for Olden's new fire department, as a signal system. The Commission told the two that they were welcome to it, if it doesn't belong to the Volunteer Fire Department, in which case they'd have to ask that body.

Moseley said that the Federal Housing Authority is going to loan the money to the Olden project for the water system and that it would be a complete system, governed by a board of directors, who would arrange for meter reading and bill collections. "Eastland," he said, "would have only to set a master meter and bill the Olden organization for used water."

"Will there be an incorporation of the city of Olden?" Commissioner Curtis Koen asked. "No," Moseley answered. "Then who'll be responsible?" Curtis asked.

"Well, it'll be handled by the FHA, with stockholders electing directors," said Moseley. "Somewhat like the REA, commissioner James Reid said.

The Abilene firm of Yates and Decker has been employed to draw up plans for the Olden system, Moseley said.

A master meter will cost some \$1,000 to install, City Manager Lewis Tiner said, and he was instructed to confer with City Auditor E. J. Johnston regarding a further study of water costs.

The commission approved a recommendation by the State Highway Department affecting certain changes on speed limits on State Highway 6 through the city.

The commission agreed to continue the practice of giving Christmas bonuses to city employees.

Mayor Frank Deaton presided and Commissioners Koen, Reid and Dale Trutt were present for the Friday afternoon meeting. The earlier called meeting will replace the regularly scheduled monthly meeting which would have been Monday, Dec. 21.

Old Rip Scrip, that Eastland tradition which has become well-loved by citizens throughout this area, is destined to be a part of the local scene for days to come, after action by Eastland Chamber of Commerce directors this week.

A brief discussion of a salary increase for Secretary Mrs. Clyde Benton was discussed but no action taken and directors agreed to continue study of the matter.

Research Expert Due To Speak At Industry Seminar

Dr. W. L. Fisher, Research Scientist and Lecturer for the University of Texas, will be one of the featured speakers at the second EC-65 Training Seminar, according to an announcement by the Texas Industrial Commission.

Dr. Fisher, a member of the faculty of the Bureau of Economic Geology, will discuss the "Mineral Resources of Eastland County." He is a graduate of Kansas University and has been associated with the University of Texas since 1960.

This will be the second in a series of five seminars sponsored by the Texas Industrial Commission in conjunction with EC65, the industrial development pilot project for Eastland County. The first seminar, held in Ranger in early December, covered the topic of "Community Betterment" one of the five steps toward the industrialization of this area. The second seminar is called "Research and Analysis." Three other training sessions are scheduled in the coming months.

The meeting will be held January 6 in Eastland at the White Elephant Restaurant beginning at 9:00 a.m.
