The Eastland Maverick basketball squad has won their school another district championship trophy, and in so doing, the hearts of all their fans.

It was a two-stage firing that hurled the Mavericks to their undisputed District 10-A victory and caused the town to go into orbit Friday night.

The District crown last rested on the Mavericks in the Mid-40s.

Playing the games one-by-one as they've done all season the Mavericks handily defeated the Cross Plains Buffaloes Friday night in the local gym, 74-41, accounting for the first stage. The second stage was the surprise upset by Clyde over Baird, who had been tied with the Mavericks for first place, and guessed to be a play-off certainty for the Mavs this week. Clyde handed it to their rival neighbors, the Bears, 59-52, proving again that record books go out the window in certain twin-town tilts.

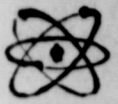
Traded for the new truck was an old truck and body and \$5,200 difference, Tiner said.

five civil cases, clearing that many from the docket, and saw the empannelment of a grand jury. He had invited Judge Floyd Jones, now retired, of Breckenridge, to empanel the grand jury because several of the prospective jurors had been clients of Attorney Sparks before he was named judge.

Attorney Frank Sparks officially became "His Honor" in informal swearing-in ceremonies in 91st District Court in Eastland Thursday.

Introduced by County Bar Association President Bill Hart, Judge Sparks was given the oath by County Judge Scott Bailey. The ceremony took place before a "just-hung" portrait of the late Judge T. M. Collie, whose place Sparks takes.

Judge Sparks, 70, was appointed by Gov. John Connally to the vacancy created by the death in December of Judge Collie, who had served the court for the past 12 years.

The judgeship was confirmed by the Senate executive committee Thursday at noon.

Following his swearing-in, Judge Sparks said: "This moment I come to with mixed emotions. For 46

years, all of them in Eastland County, I have been advocate of the law and now I find myself an administrator. Let me remind my fellow attorneys that this is the greatest profession on earth and that they may well be proud to be attorneys.

"When I was young, I wanted to be a lawyer, and as I grew older I wanted to serve on the bench. No one man is strong or wise enough to do a good job as judge. One does the best he can. I am proud I was in the Legislature when this 91st District Court was created first as a temporary court.

Sore Throat Is Health Warning


Sore throat is nature's warning system that something in your body is out of order. Often a sore throat accompanies a common cold and the soreness passes in a few days with no further affect. But, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association, sore throat also can be the symptom of any of a wide range of diseases, from diphtheria to leukemia, that require your doctor's skill, not your guessing, to diagnose. Sometimes tonsils and adenoids are involved in causing a sore throat, and when these organs cause trouble they frequently are removed. Tonsillectomy removals account for half of all operations performed on children, Today's Health reports. Sometimes the surgery helps prevent sore throat, sometimes it doesn't. Allergies can cause sore throats. Cold, dry winter air can trigger it. So can extreme thirst, excessive smoking or mouth breathing. Anything that dries out the throat and cuts off secretions that normally wash dust away. Virus infections of many types also are a cause of sore

Feed Grain Program Explained By Office

Countians signing up for the 1965 feed grain program were numerous at the beginning of the sign-up period, Feb. 8, Gilbert Meredith, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee manager, has announced, but has slowed down to about "15 a day now." Deadline for signing up is March 26. He explained the program briefly as follows, and announced that further information can be obtained from his office: "The program for 1965 is basically the same as in 1964. "It is voluntary and combines corn, grain sorghum, and barley in a single base. "Participating farmers will qualify for diverted-acre payments and price-support payments, and they will be eligible for price-support loans. "It offers producers another opportunity to reduce the grain surplus while maintaining, or improving feed grain income. "It will also exert a stabilizing influence on feed grain prices. Participation of more than a million farmers in each of the 1961, 1962, 1963, and 1964 programs will result in reducing the feed grain carryover stocks from 85 million tons down to about 58 million tons. "The 1965 program provides these improvements over the 1964 program:

"Opportunity to substitute wheat for feed grains by growers who take part in both programs. "A special provision for certain varieties of malting barley. **PARTICIPATION CHOICES** "Each feed grain producer who takes part may choose the eligible cropland to come out of feed production and go into conserving uses. To meet the needs of most farmers, the program provides a range in the acreage which may be diverted: 1. The smallest acreage of cropland that can be diverted for payment is 20 per cent of the feed grain base for the farm. 2. The largest acreage on which payment can be made for diversion is 50 per cent of the farm's feed grain base, or 25 acres if this is more than 50 per cent of the base. However, payment will not be made on more acres than are in the base. (No change from 1964 program except when an oat-rye base is established.) NEW LOAN PROGRAM READY TO BENEFIT FARM FAMILIES

A new loan program, recently announced by the Farmers Home Administration, is designed to help rural families finance enterprises that will improve their incomes, according to County Agricultural Agent, J. M. Cooper.

The FHA County Supervisor, H. P. Cole, has informed Mr. Cooper that the new loans are a part of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. They can provide up to \$2,500 for up to 15 years at a 4 1/2 percent interest rate. Rural residents can get the loans on the basis of their ability and character.

According to Mr. Cole, the loans are for people who know a good way to increase their income, but who cannot readily get financing through regular credit channels.

The county agent said farmers can borrow for improvements, land, equipment, livestock, machinery, buildings or

other items that will add to their income from farming.

Non-farm rural residents can use the same plan to finance a small business, trade or service. This includes loans to set-up such things as small repair shops.

Another provision of the new FHA program provides loans to established cooperatives for processing, marketing and other services of benefit to farmers.

Anyone interested in additional information about the new loans should contact their county FHA supervisor, located at Room 420 Petroleum Bldg. Eastland, Texas, or their county agricultural agent.

Gibbins Bill To Require Labels On Foreign Meat

AUSTIN — Rep. Wayne Gibbins of Breckenridge, co-author of a House bill to require labeling of imported meat in Texas, today expressed confidence that the measure will become law.

Strongly backed by legislators from stock-raising areas, the proposed act (HB 58) would require any person selling foreign meat to display conspicuously cards and labels disclosing the country of origin.

Wholesalers would have to label each cut or portion of any imported meat, and retailers would have to take the following steps:

1. Place a card on each tray or display table of imported meat, showing that it is imported and indicating the country of origin.
2. Label each package of meat in the same manner.
3. Place a clearly visible placard on the meat display table showing that imported meat is being sold by the establishment.

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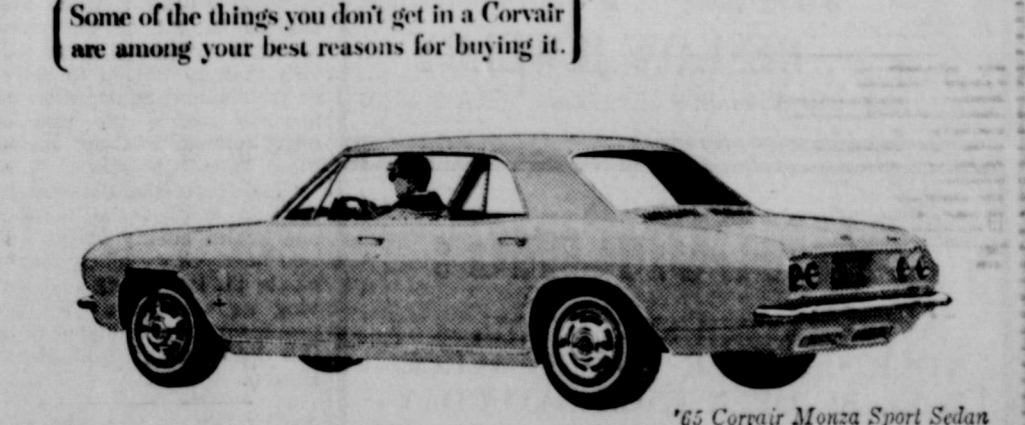
