An average of 13,271 vehicles pass through Eastland every day on U.S. Highway 80, M. O. McDowell, superintendent of the highway construction firm of Cooper and Woodruf, told Eastland Lions Tuesday, emphasizing the importance of the highway to the city's economy.

"And there's an average yearly increase of some seven percent." McDowell, a veteran highway builder, told

Complimenting the Texas Highway Department and particularly the local engineering office, Mr. McDowell explained how highway building proecdures have changed in the past few years. "It used to be an under-the-table operation," he said, "but no more. Texas has the most efficient highway department in the nation. There are no irregularities."

He carefully explained the procedure whereby companies such as his are awarded contracts, pointing out the various requirements, including experience records, financial ability. presentation of a check for five per cent of the job's cost, performance bonds




