

Some mastics are highly flammable, and they may involve you in a serious flash fire.



Any person not now a No-tary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk before May 20, 1965. Application during this period will assure that the appointment will be made in sufficient time for the applicant to qualify at the begin-ning of the new term.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a com-mission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the ap-plicant must be furnished the County Clerk.
